

2025 PROGRAMMING REVIEW: CELEBRATING PROGRAMMING WINS

A YEAR OF PURPOSEFUL AND DIVERSE PROGRAMMING

In 2025, O Cinema presented 50+ distinct film runs and special events, underscoring its capacity to sustain year-round cultural programming. This volume speaks to operational strength, while the content itself reflects thoughtful curation grounded in artistic excellence and social relevance.

Audiences were consistently invited into timely conversations through film, reinforcing O Cinema's role as a cultural curator within Miami's arts landscape.

At O Cinema, belonging is the unifying thread. Whether presenting challenging documentaries, foreign-language gems, or large-scale cult classics, O Cinema intentionally creates a safe, welcoming space where difference is celebrated.

The **shared theatrical experience** remains vital. it is where **voices are amplified**, **community is forged**, and **cultural dialogue thrives**.

STANDOUT FILMS & EVENTS

Several titles exemplify the strength and range of the year's programming. *No Other Land* anchored O Cinema's commitment to urgent, globally resonant storytelling, demonstrating the organization's willingness to present challenging work that sparks dialogue and reflection.

Lift showcased contemporary independent cinema with broad audience appeal, while *K-Pop Demon Slayers* highlighted O Cinema's ability to program genre-bending, youth-engaging, and culturally current content.

Post-screening discussions, repeat attendance, and community buzz underscore O Cinema's role as a forum for public discourse and collective experience.

Together, these films illustrate a curatorial philosophy that **embraces both artistic risk and accessibility to cultural moments** in South Florida.

EMBEDDED COMMITMENT TO REPRESENTATION, EQUITY & ACCESS

A defining programming win in 2025 was the depth of representation across the slate, paired with a clear commitment to equity and access. More than 20 films directed by women were programmed, alongside strong inclusion of BIPOC, LGBTQ+, and international filmmakers.

These works were not siloed into isolated showcases but integrated throughout the calendar, affirming that inclusive storytelling is central not supplemental to O Cinema's mission.

By presenting films at **accessible price points** within a neighborhood venue, O Cinema ensured that a broad cross-section of the community could engage with cultural work.

FLEXIBILITY & RESPONSIVENESS

Carefully selected one-off events and limited runs performed especially well, indicating strong audience trust and effective contextualization of ambitious films that invite conversation and community engagement. O Cinema's strategic balance of one-night events and longer theatrical runs allowed the organization to remain responsive to cultural moments and community interests.

This flexible programming model reduced financial risk while increasing reach, enabling O Cinema to **spotlight timely films and emerging voices** without compromising fiscal responsibility.

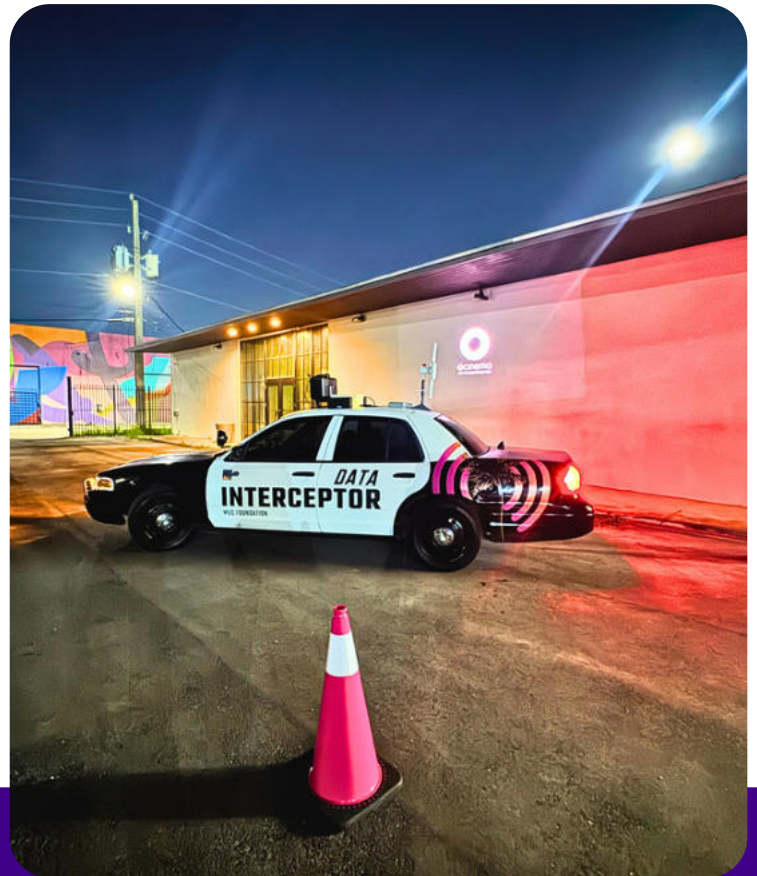
MUD FOUNDATION × O CINEMA AT O CINEMA LITTLE RIVER

During Art Basel week, MUD Foundation transformed O Cinema Little River into a multi-faceted art and technology hub, offering a preview of what our future multiplex campus will enable. Ahead of renovations beginning later this year, the activation demonstrated how cinema can intersect with visual art, data, and emerging technologies.

The exhibition, *Looking at Models*, explored how artificial intelligence, data, and computational systems shape the realities we live in. Through photography, new media, and generative art, participating artists questioned the structures behind the images we trust and the systems that produce them.

Public programming featured curator talks, artist presentations including Michael Mandiberg's *Taking Stock* and the electrifying *Night of the Living Code*. Guerrilla Hotspot projections extended the experience beyond the building, bringing digital art to unexpected corners of the city and engaging new audiences in public space.

This collaboration offered just a glimpse of what O Cinema's new campus will make possible. MUD Foundation will have an XRHub Lab at the O Cinema: Art Film Experiences in support O Verse, a new infrastructure for immersive cinema and community storytelling. More than a cinema, the Little River site will become a vibrant cultural hub with multi-use screening rooms, gallery space, flexible event areas, and a café and lounge designed to foster community connection, experimentation, and year-round cultural exchange.

O CINEMA IN LIBRARIES & MUSEUMS



O Cinema is proud to have launched its digital OCVR library initiative, extending access to its films and educational resources beyond the theater with virtual reality headsets.

Continuing into 2025, this program aimed to bring an O Cinema experience to Miami-Dade County library branches touching residents from 7 to 70 years old –

reinforcing the organization's commitment to equity, access, and lifelong cultural impact.



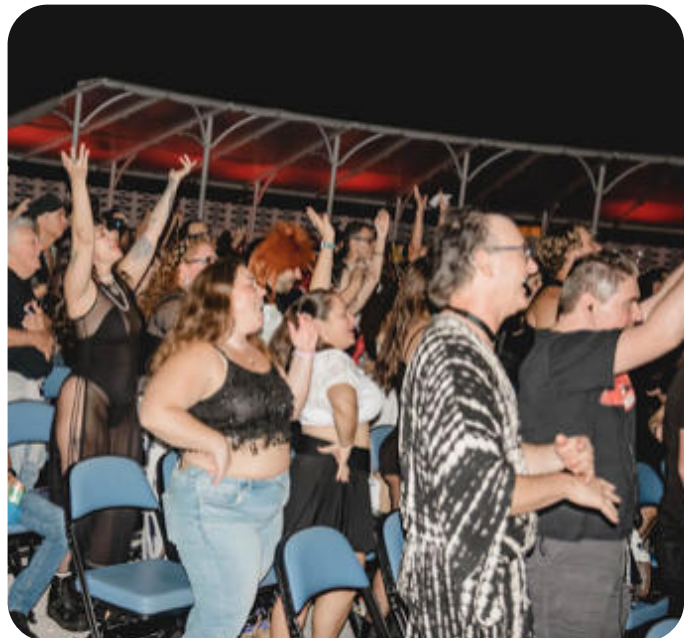
50TH ANNIVERSARY ROCKY HORROR PICTURE SHOW



O Cinema was elated to once again return to the Miami Beach Bandshell for the annual Rocky Horror Picture Show screening, a beloved tradition attracting nearly 500 patrons each year. This immersive outdoor event brings the iconic cult classic to life through costumes, participation, and communal celebration from the Time Warp dance to the shared joy of ritual and performance.

Now in O Cinema's 14th year of presenting Rocky Horror as a live show experience and marking the film's 50th anniversary, the phenomenon of participation, identity, and belonging remains vibrantly alive in Miami.

The event exemplifies what independent cinema can be: **inclusive, community-centered, joyful and trendsetting.**
