

Indigenous Birthworker— Postpartum Micro-credential Course

45 hours of online self-paced content + community-based activities





What is the Indigenous Birthworker—Postpartum Micro-credential course?

In this course, participants will learn about Indigenous philosophies related to birth, newborns, and the postpartum period. Participants will learn what to expect after birth, what the recovery process might look like, and complications that may occur during this time. Participants will explore ways to support the parent after birth, including methods to promote parent and infant bonding, and infant care and feeding techniques with a focus on breast/chestfeeding. Postpartum mental health and ways to support the health and well-being of the birthing parent will also be discussed as well as tips for starting a Birthworker business. This course includes Anishinaabemowin (Ojibwe) language training that aligns with the content to assist in communicating with the birthing parent and family.

The Indigenous Birthworker—Postpartum Course is the third course in the Indigenous Birthworker Microcredential series created based on identified community needs as reported in the Midwifery Summits of 2019 and 2023 held in Thunder Bay, Ontario.

- Anishinaabemowin (Ojibwe) phrases and terminology relevant to the field

Requirements

Participants must purchase the required textbooks for this course.

Course Hours

The Indigenous Birthworker–Postpartum microcredential course is a total of 45 hours. Participants will do the majority of their learning in an online, asynchronous format with additional community-based activities.

What Does an Indigenous Birthworker Do?

The Indigenous Birthworker helps to educate, support, and advocate for new parents to help build healthy, happy families. An Indigenous Birthworker is similar to a Doula in their scope of practice (they are not a healthcare provider, but a support person) with the background, knowledge, and ability to support community members. Throughout their learning journey, the Birthworker course participants are prompted to reach out to community members and reflect on their own cultural traditions and teachings to honour traditional ways to better help and support community members. Indigenous Birthworkers can follow along with their clients' pregnancy and birth journeys both online/via phone and in-person to provide ongoing support and guidance and can be available as needed for questions and further support.
