

Drawing Animals On Your Head

PLAY

It is a fun and humorous icebreaker where participants attempt to draw their favourite animal on a piece of paper placed on their heads.



Learning Intentions

Encourage Creativity in a Fun Context:

Students will engage in a light-hearted creative activity by unconventionally drawing their favourite animal, encouraging playful self-expression.

Promote Group Interaction and Laughter:

Students will enhance group dynamics by participating in an interactive and humorous icebreaker, fostering positive connections and reducing tension.

Develop Communication and Observation Skills:

Students will practise communication by describing and guessing the drawings of their peers, using observation and interpretation to understand what others have drawn.



Success Criteria

Participation in the Drawing Activity:

Students actively engage in the activity by drawing their favourite animal on top of their heads, contributing to the playful and fun atmosphere.

Involvement in Group Interaction:

Students enthusiastically participate in guessing each other's drawings, demonstrating effective communication and encouraging group interaction and laughter.

Fostering a Positive and Creative Environment:

Students contribute to creating a relaxed and enjoyable environment, showing appreciation for the Creativity of others and embracing the humorous and unpredictable nature of the activity.



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Objective:

It is a fun and humorous icebreaker where participants attempt to draw their favourite animal on a piece of paper placed on their heads.

Players:

Suitable for all ages, ideal for groups in a meeting, workshop, class, or casual setting.

Materials:

- Blank A4 paper.
- Pens or pencils.

Setup:

Each participant gets a piece of paper and a writing instrument.

Gameplay:

- Participants place the paper on top of their heads.
- They are given 30 seconds to a minute to draw their favourite animal.
- After the time is up, everyone stops drawing.
- The group then takes turns guessing what animal each person attempted to draw.
- The activity is filled with laughter and fun guesses.

Winning the Game:

It is not competitive; it focuses on enjoyment and breaking the ice.

Variations:

- It can be adapted for different themes besides animals.
- Works exceptionally well in large groups.
