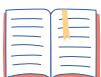


# Group Picture Creation

# PLAY

To encourage collaboration, creativity, and teamwork as students work together to create a larger picture, reinforcing the idea that everyone's contribution is important.



## Learning Intentions

**I can collaborate with my peers to create a shared artwork:**

This encourages students to work together creatively, fostering teamwork and cooperation.

**I can communicate my ideas visually with a group:**

This helps students express their thoughts and ideas through art while respecting the ideas of others.

**I can contribute to a larger project and see how individual pieces come together:**

This helps students understand the value of teamwork and how their contributions fit into a collective effort.



## Success Criteria

**Collaborating to Create a Shared Artwork:**

Students can collaborate with their group to create a single piece of artwork, ensuring active participation and engagement in group discussions.

**Contributing Ideas to the Creative Process:**

Students can contribute ideas to the group's creative process, sharing their thoughts and being part of the planning and execution of the artwork.

**Respecting Contributions and Working Together:**

Students can respect the contributions of others and work together to finish the picture, fostering cooperation and positive communication within the group.



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**Objective:** To encourage collaboration, creativity, and teamwork as students work together to create a larger picture, reinforcing the idea that everyone's contribution is important.

**Players:** Ideal for small groups (4-6 students per group).

**Materials:**

- Sheets of paper (large enough for the whole group to work on)
- Crayons, markers, or coloured pencils

**Time Required:** 5-10 minutes

**Setup:** Split the students into small groups (4-6 students each). Assign each group a theme or objective for their picture, such as "a park," "a day at the beach," "your school," etc. Provide each group with a large sheet of paper and colouring materials.

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## Reflection Prompt:

- How did you work together as a group to create your picture?
- What was challenging about collaborating with others on one piece of artwork?
- How did everyone's contribution help shape the final picture?

**Winning the Game:** There is no winner in this activity. The goal is to work together as a team to create something collaborative, with an emphasis on creativity and communication.

**Additional Notes:** Group Picture Creation is an excellent team-building activity that promotes creativity, communication, and problem-solving. It allows students to collaborate and share their ideas in a relaxed and fun setting while also enhancing their social interaction skills. It's a great icebreaker for new groups or at the beginning of the school year.
