Students will receive practical and theoretical exposure to various traditional activities that take place during the summer moon-cycles. Insights into traditional practices such as planting, fishing, gathering medicine, and ceremonies that are part of the Anishinaabe way of a good life will be granted. Opportunities to engage in land-based learning that enable students to practice Anishinaabe teachings will also be made available when and where possible. Students will learn about interrelationships between Anishinaabe peoples and their relatives from guest speakers, including Elders, traditional stewards of knowledge, and community leaders. The course will be taught using Anishinaabe worldview, with a focus on decolonizing assumptions and stereotypes about Indigenous peoples. We are also focusing on the Fall instead of summer moon-cycles. Qualifications: Must have a Master's in related field (but will consider applicants with relevant lived experience). Must have majored in an Indigenous field of study at the undergraduate level or above. Knowledge of Anishinaabe culture, history, and practices. Knowledge of an Indigenous language is an asset. Five years teaching experience is preferred. Have evidence of having experiential learning related to Anishinaabe practices. Have demonstrated experience with Anishinaabe communities, culture, and

	history. Have experience with related practices such as (but not limited to): active participation in ceremonies, beadwork, maple syrup production, drum making, land-based learning, pow-wow organization, language immersion, etc. Must be prepared to teach the course through Contact North technology, google meet, zoom, and in-person(blended format) at Oshki-Wenjack Education Institute, Thunder Bay, Ontario.
