The incident occurred at the Applebee's east parking lot located at 521 N McKinley Street, Corona CA; County of Riverside.

### DETAILS:

On 11/18/2025 at approximately 0028 hours, I was working uniformed patrol in the City of Corona; County of Riverside. Officer Evans and Officer Escoto were dispatched to the scene regarding a male subject wearing a reflective shirt holding a "crowbar" running up to vehicles in the street. Officer Evans and Officer Escoto arrived at the scene and contacted the male. Officer Evans notified dispatch that he had the male subject at gun point and shortly after, Officer Evans advised an Officer involved shooting occurred.

Responding Officers and myself arrived at the scene and I observed a male subject later identified as Kiavik Miranda laying on the ground on his back. Kiavik had several gunshot wounds to his torso. Officer Gardner and Officer Velasco were providing medical treatment to Kiavik. I then observed a male subject later identified as [REDACTED] standing by a vehicle in the south parking lot of Applebee's. I asked [REDACTED] if he observed what happened and the following is a summary of his statement:

[REDACTED] stated he was in his vehicle stopped at the intersection of Promenade Avenue and McKinley Street. [REDACTED] stated a male was in the street "waving" and "yielding" a crossed crowbar. [REDACTED] stated the male was wearing a reflective jacket. [REDACTED] stated the male subject was walking up to vehicles and believed he was going to smash the window of the vehicles. [REDACTED] stated the male subject walked up to his vehicle and he drove off. [REDACTED] stated he then contacted a Security Guard for the shopping center and advised him of the incident. [REDACTED] then stated he was no longer at the scene, however, he heard heard six to eight gunshots in the area shortly after. [REDACTED] stated he returned to the parking lot and observed several Police Officers in the area. [REDACTED] did not observe the encounter of Kiavik and the Responding Officers.

I then spoke to the Security Guard, [REDACTED] and the following is a summary of his statement:

[REDACTED] is a security guard for the shopping center and was wearing a full security uniform with Security patches on his jacket. [REDACTED] stated he was contacted by [REDACTED] who advised him a male subject was in the parking lot acting erratic. [REDACTED] arrived at the scene and observed a Hispanic male, wearing a reflective shirt, holding a tire iron. [REDACTED] stated the male subject was hitting a Chevy Silverado (CA PLT: 7X46370) with the tire iron. [REDACTED] stated he did not observe anyone inside the vehicle and observed a [REDACTED] was crashed into the Chevy Silverado. [REDACTED] stated he was inside his Security vehicle when he drove up to the male subject with the tire iron and the male subject's

attention turned towards [REDACTED] stated the male looked at him "Very aggressively" and "Out of Control." [REDACTED] was seated in the driver seat when the male subject approached him and [REDACTED] had his window slightly cracked. [REDACTED] stated the male subject swung the tire iron at the front driver side window which caused the window to shatter. [REDACTED] stated he was not struck by the tire iron and did not have any injuries. [REDACTED] stated he then drove away from the area. [REDACTED] stated he looked back at the male subject and observed him falling. [REDACTED] stated he believed the male was under the influence due to him tripping and stumbling. [REDACTED] then contacted the Corona Police Department.

[REDACTED] stated shortly after, from about 15 feet away and while standing outside of his security car, he observed responding Officers (Officer Evans and Officer Escoto) arrive at the scene and contact the male. [REDACTED] stated responding Officers tried to "Deescalate" by telling the male subject to get on the ground. [REDACTED] stated the male subject did not want to "Obey" and kept trying to chase the Officers. [REDACTED] stated the male subject was holding a tire iron and tried swinging the tire iron at the Officers and the Officers had to "Open fire" on the male subject. [REDACTED] also stated the Officers told the male subject to "Stay down" several times. This concluded my interview with [REDACTED]

While at the scene, I set up crime scene tape across the south parking lot of Applebee's. The Detective Bureau responded to the scene and took over the investigation (See Detective Arens' supplemental report for further details).

**DETAILS:**

On November 18, 2025, I was employed as a Peace Officer for the City of Corona, County of Riverside. I was wearing a police uniform and driving a marked black and white police car (#79338). At 0034 hours, I responded to the above location due to officers having a male subject at gunpoint. It had originally been reported to 9-1-1 a male was running up to cars with a crowbar.

While responding, Officer R Evans broadcasted an officer involved shooting had occurred. Upon my arrival at 0037 hours, I observed a male subject lying in a parking lot on his back, with his hands handcuffed behind his back. I observed possible injuries to the male's chest and left arm. Initially, I was able to locate a carotid pulse then a short time later, I no longer felt a pulse.

At this time, I instructed Officer M Velasco to initiate CPR. I relieved Officer M Velasco a short time later then I was relieved by medical personnel from the Corona Fire Department. At 0045 hours, the subject's death was pronounced by Firefighter Paramedic C Ortega (Paramedic #P39402). The only equipment removed from the scene by the fire department was their heart monitor.

As the crime scene was being established, I walked the immediate area around the decedent and observed several shell casings and a handgun magazine. The ground was wet because it had been raining and was still cloudy, so I used orange bands and placed them around approximately 15 spent shell casings and one live round in case it started raining again.

I exited the crime scene and started to assist with scene security at the intersection of McKinley Street and Promenade Avenue to keep all cars and pedestrians off Promenade Avenue. I was relieved by Corporal A Plasencia at 0429 hours.

**SCENE:**

The incident occurred at the Applebee's east parking lot located at 521 N McKinley Street, Corona CA; County of Riverside.

**DETAIL**

On November 18, 2025, I was employed as a Peace Officer for the City of Corona, County of Riverside. I responded to the above location due to officers having a male subject at gunpoint. It had originally been reported to 9-1-1 a male was running up to cars with a crowbar.

While responding, Officer R Evans broadcasted an officer involved shooting had occurred. I arrived at around 0040 hours and I saw Officers and CFD personnel rendering medical aid to a male laying on the ground. Sgt. Jurado directed me to start taping off the surrounding areas with crime scene tape.

I put caution tape blocking the east and westbound streets/sidewalks at Promenade Ave and McKinley St. After placing the caution tape I canvased the east side of the Marquessa apartments located at 2250 Treehouse lane for any damage that may have been caused as a result of the Officer Involved Shooting. I also canvased all four corners and nearby buildings at the intersection of Promenade Ave and McKinley St. I located no damage at any of these locations.

This completed my involvement in this incident. Refer to the initial report for further details.

### SCENE:

My involvement took place in the parking lot on the east side of Applebee's near the shopping center entrance/exit.

### DIGITAL EVIDENCE:

Body worn camera footage uploaded to Evidence.com.

### DETAILS:

On November 18, 2025 at approximately 0029 hours, dispatch broadcasted a disturbing-the-peace call near N. McKinley St. and Promenade Ave. The reporting party stated a male wearing a reflective shirt was running toward vehicles while holding what appeared to be a crowbar.

At approximately 0033 hours, I heard over the radio that Officer Evans was contacting the male. At approximately 0034 hours, I heard Officer Evans broadcast that he had the male subject at gunpoint. Upon hearing this, Officer Reynoso and I began responding to his location. While en route, it was broadcast that an officer-involved shooting had occurred.

I arrived on scene at approximately 0037 hours, east of the Applebee's restaurant parking lot. Upon arrival, I saw the male matching the description lying on the ground, handcuffed, with visible gunshot wounds. Officer Evans was attempting to cut the suspect's shirt off with trauma shears to render medical aid. I relieved Officer Evans, removed the remainder of the suspect's shirt, and applied pressure to a gunshot wound. Officer Gardner was monitoring the suspect's pulse and advised the suspect still had a pulse at that time.

At approximately 0040 hours, Officer Gardner advised the suspect no longer had a pulse. I then began CPR chest compressions until I was relieved by Officer Gardner.

Officer Reynoso and I established a crime scene perimeter with "Police" caution tape and took lead on establishing a Major Crime Incident Brief.

This concluded my involvement in this incident.

**SCENE:**

My involvement took place in the parking lot on the east side of Applebee's near the shopping center entrance/exit.

**DIGITAL EVIDENCE:**

\* Body worn camera

(The above-mentioned digital evidence was saved on Evidence.com)

**DETAILS:**

On November 18, 2025, I was employed as a Peace Officer for the City of Corona, County of Riverside. I was wearing a Corona Police uniform and acting in the capacity of a Field Training Officer for Officer Velasco. We were driving marked unit (#79356). At 0037 hours, we arrived at the above listed location due to officers having a male subject at gunpoint. It had originally been reported to 9-1-1, a male was running up to cars with a crowbar.

While responding, Officer Evans broadcasted an officer involved shooting had occurred. Upon arriving, I observed a male subject lying in the parking lot situated east of the Applebee's restaurant. The subject had his hands handcuffed behind his back. I observed possible gunshot wounds to the male's torso and legs. As Officer Velasco rendered medical aid to the subject, I made contact with Officer Evans to ensure he was uninjured and assisted him with deactivating his body-worn camera.

I assured Officer Evans was away from the crime scene and I took a position near the scene, in order to preserve scene safety and any evidence. At 0045 hours, I heard the subject's death was pronounced by Firefighter Paramedic C Ortega (Paramedic #P39402). While guarding the immediate scene, I observed several spent shell casings and one black Glock magazine on the ground near the subject.

Due to it having just rained, the ground was wet and much of the scene had standing rain water puddled. Officer Velasco and I established a crime scene perimeter with "Police" caution tape and took lead on establishing a Major Crime Incident Brief. This completed my involvement with this incident.

**Note:**

A 9mm round stamped "WIN 9mm LUGER" is issued by the Corona Police Department as 9mm, 147-grain hollow-point duty ammunition.

A 5.56mm round stamped "WMA21 5.56mm" is issued by the Corona Police Department as 5.56, 77-grain hollow-point duty ammunition.

All rounds located on both officers were department-issued duty ammunition.

**Details:**

At approximately 0200 hours, I responded to the Corona Police Department SEB conference room to assist with an officer-involved shooting investigation. Upon my arrival, I spoke to Officer R. Evans, and the following is a summary of my interaction and observations.

Officer Evans stated he has not changed or altered his uniform or equipment since the incident occurred. Officer Evans was wearing a "Class C" uniform, which consists of a blue long-sleeve shirt with "Corona Police" patches on both shoulders. He was wearing blue pants and black boots. Officer Evans was wearing a black external load-bearing ballistic vest. Over his right chest, he had "R. EVANS" with the word "POLICE" below it. Both words were in grey, block-lettering. Over Officer Evans' right chest was a cloth Corona Police badge with a morning band over it. On the rear of the vest, towards the top of the vest, was another patch that stated "R. EVANS" in grey block lettering, and in large grey block lettering was the word "POLICE".

I first inspect Officer Evans' duty handgun. The following is what I discovered: The firearm was in a Safariland "automatic locking system" holster, and the retention appeared to be working as designed. This was mounted to a drop-down thigh holster. I removed the firearm and noted it was a Glock 17, 9mm, serial number [REDACTED]. The pistol was equipped with a TLR1-HL weapon-mounted light, which was working. The pistol was equipped with night sights, which glowed in the dark. The pistol also had an extended magazine well and stippling around the grip area. I cleared the pistol and found one(1) 9mm round in the chamber stamped "WIN 9mm LUGER". In the magazine inserted in the pistol was a factory Glock 17 magazine, I found eighteen (18) rounds, all stamped the same as above and department-issued. It should be noted that the magazine is designed to hold seventeen (17) rounds; however, it still appears to function as designed with one extra round inserted.

I collected the firearm, the above-described magazine, and rounds, and gave them to Investigator Ramirez #4029.

Also attached to the thigh holster was one(1) 4-oz can of department-issued Saber Red pepper spray, which appeared to be full.

The only other item on his belt was a tourniquet.

I inspected Officer Evans' load-bearing vest and found the following: Behind the front main pocket of the vest, the lower right panel was his "Rapid Containment Baton," which appeared to be working as designed. I also located his TASER 10 serial number T19C73284, which still had ten(10) unfired cartridges,

with a battery level of 85%. When the TASER was activated, a forward-facing white light and green laser were turned on. The self-check of the TASER indicated that it was functional. There were no notable items inside the main pocket. Attached to the front of the pocket was an empty handcuff case. I noticed a small amount of blood on the top right corner of this pocket, which was photographed and swabbed by L. Walker. Officer Evens stated he normally has trauma shears in that main pocket, but they were left at the scene.

I also located a total of three open-topped vertical magazine pouches on his vest.

In the pouch on the left (closest to the center of the vest) I located one factory Glock 17 round magazine. I located eighteen(18) rounds in this magazine, all stamped "WIN 9mm LUGER." It should be noted that the magazine is designed to hold seventeen(17) rounds; however, it still appears to function as designed with one extra round inserted. The middle magazine pouch was empty.

The right magazine pouch (the one closest to his left side) contained a Glock 17 factory magazine. The magazine had seventeen(17) rounds all stamped "WIN 9mm LUGER."

Behind a small pocket under Evens' right arm (but on the LBV), I located a Magpul 20-round rifle magazine. This magazine had twenty(20) rounds of 5.56mm ammunition stamped "WMA21 5.56mm".

I located a small black operational flashlight in Officer Evans' left front sap pocket. I located a Devault spring-assisted folding knife in Officer Evans' left hip pocket. This concluded my interaction with Officer Evans

I then spoke to Officer Escoto. The following is a summary of my interaction with him:

Officer Escoto stated he has not changed or altered his uniform or equipment since the incident occurred. Officer Escoto was wearing a "Class C" uniform, which consists of a blue long-sleeve shirt with "Corona Police" patches on both shoulders. He was wearing blue pants and black boots. Officer Escoto was wearing a black external load-bearing ballistic vest. Over his right chest, he had "ESCOTO" with the word "POLICE" below it. Both words were in grey, block-lettering. Over Officer Escoto's right chest was a cloth Corona Police badge with a morning band over it. On the rear of the vest, towards the top of the vest, was another patch that stated "ESCOTO" in grey block lettering, and in large grey block lettering was the word "POLICE".

I first inspected Officer Escoto's duty handgun. The following is what I discovered:

The firearm was in a Safariland "automatic locking system" holster, and the retention appeared to be working as designed. This was mounted to a drop-down thigh holster. I removed the firearm and noted that it was a Staccato model P, 9mm, with a serial number of [REDACTED]. The pistol was equipped with a Surefire X300U, which was working. The pistol was equipped with a Trijicon RCR pistol-mounted optic, which appeared to be functioning properly. The pistol is also equipped with backup sights, which were visible through the optic. The rear sight was all black, and the front sight had a green fiber-optic insert. I cleared the pistol and found one(1) 9mm round in the chamber stamped "WIN 9mm LUGER" which is our department-issued duty ammunition. In the magazine inserted

in the pistol was a factory Staccato magazine capable of holding twenty(20) rounds. I found seventeen(17) rounds in that magazine, all stamped the same as above.

I collected the firearm, the above-described magazine, and rounds, and gave them to Investigator Ramirez #4029.

Also attached to the thigh holster was a tourniquet, which appeared not to have been used.

Attached to Officer Escoto's duty belt, on the opposite side (left side) of his firearm in a Safiland holster, with retention system engaged (hood), was his department-issued TASER 10 serial number T19C71250. The TASER still had ten(10) unfired cartridges, with a battery level of 82%. When the TASER was activated, a forward-facing white light and green laser were turned on. The self-check of the TASER indicated that it was functional.

I inspected Officer Escoto's load-bearing vest and found the following: There was nothing of note behind, in, or in front of the main pocket of the LBV.

To the right of the main pocket, I located 2 magazine pouches. The one on the left (closest to the center of the vest) had a Staccato 17-round factory magazine. The magazine had seventeen(17) rounds, all stamped "WIN 9mm LUGER".

The magazine pouch on the right had a Staccato 17-round factory magazine. The magazine had seventeen(17) rounds, all stamped "WIN 9mm LUGER".

To the right of the magazine pouches was Officer Escoto's radio, which appeared to be working. To the right of the radio (on Officer Escoto's left-hand side) was a small pouch containing his department-issued 4oz can of Saber Red pepper spray. The can appeared to be in working order and full. To the right of the pepper spray was his "Rapid Containment Baton," which appeared to be working as designed.

Behind a small pocket under Escoto's right arm (but on the LBV), I located a Magpul 20-round rifle magazine. This magazine had seventeen(17) rounds of 5.56mm ammunition stamped "WMA21 5.56mm". It is common practice not to completely fill a rifle magazine. Officers are advised that putting 1-3 rounds less than the total magazine capacity in rifle magazines makes it easier to conduct reloads.

I located a small black Streamlight operational flashlight in Officer Escoto's left front pant magazine pocket. No other items were located on Officer Escoto.

This concluded my interaction with Officer Escoto.

### DETAILS:

On 11/18/2025, I was working uniformed in a marked black and white police vehicle (79329) in the city of Corona, County of Riverside. At approximately 0028 hours, Corona Dispatch received a disturbing the peace call regarding a male wielding a crowbar and running up to vehicles near N McKinley St and Promenade Ave.

At approximately 0034 hours, I heard Officer Evans broadcast that he had one subject at gunpoint, and shortly after that, he broadcast that there was an officer-involved shooting. I responded to the area from Green River RD and Canyon Crest DR. I arrived on scene at 0041 hours. When I arrived, I set up yellow crime scene tape on the southeast side of Applebee's, 521 N McKinley St, Corona.

Sgt. Jurado called me to him and then assigned me to be with Officer Evans. Sgt Jurado ordered me not to speak to Officer Evans about the incident, asked me to drive Officer Evans to the station, keep him separate from Officer Escoto, and remain with him until I was relieved. I told him I understood and I drove Officer Evans back to the Corona Police station where I sat with him until we were both relieved by the Detective Bureau.

At this time it was unknown if the vehicles were involved or where the drivers of the vehicles were. I also observed Officers and medics from the Corona Fire Department rendering aid to the suspect.

Sergeant Jurado had Officer Evans and Officer Escoto separated and I observed him obtain a public safety statement from each of them. I then assisted with requesting Officer Ortiz respond to my location to be assigned take Officer Evans back to the station. Officer Hubbard was assigned to take Officer Escoto back to the station.

I then tasked an officer on scene to start setting up crime scene tape around the perimeter of the scene and I moved my patrol vehicle to block the left hand turn lane on to Promenade Ave from southbound McKinley Ave. When I returned to the scene, I was tasked with starting a crime scene log at approximately 0100 hours. At approximately 0242 hours I transferred responsibility of the crime scene log to Officer Johnson.

SCENE:

East parking lot of Applebee's Neighborhood Grill located at 521 N McKinley St in the City of Corona, County of Riverside.

DETAILS:

On 11/18/2025, at approximately 0029 hours, officers responded to a call for service reference a male subject swinging a crowbar at vehicles in traffic. At approximately 0034 hours, Ofc. Evans broadcasted on the radio that an officer involved shooting occurred. I began to respond to the location. Upon my arrival, I contacted two subjects, later identified as [REDACTED] who were at the scene on Promenade St. Both [REDACTED] informed me that they did not witness the shooting, but they did witness the events that occurred prior to officers arriving on scene. Both subjects were then interviewed separately and independently to ensure the integrity of their statements.

I conducted an interview with [REDACTED] and the following is a summary of his statements. [REDACTED] stated at approximately 0035 hours, he was traveling south on McKinley St in a vehicle with his brother, [REDACTED] when he observed an unknown male subject on the roadway on McKinley St between Promenade Ave and Highridge Dr. [REDACTED] said the unknown male was waving his hands in a frantic state. [REDACTED] did not stop for the unknown male and kept driving until he stopped at Promenade Ave for the red control light. While waiting at the intersection of McKinley St and Promenade Ave, [REDACTED] observed (suspect) Kiavik Miranda on the southwest corner of the intersection holding a tire iron. Kiavik approached a black vehicle that was stopped at the intersection with the tire iron. The black vehicle drove away from Kiavik, to which [REDACTED] believed the driver fled away to prevent possible harm from Kiavik. [REDACTED] said Kiavik walked to the southeast corner of the intersection, making erratic movements with the tire iron. [REDACTED] said Kiavik struck himself on the head several times with the tire iron. Kiavik walked to the parking lot east of the Applebee's Neighborhood Grill. While in the parking lot, Kiavik used the tire iron to damage 3-4 windows of a single vehicle. [REDACTED] said Kiavik then struck two additional vehicles with the tire iron. Kiavik then made eye contact with [REDACTED] who was now parked on Promenade Ave, just northeast of Applebee's Neighborhood Grill. While Kiavik was staring at [REDACTED] Kiavik swung the tire iron in an underhand manner, to which [REDACTED] described as if Kiavik was going to throw the tire iron like a bowling ball. [REDACTED] drove away from the location and to his residence ([REDACTED] Apartments) due to fear of being harmed by Kiavik. While driving away, [REDACTED] saw a security guard for the plaza arrive at the location. Some moments later while on the property of the [REDACTED] Apartments, [REDACTED] said he heard approximately 9 gunshots. [REDACTED] described it as 4-5 gunshots, followed by a pause in gunshots, and then an additional 4-5 gunshots. [REDACTED] drove back to the scene with [REDACTED] and observed officers on scene and Kiavik lying on the ground. This concluded my interview with [REDACTED]

I conducted an interview with [REDACTED] and the following is a summary of his

statements. [REDACTED] stated he was driving his vehicle south on McKinley St with his brother, [REDACTED] when he observed an unknown male subject on the roadway on McKinley St between Promenade Ave and Highridge Dr. [REDACTED] said the unknown male was "tripping out" in the street. [REDACTED] continued to drive his vehicle past the location of the unknown male and eventually stopped his vehicle at the Promenade Ave intersection. While at the intersection, [REDACTED] observed Kiavik run towards a vehicle that was stopped at the intersection while holding a tire iron. The vehicle drove away from Kiavik. [REDACTED] observed Kiavik walking on the sidewalk near the Applebee's Neighborhood Grill and hit himself on the head several times with the tire iron. [REDACTED] made a left turn from McKinley St to eastbound Promenade Ave and parked his vehicle on the side of the roadway to continue to observe Kiavik. At that time, [REDACTED] observed Kiavik in the east parking lot of the Applebee's Neighborhood Grill. Kiavik struck several windows of a parked vehicle with the tire iron. After striking the windows, Kiavik noticed [REDACTED] watching him. Kiavik walked slowly towards [REDACTED] location. [REDACTED] said Kiavik was holding the tire iron with an underhand grip and in a lowered stance, which [REDACTED] described as if Kiavik was preparing to throw the tire iron at [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] said he felt threatened at that moment. [REDACTED] began to drive away to take [REDACTED] to his residence. While driving away, [REDACTED] observed Kiavik stand up and "went about his business." Once [REDACTED] exited the vehicle at his residence, to which [REDACTED] believed it was approximately 60-80 seconds after leaving away from the parking lot, [REDACTED] heard gunshots. [REDACTED] drove back to the parking lot where they last saw Kiavik to observe what had occurred. When he returned, [REDACTED] saw 1-2 officers surrounding Kiavik at the location. [REDACTED] believed the officers had their guns holstered at that time. [REDACTED] described the gunshots as 4-5 shots, followed by a pause in gunshots, and then 4-5 additional gunshots. This concluded my interview with [REDACTED].

Ofc. Tabhika and I conducted an additional interview with [REDACTED] to clarify some details. [REDACTED] stated after observing the behavior of Kiavik, he believed the unknown male he saw on the roadway on McKinley St was signaling for help from Kiavik. [REDACTED] said he intended to call 911 right before driving away on Promenade Ave due to believing Kiavik was going to harm someone. He did not call 911 because he believed the situation was going to be handled when he saw the security guard arrive on scene. This concluded the interview with [REDACTED].

Ofc. Tabhika and I conducted an additional interview with [REDACTED] to clarify some details. [REDACTED] stated he believed the unknown male subject he saw on the roadway on McKinley St was probably waving for help from Kiavik. [REDACTED] indicated he reached the same conclusion as [REDACTED] regarding the unknown male they saw in distress on McKinley St. [REDACTED] said he believed Kiavik was a danger to people due to his observed behavior. [REDACTED] said if he stayed longer on scene while on Promenade Ave, then he believed Kiavik would've tried to harm [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] felt the need to leave the area at that time. This concluded my interview with [REDACTED].

The unknown male subject on the roadway both [REDACTED] saw in distress on McKinley St was later identified as [REDACTED] was the driver of the vehicle that was intentionally collided into by Kiavik.

At approximately 0242 hours, I took over responsibility from Cpl. Alborno for handling the crime scene log for the incident. At approximately 0645 hours, I transferred responsibility of the crime scene log to Ofc. Connor.

I was assigned to join Riverside County District Attorney Investigator Mario Moreno and Detective Rick Ramirez from the Riverside County Sheriff's Department, with interviewing [REDACTED]. At about 0546 hours, we conducted the interview and Investigator Moreno said he would document [REDACTED] statement.

Detective Arens asked that I ask [REDACTED] consent to search his [REDACTED] [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] gave the Corona Police Department permission to search his vehicle and he signed a Consent to Search form. I uploaded the consent form to Spillman and gave the original copy to Detective Arens.

Around the approximate time scene processing began (0430 hours) the temperature was 45 degrees with light rain and fog. The ground was wet from rain the night prior. Based on the time of day, cloud coverage, and fog, natural lighting was limited to overhead streetlights and parking lot lights.

**DETAILS:** On Tuesday, November 18, 2025, at approximately 0400 hours, I responded to the area of 521 N. McKinley Street to assist with this investigation. I was assigned to document the scene and was assisted by Detective Jolin and Detective Kushner.

521 N. McKinley Street is an Applebee's Grill and Bar. The incident occurred in the east parking lot of the business. This parking lot is located on the southeast corner of McKinley Street and Promenade Avenue. The parking lot is asphalt and based on observation does not appear to have been paved recently. On the east wall of the business is a loading zone area. Northeast of the business is a driveway to Promenade Avenue. To the east of the driveway there are six parking stalls sectioned off by curbs east, north, and west of the stalls. On the east and west curbs are planters containing bark and bushes. North of the stalls is a grassy area and south curb line of Promenade Avenue. South of the parking stalls is a larger parking lot. To the east of this lot is building 535 McKinley St. which has an east west alley north of the building and is adjacent to the parking stalls. To the south of the larger lot is building

529 McKinley Street which contains several business suites.

On the east side of the Applebee's building, in the loading zone, I observed a [REDACTED] facing south. The front passenger tire of the vehicle was on the curb and damaged. The front driver's side windshield was smashed. The driver's side door was ajar. A grey Honda Civic bearing license plate (CA-9VOE098) was facing west broadside into the Silverado's driver side door. The front of the Civic was smashed and lodged into the bottom driver side door of the Silverado. The airbags of the Civic appeared to be deployed. Southeast of the rear passenger tire of the Civic was shattered tempered glass. Located on the ground, northeast of the Honda, was a white empty "Burlington" tote style bag.

On Promenade Avenue was Corona Police Department unit #79330 facing east near the entrance of the driveway. In the driveway facing north was Corona police Department unit #79350. Unit #79350 had a shattered rear passenger side window. South of the parking stalls was a white Toyota Corolla bearing license plate (CA-9KPT813) facing west. The side of the vehicle had three red dots with the company name "Securitas". The rear of the vehicle also said, "private security". The driver's window of this vehicle was shattered.

The deceased male was located on his back in the first parking stall. His head was facing north, his feet facing south, and his hands were behind his back underneath his body. The deceased male was wearing a neon yellow shirt that had been cut open, brown pants and brown boots. On the ground surrounding the deceased was packaging from medical equipment. Two AED pads were still on the chest of the deceased. On the ground, west of the west planter curb, was a projectile. This was marked by yellow evidence placard #1. In the west planter were four cartridge casings. These were marked by yellow evidence placards #2, #4, #5, and #6.

In the west planter near the casings was a four-way lug wrench. This was marked by yellow evidence placard #22. The four-way lug wrench had several red areas with the appearance of blood.

In the first parking stall, located on the ground next to the deceased was a cartridge casing marked by yellow evidence placard #3. South of the deceased and east of the planter curb was a cartridge casing marked by evidence placard #7. In the first parking stall, east of the deceased, located on the ground was a cartridge casing, marked by yellow evidence placard #8. In the second parking stall were seven cartridge casings located on the ground marked by yellow evidence placards #9, #10, #11, #12, #13, #14, and #15. North of the curb of the second parking stall, located in the grass was a cartridge casing marked by yellow evidence placard #16. In the second parking stall, located on the ground near the north curb, were two cartridge casings marked by yellow evidence placards #17 and #18. On the south end of the second parking stall was a firearm magazine marked by yellow evidence placard #21. South of the magazine was a live cartridge marked by yellow evidence placard #20. South of the third parking stall there was a cartridge casing marked by yellow evidence placard #19.

On 11/18/25, I responded to Applebee's located at 521 N McKinley St. Corona; County of Riverside to assist in the investigation of an Officer Involved Shooting (OIS) as part of the Corona Police Critical Incident Team. I was assigned by Sergeant Marquez to conduct follow up interviews with (victim) [REDACTED] (witness) [REDACTED] and (witness) [REDACTED]

At approximately 0330 hours, I interviewed (victim) [REDACTED] while we were outside closed business in the complex. The interview was completed alongside The Riverside County Force Investigation Division (FID) and was captured on my body worn camera. For further information on this interview see the FID report.

At approximately 0913 hours, I met with [REDACTED] at [REDACTED] Corona and spoke with them by their car port. The following is a summary of [REDACTED] recorded statement.

On 11/18/2025 at approximately 0016 hours, he was driving a [REDACTED] with his girlfriend, [REDACTED] as a passenger. [REDACTED] was traveling from their residence at [REDACTED] and heading toward McDonald's located at 400 N. McKinley St. [REDACTED] described stopping at a left-hand turn lane set to go southbound on McKinley Ave. at the intersection of Promenade Ave. and McKinley St. when he observed a bald male, described as Hispanic, tall, and wearing a construction vest, in the street. [REDACTED] stated the male was holding what appeared to be a crowbar or a similar cross-shaped tool. He stated he believed the male was under the influence due to the way he was walking. [REDACTED] noted that the male was approaching vehicles in the left-turn lane, including two cars in front of [REDACTED] vehicle.

[REDACTED] stated that the two vehicles in front of him ran the red light to flee from the male, who appeared to be attempting to damage their vehicles. [REDACTED] stated that the male then approached their vehicle. At which point he became concerned for his safety and his girlfriend's safety so he ran the red light proceeding straight on Promenade Blvd. to avoid contact. He stated he was worried that the male might damage his vehicle and possibly assault him and his girlfriend.

[REDACTED] then made a U-turn at a nearby intersection (possibly Collette Ave.) and returned to the intersection, where he observed the male running toward the Applebee's in the area. [REDACTED] stated they then proceeded to drive towards McDonald's. Before making it to McDonalds however he decided to drive to the shopping center of Applebee's because he knew that there was a security guard that patrolled there throughout the night. His intentions were to notify the security because he believed the male to be a threat. While in the complex he located the security guard [REDACTED] and told him about the male. He told [REDACTED] that there was a suspicious male running around with a crow bar and instructed [REDACTED] to call the police.

[REDACTED] then drove to the McDonalds. While he was at McDonalds drive-through line he heard six to eight gunshots. [REDACTED] stated he immediately left the line and

returned to the area near Applebee's. [REDACTED] did not witness the shooting or see the male subject after the gunshots were fired. [REDACTED] stated he observed law enforcement units arriving at the scene stayed outside of the caution tape until he was contacted by officers for an initial interview.

I then interviewed [REDACTED] and the following is a summary of her recorded statement. She was seated in the front passenger's seat of [REDACTED] car driving towards McDonalds. At the intersection of Promenade Ave. and McKinley Blvd. they were waiting at a red light in the left turn lane to travel Southbound on McKinley Blvd. and there were two cars in front of them. She heard [REDACTED] mention to her that there was a male that was acting very strange in the intersection. The cars in front of them entered the intersection to flee from the male, and [REDACTED] continued straight through the intersection. [REDACTED] stated at the time she was shocked to see the male in front of them. She was worried that the male might damage someone's car, hurt someone, or possibly cause a traffic accident. [REDACTED] described the male as "scary" and not being "fully there." After [REDACTED] went through the intersection, he then made a U-turn and then made a right turn to travel southbound on McKinley Ave. towards McDonalds. Before going to McDonalds they went inside the complex of the Applebee's and met with the security guard to notify him. Afterwards they went to McDonalds and [REDACTED] recalled hearing gunfire while they were in the drive through at McDonalds. At this point [REDACTED] drove to the area of Applebee's where they stayed out of the way until they were contacted by police officers.

The investigation revealed the suspect, later identified as Kiavik Miranda, was the operator of the Honda Civic (9VOE098/CA). At this time, I authored a search warrant for the Honda Civic (9VOE098/CA). The search warrant was reviewed and approved by Riverside County Honorable Judge Kiel on 11/18/2025 at 0438 hours.

As the investigation progressed, Detective Kushner and I were able to observe exterior surveillance cameras from Applebee's. The surveillance footage showed the Honda Civic driving east bound in the parking lot, abruptly u-turn in the parking lot, and appeared to intentionally collide into the [REDACTED] which was occupied by the registered owner, [REDACTED]. The Honda Civic, which was driven by the solo occupant, Kiavik Miranda, was traveling at a high rate of speed and based on the driving actions, appeared to be an intentional act. [REDACTED] observed Miranda walk to the trunk of his vehicle to retrieve an item and [REDACTED] quickly fled on foot away from the vehicle. Miranda proceeded to chase [REDACTED] in and around the parking lot while holding a metal tire iron.

At the time of the call for service, detectives were unable to obtain a downloaded copy of the surveillance footage. At the request of Applebee's and their parent company, a search warrant was requested to obtain the video.

Upon completion of the scene investigation, the Honda Civic and [REDACTED] were towed pursuant to CVC22655.5. Circle City Tow transported the Honda Civic and Hamner Towing transported the [REDACTED] to the Corona Police Department for processing.
