Never open an account without the husband's consent. Never pay a married woman's cheque if forbidden by the husband to do so, whether verbally or in writing.

When a single woman has an account in a bank and afterwards marries, get her husband's consent before paying her cheques.

A husband has the right to know the state of his wife's account under any circumstances.

A wife may keep funds at credit of her current account simply as the agent of her husband and such funds may, therefore not really belong to her at all. If this can be proved, the moneys standing in the wife's name may be set off against any debt due by her husband to the bank.

ANZ Sponsored the Australian Catholic Lawn Tennis Association's annual quest and presented a silver tray to the winner at a ball hosted by the Victorian association.

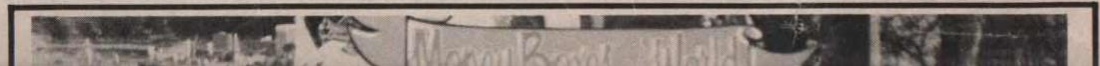

Miss Christmas (Lindee Eaton) distributed small give-aways to customers and staff who attended the Christmas party.

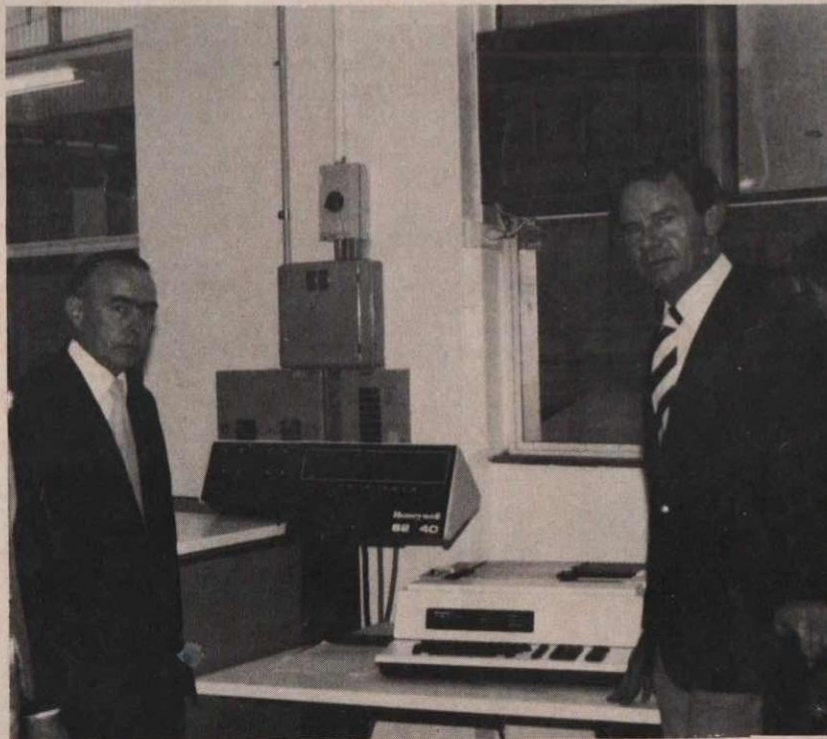

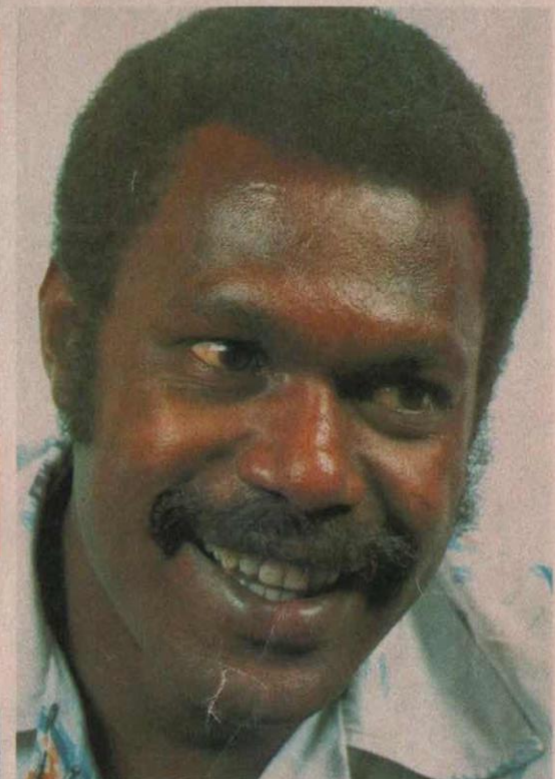

—The good old days!—

In the days when motor cars were only a dream for bank clerks, cricketing staff at 388 Collins St, Melbourne carted their gear about on a hand cart.

The team, known as ES & A (named after a forerunner of ANZ) played in the Mercantile Association from 1927, mainly against other banks, including the Bank of Australasia (also a forerunner of ANZ).

Bill Seddon, who retired from the Bank as manager Sandringham, Vic., was in the draft dept. at 388 Collins St in those days. The original equipment, including matting for the wicket, was bought from a disbanded club, says Bill.

"It was a big occasion when funds would permit the purchase of a couple of new bats," he said.

The first practice wicket was in Batman Ave across from Olympic Park. "For convenience, we stored our gear in a shed at the city morgue, then in Batman Ave and transported it by hand cart to the wicket."

All gear was purchased by the players — no sponsorships in those days — and when ex-

tra funds were needed the players would run a sweep, but only with the permission of the accountant. The sweep was drawn in the voucher storage section down in the basement.

Players were of various ages. At times it was difficult to call a more senior player by his christian name. At that time the word "mister" was very important in one's vocabulary, Bill says.

An example was H. G. Ensten, later to become general manager. At that time bill clerk, he was familiarly known as George.

The original captain was Tom Corbett, a very popular fellow, then followed Arnold Teague, who used to help everyone. Scorer was Arnold von Bertouch, who will be remembered by many staff.

Matches were played at Fawkner Park, Albert Park, Royal Park and Elsternwick Park, all fairly central points.



The club's second captain, Arnold Teague, had a good knowledge of the game which helped the younger players.

Captain of the original team was Tom Corbett, the team's wicket-keeper. Occasionally Tom would drop a catch or miss a stumping but seldom would there be a bye.

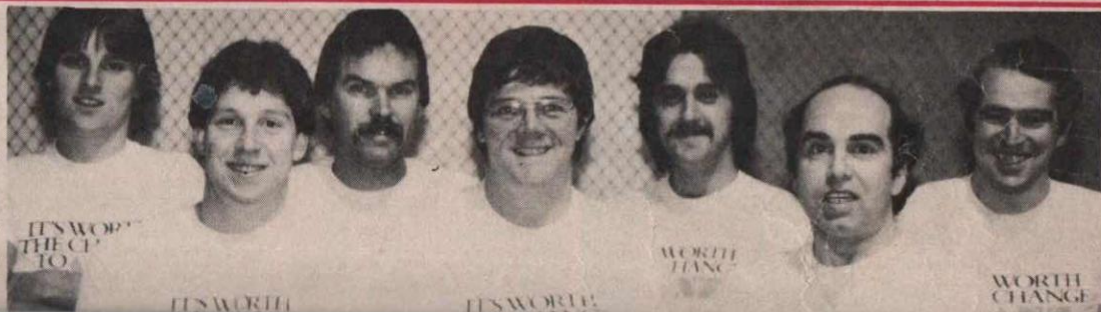

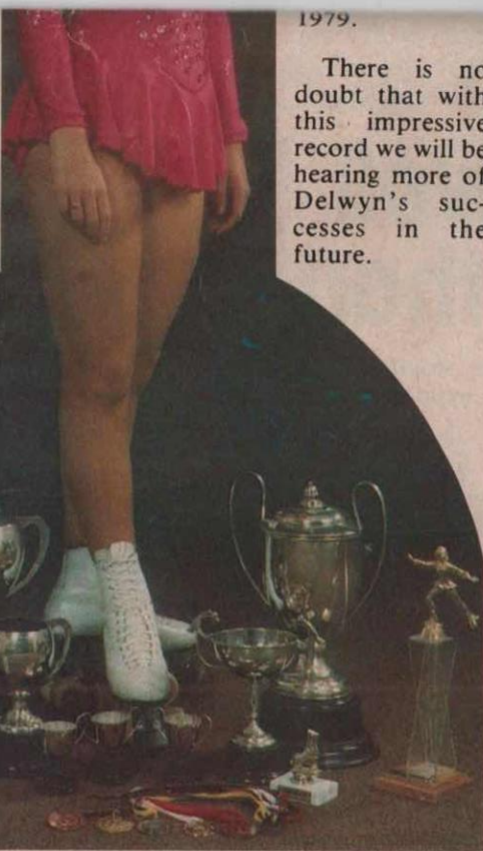
