We are grateful for their dedication and commitment, and this week we took the time to acknowledge the difference they make in the lives of our students and staff!




Visit from a Neighbours Star

Measuring Up: Year 10 Mathematics in Action

Year 10 Mathematics students have recently been applying their knowledge of trigonometry to real-world problems involving angles of elevation and depression.

One of their learning tasks was hands-on: students constructed their own clinometer - a tool commonly used by engineers and surveyors to measure angles. Using these devices, they measured the angle of elevation of a building and then calculated its height by applying the correct trigonometric ratios.

This activity gave students the opportunity to see how mathematics is used beyond the classroom and to develop practical skills in problem-solving and measurement.



Artist in Residence

We are delighted to welcome renowned Australian artist Kirrily Anderson to our school community. Kirrily is celebrated for her intricate works on paper and largescale murals that highlight the delicate beauty of nature. Her art encourages us to pause, observe the oftenoverlooked, and reconnect with the natural world - an ethos shaped by her upbringing on a farm outside Narrandera, Wiradjuri Country, NSW.

This term, Kirrily will collaborate with our Year 9 Art students to design a nature-inspired mural that will transform the west side of the Science Lab building. Students will be involved in the planning and creative development throughout the term, with the installation scheduled for Weeks 2, 3, and 4 of next term.

We look forward to seeing this exciting project unfold. Keep an eye out for Kirrily around campus and take the opportunity to watch the mural come to life!




- Spirit of Sport: Positive attitude, love of the sport, celebrating others, and creating an inclusive environment

Pedal Power: Billings Brothers Dominate Mountain Bike Series

Over the past five months, Levi Billings (Year 10) and Jackson Billings (Year 8) have proudly represented Galen in the AusCycling Victorian Interschools Mountain Bike Series.

Across seven rounds held in Dromana, Lysterfield, Gippsland, the You Yangs, Ballarat, Castlemaine and Bendigo, the boys competed against some of the state's top young riders. Each round featured its own challenges from technical downhill sections to gruelling long climbs testing skill, endurance and determination.

Through countless hours of training and impressive race craft, both Levi and Jackson won six of their seven races, securing the overall series win and bringing home gold for Galen.

The series was not only an exciting achievement but also an important step in their preparation for upcoming competitions. Jackson will compete in the NSW State Championships in Wagga Wagga during the school holidays, while Levi is heading to Japan for the 2025 Mountain Bike International Cross Country Junior Development Camp, where he will contest his first international race.

Year 11 Students Create Whimsical Fairy Garden

The Year 11 Vocational Major Personal Development Skills (PDS) class recently showcased their creativity and teamwork by transforming a garden space into a whimsical fairy garden. This hands-on project gave students the opportunity to develop key skills in communication, collaboration and problem-solving – all while bringing a touch of enchantment to the school grounds.

More than just a creative venture, the project was a meaningful exercise in real-world learning and community engagement, highlighting the value of student-led contributions to shared spaces.

Over several weeks, students:

- Planned and designed the layout of the garden
- Created handcrafted signs with messages about fairies, dreams and imagination
- Spray-painted tyres and posts to add vibrant colour and character
- Built a wishing well for students to make their magical wishes
- Planted flowers and arranged natural materials to bring the space to life

This inspiring initiative demonstrates the importance of community partnerships and the value of vocational education in developing practical, real-world skills.

Eco Dyeing with Year 8 Multiarts

On Tuesday 9 September, the Year 8 Multiarts class took part in an inspiring Eco Dyeing workshop led by renowned local artist Isabel Nina Young. This workshop marked the first step in the class's Organic Art unit, where students will go on to create both individual and collaborative three-dimensional artworks.

Students experimented with natural dyes made from plants collected around the Mullinmur Billabongs, as well as everyday items such as red cabbage and beetroot. Using these dyes, they coloured natural fibres including cotton, jute and wool, gaining hands-on experience with sustainable artistic practices.

The workshop was a creative and engaging way for students to connect with nature while developing new artistic skills, setting the stage for the exciting projects still to come.











MUNGO IMMERSION

Reflection by Tristan Lenaz and Andrew Sinclair

Tristan and Andrew embarked on a pilgrimage to Mungo National Park, a World Heritage–listed site recognised for its global significance. Mungo is a place that holds some of the oldest known ceremonial burials in the world, including Mungo Woman, a cremation dating back around 20,000 years, and Mungo Man, a 40,000-year-old ochre burial. Standing in such a place was both humbling and deeply moving, not only because of its history, but because of the living story that continues to be carried by the Aboriginal custodians of Mungo.

The importance of the immersion was to hear the First Nations perspective on connection to Country from time immemorial to now. Listening to these stories brought to light a way of seeing that stretches beyond linear time, one that understands Country as alive and continuous. For Tristan, as a First Nations man, and for Andrew, the experience was profoundly shifting. It deepened our sense of what connection means: a knowledge carried by the custodians of Mungo through deep cultural responsibility, and a lived experience for us as we stood in that landscape, listening and reflecting.

One of the most striking impressions of the journey was the wind. The wind that blew when Mungo Man and Mungo Woman walked this place, when the land resembled Kakadu or the Winton wetlands tens of thousands of years ago. The same wind that carried across the world two thousand years ago when Jesus walked, and the same wind that still shifts the sands of Mungo today. In its presence we felt a thread of continuity, a reminder that time, place and spirit remain connected.

We would like to thank Lou, Karen and Michael from CES for their care and leadership in making this opportunity possible and also extend our gratitude to Galen; Shaun Mason, Jim Samon and Deb Doyle for their support in enabling us to take part in such an important journey. This immersion has reminded us that all land is sacred, that every place across this continent holds the presence of Aboriginal people who have lived, died, and carried out ceremony here since time immemorial.
