# Growth, Inequity, and Opportunity in a Rapidly Expanding Metro

The Phoenix metropolitan area is one of the fastest-growing regions in the United States, and with that growth comes intensifying social, economic, and environmental pressures. In 2026, nonprofits across Phoenix and Maricopa County are navigating a complex funding landscape shaped by population growth, housing affordability challenges, climate stress, and widening income disparities.

Phoenix nonprofits serve communities experiencing:

- Rising housing insecurity and homelessness
- Workforce displacement amid rapid economic change
- Heat-related health risks and environmental inequity
- Persistent gaps in education, healthcare access, and services for immigrants and tribal communities

Grantmakers in the region increasingly prioritize equity, scalability, and systems-level impact, while also demanding strong operational capacity and measurable outcomes. Funding opportunities exist at the city, county, state, and private foundation levels, but competition is intense — especially for organizations without established infrastructure or regional partnerships.

# Most Competitive Grants in Phoenix

## Piper Trust Organizational Effectiveness Grants

Extremely competitive; favors mature nonprofits with leadership stability

## City of Phoenix CDBG & ESG Grants

Federal compliance required; limited funding relative to need

## Maricopa County Homelessness & Behavioral Health Grants

Strong preference for coordinated, system-aligned providers

## Arizona Community Foundation Competitive Funds

High volume of applicants statewide; Phoenix organizations must clearly justify local need

# Macroeconomic & Social Trends Impacting Phoenix Nonprofits

## Housing & Homelessness

- Phoenix continues to experience severe housing affordability challenges
- Rising rents and limited affordable housing stock drive homelessness
- Funders prioritize prevention, stabilization, and coordinated entry participation

## Climate & Heat Resilience

- Extreme heat disproportionately impacts:
  - Unhoused individuals
  - Seniors
  - Outdoor workers
- Heat mitigation, cooling centers, and public health preparedness are growing funding areas

## Income Inequality & Workforce Shifts

- Rapid economic growth has not benefited all residents equally
- Workforce development grants increasingly require employer alignment and credentialing pathways

## Immigrant, Refugee & Tribal Communities

- Phoenix has a large Latino and immigrant population
- Proximity to tribal nations creates unique service needs
- Funders emphasize culturally competent, community-led solutions

## Education & Youth Opportunity Gaps

- Title I schools in South and West Phoenix remain under-resourced
- Funders prioritize:
  - Early childhood education
  - Postsecondary access
  - Youth workforce pipelines

# Best Practices for Competing in Phoenix's Grant Landscape

## Demonstrate Place-Based Impact

- 1 Clearly define neighborhoods served (e.g., South Phoenix, Maryvale, West Phoenix).
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## Align with Regional Systems

- 2 Participation in coordinated entry, workforce boards, or public health collaboratives strengthens applications.
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## Invest in Compliance

- 3 Public grants require strong fiscal controls, audits, and reporting discipline.
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## Center Equity in Operations

- 4 Equity must be reflected in leadership, staffing, and community engagement.
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## Build Strategic Partnerships

- 5 Joint proposals with healthcare systems, cities, or school districts are increasingly favored.
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## Show Learning & Adaptation

- 6 Funders value transparency, iteration, and continuous improvement.
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## Maintain Visibility

- 7 Engage in county planning efforts, advisory boards, and sector convenings.

### Public Grant Compliance

- Familiarity with federal and state reporting requirements
- Financial tracking and internal controls
- Audit readiness

## Post-Award Systems

- Outcome tracking tools
- Sustainability planning
- Regular funder communication processes

## Fundraising Relationship Building

- Attendance at funder briefings and webinars
- Proactive stewardship of past funders
- Consistent sharing of impact stories

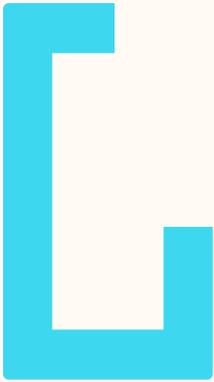
Nonprofits that invest in systems, partnerships, and impact measurement will be best positioned to secure funding and scale solutions in Maricopa County.
