

Treasure Hunt

PLAY

To help students develop problem-solving, teamwork, and exploration skills by following clues to find hidden treasures. The game promotes critical thinking, collaboration, and discovery in a fun and interactive way.



Learning Intentions

I can develop problem-solving skills by using clues to find hidden treasures:

This encourages critical thinking and the ability to follow instructions while deciphering clues.

I can practice teamwork by working with others to solve clues and find the treasures together:

This helps students learn to collaborate, share ideas, and support one another during the hunt.

I can explore my environment by searching for hidden objects, discovering new areas, and engaging in active play:

This fosters curiosity and encourages students to explore the space around them.



Success Criteria

I can follow the clues and search carefully for the hidden treasures:

This ensures that students are actively engaged in the treasure hunt and practising their listening and exploration skills.

I can work with my team to solve clues and find treasures together:

This encourages teamwork and communication as students work towards a common goal.

I can share the treasures I find with my classmates and help others if they need it:

This reinforces cooperation and reinforces the idea of sharing and being supportive in group activities.



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Objective:

To help students develop problem-solving, teamwork, and exploration skills by following clues to find hidden treasures. The game promotes critical thinking, collaboration, and discovery in a fun and interactive way.



Players: Ideal for 4-20 students, either individually or in small groups.



Materials:

- Small treasures (e.g., toys, coloured stones, paper cutouts, or treats).
- Clues written or printed on paper (optional).
- A designated search area (indoor or outdoor).

Time Required: 10-15 minutes.

Setup:

Hide the small treasures around the room or playground, ensuring they are well-hidden but still easy enough for young students to find with some effort. Prepare a series of clues to guide the students to the treasures.
