

I then relocated to the Deerwood Apartments located at 2215 Lakeside Place. I received instructions to canvas the area where the Riverside County Sheriff bloodhound had tracked a scent related to items recovered. Officer Romans was manning the unmanned aircraft during the tracking and provided me with the path the bloodhound took. Officer Romans showed me the route on a map, and I coordinated with Riverside County Sheriff personnel Dep. Farag and Cpl. Hasprey to canvas the area. The area where I was shown by Officer Romans started at the walkway between 2260 E. Treemont Place and 2250 E Treemont Place and tracked south. There were two attempts made and both started at the same location. During the first attempt, the bloodhound tracked south and then east to the end of the concrete path. The dog then turned north and stopped near the end of the apartments. During the second track, the dog followed the same path to the end of the concrete path and then turned south to the opposite end of the apartment complex. Based off the description of the area tracked, a canvas was conducted.

I located a camera on the balcony and in the window of the apartment located at 2280 Treemont Place #205. The camera in the window appeared to be pointing toward the sidewalk where the dog had tracked. I spoke to the resident, [REDACTED], and he said the camera in the window did face toward the sidewalk and was operational. [REDACTED] said he would have to check the cameras and would contact me if he found any video footage. I also located two cameras at the far east side of the complex, on N Lakeside Place, pointing toward the entrance/exit gate leading out to Richey Street. The cameras are maintained and operated by the complex and I did not make contact with anyone at the time regarding possible video surveillance footage. See Deputy Farag's and Cpl. Hasprey's supplemental reports for further information regarding their portion of the canvassing.

Once the canvassing was completed, I was contacted by Det. Placencia regarding evidence that need to be collected at the Deerwood Apartments. Detective Placencia requested a DNA swab from the fence where the suspect jumped the fence at the Ashton Apartments and from a vehicle the suspect touched after he jumped the fence at the Deerwood Apartments. Around 1810 hours, I responded to the Deerwood Apartments and located a grey Nissan Kicks (CA. 8HHK629) parked in the stall where the suspect was seen touching the vehicle in the video. I viewed a copy of the video and saw the suspect touched the tailgate area near the license plate and also touched the vehicle near the passenger's side mirror. I could clearly see both areas had apparent touch marks, where dirt had been removed. The area near the passenger's side mirror looked to have visible fingerprints.

Riverside County Forensic Technician Almendariz (ID#N6382) arrived a short time later and I showed him the areas where the suspect touched the vehicle. Forensic Technician Almendariz then attempted to lift prints from the passenger's side mirror and swabbed for DNA evidence at the rear of the vehicle. Forensic Technician Almendariz told me was unable to get any identifiable prints from the vehicle. We then relocated to the Ashton Apartments and I pointed to the area on the fence where the suspect was seen in the video, resting his hand on the fence to jump over. Forensic Technician Almendariz then swabbed the area I showed him, as observed in the video. Forensic Technician Almendariz then gave me two samples from each swabbed location. I then took the evidence to the Corona Police Department where I placed the items into evidence.

During my initial response to the scene on July 31st, I was informed by Officer Kelly that there was Ring camera footage of the suspect, provided to him by a resident. I took down the phone number (323-929-3580) Officer Kelly was given in reference to the video and called the number. There was no answer when I called, but received a call back on August 2nd 2022 around 0930 hours. The subject identified himself as [REDACTED] and confirmed he was the one who provided the video of the suspect. Montano said the video was captured around 0519 hours on the morning the incident occurred. Based on where [REDACTED] lives, the suspect was walking through the Deerwood Apartments, heading toward west toward McKinley Street. [REDACTED]

described his residence as being on at the "2200 block of Lakeside." He would not provide any further information. I later placed the Ring footage into evidence.

On August 3rd 2022, Detective Palaoro and I conducted additional canvassing at the Deerwood Apartments reference the new information regarding the time the suspect was seen on the Ring footage provided by Montano. While checking the complex, we knocked on the door to the apartment located at 695 Treemont Place #101, where I saw a Ring camera mounted at the front door. The resident at the location was unable to work the camera, but confirmed [REDACTED] lived there. Based on the video, statement from [REDACTED] and the location of the Ring camera, it was determined this was the apartment the suspect walked past in the morning prior to the incident at the Ashton Apartments.

Detective Palaoro and I then relocated to the Deerwood Apartments and spoke to assistant manager [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] was able to pull up video footage from the two cameras that point toward the entrance to the complex on the west side, near McKinley Street. At around 0534 hours, the suspect is seen walking from the pedestrian gate on the south east side of the leasing office and then toward McKinley Street. The suspect then turns and walked back toward the Deerwood complex, before walking back toward McKinley Street and crossing the street toward the Ashton Apartments. Romero emailed me a copy of the video surveillance footage to my Corona Police Department email. The footage was downloaded on an external storage and placed into evidence.

Detective Palaoro later responded to the Ashton Apartments to collect video for the new time frame. [REDACTED], the service supervisor from the Ashton Apartments, provided video surveillance from the apartment video surveillance system. I placed two external hard drives containing the separate video surveillance footage for each complex into evidence.

DETAILS:

On 07-31-22 at approximately 0900 hours I responded to the Corona Police Department reference a Critical Incident Team Activation. At approximately 1025 hours, I was tasked with charting Sgt. Waldon and his equipment. Forensic Technician Walker assisted by acting as my scribe. Forensic Technician DeLaHoya assisted by taking photographs.

I met Sgt. Waldon in the traffic conference room. I conducted a visual inspection of Sgt. Waldon for any evidence. Forensic Technician DeLaHoya took photos of Sgt. Waldon, his uniform, plate carrier, duty belt, pistol and other equipment.

I saw Sgt. Waldon was wearing a black ballistic helmet, green armor plate carrier that had "POLICE" written on the front and back, and department approved class B uniform. Sgt. Waldon's class B uniform consisted of a long sleeve uniform shirt with "Corona Police" shoulder patches, a badge over his left chest, a name plate on his right chest, uniform pants and duty belt.

Sgt. Waldon had his department issued rifle (SN: LE081003) slung. The rifle's selector was in the safe position. The rifle was loaded with one 5.56mm cartridge in the chamber and a magazine seated in the magazine well. The magazine in the magazine well was in a coupler with an additional magazine attached to it. The left magazine, which was inserted in the magazine well, had 26 5.56mm cartridges loaded in it. The right magazine had 28 5.56 mm cartridges loaded in it. All of the cartridges were department issued Winchester Ranger 77 grain 5.56 mm.

The rifle was equipped with a department issued OSS suppressor (SN:1802249), Aimpoint Patrol Rifle Optic, back up iron sight, Surefire flashlight, and single point sling. All of the rifle's attachments were in good working order.

Sgt. Waldon's plate carrier had a rifle magazine and two pistol magazines in pouches on the left side. The rifle magazine had 27 5.56mm cartridges. Both pistol magazines had 15 9mm cartridges. On the front of the plate carrier Sgt. Waldon had two more rifle magazines. Each magazine had 28 5.56 mm cartridges. The plate carrier had a multipurpose pocket on the right side that contained one bandage. All of the ammunition in the magazines were department issued cartridges.

Sgt. Waldon had his department issued 26" RCB in a holster on his front right side of his duty belt. Behind Sgt. Waldon's baton was his pistol in a Safariland level II holster. Sgt. Waldon's pistol was a H&K USP chambered in 9mm (SN: 24-061537). The pistol's hammer was resting down and the slide was in battery. The pistol was equipped with night sights and a Surefire X300 light with a pressure switch. The pistol had a 9mm cartridge in the chamber and a magazine seated in the magazine well. The magazine contained 15 9mm cartridges and had a total capacity of 15 cartridges. Behind Sgt. Waldon's pistol holder was a double handcuff case which contained two handcuffs in working order. Left of the duty belt buckle was a double pistol magazine pouch. There were two pistol magazines that were loaded to capacity, 15 9mm cartridges. All of the ammunition was department issued Winchester Ranger 9mm 147

grain JHP. Behind the magazine pouch was a radio pouch containing Sgt. Waldon's issued Harris HT with lapel mic. To the rear of the radio pouch was an OC spray pouch with Sgt. Waldon's department issued OC spray.

I secured Sgt. Waldon's rifle, magazine that was in the rifle and the ammunition from those magazines by placing them in the OIS cabinet in the patrol armory. At 1544 hours I provided the rifle, magazine and ammunition to Deputy Ditfurth for their inspection. Deputy Ditfurth delivered the rifle back to me on 08-02-22.

POST SHOOTING INSPECTION:

On 08-03-22 I conducted the post shooting inspection of the rifle and magazine. The rifle and magazine were found to be in good working condition. Sgt. Waldon last had his rifle inspection on 04-28-22 by me. Sgt. Waldon last qualified with his rifle on 05-09-22, which I observed. I attached copies of both the qualification and inspection sheets.

DETAILS:

On 07-31-22 I responded to the Corona Police Department for a Critical Incident Team activation. At approximately 1230 hours, Det. Placencia requested I respond to the 600 Blk. of Treemont Pl., Corona to check for potential evidence as the suspect was seen jumping a fence into the Deerwood Apartment Complex at this location. While checking the area I noticed a defect to the stucco of the west facing wall of 685 Treemont Pl. #205, Corona. This apartment is located on the second floor of the building. The defect appeared to be a hole from a bullet.

I knocked on the front door of the apartment to make sure everyone in the apartment were not injured. (OT) [REDACTED] opened the door. [REDACTED] said he had been in the apartment since approximately 1400 hours on 07-30-22. [REDACTED] said he had not heard or seen anything unusual during the day. I asked [REDACTED] if I could look in the apartment and he said I could.

Upon entering the apartment I contacted (OT) [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] said he had been in the apartment since 0400 hours. [REDACTED] said he had not heard or seen anything unusual.

I checked the interior of the apartment in the area of where the defect in the stucco was and did not see any interior damage.

Forensic Technician Walker responded to the scene. Forensic Technician Walker took both interior and exterior photos of the apartment. With the assistance of Corona Fire Fighters I was able to pull what appeared to be bullet fragments from the hole in the stucco. Forensic Technician Walker collected these fragments.

PURPOSE:

This supplemental report documents the crime scene (2280 Treemont Pl #204, City of Corona).

CRIME SCENE:

The residence located at 2280 Treemont Pl #204, City of Corona, is a 3-bedroom, 2-bathroom, apartment home. The apartment is located on the 2nd floor of the Deerwood apartment complex.

The apartment has one entry door in the front and one off the balcony, leading to the living room. There are no other access points to the location. The apartment was reasonably clean. The front entry leads to the living room to the left and dining room to the right.

The first bedroom (Bedroom #1) belongs to [REDACTED].

The second bedroom (Bedroom #2) belongs to [REDACTED] (Was not at scene).

The master bedroom belongs to [REDACTED] and their two young children.

Refer to scene photographs taken by Forensic Technician P. DeLaHoya for further description of the scene.

NOTE:

Detective M. DeRuyter authored a search warrant for the location (2280 Treemont Pl #204, City of Corona), including an associated vehicle (2007 Honda, Lic #7PCZ170). The warrant was signed by Riverside Superior Court Judge I. Asberry.

Prior to searching the apartment, I contacted the resident ([REDACTED]) in the bottom apartment (2280 Treemont Pl #104). [REDACTED] allowed me to review her Ring camera history. The Ring camera captured [REDACTED] walking eastbound in front of the apartment. [REDACTED] is not carrying anything and is wearing the same clothes he was wearing when officers arrived (T-Shirt and shorts). [REDACTED] stated she would email the video.

DETAILS:

On 07-31-2022, at around 0752 hours, I (Detective Wade Arens) responded to the Corona PD: reference a man with a gun/OIS call. The primary investigating officer, Detective M. Placencia, asked me to handle the crime scene at 2280 Treemont Pl #204. I was provided with the details of the case and a photo of the suspect. The RSO Bloodhound had hit on the

apartment and one of the occupants, [REDACTED]. During the initial search of the apartment (Per homeowner consent), a pair of black and white shoes and pants matching what the suspect was wearing were located. The items were left untouched.

I arrived at the location and contacted Sgt. R. Bartlett and Sgt. R. Montanez. I was advised the apartment had been cleared. The occupants of the apartment ([REDACTED] and two small children) were in the carport. [REDACTED] was placed under arrest and transported to CPD Jail for questioning.

At 1443 hours, I entered the apartment with Forensic Tech P. DelaHoya and conducted a walkthrough of the location. At my direction, Forensic Tech DelaHoya took overall photos of the scene. With the assistance of Det. M. DeRuyter, Investigator E. Carranza, Investigator F. Munoz, I conducted a search of the residence (Per signed search warrant) in attempt to locate any evidence.

During the search, assisting personnel would advise me of any potential evidence. Four items of evidence were located in the apartment. I documented the evidence on CPD Form 020-017 (Property Log). Any potential evidence was photographed by Forensic Tech DeLaHoya and a yellow numbered evidence tag was placed next to it.

At my direction, Forensic Tech DeLaHoya collected the following items from the scene and booked them into Property at the Corona Police Station.

#2 - Black/White Puma size 8 women's shoes (Family Room floor).

#3 - Black w/ white striped Adidas pants (Bedroom #1 floor).

#4 - Black/White Fila shoes (Bedroom #1 closet).

#5 - Black T-Shirt with yellow writing on front (Bedroom #2)

After the evidence was removed from the apartment, I released the scene to the family. I provided [REDACTED] with a copy of the search warrant and property log receipt.

On 07/31/22, at approximately 0545 hours, I responded to 655 Valleywood Cir. Corona, (Riverside County) in reference to multiple reporting parties reporting a man with a gun inside the Ashton apartments, located at 2178 Stoneridge Dr.

I contacted the homeowner of 655 Valleywood Cir. to gain access into their backyard. From the backyard I was able to see the west parking lot of the Ashton apartments. My dash camera (#79285) was recording from when I left the command post to when I arrived in the area of the Deerwood apartment complex, however, my body worn camera was turned off for a majority of the time I was on the perimeter.

DETAILS:

On 07/31/22, I was working as a Police Officer for the City of Corona in the County of Riverside. I was wearing a full Corona Police K9 uniform consisting of a vest carrier with visible POLICE letters attached to the front right chest and a cloth badge attached to the left chest. Attached to the back of the carrier is the word POLICE K9 in large silver letters. I was also driving a marked black and white Corona Police K9 unit 79285. My K9 partner Bruce was wearing a green tactical K9 harness.

I was called into work for an SRT (Special Response Team) activation. Upon my arrival I was tasked with holding a perimeter at the northwest corner of the Deerwood Apartments while other members conducted a search of the complex. During the time I was holding the perimeter an unknown resident provided me with a "Ring" video of the suspect. The video was sent to assisting Officers on the call to provide an update of the suspect description. Detective Eddy later contacted the resident and collected a copy of the video, please refer to his report for further.

After the search was completed I was released from my perimeter spot and this concluded my involvement with this incident.

Details:

On 07-31-2022, at about 0621 hrs, I received a notification regarding an SRT Activation. I responded to the command post and was instructed to accompany several Special Response Team members in a Riverside Police Department Bearcat armored vehicle to a perimeter position near 2240 Treemont Place, Corona, CA. I remained at this location until myself and Corporal Goodman moved to a different Bearcat armored vehicle to assist a team led by Sergeant Montanez. I remained with Sergeant Montanez's team for the remainder of the Special Response Team involvement in this incident. At one point we moved to another apartment at 2280 Treemont #204, Corona. While at this apartment I requested to have Officer Rangel leave Sergeant Shatford's perimeter position and join us on the north side of the apartment to operate a Corona PD UAS. Prior to the Corona Police Department UAS being utilized a member of the Riverside Sheriff's Department EST was able to fly a Riverside Police Department UAS into the apartment and visually clear it. Once the UAS operation was completed I accompanied a search team into the apartment and cleared it to ensure there were no subject hiding inside. This search team consisted of Sergeant Montanez, Detective Palaoro, Detective Medeiros, Corporal Goodman, Officer Rangel, and myself. Once the apartment was cleared I remained there until instructed to return to the command post.

On 07/31/2022, I was on duty and employed as a full-time police officer for the City of Corona Police Department; County of Riverside, wearing a full police uniform and driving a marked black and white police car (79291). At approximately 0545 hours, I responded to the area of 681 Morningside Dr. Corona, CA 92879 to assist Officers with a possible man with a gun call.

Upon my arrival, I stood by with Officers near the entrance of the Ashton Apartments on the Promenade Ave. side. While at this location it was relayed to Officers the suspect with the rifle was running eastbound through the complex towards McKinley St. The suspect exited the complex and continued to run eastbound towards the Deerwood apartment complex. While hearing this over the radio, I entered my patrol vehicle and drove to the backside of the Deerwood Apartments off of Richey St. to setup a perimeter in the area of Richey St. and Mary Helen St. I remained at this perimeter spot until relieved by a Riverside Police Department Officer.

I returned back to the Command Post which was setup to the rear of 420 McKinley St. Once at the command Post, I was advised to return to the area of Richey St. and Mary Helen St. to secure the exit gate for the Deerwood Apartments. I remained at that exit gate until the perimeter was disbanded at approximately 1110 hours.

DETAILS: On Sunday 07-31-2022 at around 0743 hours, I was contacted by Sergeant M. Hernandez and advised to respond to the Corona Police Department reference an officer involved shooting that occurred at the Ashton Apartments, Corona, CA. I arrived at the Corona Police Department on 07-31-2022 at around 0915 hours and attended a critical incident briefing. After the briefing, Sergeant Hernandez advised Corporal S. Hungerford, Forensic Specialist L. Walker and I to chart Corona Police Department Sergeant J. Waldon. We contacted Sergeant Waldon in the Corona Police Department traffic conference room on 07-31-2022 at around 1020 hours.

Per Corporal Hungerford's direction, I took overview and close-up photographs of Sergeant Waldon including Sergeant Waldon's duty uniform, ballistic helmet, exterior ballistic vest, duty belt, firearms, magazines, cartridges, and equipment (see photographs CPD_0001- CPD_0244). Refer to Corporal Hungerford's report for charting details of Sergeant Waldon.

After the charting process, Forensic Specialist Walker and I responded to the Ashton Apartments scene located north of 699 Stoneybrook Drive, Corona, CA. We arrived on scene on 07-31-2022 at around 1230 hours and contacted Sergeant Hernandez and Detective Matson. Per the direction of Detective Matson, I took

overview photographs of the scene including photographs of Highridge Drive, nearby apartment buildings, one cartridge case, McKinley Street between the Ashton and Deerwood Apartments, westside of the Deerwood Apartments and nearby trash cans/dumpsters (see photographs CPD_0245-CPD_0312).

After taking overview photographs, Detective Matson advised me to collect the cartridge case. I listed the cartridge case as evidence item PD1 and took overview and close-up photographs of the cartridge case (see photographs CPD_0313-CPD_0319). Prior to collecting item PD1, Officer R. Romans scanned the scene using FARO. While Officer Romans scanned the scene, I took overview and close-up photographs of victim [REDACTED] (see photographs CPD_0320-CPD_0349). After photographing Waqar, I took additional close-up photographs of item PD1 then collected item PD1. The cartridge case was head-stamped "WMA 15" (see photographs CPD_0350-CPD_0353).

After collecting item PD1, Detective Matson requested perspective photographs from the area where Sergeant Waldon fired from. I was advised Sergeant Waldon fired from the exit gate located north of 699 Stoneybrook Drive (Ashton Apartments). A defect was located at the Deerwood Apartments, on the exterior west wall of 685 N. Treemont Place Apt #205, above carport #373, and below the apartment windows. I took perspective photographs from the exit gate facing east towards the defect. Corporal Hungerford then held two yellow arrow placards to mark the location of the defect and I took additional perspective photographs from the exit gate (see photographs CPD_0354-CPD_0364).

After taking perspective photographs, Sergeant Hernandez advised me to respond to 2280 Treemont Place #204, Corona, CA (Deerwood Apartments) reference a warrant search of the residence. I arrived on scene on 07-31-2022 at around 1440 hours and contacted Detective W. Arens. Per the direction of Detective Arens, I took overview photographs of the exterior and interior of the residence (see photographs CPD_0365-CPD_0621). After completing overview photographs, Detective Arens requested I collect four evidence items from apartment #204. I took overview and close-up photographs of each items before collecting them (see photographs CPD_0622-CPD_0649). The following is a list of evidence items I collected from apartment #204, refer to the attached property report for further details including date, time, and location collected:

Item PD2: (01) pair of black and white, Puma shoes, women's size 8.

After collecting the listed evidence items I took additional overview photographs of the residence prior to leaving the scene (see photographs CPD_0650-CPD_0691). I transported evidence items PD1-PD5 to the Corona Police Department Forensic Laboratory further evidence processing. On Thursday 08-04-2022 at around 1030 hours, I processed evidence items PD1-PD5 in the forensic laboratory. I visually examined and took additional overview and close-up photographs of evidence items PD1-PD5 (see photographs CPD_0692-CPD_0720).

I took a total of (720) photographs and listed the photographs as evidence item PD6. I logged evidence items PD1-PD6 with the Corona Police Department Property Section and uploaded item PD6 into Digital On Q. Refer to Forensic Specialist Walker's report for further evidence collection details and Officer Romans

report for a diagram of the scenes.

INCIDENT RECORDED ON BODY/DASHBOARD CAMERA: Yes - I was wearing my department issued body-worn camera and had it activated at various times during the incident. It eventually died and was not recharged until after I left the scene.

SCENE:

I initially responded to the tactical command post. I was then assigned to supervise a group of SRT members who would be relieving patrol officers at the Corona Police Department's BearCat, which was parked at the Deerwood Apartments, near 685 N. Treemont Pl., Corona. We subsequently moved the BearCat to several other locations in, and around, the apartment complex.

EVIDENCE:

When I relieved patrol officers at the BearCat, the suspect's rifle was laying on the floor near the backdoors. There was also a loaded magazine and two live rounds of .222 ammunition. At one point during the operation Lt. Fountain asked that I inspect the rifle and look for a serial number. I was wearing cloth/leather gloves and used my right hand to pick the rifle up by the buttstock and turn it around. I did not see a serial number on the rifle. As we continued to move around the complex, I became concerned about it being stepped on or otherwise mishandled and decided to move it to the unoccupied front passenger seat of the BearCat. It remained there until the BearCat returned to the command post and a detective took custody of it.

DETAILS:

I am currently employed as a police sergeant with the Corona Police Department. One of my duties is that of Team Leader on our department's Special Response Team (SRT), SRT acts as our department's SWAT team and is tasked with handling high-risk incidents.

On 07/31/2022 at approximately 0615 hours, SRT received an activation regarding a man running through apartment complexes while armed with a rifle and a subsequent officer involved shooting. I responded to the tactical command post and was briefed about what had occurred thus far. I was tasked with relieving CPD officers that were stationed as an emergency reaction team in the Deerwood Apartment complex. My team initially consisted of Sgt. Bartlett, Cpl. Youngquist, Det. Medeiros, and Det. Palaoro.

A Riverside Police Department BearCat was already at the command post and drove us to our department's BearCat in the complex. Once we arrived at our BearCat, I spoke with Cpl. Rodriguez, who responded to the original call for service. He briefed me about what had occurred, showed me where they found the suspect's rifle, and showed me that it was on the floor in the back of the BearCat.

Several minutes later I learned that a potential suspect, [REDACTED], lived in the complex and that he had been seen standing on his balcony. Corona Police Dispatch had sent [REDACTED] photo out via email, so I showed it to Cpl. Rodriguez because he had seen the suspect. Cpl. Rodriguez was not certain, but believed he was a close match for the suspect he saw fleeing. I was recently involved in a foot pursuit of [REDACTED] after he had threatened another resident of the complex with a knife. Based on his previous behavior, his connection to the complex, and because Cpl. Rodriguez believed he matched the suspect's description, I instructed Officer Murphy to drive the BearCat to be closer to his apartment.

A member of the Crisis Negotiation Team was on the phone with [REDACTED] mom and asked them to exit their apartment and meet us in the parking lot. His mother met us at the BearCat and was upset with us, crying, and demanding to know what was happening. Sgt. Bartlett explained why we were there and I watched as [REDACTED] and another adult male exited the apartment and slowly walked towards us.

Det. Medeiros gave both commands and both men sat on concrete stairs near the apartment building. We told [REDACTED] to walk to us, but he suddenly stood up, turned towards us, and then laid down on the sidewalk. Det. Medeiros tried to give him commands to walk to us, but [REDACTED] was yelling at us about people chasing him and other things which I could not understand. He would lie down, but then suddenly push himself back up as he continued to yell at us. Because of the circumstances of the call, both Det. Medeiros and Det. Palaoro had their rifles pointed at [REDACTED]

We eventually had the other male walk towards us and Sgt. Bartlett remained with him and the mother. We then approached [REDACTED], who continued to yell at us, and took him into custody without further incident. He remained upset, continued to yell, and was not making sense with what he was telling me. I instructed Officer Tabikha to put him in the backseat of a Corona Police unit which we had respond. [REDACTED] got more upset and continued to yell while in the car. Due to his erratic behavior, I asked Officer Tabikha to transport him to the command post or station because we could not safely keep him in the still active scene.

RSO's SWAT team and bloodhound had also responded and were conducting a search of the complex using the bloodhound. They eventually passed us and the dog led them to 2280 E. Treemont Pl. #204. RSO setup a perimeter around the building, using both RSO SWAT personnel and CPD SRT officers. Once [REDACTED] and his family was moved from the active scene, I had Officer Murphy drive the BearCat to that building and connected with RSO's team, including their Team Leader, Sgt. Walsh.

As we decided on a course of action regarding this apartment, I asked Sgt. Glenn to return to the command post and retrieve additional pieces of equipment. He took the BearCat to do so and a member of CIT took custody of the suspect's rifle.

I spoke with Sgt. Walsh and we decided that RSO personnel would restart their bloodhound search while we worked at the apartment in question. We eventually made telephone contact with the residents at #204, including [REDACTED] and

they exited the apartment. I spoke with the occupants and obtained consent, which was recorded on my body-worn camera, to conduct a search of their apartment.

I planned on flying a Corona Police drone into the apartment, but it would not work. An RPD officer who had brought their BearCat told me he had a drone and that we could use his equipment. RSO Deputy Segura offered to operate the drone and cleared most of the apartment. I then took a team into the apartment and also confirmed no one was inside. In one of the bedrooms we noticed a pair of pants on the floor that matched the suspect's. We also found a pair of shoes that were similar to those being worn by the suspect with the rifle. As we stood in the apartment, the RSO bloodhound returned as she had tracked back to the same door.

I passed this information to the command post and it was decided that we would focus on apartment #204 and, due to the lack of further information, breakdown the perimeter and complete the tactical portion of the incident.

We returned to the command post with our BearCat and released the scene to CPD detectives.

Upon making entry to the apartment, officers located a pair of black shoes by the front door that Mathew's mother stated were his, and he bought them with his own money. Officers asked Mathew's mother where the base to the GPS monitor was and she moved a couch in the living room and showed us where it was plugged in. No other electronic devices were located. Officers collected the shoes, and GPS charger, which were both later entered into CPD evidence under items MT01 and MT02. No other items of interest were located inside the apartment.

I was wearing full police uniform, driving a marked black and white police vehicle, assigned as unit 125. I assisted with a call in reference to a man with a gun in the area of 681 Moningside Drive in the City of Corona.

While in route to the location, officers on scene advised the suspect, described as a black male adult, wearing a black shirt, black pants with a backpack and rifle. I responded to the east side of the apartment complex on Mckinley Street at which point I observed the suspect jump the east fence, cross Mckinley, and jump the west fence of the Deerwood Apartments located at 2215 Lakeside Place. I lost sight of the suspect as he continued eastbound through the apartment complex.

The distance I observed the suspect from was 75-100 yards. I am unable to identify the suspect. I responded to the east side of the Deerwood Apartment complex, entered on foot, and held a perimeter assignment mid-block on East Treemont Place which was a north central location of the perimeter.

I held my perimeter location until relieved at which point I responded to the station to download my vehicle camera footage in an attempt to identify the suspect. The unit camera footage did not provide any useful identifying footage.

When I arrived on scene, I was tasked with going to Valleywood Street in an attempt to get an observation of the man with a gun. Valleywood Street is the street behind the above listed address. There is a small park on Valleywood between 649 and 655 Valleywood Street. I walked down in an attempt to see the male, but I was unable to do so, due to the greenbelt.

I then went into the backyard of 655 Valleywood Street in an attempt to see the male. I placed a chair in the corner of the yard and looked over the fence. At first, I saw no one walking around in the area of 681 Morningside Drive. It was slightly difficult to see due to the green belt and trees being in the way. After a few seconds, I saw a male matching the description given by reporting parties with a rifle ducking in between cars. The male was approximately 50 feet away from my elevated position (backyard of 655 Valleywood Street). The male would go in and out of my view. I then saw the male walking around in the middle of the parking lot for approximately ten seconds. The male appeared to be very agitated, and he kept looking around and pacing back and forth with a rifle in his hand, leaning on his shoulder, and pointing it towards the sky.

At this time, there were multiple callers about the male pointing the rifle at them and or their apartment building. Due to their being an immediate threat to public safety and my partners, I placed my rifle over the fence and pointed it at the male. I was unable to see the sights of my gun because of my height. After trying to adjust myself to see better, the male began to run toward McKinley Street, and I lost sight of the male.

I would describe the male as the following:

African American male, with messy afro hair with the sides shorter than the top, patchy facial hair, approximately six feet tall, slim build, wearing a black shirt, black pants, and black shoes.

After the male ran away from my location, I went to McKinley Street and Lakeshore Place and held a perimeter spot. I remained at that location until the perimeter was disbanded around 1110 hours.

On 07/31/22, I was contacted by Sergeant Hernandez regarding an Officer Involved Shooting and assigned as the assisting CPD case agent. I responded to the Corona Police Department and was briefed on the incident by Sergeant Marquez who was on scene and operated the Unmanned Aerial System (UAS). Sergeant Marquez played the recorded UAS video footage which captured the incident (footage was at a high elevation). Per CPD policy, the Riverside County Sheriff's Department Force Investigations Detail (FID) responded and took primary case agent duties for the officer portion of the OIS. Master Investigator Bishop was assigned as the FID case agent.

Sergeant Waldon was identified as the solo officer involved in the OIS. I later watched his body-worn camera which captured the incident, but there was no sound. Officer Adamson stood next to Sgt. Waldon when the OIS occurred. Corporal Hungerford conducted Sgt. Waldon's charting, with the assistance of Forensic Technician De La Hoya. Refer to their supplemental reports for further information. Sgt. Waldon's duty rifle (used during the incident) was collected by Deputy Ditfurth and later inspected by Riverside County Sheriff's Department with no unusual findings. Sgt. Waldon's association attorney representative, Steven Alvarado (with Rains Lucia Stern), was contacted and advised Sgt. Waldon would be providing a statement on 08/10/22.

Officer Adamson - Bearcat rear passenger; dismounts Bearcat and is next to Sgt. Waldon when the OIS occurred / Interview later conducted on 08/04/22.

During the briefing, it was discovered the suspect (S-1) was still outstanding. I responded to the scene with FID personnel. The following duties were delegated at the scene and later in the investigation (Refer to supplemental reports for further information):

~Detective Velasco - Obtained statements from initial reporting parties and victims / Booked 911 calls into evidence.

~Detective Neagu - A subject (██████████) had been detained by CPD Special Response Team personnel. It was later determined ██████████ was unrelated to the incident. Refer to Sergeant Montanez' supplemental report for further details regarding the initial contact, and Detective Neagu's report regarding the follow up with ██████████ and his family (CPD Case# 22-054015).

~Detective Mendenhall - Officer interviews.

~Detective Palaoro - Handled suspect portion of the investigation.

~Detective Matson - Documented OIS scene(s) and obtained statements.

~Detective Eddy - Canvassed area for addition victims, witnesses, and/or surveillance footage of suspect. Assisted by Deputy Gallardo and Farag.

~Detective Arens - While conducting a search of the area with the RSO Bloodhound, there was an alert at ██████████ apartment (2280 E. Treemont Place #204, Corona) and his person. Clothing similar to the suspect's was also observed. Detective DeRuyter authored a search

warrant for the apartment and Detective Arens documented the scene ([REDACTED] apartment). During the follow-up investigation, [REDACTED] was ruled out as suspect.

~Detective DeRuyter - Authored search warrant and search warrant return for [REDACTED] apartment. Detective DeRuyter was also tasked with processing a search warrant at Isaiah Gooldmas' apartment (695 Treemont Place #208, Corona) on 08/26/22.

~Detective Clary - Booked evidence (S-1's rifle, backpack, magazines, DNA) and authored search warrants / search warrant returns for information relating to receipts located inside the above-mentioned backpack.

~Detective Medeiros - Conducted follow-up on potential suspects.

~Corporal Hungerford - After charting, Cpl. Hungerford responded to the scene and assisted. I asked him to contact the residents at 685 N. Treemont Place #205, Corona, to ensure they were okay and not injured during the incident. A resident ([REDACTED]) was contacted and appeared to match the description of the suspect. [REDACTED]

I conducted follow-up and discovered [REDACTED] was electronically supervised by Riverside County Sheriff's Department. The system didn't have full GPS capabilities but documented if the user ([REDACTED]) was further than 100' away from the monitoring device. On 08/06/22, I retrieved a copy of [REDACTED] activity report and later booked it into evidence (MP03). The monitoring device was also later collected at the apartment. I reviewed the report which documented [REDACTED] as being within 100' of his apartment when the incident / OIS occurred. The suspect was observed well beyond 100' of [REDACTED] apartment, thus, ruling [REDACTED] out as a suspect.

~Officer Romans - Scene collection using the FARO and UAS.

~Forensic Technician Walker / De La Hoya - Scene processing / Evidence collection and processing.

~Officer Vega - During an article search, Officer Vega located a backpack the suspect discarded at 685 Treemont Place #102, Corona. The backpack contained two receipts and a large capacity magazine loaded with .223 ammunition. During processing, three DNA profiles were located on the large magazine. One of the profiles was good enough for a search through CODIS, but a match was not found. Person(s) related to the receipts were also contacted. Refer to Detective Palaoro's report for further information.

~HOPE Team - The HOPE Team was shown the UAS footage and photographs of the suspect. They were unable to locate anyone matching the suspect's description during an area search.

In addition to the above assignments, all patrol personnel who responded to the incident wrote supplemental reports. Furthermore, Team Leaders of the CPD Special Response Team wrote supplemental reports with their involvement (Sgt. Shatford / Sgt. Glenn).

On 08/03/22, Corporal Rodriguez, Officer Grier, Officer Cornell, and Officer Duran were interviewed at the Corona Police Department. Detective Mendenhall assisted with the interviews which were FID led. I listened to the interviews live from a separate room. It should be noted that during the interviews, Corporal Rodriguez stated he initially recovered the suspect's rifle (also captured on body-worn camera footage). He handed the rifle to Officer Cornell who confirmed he unloaded the rifle which had a loaded magazine inserted, and an unspent bullet (.223) in the chamber.

On 08/04/22, Officer Laughlin, Officer Alborno, and Officer Adamson were interviewed at the Corona Police Department. I assisted with the interviews which were FID led. Detective Mendenhall also assisted Investigator Bishop with Sgt. Waldon's interview at the Corona Police Department on 08/10/22. The interviews were audio recorded and FID led, refer to Investigator Bishop's report for further information. Transcripts will be provided at a later date.

Several potential suspects were investigated and ruled out as being involved. Ultimately, Detective Palaoro identified the suspect as Isaiah Goldmas. While researching Isaiah, a phone number with prior contacts (2019) was located [REDACTED]. On 08/24/22, I contacted [REDACTED] at 15690 Lasselle Street, Moreno Valley. [REDACTED] was in possession of a phone with the listed phone number. [REDACTED] told me she acquired the phone and number [REDACTED] sometime in early 2021. Amanda did not know the suspect and was unrelated to the investigation.

FOLLOW-UP VICTIM INTERVIEWS:

I re-contacted some of the victims to ask clarifying questions relating to their statements provided to Detective Velasco:

On 08/25/22, I contacted [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] via telephone (dating relationship).

I audio recorded the interviews and later booked them into evidence at CPD (MP05). The following is a summary of their audio recorded statements:

I initially spoke to [REDACTED] and asked if she could provide further information about her mindset and what she was thinking when she encountered SU01 with a rifle on 07/31/22. Upon contacting SU01 on her patio, [REDACTED] felt like a "sitting duck," and believed things could have gone "either way." Chadae stated, "I felt like he could have possibly just shot me, and with that type of gun, continue to shoot me multiple times." [REDACTED] feared for her life but tried to remain calm throughout the situation. After the suspect walked away, she went back into her apartment with [REDACTED]. While inside, [REDACTED] called 911. Approximately five minutes later, [REDACTED] looked through the windows of her apartment out to the parking lot. Upon looking, she discovered SU01 was still outside of her apartment building with the rifle. [REDACTED] watched SU01 as he squinted his eyes and brought the rifle up to his face like he was aiming. SU01 then pointed the rifle in her direction and at their ([REDACTED] / [REDACTED]) apartment. [REDACTED] was approximately ten feet away from her at the time. After pointing the rifle in their direction, SU01 pointed the rifle upstairs and at the apartment building next to theirs. [REDACTED] was unsure if SU01 observed her through the window. [REDACTED] believed SU01 was capable of firing at them during the incident and feared they could have both been shot. [REDACTED] said SU01 acted like he was playing a "video game" and thought he could have been under the influence of drugs. [REDACTED] told me she feared for their safety and that of the community and desired prosecution if the suspect was located.

I then spoke to [REDACTED] about her mindset and feelings when she encountered SU01 with a rifle on 07/31/22. Upon first contact with SU01, [REDACTED] said she was "terrified" because she didn't know what was going to happen. [REDACTED] told me she didn't panic because she believed SU01 was going to shoot them. When she first noticed the SU01 had a rifle, it was facing down, but as the conversation continued, SU01 continuously manipulated the rifle (turned it in a way they could see the entire rifle). [REDACTED] thought SU01 intentionally turned the rifle to, "invoke fear." [REDACTED] did not observe SU01 later pointing the rifle in their direction because she was on the phone with 911 but feared for their safety. Additionally, [REDACTED] said she has anxiety from the incident and believes SU01 could return and harm them. [REDACTED] told me she desired prosecution if the suspect was located.

On 08/25/22, I re-contacted [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] via telephone (dating relationship). I audio recorded the interviews and later booked them into evidence at CPD (MP06 / MP07). The following is a summary of their audio recorded statements:

I initially spoke to [REDACTED] and asked if he could provide further information about his mindset and what he was thinking when he observed SU01 outside of their apartment with a rifle on 07/31/22. While watching SU01 in the parking lot, [REDACTED] specifically remembered SU01 pointing the rifle, "right at us." [REDACTED] looked into the barrel as it was pointed in their direction. However, [REDACTED] wasn't sure if SU01 specifically pointed the rifle at them because he pointed it in various directions. At that time, [REDACTED] was also obtaining visual observations of SU01 from the areas of the apartment near the parking lot. [REDACTED] daughter ([REDACTED] / 17 years old) was towards the rear of the apartment sleeping (away from windows). When the rifle was pointed in their direction, [REDACTED] feared for their safety and believed SU01 had the ability to shoot / harm them. [REDACTED] desired prosecution if the suspect was located.

I then spoke to [REDACTED] about her mindset and feelings when she observed SU01 with a rifle on 07/31/22. [REDACTED] told me she watched SU01 pointing the rifle in various directions but didn't observe the rifle being pointed at them or their apartment (looked out windows at different times than [REDACTED]). [REDACTED] said she feared for their safety and that of the community during the incident. Additionally, she fears SU01 may return and has [REDACTED] escort her to her vehicle when leaving early in the morning for work. I also spoke to [REDACTED] about SU01 pointing the rifle at their apartment while they were inside (observed by [REDACTED]) and near the windows / walls of the apartment. [REDACTED] stated it made her "scared" and desired prosecution if SU01 was located.

In addition to the weapons and obstruction charges, I believe Isaiah violated the following relating to the victims:

DETAILS CONTINUED / CONCLUSION:

With the assistance of Ontario Police Department, Isaiah was arrested at Ontario International Airport (1923 E. Avion Ave, Ontario) on 08/26/22. I was present during the apprehension. Prior to the arrest, I watched Isaiah check in luggage (black/red bag) and walk through the terminal. I took a photograph of Isaiah walking through the airport (Attachment 2). Isaiah was wearing black / white shoes and carrying a black champion bag.

~I collected the black / red bag and later searched it incident to arrest. No items of evidentiary value were located.

~I collected the black Champion bag and later searched it incident to arrest. Inside, the exact shirt the suspect wore during the incident was located. The shirt was photographed and booked into evidence by FT De La Hoya (PD9). See Attachment 3 and 4.

~I collected the black and white shoes worn by Isaiah during his arrest. The shoes match the shoes worn by the suspect during the incident. The shoes were photographed and booked into evidence by FT De La Hoya (PD12). See attachment 5.

~I collected the phone (Apple iPhone) Isaiah possessed during his arrest. I called the phone and confirmed the number was (951) 419-9925. The phone was booked into evidence by FT De La Hoya. I checked the phone out of evidence and provided it to Master Investigator Bishop for processing per a search warrant authored by Detective Palaoro and approved by Riverside County Superior Court Judge Gunn.

I was also present while FT De La Hoya took photographs of Isaiah and collected two buccal swabs (PD20 / PD21) per a search warrant authored by Detective Palaoro. I provided Isaiah with a search warrant service copy. As stated above, Forensic Technician De La Hoya will be completing a supplemental report that will be forwarded to the Riverside County District Attorney's Office.

On 08/26/22, A search warrant for additional evidence was also conducted at the Isaiah's residence (695 Treemont Place #208, Corona). During the search, a pair of black Adidas sweatpants were located and booked into evidence (PD12). The sweatpants matched the pants worn by the suspect during the incident. Refer to Detective' DeRuyter's supplemental report for further information.

On 08/28/22, I reviewed the jail phone calls Isaiah made the Corona Police Department Jail. I later booked the calls into evidence (MP08 / MP09).

MP08: On 08/26/22, at 1413 hours, Isaiah called (951) 992-7144. Based on the investigation, that number belongs to Isaiah's mother, [REDACTED]. During the conversation, Isaiah talked to [REDACTED] about why he was in custody (said he was there for assault with an illegal firearm and fleeing from officers). [REDACTED] asked if he answered any questions. Isaiah told [REDACTED] investigators asked what made him, "do what he did." Isaiah said he replied by telling investigators he, "felt in fear of my life." Isaiah tried to continue to talk, but Keishaun cut him off and told him not to speak with investigators and request an attorney.

MP09: On 08/26/22, at 1512 hours, Isaiah called [REDACTED] again. During the call, [REDACTED] asked if Isaiah had been provided with any further information. Isaiah told [REDACTED] they took buccal swabs from him and checked to make sure he wasn't shot by the police during the incident. Keishuan then reiterated to Isaiah he shouldn't speak to about the incident over the phone and shouldn't answer any further questions without an attorney.

I have been in communication with Investigator Bishop about the progress of his investigation (MB22-2120001). Refer to Investigator Bishop's report for further information regarding his portion of the investigation.

After the charting process, I responded to the Ashton Apartments scene located north of 699 Stoneybrook Drive, Corona, CA. Upon arrival I spoke with Detective Matson who showed us the scene. I was informed that the involved officer fired his weapon across McKinley St. from the exit gate located north of 699 Stoneybrook Drive (Ashton Apartments).

Forensic Specialist DeLaHoya and I decided to split up the scene and share the duty of documenting the areas the incident occurred. I then responded to the Deerwood Apartment complex where officers had located a defect that was on the exterior west wall of 685 N. Treemont Place Apt #205, above carport #373. I took overview photographs of the parking area below the defect in the wall. While photographing the area Detective Medeiros requested that I respond with him to 685 N. Treemont Place # 102 to retrieve a black backpack that he located in the exterior balcony area. I photographed the exterior balcony area and collected the black backpack and labeled it as item #LW1. I was immediately contacted by Detective M. Medeiros who took possession of the backpack (see his supplemental report for details).

I returned to the carport area where I met with Corporal Hungerford who requested that I respond with him to 685 N. Treemont Place #203 which was the apartment building the defect was located in. Hungerford spoke with the resident who allowed us to go inside the apartment and take a photograph of the bedroom just above carport #373. I took a few photos of the bedroom, specifically the corner to show that the bullet did not penetrate the apartment building and enter the apartment.

I returned to the carport area where additional photographs of the defect were taken. With assistance from the Corona Fire Department, a piece of the stucco on the exterior building was removed and a projectile was located, collected, and labeled as item #LW3.

I then responded to the rear parking area of the Deerwood Apartment complex where I met again with Detective Matson. He requested overview photos of a gray Honda Civic, plate #7PCZ170 that was parked in a parking stall. Matson requested the collection of a pair of black Adidas pants that were located in the trunk. The pants were photographed, collected, and labeled item #LW2.

The collected items were transported to the Corona Police Department. As I arrived back, I was contacted by Detective D. Clary and asked to meet him in the evidence logging room. I made contact with Clary, and he requested that I take back possession of the black backpack labeled item #LW1, and also take possession of the firearm recovered at the scene left by the suspect (see his report for details). DETAILS: On 07/31/2022 at approximately 0700 hours, I was notified of an officer involved shooting which occurred in Corona. I responded to Corona Police Department where I was briefed on the incident. I was assigned to provide assistance to Detective M. Placencia who was assigned as the primary investigator representing the Corona Police Department. (Riverside County Sheriff's Department is the primary investigative agency if an officer involved shooting occurs in our city with a corona police officer, with Corona Police personnel assisting them with delegated responsibilities). Investigator J. Bishop with the Riverside County Sheriff's Department was assigned as the lead investigator for this incident.

Detective Matson and I responded to the area of Highridge Drive (north alleyway of the Ashton apartments) with a cross street of Stoneybrook Drive, in Corona where the officer involved shooting took place. While at the scene we located a potential witness, listed above as [REDACTED]. The interview was recorded, retained and later booked by Detective Matson. After Detective Matson and I observed and documented the scene, CSI L. Walker responded to assist with evidence collection. For details see supplemental reports from Detective Matson and CSI L. Walker.

Detective Matson and I completed our duties at the above listed location and responded across the street to the Deerwood apartments where we located a bullet hole in the stucco of building number 685 Treemont Place a few feet below the window of apartment # 205. Corporal Hungerford, with the assistance of the Corona Fire Department was able to retrieve fragments of what was believed to be Sergeant Waldon's .223 round. The fragments were collected by CSI L. Walker and later booked into evidence.

I was notified by Detective Medeiros and his trainee, Lateral Officer A. Vega, during their canvas of the Deerwood apartments they had discovered a black back pack located on the patio a of 685 Treemont Place apartment 102 that had possibly been discarded by the suspect involved in this incident. Officer A Vega contacted the residents of the apartment who told her the back pack did not

belong to them. I put on latex gloves and unzipped the back pack and located a large capacity, drum style, loaded .223 rifle magazine inside. The tenant, later identified as [REDACTED] was present while I collected the back-pack. I asked [REDACTED] if the back-pack belonged to him and he said it did not. I showed [REDACTED] the drum magazine, nor the back pack belonged to him. I zipped the back pack up and gave it to Detective Medeiros to pass on to CSI L. Walker for processing.
