

vehicle was a 2005, blue, two-door, Mercedes Benz CLK320 with rear California license plate number (6JAM573). The vehicle was parked at Hamner Towing within the secured tow yard. Per the direction of Detective Arens I took overview photographs of the exterior and interior of the vehicle including photographs of a jacket and receipt located inside the vehicle (see photographs 167-272). After processing both listed vehicles, I transported evidence items PD1-PD5(A) to the Corona Police Department forensic laboratory for additional photographs (see photographs 273-308).

On Wednesday 03-08-2023 at around 1310 hours, I contacted Detective Larios in the Corona Police Department secured jail sallyport. Detective Larios requested overview photographs of Corona Police Department police unit #79319. The vehicle was parked in the jail sallyport and was a 2020, black, four-door, Ford Interceptor Utility vehicle with California license plates (1600860). Prior to photographing the vehicle, I located four bullet defects on the passenger side windshield. Per the direction of Detective Larios, I took overview photographs of the exterior and interior of the police vehicle including photographs of the bullet defects on the windshield (see photographs 309-480).

After taking overview photographs of the police vehicle, Detective Larios located and requested I collect four items of evidence from the interior of the police vehicle (see photographs 481-512). The following is a list of evidence items I collected from the interior of police vehicle (unit #79319):

Item PDV1: (01) Projectile fragment collected from unit #79319.
Item PDV2: (01) Cartridge case headstamped "WIN 9MM LUGER" collected from unit #79319.
Item PDV3: (01) Cartridge case headstamped "WIN 9MM LUGER" collected from unit #79319.
Item PDV4: (01) Deformed projectile collected from unit #79319.

After collecting items PDV1-PDV4, Detective Larios requested trajectory analysis of the bullet defects on the windshield of Corona Police Department police unit #79319. Per Detective Larios's request, California Department of Justice Senior Criminalist C. Hughes, took additional photographs and analyzed the bullet defects on the windshield of police unit #79319. Refer to D. O. J. Senior Criminalist Hughes report for further details.

After processing police unit #79319, Detective Larios requested I photograph one, black, rifle magazine and cartridges; one, black folding knife, and one pair of black sunglasses. The listed items were previously collected from police unit #79319. I photographed the items in the Corona Police Department forensic laboratory. The magazine was a black, PMAG 30, 5.56 X 45, 30 round capacity magazine with "MONTANEZ" written on the side. There were 30 cartridges in the magazine (WMA 21 5.56 MM). The knife was a black, COAST, RX352 folding knife. The sunglasses were black, VONZIPPER sunglasses (see photographs 513-530).

On Wednesday 03-09-2023, I took close-up photographs of evidence items PDV1-PDV4 in the Corona Police Department forensic laboratory (see photographs 531-551). I took a total of (551) photographs and listed the photographs as evidence item PD6. I logged evidence items PD1-PD6 and PDV1-PDV4 with the Corona Police Department Property Section and I uploaded item PD6 into Digital On Q. Refer to Detective Aren's, Detective Larios, and D. O. J. Senior Criminalist Hughes' reports for further details

ASSIGNMENT:

I am a Police Corporal for the Corona Police Department, assigned to a multi-agency task force called the Post Release Accountability and Compliance Team - West (PACT). The primary function of this task force is to monitor and conduct compliance checks on subjects who have been released on Probation, Parole, Mandatory Supervision, and Post Release Community Supervision. The Task force is comprised of members from the Riverside Police Department, Corona Police Department, Probation Department, and The Federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives.

DETAILS:

On 03-03-23 I was assigned to PACT and I was riding in our police vehicle with Officer Murphy. At approximately 1500 hours, Officer Murphy and I were driving to a location in the area of Horsethief Canyon and De Palama, Corona, Riverside County when we heard radio traffic related to a vehicle that had been involved in a pursuit from another city that was entering Corona. I monitored the radio traffic and once information was broadcasted that the suspect had armed himself with a rifle we began to respond. During the response we activated our police vehicle's emergency lights and siren, which in turn activated our body worn cameras and dash camera. Officer Murphy and I continued to respond for approximately 30 minutes, but were unable to catch up with the pursuit. At approximately 1545 hours we turned around and came back to Corona.

DETAILS:

On 03-17-23 I was contacted by Lt. Perez who requested I conduct the firearms inspections for four firearms that were used in this incident. At approximately 1100 hours, I collected Sgt. Montanez's pistol, Cpl. R. Slane's rifle, Ofcr. Tarrant's pistol and Ofcr. Grier's pistol from Lt. Perez. Lt. Perez told me that he had obtained them from Los Angeles Sheriff's Department Detective Manfree that morning. I brought all of the firearms to the Corona Police Range to conduct the inspections.

I inspected Cpl. R. Slane's rifle which was a department issued Colt AR-15A3 SN: [REDACTED]. This rifle was equipped with a sling, Aimpoint PRO optic, and OSS suppressor. All attachments were in normal working order. I performed a function check and found the rifle to be in normal working condition. I completed the attached inspection sheet.

I inspected Ofcr. Tarrant's pistol which was a Glock 34 SN: [REDACTED]. The pistol was equipped with a Surefire X300U flashlight and Holosun 407C optic. The light and optic were in normal working order. I performed a function check and found the pistol to be in normal working condition. I completed the attached inspection sheet.

I inspected Ofcr. Grier's pistol which was a Staccato P SN: [REDACTED]. The pistol was equipped with a Surefire X300U flashlight and Holosun 509T optic. The light and optic were in normal working order. I performed a function check and found the pistol to be in normal working condition. I completed the attached inspection sheet.

I inspected Sgt. Montanez's pistol which was a Glock 34 SN: [REDACTED]. The pistol was equipped with a Streamlight TLRL and Trijicon RM06 optic. The light and optic were in normal working order. I performed a function check and found the pistol to be in normal working condition. I completed the attached inspection sheet.

I secured the four firearms in the Corona Police Range Armory. I notified the

involved officers there firearms were available for pick up.

Ofcr. Grier's pistol was last inspected on 01-10-23 by me. Ofcr. Grier last qualified with this pistol on 02-17-23.

Cpl. R. Slane's rifle was last inspected on 11-12-22 by Rangemaster Devlin. Cpl. R. Slane last qualified with this rifle on 02-13-23.

Ofcr. Tarrant's pistol was last inspected on 09-08-23 by me. Ofcr. Tarrant last qualified with this pistol on 02-13-23

Sgt. Montanez's pistol was last inspected on 12-13-22 by me. Sgt. Montanez last qualified with this pistol on 02-17-23.

Details:

On 031623 at about 1000 hours, I, along with California Highway Patrol Sergeant, David Navarro and California Highway Patrol Investigator, Kevin Futrell interviewed Officer Sean Sturgis in the Chief's conference room at the Corona Police Department.

-The following is only a summary of Officer Sturgis' recorded, voluntary statement. Present was his attorney R. Perry with RLS.

Officer Sturgis ID#004244/driver of Corona Police Department marked Ford Explorer unit #79275

Officer Sturgis stated that he has been a sworn police officer for about two years with the Corona Police Department. He has no prior law enforcement experience or military service. He is currently assigned as a School Resource Officer with the Corona Police Department and has been assigned to the unit for the past six months. Prior to being a School Resource Officer he was assigned to patrol.

On 030323, he was working as a School Resource Officer, wearing a police uniform and driving a marked, Corona Police Department police unit. He recalled that as he was about to end his shift, he overheard the Ontario Police Departments air unit broadcast information regarding a hit and run that occurred at an unknown location. He thought it was significant because he does not usually hear the Ontario Police Department broadcast over the Corona Police Department's radio. The airship stated that they were following a silver sedan that was driving erratically in the City of Corona.

He continued to monitor the radio as he prepared to go home. He heard another airship state that the suspect vehicle had stopped at a residence on Rising Sun Lane. The driver went inside the home and exited, armed with an assault rifle. The suspect then traveled to the Shell Gas Station in Corona where Corona officers stated over the radio that they heard gunshots. He learned that a black pick up truck had been carjacked and officers were in pursuit of the vehicle from the 15 freeway to the westbound 91 freeway.

Officer Sturgis said that he parks his Corona PD unit at the Anaheim Police Department East Station (8201 E. Santa Ana Canyon, Anaheim) before he goes home. He had pulled into the east station and heard the suspect was continuing westbound and coming his direction. He overheard supervisors requesting additional assistance and that the officers were unable to keep up with the vehicle. Fearing for officer safety and the public, he left the east station and entered the 91 westbound freeway at Weir Canyon to assist. He parked along the shoulder and continued to monitor the radio. He considered options such as the spike strip or other diversion techniques however, due to the officer safety concerns it was not an option.

As he waited, he saw a helicopter approach and saw the suspect vehicle pass him at a high rate of speed in the shoulder of the express lanes. He entered the express lanes, activated his lights and sirens, advised dispatch and pursued the vehicle. At this time he could not see any other officers in the area.

Officer Sturgis said other vehicles moved out of his way, indicating it was clear that a police car had its' lights and sirens on. He heard the air unit remind him that the suspect was armed with a rifle. They continued westbound and he noticed the suspects driving behavior changed and he slowed down, causing him to think the suspect may be trying to kill him so he could get away. As they approached the 55 interchange, the suspect came to a complete stop in the #2 lane of the express lanes. This caused him to come to a complete stop behind the suspect.

Officer Sturgis saw the suspect's upper body come out of the vehicle, pointing an assault rifle at him. Fearing for his life, he exited the unit, un-holstered his weapon, ran to the back side of the rear passenger bumper (of the unit) and fired four rounds toward the driver side compartment of the truck. He said he could not see where the suspect was and did not see any other action from the suspect. After he shot toward the suspects' last known location near the driver side, the suspect continued traveling westbound. Officer Sturgis got back into his unit and attempted to pursue the vehicle but lost it and lost his communications causing him to terminate and pull over to the shoulder. He said he recalled there was a California Highway Patrol unit that had pulled up during a portion of the incident and had followed him to the shoulder at the termination point. He did not see any actions taken by the CHP officer. Officer Sturgis' interview concluded. Refer to his audio recorded statement and transcripts for his full detailed statement.

Crimes: CVC 2800.2 felony evading, PC 245(d)(1) assault with a firearm on a peace officer

On 031723, I, along with Detective Joseph Manfree with the Los Angeles Sheriff's Department interviewed the following Corona Police Officers at the Corona Police Department in the Chief's conference room: Sergeant Robert Montanez, Officer Mark Tarrant, Corporal Robert Slane and Officer Matthew Grier.

-The following is only a summary of Sergeant Montanez' recorded voluntary statement. Present was his attorney S. Alvarado with RLS.

Sergeant Robert Montanez ID #001607/driver of Corona Police Department unmarked black Ford Explorer unit #79319

Sergeant Montanez has been a sworn police officer for about twenty years and is currently a Police Sergeant. He has held prior non-sworn positions such as parking enforcement and jailer. He has no prior military experience. Sergeant Montanez is currently assigned as the Sergeant for the "FLEX" team with the Corona Police Department which is a proactive unit.

On 030323, Sergeant Montanez was working as the Sergeant for the FLEX unit. He was working in full uniform and was driving an unmarked, black Ford Explorer which is equipped with lights and sirens. Officer Matthew Grier was his partner for the day and sat as his passenger.

He was having lunch with Officer Grier and his other team members, Officer Mark Tarrant and Corporal Robert Slane when they overheard Ontario Police Department's airship come over the air and state that they were following a hit and run suspect vehicle from the City of Chino that evaded from the Chino Police Department. He overheard that the vehicle was in the City of Corona, however they were not going to respond based off the circumstances (traffic violations).

He heard the vehicle was traveling at high rates of speed in Corona during high traffic time. He then heard that the car had pulled up to a house on Rising Sun (unincorporated area of Corona). Riverside Police Department's airship then came onto the radio and said that the suspect exited the house and was now armed with a rifle.

They immediately responded due to the safety concerns. Officer Tarrant and Corporal Robert Slane followed in a silver, unmarked police unit. They received updates that the suspect was now at the Shell Gas Station in Corona and Sergeant Montanez knew that area has heavy traffic and it was during a busy time of day. He heard an officer state over the radio that they heard shots being fired at the gas station, there was a carjacking and that officers were in pursuit of the suspect who was now in a black pickup truck and traveling northbound on the 15 freeway. Sergeant Montanez did not know if anyone had been shot at the gas station.

Sergeant Montanez responded to the area of the 91 freeway and Main St. and heard that the vehicle had transitioned westbound onto the 91 freeway. He entered the freeway and had observations of the suspect vehicle traveling at a high rate of speed. He attempted to catch up to the truck and wanted to take a primary position due to there being two of them in the unit. He heard Officer Sturgis say that he was behind the suspect vehicle and in pursuit. He then heard Officer Sturgis say, "Shots Fired", but he did not know what that meant. He assumed Officer Sturgis was returning gunfire.

The suspect continued onto the 55 freeway from the westbound 91 freeway and took

the first exit (unknown street). They were able to catch up to the suspect vehicle and saw him get back onto the 91 westbound freeway from the Tustin onramp.

The pursuit continued onto city streets in to the City of Lakewood. The suspect drove through a school zone where there were tons of children walking across the street. The suspect waited for the kids to pass and the pursuit continued. The suspect entered an alleyway which had a 90 degree turn. As they hit the turn, he was concerned due to the houses in the area and officer safety concerns. He took a wide turn to get a better view and as they came around the corner, he saw the suspect leaning out of his window and saw muzzle flash. He does not recall if he saw the rifle, but recalls the flash. At that same time, gunshots came through their front windshield. As they were trying to get out of the unit, duck and take cover, the suspect drove away.

Sergeant Montanez and Officer Grier got back into the car and continued to pursue the vehicle. They had poor radio reception and communication throughout the incident but had to continue due to the safety concerns for the officers and the public. He considered other options such as spike strips or a PIT maneuver, however due to the safety issues it was not an option.

The pursuit continued and he saw that they were on Pacific Coast Highway in the City of Long Beach. He noticed the suspect slowed down frequently during the pursuit and believed he was looking for an opportunity to kill them. At an unknown location on Pacific Coast Highway, the suspect stopped. Fearing for their safety, Sergeant Montanez stopped, exited the unit and fired four to five consecutive rounds toward where he believed the suspect would be in the vehicle. He could hear Officer Grier firing his weapon to his right. The suspect continued to flee so they got back into the car and continued the pursuit, putting Officer Tarrant and Corporal Slane as the primary unit.

They approached another intersection (unknown cross street) and he could hear another exchange of gunfire. He was aware of what the suspects rifle sounded like due to him shooting at him earlier and heard the suspect weapon and different gunfire meaning that the suspect and officers were shooting at each other. The gunfire stopped and the pursuit continued to another area.

He recalled that the pursuit continued into a residential neighborhood and he could hear another exchange of gunfire again between the suspect and officers in the silver unit (Tarrant and Slane). The gunfire stopped and the pursuit continued once again. At one point he saw that there were several Los Angeles County Sheriff units in the area and he attempted to have them take a primary position due to poor radio communication and being in an unknown area. They came to the termination point where he saw several police units and realized the suspect vehicle had collided into a pole and the suspect had been taken into custody. Sergeant Montanez had no further detail and the interview concluded. Refer to his audio recorded statement and transcripts for his full detailed statement.

****Crimes: CVC 2800.2 felony evading, PC 664/187 attempt homicide on two peace officers****

-The following is only a summary of Officer Grier's recorded voluntary statement. Present was his attorney, S. Alvarado:

****Officer Matthew Grier ID#004357/passenger of Corona Police Department unmarked black Ford Explorer unit #79319****

Officer Grier has been a sworn police officer since 2019 and has no other

previous law enforcement or military experience. He is currently assigned to the Corona Police Department FLEX team where he has been for about two months. Prior to the FLEX team, he was assigned patrol.

On 030323, he was working patrol in full uniform and was partners with Sergeant Montanez for the day. He rode as passenger in an unmarked black Ford Explorer unit while Sergeant Montanez drove. While having lunch, he heard an airship come over the air stating that a vehicle had been in a pursuit which had been terminated, however, the vehicle was traveling in the City of Corona. The vehicle parked in front of a house, walked into the house and exited with a rifle. At this time, he and Sergeant Montanez got into the unit and drove toward the call.

He heard that the male drove to the Shell Gas Station and exited his car with a rifle. He heard the rifle was discharged and that a [REDACTED] had been carjacked. Radio updates stated the suspect was westbound on the 91 freeway and it passed them as they got onto the 91 freeway at Main St. He heard Officer Sturgis say that he was behind the vehicle and that he was involved in an officer involved shooting.

The suspect traveled southbound onto the 55 freeway and exited Tustin Ave. As they continued, they saw the suspect at the stop light and then proceeded through the intersection. The suspect began to enter the 91 westbound freeway at Tustin and stopped. Sergeant Montanez stopped and they got out of the unit. The suspect took off again and they pursued him until they exited the freeway at Artesia Blvd. in the City of Los Angeles.

They entered a school zone where dozens of kids were walking across the street. Several units stopped and began to exit their units, however the suspect drove away and they continued their pursuit into an alleyway. The alleyway was an "L" shape and once the suspect turned they could not see him. As Sergeant Montanez made a wide left turn, he saw the suspect vehicle's taillight and saw the suspect pointing a rifle at him. Fearing for his life and others, he fired his firearm while seated in the passenger seat. He fired his weapon about two times through the front windshield as the suspect was shooting at them. He got out of the unit and tried to get cover to the rear of the unit. He looked up and saw the suspect was no longer there. He and Sergeant Montanez got back into the unit and continued the pursuit.

The suspect slowed down several times and shot at them as they drove. They entered the 405 freeway, exited on an unknown street and then drove onto Pacific Coast Highway. At one point the suspect came to a complete stop in the 800 block of Pacific Coast Highway. Fearing for his life, he exited the unit and fired his firearm five to six times and the pursuit continued. Sergeant Montanez also fired his firearm but he had no detail as to how many times.

The suspect drove through another school zone, a business zone and then entered a neighborhood where another officer involved shooting occurred. They were several units back and he could not see what was happening other than hearing the suspect and officers gunfire (knowing they sound different). Los Angeles Sheriff Deputies arrived and took over primary, placing them several units behind. The suspect ultimately was involved in a traffic collision where he was taken into custody. Officer Grier had no further detail and the interview concluded. Refer to his audio recorded statement and transcripts for his full detailed statement.

Crimes: PC 664/187 attempt homicide on a peace officer

-The following is only a summary of Officer Mark Tarrant's recorded voluntary statement. Present was his attorney S. Alvarado with RLS.

Officer Mark Tarrant ID #003128/driver of Corona Police Department unmarked silver Ford Explorer unit #71153

Officer Mark Tarrant has been a sworn police officer for about nine years and is currently assigned to the FLEX team which is a proactive unit. Prior to FLEX, he was in patrol for about seven years. He holds other positions in the department such as armorer and range master and has prior military experience in the Marine Corps.

On 030323, he was working as a FLEX team officer. He was working in full uniform and was the driver of an unmarked, silver Ford Explorer patrol unit. Corporal Robert Slane was his partner for the day and in the passenger seat. He was having lunch when he heard radio traffic from the Ontario Police Departments air unit stating that there was a vehicle involved in a hit and run and pursuit in the City of Chino. The vehicle had entered the City of Corona, however no one was pursuing the vehicle. He then heard the update that the suspect had entered a house, exited and was armed with a rifle.

The suspect was seen going to the Shell Gas Station where he heard an officer state that gunshots were heard at the gas station confirming that the suspect was shooting at a gas station in Corona. He heard the suspect had carjacked a truck and left at a high rate of speed from the 15 freeway to the 91 westbound freeway.

He and Corporal Slane drove toward the area. As they got onto the freeway, they saw the suspect vehicle pass them at a high rate of speed. He activated his lights and sirens and was trying to catch up to the suspect. He heard officer Sturgis state that he was behind the suspect vehicle then heard him say he was in an officer involved shooting. He was concerned because he did not know what had happened, but assumed that the suspect was shooting at Officer Sturgis. He now was thinking that the suspect was shooting at people at the gas station and now at officers.

The pursuit continued and he was able to catch up to the suspect where he exited the 55 freeway and re-entered the 91 westbound freeway. He considered various intervention techniques, however due to officer safety and conditions it was not feasible.

The suspect exited the freeway at Arcadia Blvd. and entered a school zone where there were hundreds of children in the area. The suspect came to a stop, causing Officer Tarrant to stop and exit his unit. The suspect took off at a high rate of speed so he got back in the unit and continued to pursue. They were on surface streets where the suspect drove recklessly. He felt the suspect was trying to bait them by slowing down causing them to get close. He was concerned since the suspect had already shot at the public and Officer Sturgis. He feared for his life and felt they were in immediate danger.

The pursuit continued into an alleyway where Sergeant Montanez and Officer Grier were the primary unit. He saw Sergeant Montanez stop but could not see the suspect. He heard gunshots from what he believed to be from a rifle. He knew the gunshots were from the suspect because he knew that Sergeant Montanez and Officer Grier were not equipped with a rifle. He also saw gunshots appear in the windshield of their unit. He saw Officer Grier exit the unit and run toward the back. He was concerned for their safety and then saw them proceed to pursue the suspect.

The pursuit continued on to Pacific Coast Highway. He was behind Sergeant Montanez and Officer Grier when the suspect came to a complete stop and another officer involved shooting took place. He placed his unit next to Sergeant Montanez so they were not directly behind them and as he did, the suspect took off again. At this point he is now directly behind the suspect.

The pursuit continued and the suspect began to slow down again. He saw the suspect fire one to two rounds through his back windshield. He stopped and saw the suspects rear window shatter and he felt the rounds impact his unit and go by his head. He did not know if he had been hit or if Corporal Slane was ok. He also knew there were at least five police cars behind them and he did not know if any of them had been hit. Due to their positions, he believes any of the officers could have been struck by gunfire. He exited the unit and fired one round toward the suspects driver side compartment and the suspect dove away.

The pursuit continued and they went through a shopping center. He could see the suspect looking in his mirror to see where they were, making him believe he was trying to get a better target acquisition on them. They drove through another school zone and the suspect made a left turn. As they made the turn he saw the suspect point the rifle out his window, directly at them. He saw the rifle barrel and knew it was an AR type rifle and he thought he was going to die.

They continued and made a turn onto Marigold St. in Harbor City. They were to the rear of a pink/tan building which provided them with a good background. Corporal Slane rolled his window down and fired several rounds toward the suspect. They continued and the suspect came to a complete stop. He recalled seeing the suspect's rifle and was not sure if he pointed it at them or if he fired at them. He exited the unit and fired about eight more rounds toward the suspect.

The pursuit continued and at this time, several Los Angeles Sheriff Deputy units arrived and they became primary due to them knowing the area better. They went around another corner and he saw deputies running in the street. He drove around and got out of his unit and saw the suspect being taken into custody. Officer Tarrant had no further detail and the interview concluded. Refer to his audio recorded statement and transcripts for his full detailed statement.
Crimes: PC 664/187 attempt homicide on a peace officer

-The following is only a summary of Corporal Slane's recorded voluntary statement. Present was his attorney S. Alvarado with RLS.

Corporal Robert Slane ID #002279/passenger of Corona Police Department unmarked silver Ford Explorer unit #71153

Corporal Robert Slane has been a sworn police officer since 2009. He is currently assigned as the Corporal on the FLEX team which is where he has been for about a year and a half. Prior to this assignment he was a Corporal in patrol and prior to that had been on the FLEX team as an officer. Prior to being sworn, he was a Jailer for the Corona Police Department and has no military experience. He is currently a defensive tactics instructor, a rangemaster and on the mobile field force unit.

On 030323, he was working as a Corporal on the FLEX team. He was in full uniform and working with Officer Tarrant as passenger in an unmarked, silver Ford Explorer unit. While at lunch, he heard an airship come onto the radio and state that they were following a vehicle that had been involved in a hit and run traffic collision in the City of Chino. The vehicle was driving recklessly

through the City of Corona. He heard a Corona Police Officer attempt to stop the vehicle, however the vehicle did not stop and a supervisor stated not to pursue the car.

He heard updated information that the vehicle went to a house on Rising Sun and exited the house with a rifle. The suspect drove to the Shell Gas Station in Corona and they began to respond. He heard that shots were fired at the gas station and that the suspect carjacked a truck and fled to the 91 westbound freeway. Officer Tarrant entered the freeway from Main St. and they saw the suspect vehicle near Lincoln Ave.

He saw the suspect traveling at high rates of speed and they pursued the vehicle with Sergeant Montanez and Officer Grier ahead of them. Due to the suspects speed they lost sight of him. He heard Officer Sturgis state that he was behind the suspect and then heard Officer Sturgis say that shots were fired, but he did not know what had occurred. He believed the suspect was a threat and his intent was to kill police officers.

They caught up to the suspect near the first exit off of the 55 freeway after the 91 freeway transition. The suspect stopped at a signal and they prepared for a felony stop, but the suspect continued to flee onto the 91 westbound freeway. They continued the pursuit and the suspect exited the freeway and drove through a school zone where there was a crosswalk full of children. The suspect stopped momentarily then proceeded through.

The pursuit continued and the suspect entered a residential area and entered an "L" shaped alleyway with Sergeant Montanez and Officer Grier behind him. The suspect made a left turn and he could not see the suspect due to them being a couple cars back. He saw Sergeant Montanez and Officer Grier jump out of the unit and saw their front windshield get struck with gunfire. He could hear gunfire and knew it sounded different than the firearms that Sergeant Montanez and Officer Grier were carrying. He feared for the officer's life and did not know if they had been shot.

He saw Sergeant Montanez and Officer Grier get back into the unit and the pursuit continued. The suspect stopped again and another officer involved shooting occurred between Sergeant Montanez and Officer Grier. The suspect fled again which placed them as the primary unit behind the suspect. The pursuit continued onto Pacific Coast Highway where the suspect slowed down several times causing him to believe he was luring them in so he could shoot and kill them.

They approached an intersection where the suspect slowed down again and began to shoot at them. He and Officer Tarrant got out of the unit and Corporal Slane began to aim his rifle toward the suspect. The suspect began to flee again and he was unable to fire his firearm. At an unknown point, Officer Tarrant fired his firearm and they got back into the unit and continued the pursuit. He was not aware that their unit had been struck by gunfire until later.

They entered another school zone where there were more children present. The suspect slowed down several more times and he thought he was going to shoot at them again. The suspect made a left turn at which time the suspect pointed the rifle at them out the window. He could not tell if the suspect shot at them. The pursuit continued onto a straight street where there was a clear background. The suspect slowed down again, making him feel as if he was luring them in as he had already done this several times. Corporal Slane leaned out his window and fired three rounds toward the suspect with his rifle.

The pursuit continued and the suspect made a right turn where the suspect

stopped. He believed the suspect was shooting at them due to seeing movement in the suspect's car and hearing gunfire. He fired about seven or eight rounds toward the suspect. The suspect fled again and they continued the pursuit. At this time, he saw there were several Los Angeles Sheriff Deputies in the area who took a primary position causing them to be several units behind.

They continued to follow the units and saw that the pursuit terminated due to the suspect crashing and he was taken into custody. Corporal Slane had no further detail and the interview concluded. Refer to his audio recorded statement and transcripts for his full detailed statement.

During the time that the listed involved officers were interviewed, Los Angeles County Detectives interviewed the following Corona Police Department officers: Sergeant J. Marquez, Officer C. Sisco and Officer K. Sosa. Their interviews were voluntary and no attorney was present. They did not fire their weapons. Their interviews were recorded and I reviewed them at a later time. Refer to the Los Angeles Sheriff Department report(s) for their statements.

Details:

On 030423, I was informed that there were two vehicles from the officer involved shooting that had been left at the scene in the City of Los Angeles. One vehicle was the suspect vehicle [REDACTED] that had collided into a LAUSD (Los Angeles Unified School District) Transit Police School unit and signal pole at the intersection of 253rd St. and Western Ave. The other vehicle was a Corona Police Department, black Ford Explorer, unit #79319. Both of the vehicles were later towed to the Los Angeles Police Department Central Station located at 251 E. 6th St., Los Angeles.

On 030823, I responded to the Los Angeles Police Department Central Station to escort the suspect vehicle [REDACTED] and police unit (black Ford Explorer unit #79319) back to the Corona Police Department for evidence processing. Hamner Tow (2125 Railroad St, Corona) and Circle City Tow (1005 Quarry St, Corona) arrived on scene. Detective Matthew Casalicchio with LAPD met with me and escorted us into their secured garage where the two listed vehicles were parked. I saw that both vehicles were in a locked garage bay. Detective Casalicchio told me that they had been transported directly from the scene(s) to the garage

bay and had not been tampered with. Refer to his reports regarding evidence recovered from the vehicles while on their scene in the City of Los Angeles (case#2303030003000).

I saw that the [REDACTED] pick up truck had significant damage to the front end. The front, passenger wheel was broken off and there was debris (dirt, leaves, vehicles parts) in the front passenger floorboard and bed of the truck. The airbags had been deployed from the steering wheel and passenger side. I saw that there were several bullet holes in the front windshield, shattered rear window and shattered rear, passenger window. The front, driver side window was partially rolled down. The front and rear, passenger side windows were rolled up. There were several bullet holes in the tailgate, rear bumper and driver side of the vehicle. Detective Casalicchio told me that when they processed the vehicle, they did not disturb or access the vehicle from the passenger side.

I provided gloves to both drivers and requested that they not tamper or touch the vehicles if possible. I watched as both drivers placed the vehicles on flat bed tow trucks. I followed both trucks back to the Corona Police Department secured jail sally port located at the Corona Police Department (730 Public Safety Way, Corona). I maintained constant observation of both vehicles from Los Angeles to Corona.

On 030823, Forensic Technician P. Delahoya and L. Walker met with me in the secured jail sally port to process the two vehicles. The sally port is a secured lot which has automatic gates on each side. It is equipped with surveillance cameras and both vehicles had not been disturbed, tampered with or accessed until they were processed.

Vehicle #1: [REDACTED] 4dr, CA license plate [REDACTED]
The following evidence was located and recovered by Forensic Technician L. Walker:

Item LW1: (01) Grey sweatpants from front, driver seat.
Item LW2: (01) 5.56 projectile from front, passenger floorboard
Item LW3: (01) WIN USA 5.56 case from rear, passenger floorboard
Refer to L. Walker's report for details, collection and photographs.

I opened the driver side door to the truck and saw the following:
There was a pair of grey sweatpants on the driver seat. I requested L. Walker recover the pants due to not knowing if they belonged to the suspect. I watched as Walker removed the pants and I saw that there was red staining and holes in them that appeared to be blood and bullet holes. Refer to her photographs and report for collection details.

I saw there was a mound of debris on the front passenger floorboard. The debris consisted of trash, dirt, leaves and car parts (more than likely caused by the tow truck driver shoveling the debris back into the vehicle as it was towed). Under the debris was a straw hat, clothing and belt. All of the debris was carefully removed out of the truck and once it was cleared, a bullet fragment was located on the front passenger, floorboard. I requested that L. Walker recover the fragment. Refer to her photographs and report for details.

I continued to search through the vehicle and saw there was a backpack with clothing, shoe box with shoes, golf club and iPad in the back seat. Those items were carefully removed and once removed, a 5.56 case was located on the rear, passenger floorboard. I requested that L. Walker recover the casing. Refer to her photographs and report for details. Note: The iPad was returned to the victim after the vehicle was processed. The rest of the items remain in the

cabin.

DOJ Criminalist Casey Hughes responded and processed the bullet holes and trajectories on the truck. There were 10 bullet holes (marked A-J) located on the exterior portion of the vehicle. Refer to her report for those details and photographs.

Vehicle #2: Ford Explorer, black, 4dr, Corona PD unit #79319, CA plate 1600860. The following evidence was located and recovered by Forensic Technician P. Delahoya.

Item PDV1: (01) Projectile fragment collected from center console

Item PDV2: (01) Cartridge case collected from the interior between dash and front windshield

Item PDV3: (01) Cartridge case collected from interior between dash and front windshield

Item PDV4: (01) Deformed projectile collected from interior between dash and front windshield

I opened the front door and saw that there was a fragment on the center console of the vehicle near the radio. I also located another fragment and (2) 9mm cases inside the vehicle between the bottom portion of the dash board and windshield. I requested that P. Delahoya recover the (2) fragments and (2) cases. Refer to his photographs and report for details.

I looked at the exterior of the unit and saw that there were (4) bullet holes in the front windshield. The trajectories appeared that the rounds were fired from the inside of the vehicle. Refer to DOJ Criminalist Hughes for details on the trajectories and photographs of the windshield. I did not see any other apparent bullet holes on or inside the vehicle.

After all evidence was recovered, I called Hamner Tow and requested that they respond back to the Corona Police Department to pick up the [REDACTED] pick up truck and store it at their facility located at 2125 Railroad St., Corona. Refer to the CHP 180 form for details. The Ford Explorer was transported to (Corona) Fleet for repairs.

There was also a Corona Police Department, silver Ford Explorer that was parked in the Corona PD sally along with the other two vehicles. That vehicle was processed by the Los Angeles Sheriff's Department. Refer to their reports for details.

NOTE: I requested and later received all Body Worn Camera (BWC) footage and surveillance footage from the Arco gas station, Chino PD had related to this incident. Photos of evidence collected by Chino Police Department were included as well as audio of the radio traffic during the pursuit Chino Police Department was involved in. On 03-30-23, I received the listed footage/evidence via email. This evidence was placed on a hard drive and booked into evidence.

DETAILS: On 03-03-23, I was asked to assist Det. L. Larios with this Officer Involved Shooting (OIS) investigation by investigating what occurred in the jurisdiction of the Chino Police Department prior to the involvement of the Corona Police Department. What was known at this point was the following.

On 03-03-23 at 1458 hours, Corona Police Department dispatch was advised by CHP that Ontario Police Department's airship was following Gray Mercedes (CA. 8UDP379) into our jurisdiction. They further advised that this vehicle had just been involved in a pursuit with Chino PD and the crime it was wanted for was 20002 CVC hit and run. This pursuit was terminated for public safety reasons.

On 03-03-23 at around 2000 hours, I contacted Chino Police Sergeant Mike Johnson. Johnson told me that on 03-03-23 Chino Police Department received a call of a reckless driver possible "road rage" in the area of Euclid Ave. and Pine St. at around 1422 hours. Chino Police Officers were dispatched at 1423 hours and located two vehicles that appeared to be involved, a Black Dodge Charger [REDACTED] and the Gray Mercedes (CA. 8UDP379) which was later involved in a carjacking in Corona.

Sgt. Johnson told me Chino Police Det. Nick Roberts was conducting the investigation regarding the incident in Chino, and spoke directly with the female suspect associated with the listed Dodge Charger. I contacted Det. Roberts and arranged for him to send me the police reports prepared by him and the officers involved in their investigation.

On 03-08-23, I received these reports via email from Chino Police Department Records. The criminal report involving [REDACTED] was documented under case # 23-02105. The Hit and Run traffic collision was documented under case # 23-02029. Det. Larios provided me with the "Communications Event Report." (I attached copies of all of the Chino Police Department reports to Spillman.) The following is a synopsis of the listed incidents that occurred in Chino on 03-03-23.

At 1422 hours, Chino PD received a call of a reckless driver at the 16700 blk. of Euclid Ave. with the reporting party, [REDACTED] following. [REDACTED] reported that a Black

Camaro, later confirmed to be the listed Black Dodge Charger was driving on the wrong side of road then reversing in traffic.

██████████ then reported that this vehicle was pulled over on Euclid north of Pine and was possibly involved in a "Road Rage" incident with the listed Gray Mercedes. ██████████ then reported both vehicles were seen entering the Arco Gas Station, located at 15705 Euclid Ave. (Chino).

Chino Police Officer M Sims arrived at Arco Gas and located the listed Mercedes parked at a gas pump and the listed Charger parked in a parking stall away from the pumps.

Officer Sims saw three subjects, Male #1 a Hispanic male, Female #1 a Hispanic female, and Female #2 a White or Hispanic female congregating near the Mercedes at the gas pumps. Officer Sims then saw Female #2 walk to the Charger and get into the driver's seat and drive the vehicle to the where the gas station air pump machine is at. Officer Sims then saw all three subjects rummaging through the Charger before Male #1 and Female #1 returned to the Mercedes and left Arco going east bound on Kimball Ave. Male #1, later identified as Benjamin Gonzalez was the driver.

Chino Police Department Corporal M Gregory located the Mercedes just east of the location and initiated a traffic stop. The Mercedes failed to yield, made a u-turn and fled westbound at a high rate of speed.

A pursuit ensued and Officer Sims became involved in the pursuit as well. During the pursuit, Gonzalez displayed a reckless disregard for public safety by committing numerous traffic violations which included running red lights and driving on the wrong side of the road. (In violation of 2800.2 CVC Felony Evading. Gonzalez was involved in a hit and run traffic collision as well. (In violation of 20002 CVC Hit and Run.)

For the safety of the public and the involved officers, Officer Sims cancelled the pursuit.

Ontario Police Department's airship located the Mercedes driven by Gonzalez and broadcast information to the Corona Police Department after CHP advised Corona Police Department Dispatch. (See Corona Police Department Reports for further details.)

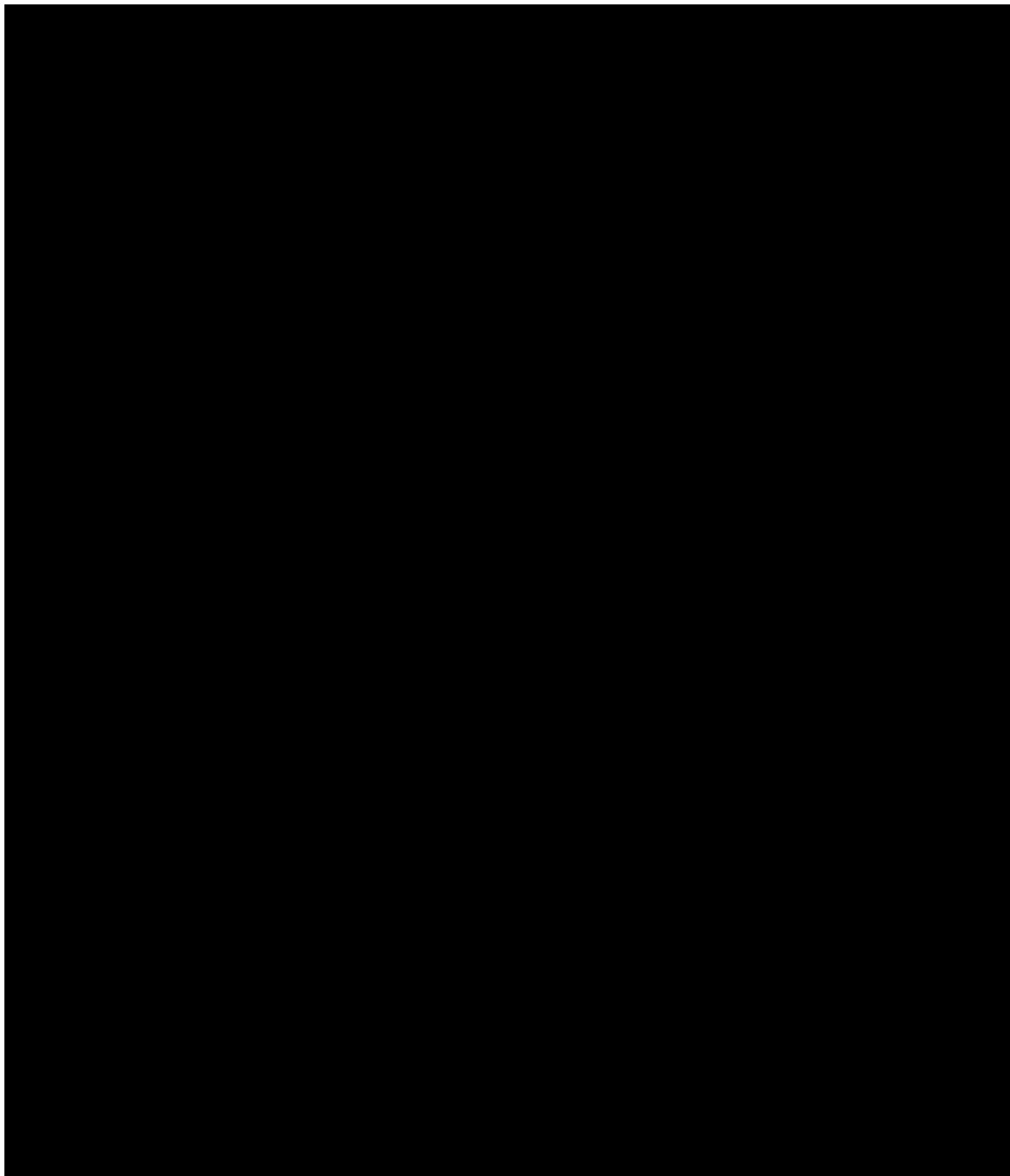
Officer Sims and Corporal Gregory returned to the Arco Gas Station where they contacted and detained Female #2, identified at ██████████

██████████ Through video evidence, Officer Sims confirmed ██████████ had been driving the Charger. Officer Sims asked ██████████ for her permission to search the vehicle. ██████████ gave her permission and claimed she did not know who this vehicle belonged to, nor did she know what was inside of it.

Officer Sims and Corporal Gregory searched the Charger and located a loaded .40 caliber semi-automatic handgun (one in the chamber, nine rounds in the magazine) under the driver's side floormat. They also found Methamphetamine and suspected Fentanyl along with a digital scale and packaging material (small zip-lock type bags).

Officer Sims and Corporal Gregory also noticed that the Charger's interior, as well as under the hood, was tagged with the name "Ben," "Benjamin" and "Harbor City."

██████████ was arrested for 14601.1(a)CVC Driving with a suspended/revoked Driver's License, 29800(a)(1)PC Felony in Possession of a Firearm, and 11379 H&S Transportation of a Controlled Substance for Sales. ██████████ was transported to the Chino Police Department where Chino Police Det. N. Roberts spoke with her under Miranda. The following is a synopsis of what she told Det. Roberts.



On 03-08-23 at around 1110 hours, Det. Arens and I went to Chino Police Department to search the listed Dodge Charger (CA. [REDACTED] which was being stored in an enclosed, secured area inside the police department. Det. Larios had authored a search warrant on 03-08-23 which was granted by the Honorable Riverside Superior Court Judge David A. Gunn, to search this vehicle. (Note: This vehicle had already been searched on 03-03-23 by Chino Police Officers.)

He told me that he had a USB that was prepared and contained all reports and recordings that were relevant and completed for this investigation. I met with Detective Hutchinson and he provided me with the copy of the USB which I logged in as evidence.

I reviewed all the of the listed reports, videos and body worn camera footage. After I reviewed them I scanned/logged them into evidence.

I then met with Detective Hutchinson on 040423 and collected the following physical evidence: Five (5) 9mm Winchester cases that were collected from the officer involved shooting scene on Pacific Coast Highway. Detective Hutchinson told me that he believed the five 9mm cases belonged to the involved officers. He stated that the one damaged case appears to be old and more than likely was already on the scene prior to the officer involved shooting and is not involved, however was collected due to being within the scene at the time.

He stated he would complete his last supplemental report indicating that he provided me with the listed items and that his agency will have completed their portion of the investigation. They have no other evidence or reports to complete at this time.

The purpose for this supplemental report is to include the statement provided by the registered owner to the initial suspect vehicle used in the pursuit (silver Mercedes CA 8UDP379).

Refer to the attached evidence form, "evidence report_LLarios_supp#42" for details. I logged in the listed evidence into the Corona Police Department DigitalonQ system. Evidence consists of the following:

-One digital recording between myself and OT [REDACTED] that occurred on 040423.

Details:

On 032923, I received an email from a Corona PD Records Technician stating they received a phone call from [REDACTED] stating that she had questions regarding the silver Mercedes (CA 8UDP379) that was stored as evidence regarding the listed case.

On 040423, I called the phone number that was listed in the message and spoke with [REDACTED] over the phone. The following is a summary of our recorded conversation: She stated that her [REDACTED] is the registered owner to the listed vehicle. Due to a language barrier, she translated for [REDACTED] currently lives at [REDACTED] which is the same address the vehicle is registered to. At the time, her [REDACTED] was living with her. I asked [REDACTED] purchased the vehicle. She told me that she purchased it from a third party in the City of Wilmington sometime in November 2020. Note: Detective Hutchinson with Long Beach PD told me that the same vehicle was [REDACTED]

In September 2022, [REDACTED] purchased the residence located at 19300 Rising Sun, Corona, which is the residence that the suspect (Gonzalez) was seen entering and exiting armed with a rifle. A record check of that address showed [REDACTED] as owner of the home in June 2022. I asked [REDACTED] who lives at the Rising Sun address. She stated it was her [REDACTED] and his two [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]. She clarified that [REDACTED] lives at the residence off and on.

[REDACTED] said that her [REDACTED] stays with her in [REDACTED] from time to time, but that she leaves her Mercedes parked at Rising Sun so that [REDACTED] can use it to take [REDACTED] to and from school. She left the car at the house sometime in March (possibly the 6th) and said the only people that should have had access to it at that time was [REDACTED]. I asked her who has been allowed to drive the car since she purchased it in November 2020. She stated it was her and [REDACTED]. I asked her who had access to the car now and she said [REDACTED] would leave the car keys at the house so she did not know who all had access to it when she was not there. There were times [REDACTED] would come home and see that the car was gone and unaccounted for.

[REDACTED] did not know who last had the car. I asked her what she was told as to why the car was impounded. [REDACTED] said she spoke with an unknown female on the phone who told her that they were at her house on Rising Sun. The unknown female told [REDACTED] that an unknown male took the vehicle, left it at a gas station and was involved in a police pursuit. [REDACTED] did not know who this person was and asked them what they were doing there. She did not give any

one else aside from [REDACTED] permission to take the car. I asked her if they knew who Benjamin Gonzalez was and she said they did not know who he was.

They had no further details on the incident or the people involved and our conversation ended. I provided this information to Detective Hutchinson with Long Beach PD.

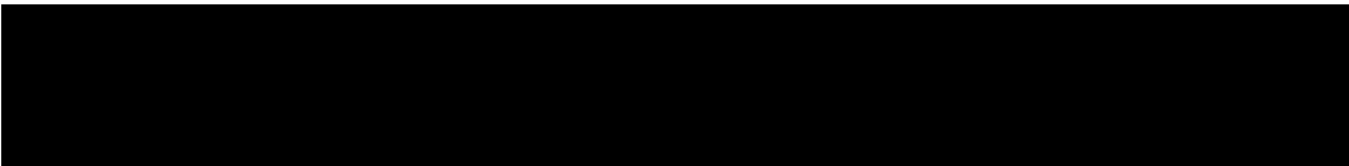
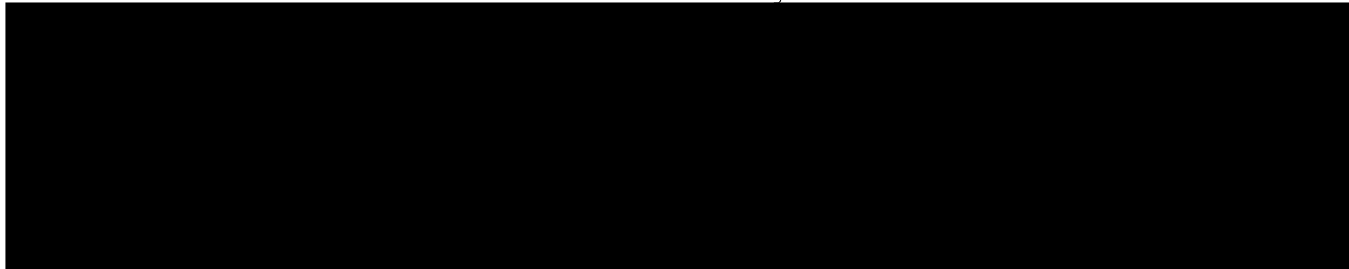

DETAILS:

On 04-16-24 Det. Larios requested I inspect the firearms logged as evidence items LW4 and LW1(LAPD). On 04-16-24 I checked both items out of evidence and brought them to the forensics lab. I requested Forensic Technician Cates assist by taking photos of the items.

Item LW1(LAPD) was a rifle that was packaged in pieces. I also reviewed photos of this firearm as it was collected. The firearm was a semi-automatic, centerfire rifle that had a removable magazine via a standard magazine release, and had an approximate 12" barrel. This firearm had a frame (lower receiver) that did not have any manufacturing markings or serial number. Based on my training and experience I believe this firearm was a Firearm Manufactured By an Unlicensed Subject (FMBUS) or home made firearm. This is generally accomplished by purchasing an 80% frame and completing the milling at home and simply buying and assembling the rest of the parts.

CA PC 30515(a)(1) defines an assault weapon as the following:

A semiautomatic, centerfire rifle that does not have a fixed magazine but has any one of the following:

- (A) A pistol grip that protrudes conspicuously beneath the action of the weapon.
- (B) A thumbhole stock.
- (C) A folding or telescoping stock.
- (D) A grenade launcher or flare launcher.
- (E) A flash suppressor.

(F) A forward pistol grip.

This firearm was a semi-automatic, center fire rifle with a pistol grip that protrudes conspicuously beneath the action of the weapon, a telescoping stock, and a flash suppressor, meeting the definition of an assault weapon.

CA PC 17170 defines a short barreled rifle as having any of the following:

- (a) A rifle having a barrel or barrels of less than 16 inches in length.
- (b) A rifle with an overall length of less than 26 inches.
- (c) Any weapon made from a rifle (whether by alteration, modification, or otherwise) if that weapon, as modified, has an overall length of less than 26 inches or a barrel or barrels of less than 16 inches in length.
- (d) Any device that may be readily restored to fire a fixed cartridge which, when so restored, is a device defined in subdivisions (a) to (c), inclusive.
- (e) Any part, or combination of parts, designed and intended to convert a device into a device defined in subdivisions (a) to (c), inclusive, or any combination of parts from which a device defined in subdivisions (a) to (c), inclusive, may be readily assembled if those parts are in the possession or under the control of the same person.

This firearm was a rifle with a barrel less than 16 inches in length, meeting the definition of a short barreled rifle.

LW4 was an item logged in as a dismantled rifle. I inspected the frame (lower receiver) and found that it was stamped with the following markings from the manufacturer, Bushmaster (manufacturer), MOD XM15-E2s, and CAL .223-5.56MM. I found that the evidence box contained all of the additional parts needed to assemble the rifle into a functioning semi-automatic centerfire rifle.

Forensic Specialist Cates later logged the photos taken today into evidence.com. I repackaged the evidence items and checked them back into evidence.
