Course Description

This course is to examine God's purpose and activity related to missions as fulfillment of the Great Commission particularly to understand Israel's responsibility to the nations in the Old Testament and in the spreading of the Kingdom of God in the New Testament. The course will show the basic principles of strategic mission planning for the church, para church organization and the individual Christian worker's overall task in the Great Commission. Special emphasis will be given to the biblical perspective of missions, missiological principles, early church mission strategy, contextualizing, cultural research, etc. The student will be involved in developing a mission strategy in their chosen context (local, state, national or international).

Course Objectives

Cognitive (Content)

- To know the biblical definition of missions in order to understand its importance, its nature and dispel some of the common myths associated with missions.
- To know God's missionary intent for the nations throughout history.
- Know how to craft a biblical strategy of missions.
- Know common missiological principles for strategy development
- Know basic mission strategies that have been utilized throughout church history

Affective/Motivational (Character)/Comprehension

- Reflect on the biblical basis for missions.
- Distinguish between different models of missionary methods.
- Reflect on proper case studies.

• Understand the importance of proper cultural/cross-cultural research.

Volitional/Application (Competencies)

- To participate in the Great Commission in accordance with Matthew 28 and Acts 1:8.
- Develop a missional strategy to be used in the student's own context.
- Organize teams, map areas of outreach, and use effective strategies for that context.
- Execute and evaluate the effectiveness of teams and work done to evoke appropriate change.

Required reading. The student is expected to complete all assigned reading.

Weekly research and writing assignments. The student is expected to complete weekly writing assignments, two book reviews and a final research project. Logos Bible Software and the BTS Writing Center provide resources for research, bibliography, and footnotes. A detailed description of each assignment will be provided via email or Blackbaud under "Downloads."

Final Research Project. The student will choose a mission's context which will culminate in a final research project. The project will be the result of their research and strategic understanding throughout the semester. This is a quantitative summary paper in conjunction with the student's personal learning objectives. It will reflect what is read/learned from the class, show how it will benefit the 'nations' now and in future ministry and be implemented into the mission's effort of the local church/ministry they are part of. Details will be available via email or in Blackbaud under the "Downloads"

The student will submit various reflection papers based on the course lectures, special presenters, and readings.

The student will develop a course of action planning model and perform a mapping exercise of their selected demographic area: local, national, or international. The student will submit a book critique of *A Light to the Nations* by Michael W. Goheen along with a missionary biography of the student's choice.

The student will be asked for an honest assessment of the percentage of the reading they completed.

All research papers must be formatted in accordance with Turabian Chicago standards including the title page. All papers are to be 12-point, Times New Roman font and double-spaced. Any paper not conforming to these standards will automatically be dropped one letter grade. Please see the BTS

BTS Outcomes

- 1. <u>Scripture</u>: Students will effectively articulate the truth of Scripture and Scripture as truth, engaged with learning biblical knowledge and reformed principles of the supremacy of Scripture as God's word.
- 2. <u>Reformed Theology</u>: Students will be able to engage and reproduce the primary and essential elements of Reformed Theology.
- 3. Local Church: Students will be engaged in applied ministry projects in the local church
- 4. <u>Wisdom</u>: Students will grow in character; increasing in their demonstration of wisdom and its fruits.
- 5. <u>Discipleship</u>: Students will be able to understand and articulate the nature and importance of discipleship—both ordinary (means of grace) and extraordinary (biblical counseling).
- 6. <u>Communication</u>: Students will grow in the efficacy of their communication (articulation, teaching/speaking, and preaching—respective to various departments) both in content knowledge and rhetorical strategies

Outcome	Rank	Rationale (one sentence)
Scripture	5	Throughout the course, in readings, lectures, and assignments, students will consider their research topics, such as intertextuality and literary analysis, in light of Scripture. Students will study the Missio Dei as God's "grand narrative" of Scripture from Genesis to Revelation.
Reformed Theology	4	The tradition of mission in Reformed churches has a long history. Students will be exposed to many historical quotes, readings, and prominent figures who are/were Reformed in their theology. Additionally, students may explore Reformed theology in their readings and assignments on their major research project.
Local Church	5	Students will be encouraged to apply a biblical theology of missions in the life of their local church through an upcoming Bible study, Sunday school class, mission trip, or sermon preparation. The final ministry project is intended to be a useful product in the student's context.
Wisdom	5	The study of "the nations" throughout Scripture and the major research project requires students to identify potential points of cultural bias and to write with missional objectivity. Additionally, students may explore the application of biblical wisdom in the modern Christian's life in the local church and/or around the world as it pertains to missions.
Discipleship	5	Students will study biblical theology and write a detailed ministry project which will bring Scripture to life in the

		student's chosen context. As a result, students will write a detailed mission's strategy where he/she will explore the importance of discipleship both personally and missionally. Possible points of consideration may be discipleship in new church plants, discipleship on the short-term mission trip, and discipleship as a means for continuing growth of established churches.
Communication	5	Students will develop in both their written and oral communications through readings, lectures and assignments, in which they write a variety of reflection papers and present their research papers to the class. They also practice listening skills by providing feedback to each other.
Worldview	5	Students apply a biblical worldview through their weekly reflection papers. Additionally, their major missions project will require a biblical lens through which to look. Potential topics include various doctrines such as missiology, cultural contextualization, spiritual disciplines, social settings, etc.
Leadership	5	Students will explore leadership in their readings, lectures, and their writing assignments. The student will be required to study various effective leadership strategies of those on the mission field as well as key strategy team members in order to promote healthy relationships and empower people for ministry.
