## **Contemporary Theology Syllabus**

**Course Description:** This course will instruct the student in understanding contemporary theological thought within a biblical-theological context. Emphasis will be given to developing a biblical-theological response to contemporary and emerging theological thought relevant to the Church today.

# **Course Objectives:**

- 1. Engage both internal and external evidence with respect to the authority and inspiration of the Scriptures in response to the de-emphasis of the Bible in contemporary theology.
- 2. Examine the work, results, and theological implications of redemption in Christ, as revealed in the Scriptures, in response to inclusive and universal systems of redemption in contemporary theology.
- 3. Develop a Biblical theology of redemption in Christ with respect to the relationship between law and grace in the life of a believer in Christ.
- 4. Develop a Biblical/anthropological theology with respect to Christian thinking and what it means to be human, in response to the secularization of human beings in contemporary theology.

# **Course Requirements and Assessments:**

This course is an analysis of contemporary theology through the lens of Reformed theology, informed by the Word of God. In so doing, we will think through and develop biblical and theological responses to nonbiblical contemporary theology and its cultural influencers.

This course involves the reading of various texts concerned with:

- 1. The literary structure of the Scriptures and the reliability of the Scriptures.
- 2. The theology of biblical atonement and redemption.
- 3. The ontological reality of being in union with Christ as a believer in Christ and the implications of this union.
- 4. The contemporary theological systems that reject the Scriptures and its theology.
- 5. Contemporary cultural thinking and doctrines that oppose the doctrines of Scripture and the Church

The class expectations and grading are comprised of the following:

- 1. Reading the assigned texts
- 2. Completing weekly assignments and participation in class discussions
- 3. Submitting four personal response papers based on the reading
- 4. Submitting a research paper

**Note:** The research paper is designed for the student to choose a subject that will contribute to the development of the student's dissertation development.
