



Context: The Convergence of Three US Phenomena

ABSTRACT

Small businesses are the primary driver of economic growth and job creation in the US, yet half fail by year five and over two thirds fail by year ten (US Census Bureau, 2016). Supporting small businesses through an entrepreneurial ecosystem greatly increases chances of success for these firms, which our economy relies on. Further, soaring tuition cost, student debt, and a rapidly changing world are eroding confidence in the value and relevance of formal degrees (Gallup, 2019). Colleges that provide business incubation and acceleration models foster business growth while demonstrating value to stakeholders.

The convergence of US economic development initiatives and the phenomenon of business incubation has positioned community colleges as an ideal host for business incubation/acceleration. This mixed methods, case study is a model for community colleges to explore whether a business incubator and/or accelerator make sense as part of their strategic planning and institutional economic development initiatives.





Incubators & Entrepreneurship Centers

Entrepreneurship centers in our network include incubators, accelerators, small business development centers (SBDC's), and other organizations. These centers support startup companies in rural, urban, and developing countries around the world.



Shared Workspaces

The explosion of coworking and makerspaces has created a renaissance era in shared workspaces. Shared spaces enable diverse groups of entrepreneurs, remote workers, and other independent professionals to share resources, knowledge, and networks.



University Entrepreneurship Centers

Our network of universities are critical for the commercialization and incubation of startups. Some of the more prominent industries include "deep tech" fields like biotech, clean energy, and advanced manufacturing, which are led by students and researchers that leverage university labs and resources to launch their companies.



Government & Economic Development Organizations

EDO's and government policy makers are quickly realizing that startups and small businesses drive job creation faster than large corporations. The rise of innovation districts and investment in entrepreneurial economic development is critical for job creation and economic prosperity.



What Does Success Look Like for Non-profit Incubators?

The goal of a non-profit incubator is to set up a robust entity that can sustain the creation of value in a local economy. Possible metrics include ongoing impact in the form of new entrepreneurs created, jobs created, and revenue to fuel local economies. According to the **Aspen Institute** and National Entrepreneurship Network of India (2013) white paper, however, these developments typically take between four to five years to mature and require a different focus, resources, and outcomes along the way as the incubator progresses.

Over the long term, revenue and jobs are goals of an incubator but, according to the white paper, they may also be useful as active indicators to determine the immediate success of the startup.


