The scene was documented with the use of the FARO Focus 3D terrestrial laser scanner. It was used to capture the scene and evidence. The scanner combines 3D laser measurements to create a cohesive point cloud. The scanner information was used to produce a Scene2Go using FARO Zone 3D software.

I later booked into evidence one disc of the raw data evidence captured by the Faro Scanner and one disc of the processed Scene2Go data.

SCENE:

The Ashton Apartment complex is a multi-building residential complex located on the northwest corner of N. McKinley Street and Promenade Avenue in Corona, California. Each apartment unit is marked with a numerical address affixed to the exterior, facing the internal roadways and adjacent parking stalls.

The suspect vehicle, a gold four-door 1998 Toyota Camry bearing California license plate 4CWZ933, was located within the complex. The vehicle was backed into the third parking stall north of a dumpster enclosure, just east of the building located at 628 Stoneybrook Drive. The building number "628" was affixed to the east exterior wall and was clearly visible from the street without obstruction.

DIGITAL EVIDENCE:

Photos of the suspect vehicle's exterior, the carport area where the victim's daughter is known to park and a video taken of this area were uploaded into Evidence.com.

ASSISTING PERSONNEL:

Forensic Specialist L. Walker photographed the suspect vehicle and collected evidence within the vehicle. For details, refer to her supplemental report.

DETAILS:

On 03-20-26, I assisted with a homicide investigation that occurred at 615 Stoneybrook Drive, Apartment #349, in Corona, California. This location is within the Ashton Apartment Complex. I was assigned to search a vehicle pursuant to a search warrant obtained by detectives. The vehicle, a gold four-door 1998 Toyota Camry bearing California license plate 4CWZ933 (VIN: JT2BG22K4W0261745), was believed to belong to suspect Roy Lee Starks.

The Toyota was found backed into a parking stall just east of the building located at 628 Stoneybrook Drive. The vehicle did not have tinted windows, and a cellular phone was visible in plain view on the driver's seat. It was later discovered that this cellphone did not have power. The vehicle doors were unlocked, and at 1452 hours, the search of the vehicle commenced.

During the search, a second cellular phone was located on the center console next to the gear shifter; this phone had power. Two prescription pill bottles were located in the glove compartment. One bottle was labeled "Roy Stark," and the other was labeled "Denise Stark." During a search of the trunk, a Ziploc bag containing numerous prescription pill bottles bearing the name "Roy Stark" was also located. I requested that Forensic Specialist Lynsey Walker photograph these items and collect the cellular phones as evidence. For additional details, refer to her report. At the conclusion of the search, the vehicle was secured and left parked within the complex.

I was later advised that the victim's [REDACTED] is assigned parking stall [REDACTED] and normally parks her vehicle in the carport located on the southeast corner of [REDACTED]. This parking space is approximately 65 feet from where the suspect vehicle was parked. I photographed the area and also recorded video footage as I walked from that location to the victim's apartment building. These images and video were uploaded to Evidence.com.

Note:

A 9mm round stamped "WIN 9mm LUGER" is issued by the Corona Police Department as 9mm, 147-grain hollow-point duty ammunition.

A 5.56mm round stamped "WMA21 5.56mm" is issued by the Corona Police Department as 5.56, 77-grain hollow-point duty ammunition.

All rounds located on both officers were department-issued duty ammunition.

Details:

On 03-20-26 at approximately 0920 hours, I responded to the Corona Police Department SEB conference room to assist with an officer-involved shooting investigation. Upon my arrival, I spoke to Sergeant R. Slane, and the following is a summary of my interaction and observations.

Sergeant R. Slane stated that he has not altered his uniform or equipment since the incident. Sergeant R. Slane was wearing a "Class C" uniform, which consists of a blue short-sleeve shirt with "Corona Police" patches on both shoulders. He was wearing blue pants and black boots. Sergeant R. Slane was wearing a black, external-load-bearing ballistic vest. Over his right chest, he had "R Slane" with the word "POLICE" below it. Both words were in grey, block-lettering. Over Sergeant R. Slane's right chest was a cloth Corona Police badge. On the rear of the vest, towards the top, was another patch that stated "R. Slane" in grey block lettering, and in large grey block lettering was the word "POLICE." Sergeant R. Slane was wearing a black hat marked "Corona Police" in white lettering.

I first inspected Sergeant R. Slane's duty handgun. The following is what I discovered:

The firearm was in a Safariland "automatic locking system" holster, and the retention appeared to be working as designed. This was mounted to his duty belt on the right hip. I removed the firearm and noted it was a Glock 34, 9mm, serial number [REDACTED]. The pistol was equipped with a TLR1 weapon-mounted light, which was working. The pistol was equipped with iron sights, which were visible through the mounted optic. This pistol was equipped with a Holosun 509T pistol-mounted optic, which was working. I cleared the pistol and found one (1) 9mm round in the chamber stamped "WIN 9mm LUGER." The magazine inserted into the pistol was a factory Glock magazine. I found eleven (11) rounds in the magazine, all stamped the same as above.

I collected the firearm, the above-described magazine, and rounds, and gave them to Detective Arens.

The only other item on Sergeant R. Slane's duty belt was a department-issued TASER 10 serial number T19C73119, which still had ten (10) unfired cartridges, with a battery level of 88%. When the TASER was activated, a forward-facing white light and a green laser were activated. The TASER's self-check indicated it was functional.

I inspected Sergeant R. Slane's load-bearing vest and found the following:

Behind the front main pocket of the vest, the lower right panel held one (1) Magpul AR magazine containing twenty-eight (28) department-issued 5.56 rifle rounds. Inside the main pouch, I located notetaking materials, one working Noxon Flashlight, and one window punch.

Above the main pouch, attached to the vest, was a multi-tool. To the left of the main pouch, in the center of the vest, was one (1) 4oz can of Saber Red department-issued pepper spray, which appeared to be full, with an expiration date of 2022. To the left of the pepper spray was one (1) Apex Next Motorola radio, serial number 142CZZ0310. The radio was working at the time of my inspection.

I also found two horizontal magazine pouches on his vest, beneath the pepper spray and radio.

In the magazine pouch at the top, I found one (1) factory Glock magazine capable of holding seventeen (17) rounds. I located seventeen (17) rounds in this magazine, all stamped "WIN 9mm LUGER."

In the magazine pouch at the bottom, I found one (1) factory Glock magazine capable of holding seventeen (17) rounds. I located seventeen (17) rounds in this magazine, all stamped "WIN 9mm LUGER."

On the left panel of the vest, I located one department-issued "Rapid Containment Baton" which appeared to be working as designed. On the right panel of the vest, I located a pocket with one department-issued, unused Narcan.

On the back panel of the vest, on the left and right side I found handcuffs in handcuff cases.

In Sergeant R. Slane's left cargo pocket, I located one Surefire working flashlight and one black Kershaw folding knife. In his right cargo pocket, I located 1 department-issued TARP.

This concluded my interaction with Sergeant R. Slane

I then spoke to Cpl. Remington, and the following is a summary of my findings.

Cpl. Remington stated that he has not changed or altered his uniform or equipment since the incident. Cpl. Remington was wearing a "Class C" uniform, which consists of a blue long-sleeve shirt with "Corona Police" patches on both shoulders. He was wearing blue pants and black boots. Cpl. Remington was wearing a black, external-load-bearing ballistic vest. Over his right chest, he had "B Remington" with the word "POLICE" below it. Both words were in grey, block-lettering. Over Cpl. Remington's right chest was a cloth Corona Police badge. On the rear of the vest, towards the top, was another patch that stated, "B Remington" in grey block lettering, and in large grey block lettering was the word "POLICE." Cpl. Remington was wearing a black hat with a green SRT Logo in the center front.

I first inspect Cpl. Remington's duty handgun. The following is what I discovered:

The firearm was in a Safariland "automatic locking system" holster, and the retention appeared to be working as designed. This was mounted to his duty belt on his right hip. I removed the firearm and noted it was a Smith & Wesson M&P 2.0 Competitor, 9mm, serial number [REDACTED]. The pistol was equipped with a working Modlite weapon-mounted light. The pistol was equipped with iron sights, which were visible through the mounted optic. This pistol was equipped with a Holosun 507 pistol-mounted optic, which was working. I cleared the pistol and found one (1) 9mm round in the chamber stamped "WIN 9mm LUGER." The magazine inserted into the pistol was a factory Smith & Wesson magazine capable of holding seventeen (17) rounds. I found ten (10) rounds, all stamped the same.

I collected the firearm, the above-described magazine, and rounds, and gave them to Detective Arens.

Also located on Cpl. Remington's duty belt was an empty tourniquet holder forward of his holster. Behind the holster was a multi-tool clipped to the duty belt. On Cpl. Remington's left side, I located two magazine pouches. In the pouch nearest his belt buckle, I located

one Smith & Wesson factory magazine filled to capacity with seventeen (17) rounds. In the next magazine pouch, I located one Smith & Wesson factory magazine filled to capacity with seventeen (17) rounds. Cpl. Remington also had a dump pouch on his duty belt, which was rolled up and empty.

I inspected Cpl. Remington's load-bearing vest and found the following:

Behind the front main pocket of the vest, the lower right panel held one crowbar-type tool. Inside the main pouch, I located notetaking materials, keys, and his department-issued cellphone.

To the left of the main pouch, in the center of the vest, was one department-issued TASER 10 serial number T19C73321, which still had ten (10) unfired cartridges, with a battery level of 91%. When the TASER was activated, a forward-facing white light and a green laser were activated. The TASER's self-check indicated it was functional. The TASER was positioned for a right-handed draw.

To the left of the TASER was one (1) Apex Next Motorola radio serial number 142CZZ0343. The radio was working at the time of my inspection.

On the left panel of the vest, I located a "Rapid Containment Baton" which appeared to be working as designed and positioned for a right-handed draw. Behind the baton, I located one 4-oz can of department-issued Saber Red pepper spray with unreadable markings. It appeared to be full and working as designed.

On the back panel of the vest, on the left side, I found handcuffs in a handcuff case.

On the right side of Cpl. Remington's vest, I located one set of handcuffs, and one working cloud defense flashlight.

In Cpl. Remington's left cargo pocket, I located one black folding knife. In his left cargo pocket, I located keys.

This concluded my interaction with Cpl. Remington.

I then spoke to Officer Aubert. Officer Aubert stated he had not changed or altered his uniform since the incident. Officer Aubert was wearing a traditional short-sleeved Class B uniform marked with Corona Police Patches on both shoulders. He was wearing a metal badge on his left chest and a silver nameplate on his right chest. He had a small working flashlight attached to his left lapel. In his left chest pocket, he had note-taking material, and in his right chest pocket, he had a cellphone. In Officer Aubert's left sap pocket, I located one tourniquet. In his right sap pocket, I located one black Milspec Tactical folding knife. In both of Officer Aubert's hip pockets I located keys.

I inspected his duty belt and located a Glock 47, serial number [REDACTED] secured in a level three holster on his right hip. I inspected the firearm further and discovered it was equipped with a TLR-1 weapon-mounted light. The firearm was equipped with iron sights visible through the mounted optic. The weapon was equipped with a Holosun 504 working weapon-mounted optic. I cleared the pistol and found one (1) 9mm round in the chamber stamped "WIN 9mm LUGER." The magazine inserted in the pistol was a factory Glock magazine capable of holding seventeen (17) rounds. I found seventeen (17) rounds (the full capacity of the magazine), all stamped the same as above and department-issued.

Behind the holster, I located one Motorola APEX Next radio, serial number 142CZZ0302, which was working at the time of the inspection.

Forward of the holster, I located a "Rapid Containment Baton" set up for a left-handed draw. To the left of the duty belt buckle, I located a department-issued TASER 10 serial number

T19C73384, which still had ten (10) unfired cartridges, with a battery level of 68%. When the TASER was activated, a forward-facing white light and a green laser were activated. The TASER's self-check indicated it was functional. The TASER was positioned for a right-handed draw.

To the left of the TASER, I located two magazine pouches. In the pouch nearest his belt buckle, I located one Glock factory magazine filled with one round beyond capacity with eighteen (18) rounds (the magazine is marked to hold 17 rounds; however, despite the extra round, it still appeared to work as designed). In the next magazine pouch, I located one Glock factory magazine filled with one round beyond capacity with eighteen (18) rounds (The magazine is marked to hold 17 rounds; however, despite the extra round, it still appeared to work as designed).

To the left of the magazines, I found a working Maglite flashlight. Behind the flashlight, I located an empty handcuff case.

This concluded my contact with Officer Aubert.

On 03/26/26 at approximately 1300 hours I received both Slane's and Remington's firearms from Sgt. Marquez and conducted an inspection on both.

Sgt. R. Slane:

Glock 34gen5 serial number [REDACTED] was in good working order, all of the safety features of the firearm were working as designed. All components of the weapon appeared to be in working order and within factory tolerances. The trigger pull on the weapon was approximately 5.6 pounds. The completed inspection sheet was uploaded to Evidence.com.

Cpl. Remington

Smith and Wesson M&P 2.0 Competitor, serial number [REDACTED] All of the safety features of the firearm were working as designed. All components of the weapon appeared to be in working order and within factory tolerances. The trigger pull on the weapon was approximately 4.4 pounds. It should be noted that the trigger was an aftermarket replacement. The brand of the actual trigger was "APEX." This is a department approved replacement. The completed inspection sheet was uploaded to Evidence.com.

Both weapons were returned to the respective officers.

DETAILS:

On 03-20-2026, I responded to assist on an officer involved shooting which occurred at 615 Stoneybrook Dr #350, Corona (County of Riverside). When I arrived, other members of the detective bureau and I were briefed on the incident. I was then assigned to contact the occupants of apartment [REDACTED] and determine if any potential evidence or damage was in their apartment during this incident. From the outside of apartment, it appeared vacant and there was no answer at the door. I contacted [REDACTED] in the front office. [REDACTED] stated a woman (later identified as [REDACTED]) moved in the week prior. I then contacted [REDACTED] via cell phone [REDACTED] who gave verbal consent to search her apartment for any potential evidence and/or damage. Using a key provided by [REDACTED] I searched apartment [REDACTED] and found no evidence or damage. Forensic Technician Walker then took multiple photographs of the apartment, documenting its condition. The apartment was re-secured, and the borrowed apartment key was given back to the Ashton Apartment's management.

NOTE:

Prior to the search of apartment [REDACTED] Det. Rangel used his BWC to walk through the apartment and record the apartment as we found it.

I sent [REDACTED] an Evidence.com request for the apartment complex's video surveillance. At the time of this report, he has not uploaded any video. It should be noted, the Ashton Apartments was under construction and [REDACTED] did not know which, if any cameras were currently working.

I spoke with [REDACTED] who stated the following: she resides at [REDACTED] Stoneybrook Drive [REDACTED] Corona. At approximately 0810 hours, while leaving her apartment. She was stopped by two police officers running through the complex. They asked her where building 615 was. She overheard the officers talking about going back to their vehicles to get rifles. She then heard four gunshots, and the officers ran toward the area of the shots. She did not see or hear anything else.

At 1601 hours, I met with Forensic Specialist L. Walker to process the Hyundai Veloster. During the search no evidence was collected. After the completion of the search the vehicle was locked.

DETAILS:
On Friday 3/20/2026 at around 0800 hours, I received a telephone message from the Corona Police Department requesting me to respond to the Corona Police Department reference an officer involved shooting.

At approximately 0830, I contacted Sergeant J. Marquez, and he requested I respond to 615 Stonybrook Dr. #350 to assist Detective J. Rangel and Detective J. Mason with this investigation.

I arrived on scene at around 0950 hours and contacted Detective J. Rangel and Detective J. Mason. Detective Rangel and Detective Mason requested I take overview photographs of the exterior and interior of the residence. After I took overview photographs of the exterior and interior of the residence, Detective Rangel and Detective Mason requested I photograph and collect the following evidence items:

Item KC1: (01) Cartridge casing in kitchen under kitchen cabinet.
Item KC2: (01) Projectile in dining room near kitchen table.
Item KC3: (01) Cartridge casing in hallway of residence.
Item KC4: (01) Cartridge casing in hallway of residence.
Item KC5: (01) Cartridge casing in hallway of residence.
Item KC6: (01) Projectile in hallway of residence.
Item KC7: (01) Cartridge casing in hallway near bathroom.
Item KC8: (01) Cartridge casing in doorway of Northeast bedroom.

After I collected evidence items KC1-KC8, Detective Rangel and Detective Mason requested I photograph the decedent during the coroner's processing. At around 1500 hours, Riverside County Sheriff's Department Deputy Coroner L. Burton (N8242) began the coroner processing. Per the direction of Detective Rangel and Detective Mason, I took overview and close-up photographs of the decedent and collected the following evidence items from Deputy Coroner L. Burton. It should be noted I later labeled the evidence items KC28-KC35 after processing the scene and evidence item KC20 (01) projectile near decedent) was labeled and collected during the coroner processing:

Item KC28: Black Nike sweatshirt size medium.
Item KC29: Gray "Big Ten Brawl" shirt size medium.

Item KC30: Left and Right red Nike shoes size 9.
Item KC31: Pair of black Nike socks.

After I collected evidence items KC28-KC35, Detective Rangel and Detective Mason requested I continue collecting the following evidence items:

Item KC9: (01) Cartridge casing in Northwest bedroom.
Item KC10: (01) Cartridge casing in Northwest bedroom.
Item KC11: (01) Cartridge casing in Northwest bedroom near bed frame.
Item KC12: (01) Cartridge casing in Northwest bedroom near nightstand.
Item KC13: (01) Cartridge casing in Northwest bedroom near nightstand.
Item KC14: (01) Cartridge casing in hallway closet.
Item KC15: Bloodstained steak knife with black handle.
Item KC16: Set of Hyundai and Toyota keys with black key fob.
Item KC17: White Tapo home security Wi-Fi camera with black cord wall plug in.
Item KC18: Black Samsung cell phone with pink phone wallet case.
Item KC19: Gray Asustek notebook PC.

Once I collected evidence items KC9-KC19 and KC21, Detective Rangel and Detective Mason requested I collect the following blood swabs from various locations of the residence:

Item KC22: (01) Sample blood swab and (01) control swab from patio door frame.
Item KC23: (01) Sample blood swab and (01) control swab from patio screen door handle.
Item KC24: (01) Sample blood swab and (01) control swab from living room wall near light switch.
Item KC25: (01) Sample blood swab and (01) control swab from bottom of stove.
Item KC26: (01) Sample blood swab and (01) control swab from hallway closet door handle.

After I collected evidence items KC22-KC26, Detective Rangel located a fragment in the hallway of the residence and requested I photograph and collect the evidence item. I later labeled the fragment as evidence item KC27.

After I collected evidence items KC1-KC35, I transported all evidence items to the Corona Police Department's Forensic Laboratory for further evidence processing.

On Monday 3/23/2026 at around 1100 hours, I began to process evidence items KC1-KC35. I visually examined items KC15-KC21 and evidence items KC28-KC34 and took additional photographs of each evidence item. During my visual examination of evidence items KC28-KC32, I located small holes on each evidence item. I took additional overview and close-up photographs of the holes. I also located a fragment in the left arm sleeve of evidence item KC28 (black Nike sweatshirt) and took additional close-up photographs of the fragment and labeled it as evidence item KC28(A). Refer to my laboratory photographs of evidence items KC28-KC32 for location of the holes on the clothing items.

I took a total of 535 photographs of the scene, the decedent, and evidence items and labeled the photographs as evidence item KC36. I logged in evidence items KC1-KC35 with the Corona Police Department's Property Section and I uploaded evidence item KC36 into Evidence.com.

SCENE:

4445 Magnolia Avenue; Riverside Community Hospital, County of Riverside. RCH is a level 1 trauma hospital and often receives victims in their emergency room with great bodily injuries.

INJURIES:

Coroner Leah Burton's (ID # N8242) preliminary investigation revealed that Natalie Starks (VM01) had approximately 21 penetrating wounds on her body. A majority of her injuries were in her upper torso.

ASSISTING PERSONNEL:

DETAILS:

On 03/20/2026 at approximately 0816 hours, I responded to the Ashton Apartment's located at 615 Stoneybrook Drive # 350, Corona, County of Riverside. I responded to assist patrol officers who were involved in an officer involved shooting and investigating a homicide. I arrived on scene and remained at the designated command post to receive my assignment. Sgt. Marquez assigned Detective E. Jolin and I to respond to Riverside Community Hospital to document the scene where Natalie Starks was pronounced deceased. I responded to bed 37 in the emergency room department. I arrived in the emergency room at approximately 1200 hours. I met with Corporal M. Gutierrez who was inside of room 37 with Natalie. Corporal Gutierrez advised me that hospital staff had pronounced Natalie deceased at 0858 hours.

Forensic Tech. Walker, Detective Jolin, and I entered room 37 and relieved the scene from Corporal M. Gutierrez. When I entered the room, there was a white bed sheet covering a body on the hospital bed. Once the sheet was removed, I observed Natalie Starks laying on her back on the hospital bed. I confirmed it was Natalie by comparing her face to her California DMV photograph.

Natalie's shirt and bra had been cut by medical staff to access her injuries. Natalie was still wearing jean shorts and had a single right foot black sandal on the bed with her. I examined Natalie's injuries and observed several penetrating wounds on her upper torso, head, upper extremities, and lower extremities. Natalie had a tourniquet attached to her right arm above her bicep and another tourniquet attached to her left leg near her groin area.

There was a clear plastic tube protruding near Natalie's right armpit area. This was placed by hospital staff for blood transfusion.

Deputy Coroner Burton and Forensic Tech. L. Walker took several photographs of Natalie. Deputy Coroner Burton provided me with her case number for Natalie as 2026-02253.

Forensic Tech. Walker collected Natalie's clothing and sandal. Once Forensic Tech. Walker and Deputy Coroner Burton collected all evidence, Natalie's body was taken into the Coroner's possession and transported from the hospital.

On 03/20/2026, Detective B. Walker requested I contact the resident of [REDACTED] Stoneybrook Drive [REDACTED] Corona, County of Riverside. I observed a surveillance camera on the front porch that pointed west towards Stoneybrook Drive. I also saw a surveillance camera in a window near the front door that faces the breezeway of the apartment. I knocked on the front door and spoke with the tenant who identified herself as [REDACTED]. I asked [REDACTED] if she had surveillance video from either camera. [REDACTED] told me that the camera in her front porch [REDACTED] [REDACTED] I then reviewed surveillance video of the camera by the front door; however, nothing of evidentiary value was seen.

[REDACTED] then told me she has an additional camera in her bedroom window that faces south towards [REDACTED] Stoneybrook Drive. [REDACTED] does not have a subscription through the provider of the camera and could not review past video recordings. However, [REDACTED] was able to provide still photographs of movement that passed the camera. The timestamp on the camera was an hour behind due to the recent time change. I reviewed several still photographs with [REDACTED] between the time frame of 0700-0800 hours. One photograph that stood out to me was timestamped at 0646 hours (0746 present day time). The photograph captured a Black male adult, medium to heavy build, and approximately 5'8 to 6'00 tall. The male was wearing a black sweatshirt with the hood above his head, black pants, and red shoes. The male appeared to be walking east through a breezeway between buildings [REDACTED] Stoneybrook Drive. The male's right hand is seen near the front pocket of his sweatshirt.

I uploaded the photograph of the male to Evidence.com. I provided my findings to Detective Walker.

On 03/20/26 at approximately 0930 hours, I responded to the Corona Police Department regarding an officer-involved shooting. Upon arrival, I met with Corporal Tarrant, who advised that he would be assisting with charting the two involved officers. Corporal Tarrant and I proceeded to the Corona Police Department Traffic Conference Room, where we contacted Sergeant R. Slane. I obtained overall photographs of Slane's duty uniform, firearm, and associated equipment. While photographing the front of Slane's pants, I noticed some red stains on both his lower left and right legs. I photographed the stains. Corporal Tarrant completed the weapon charting for Sergeant Slane's firearm and magazines. (Refer to Corporal Tarrant's report for detailed charting information).

At approximately 1015 hours, we contacted the second involved, Corporal Remington. I obtained overall photographs of Corporal Remington's duty uniform, firearm, and associated equipment. Remington had a small laceration on the inside palm of his left hand close to his wrist. I photographed the laceration. While photographing the front of Remington's pants, I noticed some red stains on the front zipper area of his pants, both his lower left and right legs and also on his shoes. I photographed the stains. Corporal Tarrant completed the weapon charting for Remington's firearm and magazines. (Refer to Corporal Tarrant's report for detailed charting information).

At approximately 1100 hours, I was asked to photograph a witnessing officer involved in the incident, Officer Aubert. I obtained overall photographs of Officer Aubert's duty uniform, firearm, and associated equipment. Corporal Tarrant completed the weapon charting for Aubert's firearm and magazines. (Refer to Corporal Tarrant's report for detailed charting information).

At approximately 1150 hours I then responded to Riverside Community Hospital with Detective Murphy. We responded to the Emergency Room area to an adjacent room where the victim was. Coroner Burton was already present awaiting our arrival. At approximately 1200 hours, we began processing the victim. I photographed the victim throughout the entire process, starting with overviews. Additional photographs of the victim's injuries were also taken. Coroner Burton collected fingernail clippings from both hands, a GSR (gunshot residue kit), the decedent's clothing and one shoe. I took possession of all these items and secured them in my vehicle.

At approximately 1430 hours I responded to 615 Stoneybrook Dr. #350, Corona to assist with this case. I was then contacted by Detective Murphy and asked to process a vehicle. I took overview photographs of a gold Toyota Camry, plate# 4CWZ933. Murphy requested the collection of two items from inside the vehicle as follows:

NOTE: Based on Weather Underground, www.weatherunderground.com, around the approximate time of the initial incident the temperature was 60 degrees. Around the approximate time scene processing began the temperature was 70 degrees and sunny.

All evidence and photographs at the scene were collected, processed, and booked by Corona PD Forensic Tech. K. Cates. Refer to Cates' report for further evidence collected at the scene. All of the photographs and evidence collected by Cates were at my request.

DETAILS:

On 03/20/2026 at approximately 0814 hours, I responded to 615 Stoneybrook Dr., #350, Corona, to assist with an officer-involved shooting investigation. I was tasked with processing the scene.

The apartment is located on the second floor and faces south. It is white in color, with the numbers "350" displayed above [REDACTED] with the numbering appearing in a non-white color on a black background. The stairs leading to the apartment are located just west of the front entrance, and at the top of the stairs the front door faces west and was observed open. Directly in front of the doorway is a black trash can, with a window positioned above it.

LIVING ROOM:

Upon entering the apartment, immediately to the south there were bags, shoes, and a shoe rack. Just beyond the shoe rack, a black leather couch was positioned against the southwest corner of the apartment. Along the south wall were boxes, bags, children's toys, cleaning supplies, and cushions, with a window and white blinds located above the couch. On the north side of the living room, a folded table was leaned against the wall. The living room connects to a hallway on the north side and a dining area on the east side. There were smeared blood marks in the living room consistent with movement of a victim and suspect from the hallway into the living room, and a medical bag with its contents was observed on the floor.

DINING AREA:

The dining area contained a dark brown wooden table with four chairs. On the table was an approximately 9-inch kitchen knife with a black handle and stainless steel blade, which had visible blood and hair on it, along with a set of keys and miscellaneous items. Blood droplets were observed on the floor leading from the living room into the dining area. On the south side of the

dining area was a sliding glass door that was open, with white blinds in front of it, and blood droplets were present on the frame and screen. Along the east wall of the dining area was a black trash can and several boxes. Exiting through the sliding glass door led to an outdoor patio area, which contained two chairs similar to those at the dining table, a white trash can, and a football-shaped balloon. The patio was enclosed by an approximately four-foot wooden wall along the south and east sides, and a stainless steel trash can was located against the wall on the northeast side.

KITCHEN:

Just north of the dining area was the kitchen, which had white cabinets and gray countertops. On the west side walls were a stainless steel stove, microwave, and refrigerator. On the east side counter were a sink, coffee maker, ice maker, and a knife block. The knives in the block had stainless steel handles and did not match the knife found on the dining table. Blood droplets were observed on the west-side cabinets and on the oven.

HALLWAY:

North of the living room was a hallway, where on the east side there was a closet followed by a door housing a washer and dryer. Blood smears were present on the hallway floor consistent with movement toward the living room, and blood was also observed on the closet handle and door.

BEDROOM:

At the end of the hallway on the east side was a bedroom with carpeted flooring. Upon entering, immediately to the left was a television positioned on stacked storage bins, along with boxes and bags containing clothing and miscellaneous items. In front of the entry were additional boxes and items. A closet was located along the north wall, and a bed with a headboard was positioned near it against the east wall. On the east wall next to the bed was a window with white blinds, and in front of the window was a desk holding two computer monitors and miscellaneous items.

BEDROOM:

On the west side of the hallway was another bedroom. Upon entering, a television was mounted on the wall, and clothing was scattered across the floor along the east and south walls. In the southwest corner was a window with white blinds, and inside the window was a camera positioned facing the front door and stair area. A bed was located against the west wall with clothing and miscellaneous items on it. Along the north wall was a closet containing a black-framed bunk bed, and next to the closet was a bathroom. This bathroom had a sink and countertop immediately to the right upon entry, a toilet along the wall, and a bathtub straight ahead.

BATHROOM:

At the end of the hallway was another bathroom. Immediately to the left upon entry was a countertop with a sink, on which there was a black purse. Along the east wall was a toilet, and beyond it was a bathtub and shower combination with the curtain fully open. A significant amount of blood was observed inside the bathtub, and within the blood was a set of car keys. On the bathroom floor were rugs and blood smears consistent with the movement of a body from the bathroom down the hallway toward the living room.

DECEASED:

The deceased male was located on his back in the Living Room. His head was facing southeast, his feet facing northwest, and his hands were behind his back underneath his body. The deceased male was wearing a gray shirt that had been cut open, black shorts and red shoes. On the ground surrounding the deceased was packaging from medical equipment. Two AED pads were still on the chest of the deceased, along with two chest seals.

On 03/20/2026 at approximately 0806 hours, while uniformed patrol for the City of Corona Police Department (CPD), I was driving alongside Officer H. Montalvo in an unmarked patrol unit. During this time, we responded to 615 Stoneybrook Drive #350, Corona, CA 92880, County of Riverside (Ashton Apartments) in regard to a domestic disturbance call.

Upon my arrival, I arrived on scene alongside Officer H. Montalvo. Shortly after, I heard sounds of gun fire come from the southside of the location. I then began to run towards the sound of the gunfire and located the unit mentioned above.

At approximately 0811 hours, I made entry into the unit and made contact with Officer O. Aubert, Sergeant S. Hungerford in the hallway of the apartment room. I then observed a male subject (later identified as Roy Starks) laying face up the hallway before he was dragged out of the hallway by Officer O. Aubert.

At this time, I placed handcuffs on Starks with the assistance of Officer O. Aubert and Officer H. Montalvo. At approximately 0812 hours, I began chest compressions on Starks and rotated with Officers O. Aubert, Officer H. Montalvo and Officer L. Mercado. The Corona Fire Department (CFD) arrived on scene and pronounced Starks deceased at the scene at approximately 0823 hours.

Officer H. Montalvo and I conducted a safety sweep of the apartment room for any outstanding subjects, but were met with negative results.

On Friday 03/20/26 at 0806 hours, I, Officer H. Montalvo along with Officer B. Chagoya responded to 615 Stoneybrook Dr. reference a domestic disturbance. Upon arrival, while attempting to locate the apartment unit, I heard gunshots followed by a radio broadcast indicating an officer involved shooting just occurred.

Officer Chagoya and I ran towards the direction of where we heard the gunshots and located the apartment unit. We entered the apartment unit and I observed Officer Aubert drag a male, who appeared to have bullet wounds, to the living room from the hallway. I assisted Officer Aubert place handcuffs on the male subject (later identified as Roy Starks). At this time, I observed officers rendering aid to a female that appeared to be unresponsive laying face up in the hallway. I then moved items from the living room to make a clear path for the Corona Fire Department and provide space for officers to render aid.

Officer Chagoya and I conducted a safety sweep of the unit for any additional suspects or victims but did not locate any.

I assisted Officer Chagoya and Officer Aubert in providing chest compressions to Starks until he was pronounced deceased by the fire department at approximately 0823 hours.
