

Teen's First Car - Parent & Teen Checklist

Choosing your teen's first car is exciting—but it can feel overwhelming too. As both a mother, grandmother, and auto professional, I want to share what I've learned from years in the shop and at home. This checklist will help you feel confident that your young driver is safe and prepared on the road.

1. Safety First • Uvehicle includes anti-lock brakes (ABS) •

Electronic Stability Control (ESC) is installed • ☐ Strong crash test ratings (check IIHS, NHTSA) • 🗆 Bonus: Blind-spot monitoring or backup camera available 2. Reliable—Not Flashy • Choose a model known for reliability, reasonable gas mileage, and low-cost ■ Prefer a trustworthy make like Toyota or Honda over flashy luxury/European brands 3. Hidden Costs Budgeted • \square Monthly insurance premiums estimated □ Fuel, registration, and maintenance (tires, oil changes, etc.) factored in • \square Encourage your teen to contribute to some ongoing costs for responsibility and respect 4. Pre-Purchase Inspection (PPI) • \square Schedule a Pre-Purchase Inspection before committing to a used car • Confirm brakes, suspension, tires, fluids, and warning lights are vetted 5. Teach Car Basics • \square Show how to pump gas and understand fuel types • 🗆 Explain what dashboard warning lights mean • \square Teach how to check tire pressure and oil levels • \square Set expectations about when to ask for help—no fear of questions

Bonus: Emergency & On-Road Essentials A. Safety Kit Must-Haves I First-aid kit (bandages, antiseptic wipes, ointment) Flashlight with fresh batteries Seatbelt cutter & window breaker tool Reflective triangle or road flare for visibility if stranded B. Emergency & Maintenance Tools Jumper cables or an emergency battery booster Spare tire, tire inflator/sealant, and tire pressure gauge Emergency contact list (insurance, roadside assistance, parent numbers) C. Comfort & Practical Items

Water bottle kept in the car
