Re: Non-Fatal Officer-Involved Shooting of Isaiah Janmar Goldmas on July 31, 2022, by Sergeant Jason Waldon, Badge No. 11670; Riverside County Force Investigation Detail Case No. MB222120001

Dear Chief Newman:

We have reviewed the investigative reports and other materials submitted by the Riverside County Force Investigation Detail concerning the non-fatal shooting of Isaiah Goldmas by Sergeant Jason Waldon on July 31, 2022. Our office completed its review of this incident on October 3, 2023.

PERSONS INVOLVED

Mr. Goldmas was a suspect in an assault with an assault rifle incident in Corona on July 31, 2022. The Riverside County District Attorney's Office filed a felony charge, which included assault with an assault rifle.

Sergeant Jason Waldon has been a peace officer for 23 years, with his entire tenure with the Corona Police Department. During his employment as a peace officer, Sergeant Waldon spent 17 years in Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT), and two years on the Gang Task Force. During the officer-involved shooting (OIS), Sergeant Waldon was working as a Patrol Sergeant and wearing a Corona Police Officer's uniform and assigned to a Corona Police armored vehicle.

On Sunday, July 31, 2022, at 5:45 a.m., reporting parties began calling 911 in reference to a black male adult with a rifle, who was carrying a backpack, at the Deerwood Apartment complex in the City of Corona. The callers noted that the man was pointing the rifle randomly in the air and toward them. They were concerned he was a threat to the residents.

FACTUAL SUMMARY OF THE INCIDENT

Corona Police Department officers responded and developed a perimeter around the apartment complex. A drone was deployed and located the subject holding a rifle and pointing it in different directions as he walked around the parking stalls at the apartment complex. Corona PD then deployed their BearCat armored vehicle, which contained numerous officers, including Sergeant Waldon. The subject continued to walk around the parking stalls when he came upon a pedestrian standing near a carport, approximately 15 feet away. The subject appeared to have some sort of contact with the person and at one point the person raised his hands as if to “surrender.” At that time, the BearCat drove towards the subject. Upon seeing the BearCat, the subject fled the area and jumped over a perimeter fence. After he jumped, the subject dropped the rifle, picked it back up, and continued to run across McKinley Street towards the neighboring Deerwood Apartment complex. As the subject approached the perimeter fence, he threw his rifle over and then scaled the fence. As he was scaling the fence, Sergeant Waldon fired one round from his .223 rifle. The projectile missed the subject and struck an apartment building in the background. The subject then fled within the apartment complex, leaving the assault rifle on the ground. The subject was not located and arrested until weeks later.

THE INVESTIGATION

Injury to the Subjects:

No parties were injured as the result of the OIS incident.

Interviews:

Several civilians who saw Mr. Goldmas possessing the assault rifle were interviewed. In addition, Corona Police Department Officer Jennifer Adamson, who was standing near Sergeant Waldon at the time of the OIS, was interviewed.

Interview with Sergeant Jason Waldon (11670):

Sergeant Waldon agreed to a voluntary interview and reviewed his body-worn camera (BWC) prior to his interview.

Sergeant Waldon has been a peace officer for 23 years, with his entire tenure with the Corona Police Department. He has worked SWAT for 17 years and was Assistant Team Leader for approximately 6-7 years. He has served as a Sergeant for the last three years and was assigned as a Patrol Supervisor. His shift was Sunday, Monday, and Tuesday from 6:00 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. The date of this incident was his normal shift. Sergeant Waldon was wearing a black ballistic helmet, a green load-bearing vest with “POLICE” on front and back. He was dressed in a navy-colored long-sleeved uniform with Corona police patches on each shoulder with sergeant stripes and a metal badge affixed to the left chest. During the incident, Sergeant Waldon utilized a department-issued Colt M4 rifle. That rifle was loaded with a magazine containing 28 rounds. Just prior to the incident, Sergeant Waldon was inside a green BearCat armored vehicle displaying “POLICE” on the sides and lightbar on top. The BearCat was deployed due to the calls for service describing the subject’s weapon as a “machine gun” and “rifle.”

Sergeant Waldon stated that on the morning of Sunday, July 31, 2022, at approximately 5:45 a.m., he was in the men’s locker room and just finished getting ready for his shift when he heard a call over the intercom regarding a suspicious person with a gun. Dispatch advised that there were two reporting parties, with the first party at the 600 block of Morningside. The description given was a black male wearing a black “Lakers” t-shirt, black pants, with white stripes going

down the side. The subject was also carrying a black backpack. One reporting party described that the subject had an extended magazine on the rifle.

Sergeant Waldon described feeling “the hairs on the back of his neck go up” as this was not a normal type of call due to the type of weapon. He explained that he knew that a rifle could fire a caliber of rounds that could cause a lot of damage, which caused him to be in fear of the safety of the community. Based on the information relayed to him, the subject committed a felony violation of Penal Code section 245(a)(2), assault with a firearm, which he knew was a serious and violent felony.

He then went to his patrol vehicle and began to load his equipment (ballistic helmet, load-bearing vest, and rifle bag). On the way to the call, Sergeant Waldon called for an airship due to the nature of the call and soon thereafter heard on the radio that Corona Police Sergeant Jesse Marquez was deploying a UAS (drone) to surveil the subject. Sergeant Waldon also heard various units setting up around the area, and that the subject was still walking around the apartment complex’s parking lot while appearing agitated.

Sergeant Waldon then drove to the staging area (at Promenade and Sungate) where he met other units. He also equipped his load-bearing vest and ballistic helmet to assist in protection from a rifle projectile. When Sergeant Waldon noticed that he was the only officer wearing a load-bearing vest, he instructed the other officers to equip theirs. This was only the second time in the last three years that Sergeant Waldon was in a situation which caused him to wear greater ballistic protection. While speaking to another sergeant, Sergeant Waldon heard over the radio that the subject had pointed his rifle at a person. This caused Sergeant Waldon’s concern to elevate as he believed that the community was in imminent threat. As a result, he requested that medical be staged near McKinley Street.

Sergeant Marquez deployed the drone and had visual of the subject in the north end of the complex near Morningside Drive. Sergeant Waldon was next to Sergeant Marquez and was able to see the drone footage capturing the subject in real time for approximately 10 minutes. The subject appeared to be very agitated as he was looking in different directions while walking around. A rifle (AR-style) could clearly be seen in his hands. Sergeant Waldon believed that the subject may shoot someone at the apartment complex, or he was waiting to engage in a shootout with law enforcement.

Once the BearCat arrived, Sergeant Waldon organized a team to occupy the armored vehicle and approach the subject and contain him in a central area to allow a negotiator to speak to him and deescalate the situation. Sergeant Waldon had all the BearCat’s occupants inside the armored vehicle, rather than some on the outer skids, in order to protect the entire team from gunfire. As the BearCat began to approach the apartment complex, Sergeant Waldon was notified that the subject had fled eastbound towards McKinley Street. The BearCat then turned eastbound on Highridge headed towards McKinley when Sergeant Waldon saw the subject and another person approximately 30-40 feet from the subject. During this time, Sergeant Waldon heard from Sergeant Marquez that the battery for the drone was getting low, which meant that visual on the subject was finite. The subject was still armed with a rifle, and a backpack that appeared to contain something heavy. This caused Sergeant Waldon to believe that the subject may have additional weapons and/or ammunition in the backpack. The subject continued running to a fence near the apartment’s property line. He then leaped off an object next to the gate and scaled the

fence. Once the subject was on the other side, it appeared that he inadvertently dropped the rifle as he stopped, turned back, looked directly at the BearCat, and picked up the rifle. Sergeant Waldon believed that the subject turning back to retake possession of the weapon demonstrated his intent to use the weapon, rather than simply abandoning it and risking arrest. Additionally, a person attempting to merely flee would not likely carry a heavy, cumbersome rifle.

The BearCat approached the apartment complex at Highridge and McKinley. However, the BearCat had to stop as there was no vehicle access onto McKinley where the subject was running across. When the BearCat stopped, two officers exited prior to Sergeant Waldon. Sergeant Waldon immediately ran east to the iron gate abutting McKinley. While at the gate, the Sergeant saw the subject running with the rifle to the Deerwood Apartment complex on the other side of McKinley. Sergeant Waldon explained that he looked south for officers but did not see any, and then looked back at the subject. The man was now scaling the rod iron fence to go onto the Deerwood property.

Sergeant Waldon believed that should the subject get over the fence, he would have an advantage as he had parked vehicles and a cement trash receptacle for cover and the drone was about to lose visual due to battery being low. Sergeant Waldon explained that he believed that the likelihood of the subject killing an officer or someone in the community was imminent and high. Sergeant Waldon believed due to the distance, and the immediacy of the threat, it was not practical to yell out commands to the subject, and due to the distance, less-lethal options were not reasonable. Therefore, Sergeant Waldon decided to shoot one round when the subject was at the top of the fence.

The subject then dropped over the fence line, however, Sergeant Waldon could not determine whether the subject was hit as he lost sight of the subject. Officers then proceeded to run across McKinley towards the Deerwood Apartments. Sergeant Waldon went back into the BearCat and drove around to the Deerwood Apartments. He then heard on the radio that the suspect was seen fleeing through the apartment complex.

Soon after, Sergeant Marquez's drone lost battery power, and consequently, visual of the subject. Corona PD officers then set up containment at the Deerwood Apartments. The rifle was located and placed in the BearCat. Corona PD officers contained the area while SWAT and K-9 units were en route.

Sergeant Waldon additionally explained his training in active shooter scenarios. He was trained that active shooters with high-capacity magazines tend to select a location that is highly populated. The apartment complexes pertinent to this incident are large apartment complexes where hundreds of people reside. Sergeant Waldon explained that this was on his mind at the time of the officer-involved shooting.

Interview with Officer Jennifer Adamson (4192)

Officer Adamson agreed to a voluntary interview and reviewed her body-worn camera (BWC) prior to her interview.

On the date of her interview, Officer Adamson had been with Corona PD for three years working patrol. Prior to joining Corona PD, she worked as a sworn deputy for the Riverside Sheriff's

Office where she worked in the jail for four years. She had been a sworn peace officer since 2015. Her shift was graveyards from 6:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday. During the time of the incident, she was dressed in a Class B uniform consisting of a long-sleeved shirt, pants, nameplate, ballistics helmet, plate carrier, and Corona police patches clearly displayed on both shoulders. During the officer-involved shooting, Officer Adamson had a Glock 17 service weapon, which she did not fire. She was not in possession of a rifle during the incident.

Officer Adamson was on patrol when she was notified of a subject with a “machine gun” walking around an apartment complex. There was a second reporting party who described the weapon as a rifle. One of the reporting parties relayed that the subject had pointed the firearm at them.

Officer Adamson met other units at the staging area where Sergeant Marquez deployed a drone to obtain the subject’s location. Sergeant Waldon arrived and compiled a team to approach the subject’s location in the armored vehicle (BearCat). The team then approached the apartment complex via Highridge. As they drove closer, Officer Adamson saw a man with a rifle running toward the fence leading to McKinley. The gate leading from Highridge onto McKinley was closed, and blocked access for the BearCat to turn onto McKinley. The subject scaled the fence and began to run east across McKinley, while carrying a rifle. At some point, the subject dropped the rifle and turned around to retrieve it as he looked toward the location of the BearCat. During this time, the officers, including Sergeant Waldon, exited the BearCat, and ran toward the gate.

Officer Adamson and Sergeant Waldon ran straight towards the gate while other officers ran to a different location along the fence line. When Officer Adamson and Sergeant Waldon arrived at the gate, Sergeant Waldon fired one shot just as the subject was scaling another fence to the Deerwood Apartment complex where she lost visual of the subject. When Sergeant Waldon fired, Officer Adamson believed that the subject was still in possession of the rifle. The officers, including Sergeant Waldon, then re-entered the BearCat and drove over to the Deerwood Apartments where they retrieved the subject’s rifle that he discarded and waited for SWAT to relieve them.

Interview with Witness 1

On July 31, 2022, at approximately 5:30 a.m., Witness 1 was awakened by Witness 2 as she saw a suspicious person in the parking lot outside of the apartment unit. Witness 1 was concerned as he just purchased a new vehicle. When Witness 1 looked outside, he saw a subject walking around with an “AR” gun. Witness 1 told Witness 2 to call 911 while he continued to watch the subject. Witness 1 saw the man point the gun toward their apartment (“right at us”) as well as various directions, including the sky. Witness 1 stated that although he was unsure if the subject was aiming at them or if the man was aiming randomly, Witness 1 was frightened for his life and was in fear for his and Witness 2’s safety.

Interview with Witness 2

Witness 2 stated that sometime during the early morning hours of July 31, 2022, she looked through her bedroom window and saw a man walking around the parking lot peering into vehicles approximately 100 feet from their location. Witness 2 then told Witness 1, who also began watching the subject. Witness 1 explained that the subject had a gun, which caused Witness 2 to be in fear for her safety. Witness 2 then called 911. Witness 2 stated that she saw the man hold up the rifle and began aiming randomly in various directions but did not see the

subject point the firearm at her or her apartment. Nevertheless, when she learned from Witness 1 that he saw the subject point the gun at their apartment, Witness 2 became increasingly frightened.

Interview with Witness 3

On July 31, 2022, at approximately 5:30 a.m., Witness 3 woke up when she heard a neighbor yell, "You are tweaking." As a recent victim of theft, Witness 3 believed that someone was attempting to steal something. She then went outside to her patio where she saw a black male adult holding a rifle approximately five feet from her. She described the male as slim and approximately 5'6" – 5'9", approximately 130 lbs, with a medium length afro, wearing a black short-sleeve t-shirt, and black Adidas pants. Witness 3 stated that the subject approached her and asked, "Do I know you?" and "Where are you from?" Witness 3 stated that she did not know the man and that she lives at the apartment complex. She then asked the subject, "Are you good?" to which he responded, "Yeah, I'm good" and then he walked away. The entire conversation was less than a minute and the subject did not point the gun or attempt to threaten Witness 3 during their interaction. However, Witness 3 described that notwithstanding the short duration, she felt like a "sitting duck," and believed that things could have gone "either way." Witness 3 believed that the subject could have just shot her. She described that she did feel threatened due to the type of firearm the subject was possessing.

While Witness 3 was back inside her apartment, Witness 4 called 911. A few minutes later, Witness 3 looked out her window and saw the subject with the rifle up to his face and he was squinting while looking down the barrel. The subject appeared to be aiming directly at Witness 3's apartment window. The subject then pointed the rifle to the apartment above theirs, and then appeared to point it at a vehicle. Witness 3 was unable to determine whether there was an occupant in the vehicle. Witness 3 described the subject acted as if he was playing a video game.

Witness 3 was unable to subsequently identify the subject in a photographic lineup.

Interview with Witness 4

Witness 4 stated that she was awoken due to a neighbor yelling and decided to walk outside to smoke. When she walked outside, she saw Witness 3 talking to a subject who was holding a rifle. While the man was speaking to Witness 3, he continued to turn the gun in his hands as if he was trying to display it and to "invoke fear." Witness 4 did not interact with the subject, but felt "terrified" and did not know what the man was going to do. Witness 4 stated that she did not panic out of fear that it would instigate the subject into shooting.

Witness 4 re-entered the apartment and called 911. While on the phone with the dispatcher, she looked outside her window and saw the subject pointing the rifle toward her direction.

Interview with Witness 5

On July 31, 2022, at approximately 5:50 p.m., Witness 5 walked to the parking lot of his apartment complex to his vehicle. While walking, he saw a man holding a rifle also walking in the parking lot approximately 15-20 feet away. Once Witness 5 entered his vehicle, he saw the subject walk up to his car and stare at him while walking past. Witness 5 stated that he has experience with firearms and believed the rifle to be a 556 and the subject held it as if he was ready to "take action." While Witness 5 sat in his vehicle, he believed that the man with the gun

may shoot him at any moment. However, the subject did not point the gun at him and continued to walk past the vehicle and Witness 5 drove away from the location.

Witness 5 described the subject as a black male adult, 5'8"-5'9" with an afro hairstyle.

Interview with Witness 6

Witness 6 lived at the apartment complex and is seen on the drone footage with his hands up in the air when the subject with the rifle walked by him. Witness 6 stated that he was outside praying with his hands up when a man walked by him. He stated that he could not recall any identifying features and did not see the man carrying anything. Witness 6 only recalled that when the man walked by, the subject nodded his head and continued walking. Witness 6 stated that shortly after the subject walked by police arrived. Soon after the police arrived, he heard one gunshot and Witness 6 then went back inside to his apartment.

Interview with Subject Isaiah Goldmas

On August 26, 2022, Mr. Goldmas was arrested at the Ontario International Airport prior to him leaving on a flight. He was then transported to Corona PD jail for an interview. Mr. Goldmas was silent through much of the interview. He would rarely answer questions, and when he did, he gave very limited responses. Mr. Goldmas confirmed that it is him seen in the videos on July 31, 2022, at Ashwood Apartment complex with the rifle. He would not give additional context as to how he came upon the rifle. He stated that he found the rifle "on the floor." Mr. Goldmas also eventually confirmed that he was fleeing from police when he was shot at while at the gate abutting the Deerwood Apartments. He described hearing the bullet nearly miss his abdomen. He explained that he fled from the police because he felt threatened "by people a few weeks ago," but could not articulate how or why he felt threatened. Mr. Goldmas made a general statement that he was carrying the rifle for protection. Later in the interview, Mr. Goldmas stated that he was tired of people shooting their guns around him and that was why he was carrying a rifle on that day. He also explained that he self-admitted to Corona Regional Medical Center for mental health issues "a few weeks prior." Mr. Goldmas recalled that he was then transported to a "mental health facility" where he stayed for about a week.

Attempted Interview with Witness 7

Witness 7 refused an interview with Corona PD detectives.

Interview with Witness 8

Witness 8 explained that Isaiah had been diagnosed with schizophrenia in May of 2022 after being transported to Corona Regional Medical Center. This was after Isaiah claimed to a family member that people were after him. Isaiah's family members had attempted to learn more about the people who were allegedly after him, however, Isaiah would not give more information,

Witness 8 explained that on July 31, 2022, he received a call from Witness 7. Witness 7 presented as being stressed and urged Witness 8 to call Isaiah and "talk him off the ledge." Witness 7 relayed that Isaiah was acting weird and was having some sort of "fit."

Witness 8 called Isaiah and Isaiah explained that he felt afraid, and that people were threatening him and his family. He also stated that he had been running from "people." There was no mention from Isaiah that he had been running from police.

Witness 8 picked up Isaiah in Corona on August 1, 2022, and drove him to his home. Isaiah told Witness 8 that he accepted a job on the east coast and that was the reason why Isaiah booked a flight leaving from Ontario International Airport.

Scene Description and Evidence:

The Ashton apartment complex is directly west of the Deerwood apartment complex and is separated by McKinley Street, which runs north/south. During the time of the officer-involved shooting, the lighting conditions was early morning daylight. The weather conditions were clear and dry, with high visibility.

At the time of the OIS, Sergeant Waldon was at the east emergency service gate on Highridge Drive located within the Ashton complex, and Isaiah Goldmas had run east through McKinley Street and to the fence abutting Deerwood Apartments. The approximate distance between Sergeant Waldon and Mr. Goldmas was 187 feet.

Body Worn Camera (BWC):

Sergeant Waldon's BWC captured Mr. Goldmas running across McKinley Street southwest of Sergeant Waldon. Sergeant Waldon shot one time while the subject was scaling the fence to enter the Deerwood Apartments. There was no sound in the collected BWC video.

Drone Video:

Corona Police Sergeant Jesse Marquez deployed a drone prior to the armored vehicle arriving at the location. The drone camera captured Isaiah Goldmas holding an assault rifle. The footage also depicted Mr. Goldmas aiming the weapon at different objects while walking around the parking lot of the Deerwood Apartments. At one point, Mr. Goldmas walked next to another person (Witness 6), and they briefly exchanged looks. Witness 6 appears to briefly have his hands in the air during the contact. At that time, the armored vehicle arrived, and Mr. Goldmas fled east on Highridge towards the emergency gate. Mr. Goldmas then scaled the gate with the assault rifle. When Mr. Goldmas landed on the other side of the gate, he briefly dropped the assault rifle, turned around and picked it up, and then continued to run southeast across McKinley Street toward the Deerwood Apartments. As Mr. Goldmas arrived at the west fence line abutting Deerwood Apartments, he threw the assault rifle over the fence and began to scale that fence to enter the parking lot. As Mr. Goldmas is scaling the fence, a small dust cloud is seen at the stucco of an apartment unit just southeast of Mr. Goldmas. This depicted the strike mark of the bullet projectile shot from Sergeant Waldon's rifle. Mr. Goldmas then fled into the apartment complex, leaving the assault rifle behind where he dropped it in the parking lot.

APPLICABLE LEGAL STANDARD

The decision by a peace officer to use force shall be evaluated carefully and thoroughly, in a manner that reflects the gravity of that authority and the serious consequences of the use of force by a peace officer, in order to ensure that officers use force consistent with law and agency policies. (Pen. Code, § 835a, subd. (a)(3).) This evaluation shall be conducted from the perspective of a reasonable officer in the same situation, based on the totality of the circumstances known to or perceived by the officer at the time, rather than with the benefit of

hindsight, and that the totality of the circumstances shall account for occasions when officers may be forced to make quick judgments about using force. (Pen. Code, § 835a, subd. (a)(4).)

Under California law, a peace officer who has reasonable cause to believe that a person to be arrested has committed a public offense may use objectively reasonable force to effect the arrest, to prevent escape, or to overcome resistance. (Pen. Code, § 835a, subd. (b).) Pursuant to the statute, a peace officer is justified in using deadly force upon another person only when the officer reasonably believes, based on the totality of the circumstances, that such force is necessary to defend against an imminent threat of death or serious bodily injury to the officer or another person, or to apprehend a fleeing person for any felony that threatened or resulted in death or serious bodily injury, if the officer reasonably believes that the person will cause death or serious bodily injury to another unless immediately apprehended. (Pen. Code, § 835a, subd. (c)(1).) The officer need not retreat or end his efforts to make the arrest because of the person's resistance. (Pen. Code, § 835a, subd. (d).) Penal Code section 834a requires that if a person has either actual or constructive knowledge that he is being arrested by a peace officer, the person must refrain from using force or any weapon to resist such arrest.

In addition, peace officers, in the course of their duties, may use deadly force to protect themselves or others from the threat of death or great bodily harm. "Claims that police officers used excessive force in the course of an arrest, investigatory stop or other 'seizure' of a free citizen are analyzed under the reasonableness standard of the Fourth Amendment to the United States Constitution." (*Munoz v. City of Union City* (2004) 120 Cal.App.4th 1077, 1102, citing *Graham v. Connor* (1989) 490 U.S. 386, 395.) The question is whether a peace officer's actions were objectively reasonable based on the totality of the circumstances known to the officer, and the test is "highly deferential to the police officers' need to protect himself and others." (*Brown v. Ransweiler* (2009) 171 Cal.App.4th 516, 527, quoting *Munoz v. City of Union City, supra*, 120 Cal.App.4th at p. 1102.)

In calculating whether the amount of force was excessive, a trier of fact must recognize that peace officers are often forced to make split-second judgments, in tense circumstances, concerning the amount of force required. (*Edson v. City of Anaheim* (1998) 63 Cal.App.4th 1269, 1273.) The reasonableness of a particular use of force must be judged from the perspective of a reasonable officer on the scene, rather than with the 20/20 vision of hindsight." (*Graham v. Connor, supra*, 490 U.S. at p. 396.) "[I]ts proper application requires careful attention to the facts and circumstances of each particular case, including the severity of the crime at issue, whether the suspect poses an immediate threat to the safety of the officers or others, and whether he is actively resisting arrest or attempting to evade arrest by flight." (*Ibid.*)

CONCLUSION

Prior to the officer-involved shooting, Mr. Goldmas had contacted multiple residents at the Ashton Apartment complex while armed with a loaded assault rifle. Multiple calls to 911 referenced Mr. Goldmas threatening residents with the weapon. Sergeant Waldon heard the calls for service and believed that the subject was potentially readying as an active shooter. The information relayed to Sergeant Waldon was that the subject had an assault rifle with an extended magazine and had threatened someone with the firearm. When Sergeant Waldon arrived at the meeting point and saw the drone footage, he noticed that the subject appeared to be agitated and was aiming the assault rifle at different objects. A plan was developed to approach

the subject with the armored vehicle. As the vehicle approached the subject, Sergeant Waldon saw that the subject fled with the rifle and scaled the fence to run to the large apartment complex to the east. When Sergeant Waldon approached the east gate at Highridge, he could see that the subject still had possession of the assault rifle and believed that the subject was not going to surrender to police. Sergeant Waldon felt that the community as well as police officers were in imminent threat and reasonably believed that the use of lethal force was necessary to curb the threat of a potential mass shooting.

A copy of this letter, along with the materials submitted for our review will be retained in our files. Absent objection, in whole or in part, this letter may be made public in response to a request for such records under the California Public Records Act.

INCIDENT RECORDED ON BODY/DASHBOARD CAMERA:

SCENE:

This incident occurred inside the Ashton Apartments, located at 2178 Stoneridge Dr., Corona. The point of contact with the suspect was just east of the intersection of Stoneybrook Dr. and Highridge Dr.

WEAPON/INSTRUMENT:

Un-serialized black rifle

EVIDENCE:

Body worn camera footage, Un-serialized black rifle, statements collected.

DETAILS:

On 07/31/22 at approximately 0541 hours, I responded to 681 Morningside Dr., in reference of a man with a gun.

Per request of fellow officers on scene, I responded from the station in the Bearcat (armored vehicle) with Officer Alborno. I drove the vehicle to the set meeting point near the intersection of Sungate Dr. and N. Promenade Ave, Corona.

I was informed the suspect was a black male adult, last seen wearing a black t-shirt with black pants and carrying a black rifle with him. Multiple witnesses had told dispatch that he was pointing the gun at vehicles and the gun had been pointed towards themselves.

At this point in time, we had observation of the suspect, via drone, walking eastbound on Highridge Dr. towards N. McKinley St., Fellow officers on scene got into the back of the armored vehicle and a decision was made to contact the suspect and attempt to detain him. I drove the armored vehicle northbound on Stoneybrook Dr.

I arrived at the intersection of Stoneybrook Dr. and Highridge Dr., and I observed a male matching the suspect's description and carrying a black rifle just east of my location.

Refer to my interview with Riverside Sheriff's Department Force Investigation Division for additional details regarding the incident.

I later assisted with administering a photograph line up to a witness. I contacted [REDACTED] at 681 Morningside Dr. [REDACTED] stated he and [REDACTED] saw the male with the gun. I requested [REDACTED] wait in the other room as I spoke with [REDACTED]. The following is a summary of [REDACTED] recorded statement:

[REDACTED] stated [REDACTED] told him about the male suspect walking around outside with a rifle and pointing it at cars as he passed by. [REDACTED] was worried about his new car and he watched the male through his window in the living room. [REDACTED] said he is unsure if the male was under the influences, but he was pacing back and forth.

I read [REDACTED] the Photo Line-Up Admonishment and he stated he understood. [REDACTED] reviewed the photographs and stated he was 70% sure the suspect was the male in photograph #4.

I later responded to the initial crime scene and set up crime tape around the area of the incident. As detectives and forensic investigators arrived, I assisted with completing a crime scene log. The crime scene log was later submitted into FileOnQ while at the Corona Police Department.

DETAILS:

On 07/31/2022, at about 0745 hours, I responded to the Corona Police Department located at 730 Public Safety Way Corona, CA. which is in the County of Riverside. I was assigned to contact reporting parties who called Corona Police Dispatch reference an officer involved shooting that had just occurred in the area of 681 Morningside Drive Corona, CA. The following is a summary of statements I obtained in this investigation via telephone. Note, each telephone conversation was recorded and a copy of the statements were logged into evidence at the Corona Police Department.

On 07/31/2022, at about 1147 hours, I contacted OT01 [REDACTED] via telephone. [REDACTED] stated his wife told him she saw a Facebook posting from the Corona Police Department which advised there was an investigation near their residence. Wilson said he reviewed his live camera surveillance video footage from an exterior video surveillance camera via his Google camera system. At that time [REDACTED] saw a male he believed may have been involved in the Corona Police Department's investigation. [REDACTED] described the male as the following: Tall male adult, about 5'11"-6'02" in height, medium body build, black/ African American male, between 25-35 years in age, and he was last seen wearing dark pants with a white T-Shirt and baseball style hat. [REDACTED] said he is familiar with the people that walk in the area, however he has never seen this male before. Due to [REDACTED] being unfamiliar with this male and knowing there was a police investigation occurring near his residence, [REDACTED] notified the Corona Police Department and sent a copy of his video surveillance via email to me and to my Corona Police Department issued cell phone.

I reviewed the video, notified Sergeant Hernandez, Detective Palaoro, and Detective Placencia. A copy of this video was uploaded into Digital On Q for evidence. This concluded my contact with Wilson.

On 07/31/2022, at about 1219 hours, I contacted [REDACTED] via telephone and the following is a summary of her statement. On 07/31/2022, at about 0000 hours, Perry and her girlfriend [REDACTED] heard their neighbor from another apartment yelling. Due to the

yelling ██████ said ██████ got out of bed and went outside their apartment to smoke a cigarette on their patio. ██████ went outside shortly after ██████ exited their apartment and met ██████ on their patio. ██████ saw ██████ speaking to an unknown male, who will be referred to as SU01 for the remainder of this report. ██████ was not familiar with SU01 and as she removed a lighter from a pocket on ██████ person she saw SU01 was holding a gun that looked like a "Military gun". ██████ said she and ██████ are both TSA Agents (Transportation Security Administration), and she has some training and knowledge of guns. Based on her training from work, she remained calm because she didn't know what SU01 was going to do. ██████ estimated SU01 stood approximately five feet away from her and ██████ when she heard SU01 ask ██████ where she is from. ██████ said ██████ stood on their patio and leaned against their patio wall while SU01 asked her a few more questions. ██████ estimated SU01 remained near their patio for about one minute before he walked away in an unknown direction in the parking lot.

██████ said she was worried if she wasn't calm the situation would have "turned left" or got worse because SU01 appeared to be "looking for something".

██████ described SU01 as: a thin build male, with dark brown or black hair that appeared to be undefined curly and an "Afro" that was longer on the top of the head and shorter hair on the sides, last seen wearing a black short sleeve T-Shirt with Adidas jogger pants and a unknown color backpack with black straps.

██████ described the gun as: military gun with a triangle on the back, a long muzzle, and long in length that went from the under arm area to SU01's thigh area.

I asked ██████ if she could identify SU01 if she saw him again. ██████ said after the incident she thought she could identify SU01, however she was shown a photo line up by an unknown Corona Police Officer during the morning hours, which has left her doubting if she can identify SU01 if seen again. This concluded ██████ statement.

On 07/31/2022, at about 1249 hours, I contacted ██████ via telephone and the following is a summary of ██████ recorded statement. On the listed date, at about 0530 hours, ██████ heard her neighbor yelling something similar to "What are you doing?" and possibly referred to someone as a "Tweaker". ██████ said she got out of bed and was upset because her sleep was disrupted. ██████ exited her apartment and walked to her outdoor patio to smoke a cigarette. At about that time, SU01, who is a male not known to ██████ walked up to her patio from the parking lot. ██████ said SU01 asked her "Do I know you?" and "Where are you from?". Davis told SU01 "I live here", and SU01 responded by squinting his eyes and nodding his head up and down as he held onto a gun. ██████ said she works as a TSA Agent (Transportation Security Administration) and said it's her job to deescalate situations, so she tried to deescalate and remain calm. ██████ estimated SU01 was about 3 feet away from her and he eventually walked away from ██████ patio to an area across the street. ██████ said after SU01 walked away, she and ██████ went inside their apartment. ██████ watched SU01 from a window inside her apartment and saw SU01 point the gun at their apartment building, aim the gun in an up and down motion, and he aimed the gun in the air. ██████ said SU01 pointed the gun at her apartment building and had to move away from the window for protection.

██████ described SU01 as: a male about 5'06" - 5'09" in height, slim body build, about 125-145 pounds in weight, slight "after shave" for facial hair, matted "Afro" hair style that appeared "unkempt", a fair skinned black/ African American male, with a black T-Shirt that had a possible "Lakers" logo or a yellow logo on the front of the shirt and "break away" black Adidas pants that had a white stripe on the side. In addition, ██████ described SU01's voice as low, "eerie", clam, and "inebriated" (but not a drunk type of inebriation).

██████ described the gun as the following: a Military gun, long open triangle handle, and black in color.

If seen again, Davis think she can identify SU01 and his voice again. (Note, ██████ was shown a photo line up during the morning hours by an unknown Corona Police officer on scene prior to my contact with ██████). This concluded my contact with ██████.

On 07/31/2022, at about 1338 hours, I contacted ██████ via telephone and the following is a summary of his recorded statement. On the listed date, at about 0550 hours, ██████ walked to the parking lot of his apartment complex to enter his vehicle. ██████ saw a male was later identified as SU01, standing in the parking lot about 15-20 feet away from him. ██████ said SU01 was walking in the parking lot with a gun, but it took him a minute to register SU01 was in possession of a gun and further said the gun appeared to be real. ██████ said he has about 10 years of experience working with guns for a recreational and hobby interest. Therefore, ██████ believed the gun SU01 was in possession of was real and described it as the following: 556 Riffle with a 4 grip, and an extended magazine. ██████ said SU01 held the gun in his right hand and held it in a manner that showed he was ready to "take action". ██████ said once he was inside his vehicle he saw SU01 walk up to his vehicle and stare at him; ██████ believed SU01 was going to shoot him at that time. However, SU01 didn't say anything to him and continued to walk pass the vehicle and ██████ was able to drive away from the location. ██████ estimated his encounter with SU01 was about 2 minutes in duration.

██████ desires prosecution for this incident and described SU01 as the following: a black/African American male adult, about 5'08" - 5'09" in height, unknown eye color, with about 2 inches of black hair on the top of his head and short hair on the sides, however the hair style was not described as an "Afro".

██████ said he if saw SU01 again he may be able to identify him. This concluded my contact with ██████.

On 07/31/2022, at about 1404 hours, I contacted WT02 ██████ via telephone and the following is a summary of her recorded statement. On the listed date, at about 0000 hours, ██████ looked through her bedroom window and saw a male who appeared to be looking into vehicles in the parking lot of her apartment complex. ██████ told her boyfriend, WT03 ██████, who then began observing SU01 from inside their apartment. ██████ told Wells SU01 had a gun and asked to her to call the police. Wells said she watched SU01 from inside her residence and estimated she was about 100 feet from SU01 as he paced back and forth in the parking lot. ██████ said SU01 is not known to her and she described him as the following: a male adult, approximately 19-20 years old, appeared to be clean and did not appear to be homeless, approximately 5'10"-5'11" in height, light skinned black male, and he was last seen wearing black Adidas sweat pants with a white T-Shirt, and he had dark black hair that was parted to the left side side.

██████ said if seen again she can possibly identify SU01. (Note, ██████ stated an unknown Corona Police Officer contacted her and ██████ during the morning hours and prior to my phone call. The unidentified officer showed ██████ a photo line up, however ██████ said she was not shown the photo line up because the officer believed ██████ had the better view of SU01.) This concluded my contact with ██████.

On 07/31/2022, at about 1556 hours, I contacted ██████ via telephone and the following is a summary of his recorded statement. On the listed date, at about 0530-0540 hours, ██████ said his girlfriend woke him up because she saw someone looking into vehicles in the parking lot of their apartment complex. ██████ became concerned because he recently purchased a new vehicle and looked out into the parking lot via a window in his apartment to check on his car. At about that time, ██████ saw SU01 in the parking lot with a "AR" gun. ██████ told his girlfriend ██████ to call the police. ██████ said he observed SU01 from inside his apartment and gave ██████ updates for the police dispatcher and she remained on the telephone with the dispatcher for about 20 minutes. ██████ saw SU01 point the gun at his apartment building and then randomly point the gun up as if he was aiming at birds in the

sky. ██████ said this was a scary situation and he was in fear for his safety and desires prosecution for this incident.

██████ described the male as: Approximately 6'00" -6'02" in height, skinny body build, possible facial hair or goatee, African American, unknown color eyes, unknown clothing, light skin color, with dark hair that was in a short "mushroom" hair style shape.

██████ described the gun as: Long, skinny, with a shovel handle at the end, possible AR (Assault Rifle) because the gun was longer than a AK-47, but not as long as a shot gun.

██████ said if seen again he believes he can identify SU01 because of his of his body build, face, and SU01's skinny jaw line. (Note, ██████ was contacted by an unknown Corona Police Officer who showed him photo line up.) This concluded my contact with ██████.

Next, I requested the initial phone calls placed into Corona Police Dispatch from the above listed parties. These recordings were logged into evidence via File On Q without further incident.

On 07/31/2022 at approximately 0541 hours dispatch received multiple calls in reference to a man with a gun at 681 Morningside Dr., Corona, CA 92880. Given the circumstances of the call, myself and Officer Laughlin responded to the location with the armored vehicle. Refer to my interview with the Riverside Sheriff's Department Force Investigation Division for additional details regarding the incident.

Lt. Dunnigan instructed me to prepare a photograph line-up and present the line-up witnesses. I created the photograph line-up and presented it two witnesses, [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] Officer Laughlin and Officer Gaeta also presented the photograph line-up to witnesses, refer to there reports for additional information.

I contacted [REDACTED] at 681 Morningside Dr. #167. [REDACTED] stated she and [REDACTED] saw the male with the gun. I requested [REDACTED] wait in the other room as a I spoke with [REDACTED]. The following is a summary of [REDACTED] recorded statement:

[REDACTED] stated she stepped outside to smoke when she saw [REDACTED] talking to a male holding a gun. [REDACTED] described the male as a dark skinned black male adult, with black medium length curly hair, wearing a black short sleeved t-shirt and black adidas joggers with a white stripe down the leg. [REDACTED] stated the male was holding the gun in his left hand with the barrel pointed towards the ground. The male would turn the gun in his hand as if he was trying to show that he had it. [REDACTED] did not exchange words with the male. [REDACTED] had never seen the male but would be able to identify if seen again.

I read [REDACTED] the Photo Line-Up Admonishment and she stated she understood. [REDACTED] reviewed the photographs and stated she was torn between the photograph #3 and #6. [REDACTED] ultimately selected number 3 and stated she was 75% sure that was the person she saw.

After speaking with [REDACTED], I had her retrieve [REDACTED] from the room. When I spoke with [REDACTED], [REDACTED] stayed in the room. The following is a summary of [REDACTED] recorded statement.

[REDACTED] stated she was woken to her neighbor yelling, "you are tweaking". [REDACTED] was recently the victim of a theft and thought it could possibly be related, so she went out on her patio. [REDACTED] was approached by a male holding a rifle. [REDACTED] described the male as a slim light skinned black male adult, approximately 5'6" to 5'9", weighing 130lbs, with a medium length afro, wearing a black short sleeve t-shirt with a yellow logo on the front and black adidas breakaway pants with stripes down the leg. Chadae described the rifle as a black tactical rifle.

The male approached [REDACTED] and asked, "Do I know you?" and "Where are you from?" [REDACTED] responded by saying, "no" and "I live here." [REDACTED] asked the male, "are you good?" and the

male responded, "yeah, I'm good" and walked away. The male did not point the gun and at [REDACTED] and the conversation lasted approximately 30 seconds to 1 minute. [REDACTED] went back into her apartment for her safety. A few minutes later, [REDACTED] looked back out the window and saw the male across the street pointing the rifle at a vehicle. Chadae does not know if anyone was inside the vehicle.

After obtaining her statement, I read [REDACTED] the Photo Line-Up Admonishment and she stated she understood. After reviewing the photographs, [REDACTED] was unable to positively identify a suspect.

DETAILS:

On 07/31/2022 I was contacted by Detective Placencia who contacted me and requested my assistance in processing evidence at the Corona Police Department.

While at the Corona Police Department, I met with Officer A Vega, who advised me during an evidentiary search at 685 Treemont Pl, #102 she had located a black backpack. Officer Vega said Forensic Technician Walker responded to the scene, photographed, and collected the backpack from its original location for processing. Officer Vega said after Walker had finished, she transported the black backpack to Corona Police Station. Officer Vega gave me the backpack so it could be processed for DNA samples.

Officer Tabikha also told me he was given a rifle, magazine, and loose bullet by Corona Police Department Sergeant Glenn. Officer Tabikha told me he was tasked with transporting the items to the Corona Police Department to be processed for DNA.

At the Corona Police Department property room, Forensic Tech Moreno laid several sheets of parchment paper before setting the items down on the table to be processed for DNA collection.

Moreno then took several digital photographs of the items. Moreno then collected cumulative and Control swabs from the Rifle, Bullet, and Magazine. I collected the swabs from Moreno and later booked them into evidence.

Moreno then placed a new piece of parchment paperwork before I began searching the backpack. While searching the backpack's interior, I located a drum magazine, a receipt from ARCO AM/PM with 4.4 grams of marijuana inside, and a receipt from Juice it up.

Moreno then collected cumulative and Control swabs from the drum magazine and backpack, which I collected and later booked into evidence at the Corona Police Department room.

After processing the items, I contacted Forensic Tech L. Walker and requested her assistance in properly booking the backpack and firearm in case we needed further DNA testing at a later time.

L. Walker took additional photographs in the Forensic lab of the items, which she later booked into evidence.

Using the receipts I located in the backpack, I attempted to locate surveillance footage from the physical store location. Detective Placencia obtained footage from the Juice it up in Moreno Valley while I contacted employees at the AM/PM in Chino Hills. Employees at the Chino Hills location notified me the footage from the transaction (07/12/2022 03:35:17 hrs) had already been recorded over, but were able to locate the transaction number for me. Using the transaction number, I was able to locate a partial credit card number. The beginning sequence of the card showed the card was a Visa Chime Card. I drafted a search warrant for the Chime account requesting account owner information and financial statements.

Using the transaction sequence that Det. Placencia obtain for me from Juice It Up, it showed a Bancorp Bank corporation. I drafted a search warrant for the Bancorp account requesting account owner information and financial statements.

On 7/31/2022, I , Officer Vega and Detective Medeiros were on duty in full police uniform, I was driving unit 79304 and Detective Medeiros was the passenger acting as my Field Training Officer. At approximately 0550 hours, we responded to 681 Morningside Dr., Corona, CA 92880 reference a man with a gun call.

Upon our arrival, we were informed the subject was running across McKinley Avenue eastbound towards the Deerwood Apartments located at 2215 Lakeside Pl. I drove to the area of Richey Street and Mary Helen Street and assumed a containment position. Once the containment was established I responded to the Command Post to assist as Detective Medeiros was activated for the Special Response Team.

EVIDENCE:

Black backpack discovered on porch, photographed and booked into Corona PD evidence by Forensic Technician L. Walker.

DETAILS:

On 7/31/2022 at Approximately 1240 hours I responded to the Deerwood Apartments, located at 2215 Lakeside Pl, in the city of Corona, County of Riverside to assist with an article search. For further details on Original incident refer to report completed by Riverside Sheriff's Department Force investigation Division.

Prior to our arrival, I reviewed Corona PD UAS video footage surveillance. The video showed a male suspect running in the walkway near 685 Treemont Pl #102. The suspect is momentarily out of the UAS visual, and then reappears running out away from the porch in the area. Once he resurfaces, it appears he no longer has a black backpack slung on his back. This area was our primary area of concern in efforts to locate the black backpack.

As I was walking up the stairs adjacent to 685 Treemont Pl #102, I had a clear visual into their porch located on the first floor. In the corner was a black strap which appeared to be a backpack stuffed into the corner of the patio.

I contacted the resident at 685 Treemont Pl, #102, identified as [REDACTED] who lives at the location with her husband [REDACTED] and their three children. The following is a summary of [REDACTED] Recorded statement.

[REDACTED] stated she had never seen the black backpack located on the porch. She stated she and her husband recently cleaned the porch and the backpack was not there. She stated she did not hear or see who placed the backpack in her porch. I asked if she heard anything unusual in the morning and she stated she heard noise around 0500 hours, looked out her front door and saw police presence. I asked Rich if she had any surveillance cameras at her residence or surrounding her balcony, and she stated she did not.

[REDACTED] mother [REDACTED] and husband [REDACTED] were both present during my interview and stated they did not see or hear anything.

After my interview, Forensic Technician Walker responded to the scene, photographed, and collected the backpack for processing. We remained at the scene while L. Walker processed the evidence. At the completion of her investigation we were tasked with transporting the black backpack collected at the scene as evidence to Corona Police Station, located at 730 Public Safety Way in the City of Corona, County of Riverside. Upon my arrival, Detective Clary took possession of the black backpack as evidence.

The intent of this report is to document the arrest of (SU01) Isaiah Goldmas. This arrest report will articulate the primary evidence and information supporting probable cause establishing Goldmas was the suspect who committed the alleged crimes in this investigation. I will complete an additional supplemental report documenting the totality of my investigative efforts in this case. Refer to initial and all supplemental reports for complete details.

(SU01) was arrested inside 2500 E. Airport Dr. (Ontario International Airport) in the City of Ontario (County of San Bernardino).

DETAILS:

On 07/31/22 at approximately 0541 hours, Corona Police Department patrol officers responded to the area of 681 Morningside Dr. (The Ashton Apartments) in the City of Corona (County of Riverside) in reference to multiple 911 calls reporting a man armed with a rifle in the complex and the suspect had pointed the rifle at citizens. The following people have been identified as victims; refer to supplemental reports for complete victim statements:

Multiple CPD officers responded, attempted contact with the armed suspect, and an Officer Involved Shooting (OIS) occurred. The suspect was last seen jumping a fence at the east end of the Ashton Apartment Complex, running across McKinley St. (a major city thoroughfare), and jumping a fence into the adjacent Deerwood Apartment Complex. The suspect remained armed with his rifle as he fled and jumped fences before eventually dropping the rifle in the parking lot at the west end of the Deerwood Apartment Complex. The suspect fled on foot, was observed by the drone abandoning his backpack inside the patio area of a nearby apartment, and last seen running towards the stairwell of another apartment, later identified to be 695 Treemont #208, when the drone battery died, and police observation was lost.

The rifle was recovered and found to be unserialized, unregistered, short-barreled, equipped with features making it an illegal Assault Rifle (short barrel, collapsible stock, pistol grip, standard magazine release), and loaded with a high-capacity magazine with .223

ammunition. The abandoned backpack was located and found to contain a loaded drum-style high-capacity magazine (approx. 50-round capacity).

On 08/10/22, an anonymous tip from a citizen advised that the suspect from the incident lives at 695 Treemont Pl #208, Corona. Through investigative efforts, (SU01) Isaiah Goldmas was identified as a resident of that apartment.

I subsequently created a photographic lineup of Isaiah Goldmas and five additional subjects with similar appearance. The similar subjects were generated randomly by a computer program based on Isaiah's appearance in his 2021 DMV photograph. On 8/22/22 and 8/23/22, Corona PD Officer Domenack administered the sequential photographic lineups to (3) material witnesses / victims from the incident ([REDACTED]). Each victim positively identified Isaiah Goldmas as the armed suspect who either pointed, or brandished, his rifle at them during the incident. All statutory procedures were followed during the lineup administrations.

Regarding the backpack that was abandoned by the suspect, it had a unique embroidery (circular logo with "MPC") stitched onto the front. Through open-source research, that symbol and acronym was found to be related to Monterey Peninsula College in Northern California. On 8/16/22, the Honorable Judge Gunn approved a search warrant for records from MPC. On 8/22/22, the school searched their records and produced documentation that Isaiah Goldmas was a prior student, having registered for classes in Fall of 2021.

On 8/23/2022, the Honorable Judge Gunn approved a Ramey Arrest Warrant for Goldmas for various related felony and misdemeanor crimes. The Riverside County Sheriff's Office subsequently entered the felony warrant into state and national law enforcement databases; Warrant #22053965.

On 8/26/2022, Goldmas was arrested inside Ontario International Airport as he attempted to board a flight. He was transported to CPD Jail per the arrest warrant listed in the system and for further investigation into the numerous crimes he committed that are triable in Riverside County.

While inside CPD Jail, Riverside County Sheriff's Master Investigator Bishop and I interviewed Goldmas inside of a jail interview room. Goldmas was provided a bag of chips that he requested, and our conversation lasted around two hours. I read Goldmas his Miranda Rights from my department issued Miranda Card. Goldmas replied in the affirmative that he understood his rights by nodding his head up and down in a "yes" motion. I clarified that Goldmas understood his rights; he continued to nod and said "Mhmm." He then impliedly waived his rights by speaking with us:

Goldmas said he hadn't ingested any drugs, had any alcohol, nor taken any medication this day. Over the course of the interview, Goldmas made numerous incriminating statements. Goldmas admitted to being the suspect from the incident, said he found the rifle "on the ground," said the officer's bullet grazed by his stomach, and stated that he felt like "shit" after I told him his actions had terrified his victims. Refer to interview transcripts for complete details. Throughout the interview, Goldmas would often refuse to answer questions and appeared nervous when asked direct questions (bouncing his leg, clenching his jaw, biting his nails, scratching his head, etc.). Goldmas claimed he had gone to Corona Regional Hospital a few weeks prior and was self-admitted for possible mental health issues. During that time, Goldmas was prescribed medications (later found in his luggage; refer to Evidence Tech DeLaHoya's report and photos for medication details).

At the time of his arrest, Goldmas was wearing shoes that matched his shoes captured on video footage during the incident. The shirt he was wearing during the incident was located inside of his duffle bag that he had with him at time of arrest. The cellphone that CPD was tracking and had already obtained historical records for (pursuant to search warrant) was found with Goldmas during his arrest. Those historical phone records place his device in the

area of the crime the afternoons prior and following the incident. The day after the incident, the device suddenly is no longer Corona and tracks to the area of Adelanto (where Goldmas' father lives). Refer to my supplemental report, #2, for additional details.

Pursuant to a search warrant, Goldmas' DNA was obtained while inside CPD jail and will be sent out for analysis against DNA profiles obtained from the aforementioned drum magazine. Pursuant to a search warrant at Goldmas' apartment, the sweatpants he was wearing during the incident were located.

Substantial and convincing evidence has positively identified Goldmas as the suspect in this case.

Goldmas was ultimately transported to Riverside County Jail for housing.

I transported them to the station until Riverside County Crime Scene Investigation and Detective Clary took custody of the rifle from me at the station at around 1500 hours.

On 07-31-2022, The Corona Police Department received an anonymous tip reference this case. The anonymous reporting party stated while at the Vons grocery store, located at 535 N. McKinley Street, Corona, Ca, he/she saw two suspects enter the grocery store at around 1610 hours. After entering the store, the two suspects walked toward the isle where the energy drinks are kept. While in the store, the unknown reporting party asked the two subjects how their day was going. One of the suspects responded to the reporting party and stated he was having a bad day because they police shot at him earlier. The reporting party described the two male subjects who he/she spoke with as two black male adults, one with light skin and one with dark skin.

I later contacted Detective Bishop from the Riverside Sheriff's Department Central Homicide Unit (RSO CHU) and we responded to the Vons. While at the Vons, I contacted a store manager OT [REDACTED] [REDACTED] escorted me to the managers office and assisted with my review of the surveillance video. I reviewed the video surveillance from approximately 1545 hours - 1630 hours. At 1604 hours, two black male adults enter the store through the glass doors on the west side of the business. One of the adults is a BMA with light skin wearing a white tank top and dark pants. The second subject was a BMA with dark skin wearing a black T-Shirt with black gym shorts. The subjects are walking side by side and enter the store together. The two males walk to the liquor isle and eventually purchase a case of Lime Cutwater for \$16.99. The male subject wearing the white tank top pays for the item in cash (\$20.00) at check stand #5. The male wearing the white tank top manually enters his birthday due to his alcoholic beverage purchase. The male enters his date of birth as [REDACTED]. After purchasing the item, the two male subjects exit the grocery store at around 1613 hours through the west doors. The two subjects then enter a black Dodge Charger and exit the parking lot towards McKinley Street. The video indicates the Charger has a large amount of black paint missing on the roof of the vehicle.

I later conducted an area check for the vehicle at the Deerwood apartment complex. I located the vehicle parked in the covered parking area on the west side of complex. The vehicle was bearing California License Plate 8TRS094. [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] I confirmed this vehicle was the same vehicle seen during the incident described by the anonymous reporting party at Vons.

[REDACTED]. I then viewed [REDACTED] California's Drivers license photograph and was unable to determine if Jones was one of the subjects I viewed during my review of the surveillance video.

On 08-01-2022, I responded back to the Vons grocery store. [REDACTED] provided me with a flash drive containing the surveillance video as well as a copy of the receipt provided to the unknown subjects. I later booked both items as evidence at the Corona Police Department.

During my contact with [REDACTED] he stated the cashier who witnessed the two subjects was OT [REDACTED]. On 08-01-2022 I contacted Julie. During my explanation of the incident to [REDACTED] she immediately knew why I was contacting her and which customers I was referencing. [REDACTED] stated the customers did not say they were "shot at" by the police but rather stated

their apartment was shot at by unknown subjects. [REDACTED] stated she believed the customers believed a random person shot at or near their apartment complex. Julie stated the subject who spoke to her was wearing the white tank top.

I observed the male point the firearm several times as he walked in the parking lot area. I was unable to tell who or what he was pointing at with the rifle. I observed the male for several minutes as he proceeded to walk towards the north perimeter of the property.

I maintained observations as Officers contacted the suspect along the north perimeter. Upon officers making contact the suspect then fled the area running eastbound through the property towards McKinley St. The suspect jumped the fence onto and across McKinley St. where he then jumped the fence into the Deerwood Apartment complex. As he ran through the Deerwood Apartment complex, he did not appear to have the rifle. I maintained visual via the UAS and observed the suspect jump out of a patio area where a black backpack was later located.

Due to the UAS battery being low and losing signal I had to break away from tracking the suspect. I last saw the suspect running eastbound through the Deerwood Apartment complex.

I am a Sergeant for the Corona Police Department and am one of the Team Leaders assigned to the Special Response Team (SRT).

Details:

On 073122, I was activated as a member of SRT and responded to an incident involving an armed subject in the Deerwood apartment complex off of McKinley St. in Corona. At the command post I was assigned to take a perimeter containment spot at 2250 E. Treemont Pl. with the listed personnel. We were transported to this location via a Riverside PD Armored Vehicle. Once on scene we relieved patrol Officer Tabikha and Cpl. Brunn and the armored vehicle was positioned facing eastbound covering the parkway between 2250 and 2260 E. Treemont Pl.

While at this location Sergeant Montanez requested additional personnel while dealing with a uncooperative subject and Sgt. Glenn and Corporal Goodman left our team to assist. Corporal Gutierrez and Corporal Neff moved to a perimeter location east of Sergeant Montanez. Officer Acevedo, Rangel and I remained at this location until our armored vehicle was requested at 2280 E. Treemont Pl. by Sgt. Walsh (Riverside Sheriff EST). On 07-31-2022, I was employed as a full-time police officer by the City of Corona Police Department, wearing a full police uniform and driving a marked black and white police car (79328). At about 0545 hours, I responded to assist other Officers on a suspicious circumstances call involving a man with an assault rifle outside the residence of 681 Morningside Drive in the City of Corona, County of Riverside.

When I arrived at the location (Sungate Drive), I took cover behind a patrol vehicle's passenger door with my department-issued rifle, while aiming down Stoneybrook Drive. While remaining at the location, it was relayed to Officer's the suspect was moving eastbound towards the Deerwood Apartments. I entered my patrol vehicle and began driving towards the location before taking a perimeter spot at Promenade Avenue and Tradewind Place.

I remained at the location until I was relieved by Riverside Police Officers and returned to the Command Post located at the rear of 420 North McKinley Street. Once at the Command Post, I was instructed to take another perimeter spot at Richey Street and Mary Helen Street. I remained at that location until the perimeter was disbanded around 1110 hours.

I (Detective Matson) responded to 681 Morningside in Corona, CA to assist with an officer involved shooting investigation.

The following is a description of two scenes from the incident:

SCENE #1:

Highridge Drive and Stoneybrook Drive intersect at the most northern portion of the Ashton Apartments in Corona, CA. The Ashton apartments main address is listed as 2178 Stoneridge Drive, Corona. The Ashton apartments have two primary entry and exits, Stoneridge Drive (East) and Sungate (South). Both entrances require a gate code or key. The entire complex is surrounded with a rod iron fence which is an estimated 6' in height.

Directly east of the Ashton apartments is McKinley Street which is a north/south street. McKinley is a 4 lane (2 in each direction) street with a landscaped center median. Both sides of the street have a bicycle lane. At the time of this incident, the center median landscaping was an estimated height of 2-3 feet.

Highridge Drive is a street which runs east and west and is intersected by three separate streets (Stoneybrook Drive, Woodcrest Court, and Morningside Drive). The far west end of Highridge becomes Morningside Drive which runs north and south. A dirt hill borders the west end which leads up to the neighborhood of Valleywood Street and Blazing Street.

This incident occurred at the far east end of Highridge. At the far east end of Highridge is an rod iron fence which is a entry and exit gate but is not currently used for either and remains closed and locked. On the south west side of the gate is a trash enclosure. This trash enclosure is assessable and not locked.

On the southside of Highridge, near the gate, is the address of 699 Stoneybrook Drive which is a two story apartment building. Apartments 65, 66, 67, 68 all face north (facing Highridge). The apartment building is brown and tan in color and each apartment have a exterior porch with a glass slider facing Highridge. Each apartment has at least one bedroom and kitchen window facing Highridge.

Along Highridge on the north and south side are parking stalls, some covered and some uncovered. At the eastern point of Highridge next to the gate are covered stalls on both the north and south sides covering 9 vehicles each.

SCENE#2:

685 Treemont Place is located at the Deerwoods apartments (2125 Lakeside Place, Corona, CA). Treemont Place is a north/south street within the complex which becomes a east/west street at the furthest northern portion of the complex. The Deerwoods apartments have three primary entry and exit rod iron gates (Treemont Place, Lakeside Place, and Richey Street). All entry and exits required keyed or code entry.

The complex is surrounded with a rod iron fence along the north and south side. The east and west side have cinder block walls separating the complex from the Marquessa apartments (north) and Promenade Avenue (south).

685 Treemont Place is a two story apartment building which is gray, tan and light red in color. The second story of this apartment is apartment #205, the downstairs apartments are #203 and 103. The rear windows of the building face the west. The building has attached covered parking. On the west side of the parking lot (along Treemont Place) is all uncovered parking divided by various landscaping and two covered trash enclosures which are not locked and assessable to the public. Directly south of 685 Treemont Place is a walkway leading east into the central portion of the complex.

EVIDENCE:

-1 .223 casing

-Found at scene #1. This was located just south west of the gate on Highridge. The casing was on the asphalt and near the trash enclosure.

-1 .223 round

-Found at scene #2. This was located inside of the exterior stucco wall of 685 Treemont Place, at the lowest portion of the wall below a window facing west for apartment #205. If looking at this section of the apartment, this is a red colored wall. The round was embedded in the stucco & frame on the north east portion of the wall.

-1 pair of black ADIDDAS pants with a white stripes on the side

-Found in the trunk of vehicle 7PCZ170 (Honda).

These items were collected as evidence by ID Technician L. Walker. The round found at scene #2 had to be extracted by the Corona Fire department by cutting a portion of the stucco out.

DETAILS:

On 07-31-2022 at 0800 hours I (Detective Matson) was requested to assist in an investigation at 681 Morningside Drive, Corona, CA.

While on scene I assisted ID Technician L. Walker and ID Technician P. De La Hoya with evidence collection and scene security. In addition to this, I completed two interviews with involved parties.

During the investigation, three pieces of evidence were located which were collected by ID technician Walker and De La Hoya. One .223 casing was found at scene #1 (described above). One .223 round was found at scene #2 (described

above).

Upon completion of scenes #1 and #2 I responded to assist Detective Arens at 2280 East Treemont Place #204. I was asked to assist in searching a vehicle as it pertained to an approved search warrant. I was present during the search with Corporal S. Hungerford and ID Technician Walker. Corporal Hungerford and I searched the vehicle.

During the search I located a pair of black ADiDDAS pants in a open duffle bag which were in the trunk of the Honda (7PCZ170). This vehicle belonged to [REDACTED]. The vehicle was parked west of his residence in an uncovered parking stall. These pants were collected as evidence by ID Technician Walker.

While on scene at Highridge, I contacted resident, [REDACTED], at 699 Stoneybrook #65 to inquire if she witnessed the incident. I spoke to [REDACTED] who said she was sleeping when this incident occurred but heard what she believed to be a gunshot. She arose and looked out her bedroom window. Her bedroom window faces Highridge (north; closest to the gate). When she looked outside, she noticed a police officer running westbound, away from the gate. She could not describe the officer due to him or her running.

[REDACTED] did not see anyone else or hear anything else.

I spoke to [REDACTED] who lives at 699 Stoneybrook #67. [REDACTED] said he was outside praying in the parking lot between 5am-6am. Waqar had his hands raised to the sky and was looking up while praying. A man walked by [REDACTED] but he did not see what the man looked like. [REDACTED] was unsure of what kind of clothing the man was wearing.

[REDACTED] said this man was walking east but he did not see where he came from. [REDACTED] did not notice if the man was carrying anything.

[REDACTED] said the man nodded his head towards him but they did not speak to each other. Although [REDACTED] could not describe the male, he did say he believed the man was clean shaven. [REDACTED] could not identify the man.

After the male walked past him, the police arrived shortly after.

[REDACTED] saw the police arrived and he heard one gunshot but he did not see the shooting. [REDACTED] went inside of his apartment immediately after.

These interviews were captured on my body worn camera. Waqar's interviews were captured via Detective Mendenhall's audio recorder.

DETAILS:

On July 31st 2022 I assisted with the investigation, assigned initially to canvassing for possible witnesses with Det. Sailer, Cpl. Hasprey and Deputy Farag. After receiving information regarding the incident, at 1249 hours Det. Sailer and I responded to the housing track just north of the Ashton Apartments located at 2178 Stoneridge Drive. Cpl. Hasprey and Deputy Farag were assigned to canvas the Ashton Apartments, and focused primarily on the apartments south of Highridge Drive. See their supplemental reports for further information. The majority of the residences I attempted to make contact at were located on Russell Drive, and one on June Drive. Det. Sailer assisted with making contact at residences in the same area. See Det. Sailer's supplemental report for further information. The following is a list of the addresses and the result of the contact. All of the listed residences backed up to the Ashton Apartments with the rear of the residence closest to the apartment complex.

701 June Drive- No answer at the door. There was a camera mounted at the front door, it's unknown if there were any cameras to the rear of the residence.

2142 Russell Drive- No answer at the door. There was a camera mounted at the front door, it's unknown if there were any cameras to the rear of the residence.

2144 Russell Drive- No answer at the door, no visible cameras.

2146 Russell Drive- I made contact with [REDACTED]. He stated he did not hear or see anything and does not have cameras at the location.

2148 Russell Drive- No answer at the door, no visible cameras.

2150 Russell Drive- No answer at the door. There was a camera mounted at the front door, it's unknown if there were any cameras to the rear of the residence.

2192 Russell- No answer at the door, no visible cameras.

2198 Russell Drive- I made contact with [REDACTED]. He stated he heard a loud, "Bang" and then a scream between 0500 and 0600 hours. [REDACTED] stated it sounded like a female screaming. The direction he said he heard the noise was near the area of McKinley Street, which is south east of his residence.
