

### **Key findings**

- The take-out from the news this week is that the situation is getting better at home and worse abroad, with the US standing out as a situation that has gotten out of control.
- The mood continues to be positive, and the sense that we have turned a corner is strengthening. But many are still finding it hard to shake the feeling of dread.
- This week there has been a noticeable shift in behavior. Diarists are visiting restaurants, pubs and taking public transport for the first time, and reporting being pleasantly surprised.
- Government approval is ticking up, and support for economic measures is high. Rishi Sunak is seen to be the driving force of the economic response and is well liked for this.
- For those who have noticed him, Keir Starmer has made a strong impression in his first 100 days. But most in our sample say they don't know much and rarely hear about him.


### Overall the mood continues to be hopeful, but some Diarists fear this may be an intermission, rather than the end of the crisis


"I think the worst is yet to come, and if a second spike hits, we could fall into an economic depression of the likes we have never seen."

## Diarists are feeling more relaxed about the present, but concern is rising about the coming of winter



"I'm hopeful we can overcome this as lockdown is easing and deaths are falling."

- The falling R rate is increasing confidence and hope that the virus may be under control in the UK.
- But news about the airborne nature of the virus, and its ability to spread faster in colder weather has Diarists worried about a second wave in the winter.

"I'm very concerned that the optimum temperature for transmission appears to be the usual temperature in January and February."

#### Julie, Over 65, Dorset\*

Julie is feeling the most positive she has done in months. She is off to see her grandchildren next week, has managed to get a hair appointment booked, and is going to the shops again.


"I have felt better this week as things have opened up. We are still being very careful and wear masks indoors in public spaces and keep our distance."

#### Luke, Under 25, Kent\*

Luke is confused as to what he should be doing. He thinks the risk of the virus is still high and wonders why others around him seem to be giving it so little thought.

"Everyone seems oblivious, happy to go about their day-to-day lives without worrying about coronavirus. It makes you question your own stance. Should I be more carefree? Or am I just being overly paranoid?"

## Despite concern that things are moving too fast, the public (and our Diarists) are starting to embrace the freedoms already granted



- 51% of the public think we are coming out of lockdown too fast, with only 27% saying we're going at the right pace, and only 10% saying we're going too slowly.
- However, tracking data shows that confidence is slowly returning.
- In our work we've seen a noticeable shift this week in the number of Diarists who are willing to go to restaurants, pubs etc. Many report good experiences...

### Diarists who have taken advantage of new freedoms report feeling impressed by the measures in place, and say they feel safe



"I went to eat inside a restaurant for the first time. It felt safe and well-managed which gave me hope that physically-distanced social events can still be fun."

"I had my hair cut for the first time in 4 months as I was in the shielding category. Everyone was following the guidelines wearing masks and visors and I felt very safe. I felt so much better afterwards."

"I used public transport (train) for the first time in four months, and it was actually fine. There were about 6 people in my carriage, all wearing facemasks. Everyone was sat at least one row away from each other. I was pleasantly surprised."

# However, there are clear limits to this; foreign travel is still seen as out of the question for most

#### Willingness to travel abroad

"I'm not comfortable sitting on a plane for hours with so many people. I will think about going abroad next year, but again will depend on my comfort levels with having an underlying health condition."

"We would like to see how things go with regards to further spikes, and how safe air travel really is. If things improve, and the risk becomes less, and this is a big IF, we would consider going to Cyprus perhaps in September/October time."


"I would consider taking a break to Europe in the autumn if I was confident that infection rates are lower. I think Europe mainly because of short flight times and the ability for it to only be a short weekend trip."

Under 25.

- When asked whether they would consider going abroad this year, the vast majority of Diarists said 'no'. This
  was driven as much by concerns about the journey (particularly air travel) as about the possibility of contracting the
  virus in another country.
- Those who said 'yes' said this wouldn't be until later in the year, and was dependent on the risk level falling, both in the UK and in the destination country.

### Government approval is ticking upwards as the public start to feel confident that the situation is under control





Approval of government handling of the crisis is improving although most still consider it to be performing poorly (43% disapproving versus 33% approving).

In our work, we can see that some feel that recent announcements show the government has turned a corner. "I believe they're managing it quite well now, especially with the travel restrictions, compulsory face masks and gradual easing of lockdown restrictions."





## Keir Starmer has made a good impression on some; 49% say their view of Labour has improved over his first 100 days



- Polling shows Keir Starmer is performing better than Boris Johnson on nearly every metric.
- However, these numbers are not as dramatic when the 'don't knows' are taken into account. In our work we can see that most people still don't feel they know much about Keir Starmer, and don't feel they are hearing much from him either.

"He doesn't seem to stand out in the news much. I did pick up on how he stood against Johnson about the track and trace numbers."
