Course Note: This course, in accordance with the historical theological position held by the mainstream of evangelical churches, is limited to male students preparing for ordination. (Refer to "The Role of Women in the Church a Rationale for the BTS Position")

Course Description: A foundational course in the preparation and delivery of expository sermons. The course is designed to acquaint the students with the theology of preaching, the selection and analysis of a text, sermon development, explanation, illustration, application, sermon introductions, and conclusions. This course will place emphasis on the practical preparation and delivery of sermons and give each student several opportunities to experience homiletical delivery and evaluation. It is highly recommended to have taken BT1205 - Hermeneutics prior to this course.

Course Objectives:

- 1. The student will be able to articulate a Biblical theology of preaching based on Biblical texts.
- 2. The student will be able to craft appropriate illustrations for sermon points.
- 3. The student will be able to formulate sermon propositions consisting of textual themes and a Fallen Condition Focuses.
- 4. The student will be able to appropriately outline sermon textual units.
- 5. The student will be able to exegete sermon text units to truthfully explain the meaning to a congregation.
- 6. The student will be able to formulate appropriate sermon Introductions and Conclusions for sermon texts.
- 7. The student will be able to proficiently deliver oral expository sermons of up to 30 minute durations.

Course Requirements and Assessments:

- 1. Attend all classes

- 5. Complete in written form the questions for review and discussion and exercises at the end of each chapter in *Christ-Centered Preaching* as assigned for each week. You must write or print the questions and answers and turn them in to the professor each week they are due. This assures that you have done your reading and are keeping up with the concepts being presented.
- 6. Prepare sermons and other oral presentations as assigned per the weekly schedule. You must dress as you would dress if you were preaching on Sunday in your church, preferably in coat/tie. [previously preached sermons are not allowed; each one must be newly constructed]

Grading:

1. Reflection paper on "The Theology of Preaching" - 15% (Due on last class)

- 2. Written answers and class discussion on *Christ-Centered Preaching* 20% (Due after each class)
- 3. Sermons preached in class 40%
- 4. Book Review and Critique of *How Sermons Work* by David Murray 10% (Due last class)
- 5. Reading 15%

All research papers must be formatted in accordance with Turabian Chicago standards including the title page. All papers are to be #12 font Times New Roman and Double-Spaced. Course Schedule: <u>Homework Assignments due the next week/class</u> (subject to change based on number of students)

Class 1 - 9/2/25: Outline texts for preaching in 1 Peter with a statement of the theme of each section; Read Chapel <u>CCP</u> chapters 1-3 and answer study questions on chapters 1-3. On one written sheet prepare your **Testimony** and explain your **Call to the Ministry** including the person, the event, and the Scripture passage that has most influenced your call. You will orally present your testimony and call to the class next week. (5–10-minute presentation)

Class 2 - 9/9/25: Develop Fallen Condition Focus (FCF) on Sermon Texts in 1 Peter; Read Chapel <u>CCP</u> chapter 4 and answer questions; Prepare to give a 5-10-minute **Devotional** on one of the texts in 1 Peter next class.

Class 3 - 9/16/25: Develop a two-to-four-point outline from the English text of 1 Peter without the use of helps for each of the sermon texts in 1 Peter;

Read Chapel <u>CCP</u> chapter 5 and answer questions

Class 4 - 9/23/25: Select five texts from 1 Peter, exegete and develop based on the principles in chapter 5; Read Chapel <u>CCP</u> chapters 6-7 and answer the questions;

Prepare to present an **Illustration** based upon a theme from any passage in 1 Peter next week in class.

Class 5 - 9/30/25: Read Chapel CCC chapter 8 and answer the questions;

Write ten applications for each of the five texts;

Determine which of the five chosen texts you will use for:

- 1) a one-point exposition
- 2) a twenty-five minute sermon
- 3) a thirty minute sermon
- 4) a thirty-minute final sermon

Class 6 - 10/7/25: Outline the five texts based upon the principles found in chapter 6;

Read Chapel CCC chapter 9 and answer the questions;

Prepare to present an **Introduction** and **Conclusion** based on one the five texts next week in class.

Class 7 - 10/14/25: [this class may need to meet via Zoom as Professor will be out of town; or will find another professor to cover]

Read Chapel <u>CCP</u> chapters 10-11 (and Appendix 1 & 12) and answer questions

Prepare a **one-point exposition** consisting of: a statement of the text, a statement of the proposition, a statement of the point; development of the point through explanation, exegesis, expansion, illustration, application, and conclusion of point.

Fill out sermon evaluation forms in class.
