Objectives and activities

Next Chapter Scotland exists to help anyone in Scotland who has been involved with the criminal justice system to navigate the stigma and discrimination that they can face throughout their lives.

We established in 2022 and became a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO) in 2023.

Our Vision

Our vision is of a future society in which everyone is treated equally for who they are in the present and no one's future is defined by their past.

Our Mission

Our mission is to help people in Scotland who have been involved with the criminal justice system to navigate the stigma and discrimination they can face.

Who we support

We support:

- People who have a criminal record
- People under investigation for a crime
- Family members of the above groups

Our Key Messages

- We help people to navigate the personal, financial, emotional and social consequences for them or their family members of having a criminal record or of being under investigation for a crime.
- We commit to giving honest, non-judgemental help to anyone facing any kind of criminal investigation or after any kind of conviction. This includes their family members.
- We put people's lived experiences at the heart of everything we do.

- We gather knowledge about what impact these consequences have on people, families and communities by listening to people with lived and direct experience.
- We know that people who have a criminal record or are being investigated for a crime face stigma. We share insights about how that causes exclusion and discrimination of people in our society.
- We advocate for effective, balanced and informed change in our criminal justice system in order to create a better and safer society.
- We do not seek to rewrite the past but use our understanding of the present to create a better future for everyone.

Trustee recruitment and appointment

We are run by a Board of Trustees made up of at least 50% people with a criminal record or a close family member of someone with a criminal record. We made this commitment because we believe that people who have lived through the experience should be at the heart of any changes that will improve their lives and the lives of their peers.

Achievements and performance

Headlines for 2024-25

Share clear and accessible information to help people to navigate the stigma and discrimination they can face

Our helpline service, that originated as an information, advice and signposting service, has now expanded to include much needed advocacy for those people facing the most complex of circumstances. Our new advocacy service launched on the 1st September and the demand is already outstretching our capacity.

- In the last 12 months we have supported 290 people via our helpline (324 since it launched).
- Over 16,000 website visitors (over 24,000 since we launched) and 29,000 page views.
- In the last 12 months we have provided support across 45 outreach venues, connecting with over 2,500 people.
- Our Listening Ear service combats isolation by matching people with a volunteer who can give them a safe space to talk, once a week. We currently have 8 matches underway.

Our Advocacy Project will begin accepting referrals in early 2026. There is a vacuum in Scotland: once your criminal law solicitor has supported you through to sentencing, there is no-one to then support you through any rights violations you might face whilst undertaking your sentence. We want to go some way towards filling that gap.

Bring people together to foster hope and amplify voices

Through our Amplifying Voices project we have heard the experiences of **over 300 people**, from 29 of the 32 local authority areas in Scotland. 12 themes were identified from the data:

Mental health and trauma Stigma
Physical health Racism

Finances and employment Impacts on families

Navigating the justice system Effective representation and advocacy Accountability Person-Centredness
Moving On
Speaking Up and Lived Experience

Our final report, entitled 'What is the Point?: The Human Impact of Scotland's Justice System' not only fills key knowledge gaps around the true effects of the criminal justice system, but serves as a call to action by making a series of recommendations which would make real changes to people's lives.

Over the course of the year we have helped people to be heard by the Scottish Government in relation to Scotland's Anti-Racism Observatory, National Justice Social Work Standards and Outcomes, Sentencing and Penal Policy Commission and the National Care Service Charter of Rights. We have also shared data with Police Scotland on why people feel unable to make formal complaints. Additionally, we have facilitated lived experience input into a number of pieces of academic research.

In the last year, we have established a Research Ethics Committee (REC) with four academics from academic institutions across the UK. The role of the REC is to ensure that all of our research activities place the safety and wellbeing of participants at their core. At present we are undertaking research into the Moorov Doctrine and human rights breaches in the community.

Support people to challenge discrimination

We have developed and launched two training courses:

- Defend Your Rights! This skills-based course takes a human rights-based approach to supporting people to support themselves.
 The course helps participants to: understand their rights; know how to defend their rights when they are at risk of being violated; and develop their assertiveness and self-advocacy skills. (In person and online)
- **Surviving the Storm** The UK's first and only course designed specifically for people with a conviction for a sexual offence, written by people who've been there. A rights-based manual to surviving life after conviction for a sexual offence. (Online)

Help to breathe life into the ideas that people have of how to improve 'the system'

Over the past year, we have done the groundwork for a number of projects that have come directly from people who have been involved with the criminal justice system:

- A podcast
- Support for people to become self-employed
- An employability trading arm

We hope to bring these projects to fruition over the coming year.

Operational development

We currently have seven Trustees (including our CEO), five of whom have lived experience of the criminal justice system.

Our team has expanded to include 6 part-time, paid team members, amounting to approximately 1.8 FTE.

We have supported student placements from the University of the West of Scotland, the University of Strathclyde, the University of Stirling, the University of Glasgow, Glasgow Caledonian University. We value the contribution student's make to our team as they both increase our capacity significantly and also bring with the fresh views and insights that never fail to contribute to our overall development as an organisation.

Our volunteers support almost every aspect of our work:

- Listening Ear project
- Legal support
- Social media
- Advocacy
- Media liaison
- Speaking Up and Speaking Out
- Trustees

We are so very grateful for their time and dedication. We intend to expand our volunteer offering even further in 2026, introducing volunteer roles within our helpline team.

During the year we worked with a communications consultant to develop a Communications Plan and developed a new strategic plan for 2026 – 2029. Our new Strategic Plan includes the following priorities:

- 1. Providing clear and accessible information, signposting and advocacy to support people to navigate stigma and discrimination and defend their rights.
- 2. Promoting wellbeing by fostering hope and tackling isolation.
- 3. Bringing people together to amplify their voices.
- 4. Undertaking research that places the human experience at its centre.
- 5. Challenging stigma through influencing and advocacy.
- 6. Developing the charity into a sustainable, resilient organisation.

Financial review

Funders

We are incredibly grateful to our funders for their financial support. The breakdown of the funds received can be viewed later in the Accounts.

Donors

We are also unendingly thankful to those individuals and organisations who have chosen to make donations to the charity. We are so grateful, not only for the financial support but also for their solidarity with our aims.

Reserves

At present our reserves policy covers our essential costs (including insurance, webhosting, bank fees and independent examination of accounts). This figure currently amounts to £1,100.

We currently have these reserves protected.

Over the coming 12 months we intend to increase this figure to cover both the match funding requirements of The National Lottery Community Fund – Fairer Life Chances grant and also developing redundancy liability now that our staff are approaching 2 full years of employment.
