We honour Tasmanian Aboriginal people as the traditional custodians of lutruwita and pay our deep respects to Elders past and present. Their knowledge, strength and resistance continue to guide truth, learning and meaningful change.

People experiences sexual violence in different ways. Culture, identity, age, disability, gender, sexuality, family, community and life experiences can shape what support feels safe and helpful.

We learn from people with lived experience and value their voices in helping us improve our services.
