Keep in mind

- Devconnect kicks off on November 17th, 2025 mark your calendars for the opening event!
- Stay nearby: For Devconnect, the ideal base is near La Rural (the event HQ), while still within walking distance of Buenos Aires' best restaurants, bars, and nightlife.
- Plan ahead: Check distances between venues to optimize your schedule.
- Arrive early: Most events include lunch and coffee breaks, so you'll finish early and can enjoy the evening/night.
- Mix culture & events: Dedicate a morning or two to museums and sightseeing, then attend events after lunch — or flip it around.
- Check-in times: Most events start around 10 a.m.
- Stay active: Early mornings are ideal for running or training, with perfect weather for it.

Planning your trip to Buenos Aires #1

Visa & Entry Requirements

- Non-EU / non-Mercosur travelers: check the official government site for visa info: cancilleria.gob.ar.
- Make sure your passport is valid and confirm entry requirements before traveling.

Airport Transfers & Getting Around

From Ezeiza (EZE):

- Tienda León: buses, vans, or private cars.
- Uber & Cabify: reliable and widely used.
- Remis: can be hired at airport offices; slightly more expensive.

From Aeroparque (AEP):

- Short distance to La Rural, Palermo, or Recoleta: Uber & Cabify work perfectly.
- Taxi app: scan the QR at the exit for a licensed ride.
- Remis or airport shuttles: reliable if booked at the airport.

In the city:

- Public transport is safe until ~22:30.
- Key apps: Google Maps (download offline maps for best performance).

Planning your trip to Buenos Aires #2

Safety & Practical Tips

- Keep your phone and valuables secure; pickpocketing can happen.
- Neighborhoods: La Rural, Palermo, and Recoleta are generally safe.
- For parks or distant neighborhoods at night, take a taxi or ride-share.
- Always stay aware when using ATMs; some cards may be blocked as a security measure.

Money & Payments

- Cash is king: Some places add 10% to card payments; some don't accept cards at all.
- Exchange options:
 - "Cuevas" (local brokers) often offer the best rate—ask a local.
 - Western Union works, but cash availability may vary.
 - ATMs sometimes block foreign cards temporarily.
 - Blue dollar vs official rate: cash exchange can maximize your budget.
- Payment app: locals widely use Mercado Pago.

Extra essentials

- eSIM: recommended for connectivity on the go.
- Climate: November is spring—warm to hot days, cooler nights.
- Time zone: GMT-3



- The old cafes ('Bares Notables') have the most traditional 'café con leche' (coffee with milk). <u>Cafe Tortoni</u> is one of the most popular 'Bares Notables'
- Mate: more than a drink, it's a ritual. Hot yerba in a gourd. Try it at a park, or bring home your own kit.

For sweet tooths

- Dulce de leche: a thick caramel spread you'll find in everything: desserts, pastries, even ice cream. Don't leave without trying it.
- Alfajores: Find them in kiosks, bakeries, or refined versions at specialty cafés.
- Medialunas: Argentina's version of croissants: buttery, sweet, and best enjoyed with café con leche in the morning.
- Helado artesanal: ice cream is a must. Dulce de leche flavors dominate, but try sambayón too.
 - Try these spots: Rapanui, Luccianos, Pistachio.

Football museums

Football fans shouldn't miss Buenos Aires' two legendary rivals: the River Plate Museum and the Boca Juniors Museum. Each celebrating the city's passion for the beautiful game.





Cultural tours

Centro Cultural Recoleta hosts cool exhibitions while CCK dazzles as a converted post office offering incredible free programming. The Museo Nacional de Bellas Artes is a classic with free entry, and both MALBA and PROA showcase top contemporary art. For history, don't miss the Cabildo and the Museo del Bicentenario.

Explore theaters

El Ateneo Grand Splendid is a breathtaking bookstore set inside a former theater, while **Teatro Colón** is worth a visit for its guided tour, even if you don't catch a performance.

Explore parks

Buenos Aires' green escapes include Parque El Rosedal with its rose gardens and paddle boats, the serene Jardín Japonés, the futuristic Floralis Genérica sculpture, plus the Reserva Natural de Puerto Madero and the leafy Jardín Botánico.



Explore with bikes

Buenos Aires is a big city, but it's surprisingly walkable, with many bike-friendly areas. **BA en Bici** is a great option to cycle through Palermo's parks, past Floralis Genérica, and into the Ecological Reserve.

No bikes? No problem For rides, Uber, Cabify, and Didi all work well and are affordable, while public transport is efficient: the subway accepts debit/credit, and buses and trains require a SUBE card.

Beyond the basics, make time for authentic local experiences: the Feria de Mataderos (Sundays) with folk culture, artisan markets, and asado; San Telmo Market (Sundays) with antiques, food, and tango vibes; Caminito in La Boca (Sundays) for colorful streets and street performances; and a laid-back sunset at the Planetario, where locals gather with mates, roller skates, and music.



What to bring home

Buenos Aires offers a range of memorable souvenirs, from quality leather goods and traditional mate kits (cups, straws, yerba, and carrying bags) to silver items inspired by gaucho culture. Don't miss local wines, handwoven fabrics from Argentina's northwest, and the ever-delicious dulce de leche.

Language & etiquette tips

- Basic politeness: Always say Por favor (please), Gracias (thank you), and De nada (you're welcome).
- Ordering at a restaurant: Say Quisiera pedir el [dish], por favor to order, and ¿Te puedo pedir la cuenta, por favor? to ask for the bill.
- Service style: Waiters are generally friendly and relaxed—formalities are only expected in high-end restaurants.
- Tipping: A typical restaurant tip is around 10% of the bill. Tipping other vendors is less common, but it's appreciated for tourist guides, hotel staff, bartenders, or private drivers.
