2030 Strategic Plan

This year, Young Voices set an ambitious strategic plan for our future. We asked ourselves: **What would it take to make a truly transformative impact on the public conversation for liberty by 2030?**



The answer became our North Star:

Young Voices will define the future of freedom — for the next generation, by the next generation.

Our strategic plan builds on what we do best — cultivating media talent through our Contributor Program and elevating courageous voices through the Dissident Project — while charting bold new territory to grow their reach and relevance.

For the **Contributor Program**, we're focusing on building career paths for the middle of the liberty movement's talent funnel.. Many of our alumni already go on to high-impact careers — but we believe we can do more to accelerate their rise. That's why we plan to revamp our mentorship model to help top contributors pursue creative projects like books and podcasts, receive a crash course in nonprofit marketing and communication, and serve as on-screen talent for free market groups.

By 2030, we envision a thriving ecosystem of Young Voices alumni collaborating, supporting, and mentoring one another as they shape the cultural conversation for liberty. To achieve that, we will:



Target digital-native talent on Substack, TikTok, YouTube, and other emerging platforms



Expand advanced professional development tracks including bookwriting and nonprofit communications



Forge deeper partnerships with media outlets and think tanks to facilitate direct connections with our talent

For the **Dissident Project**, we're thinking bigger than high schools. Our goal is to develop transformative immigrants to not only speak to students about the importance of freedom but also command national attention in legacy and digital media. Through storytelling campaigns, a new media fellowship, and high-level training, we'll prepare our speakers to share their personal experiences and insights at classrooms, conferences, and civic events across the U.S.

By 2030, we aim for the Dissident Project to be America's premier speakers bureau for American immigrants — the go-to sources for people seeking firsthand perspectives on the perils of socialism and the promise of liberty.

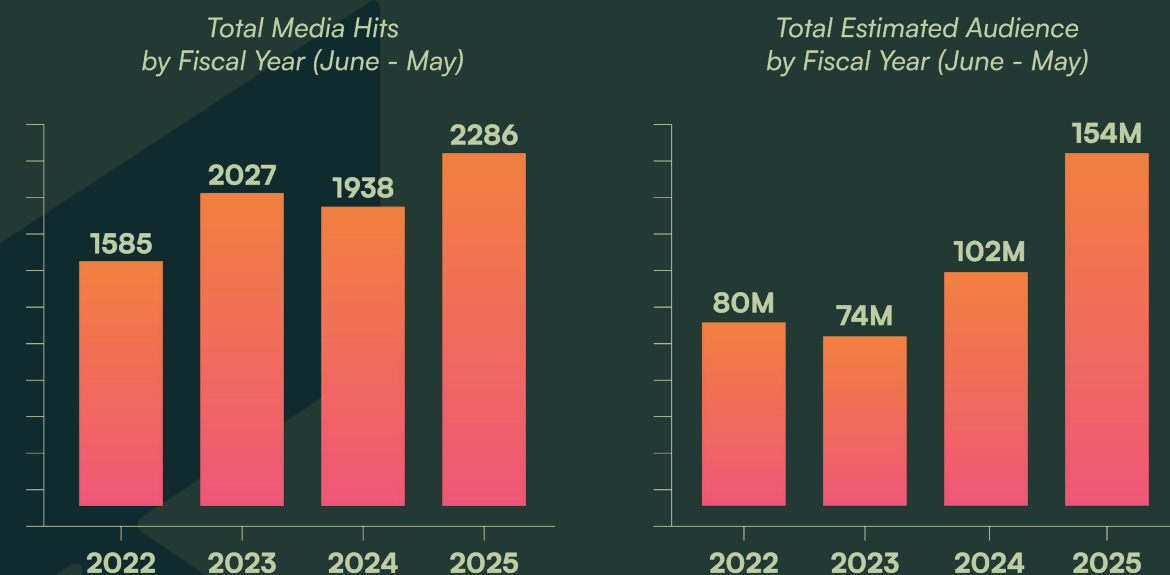
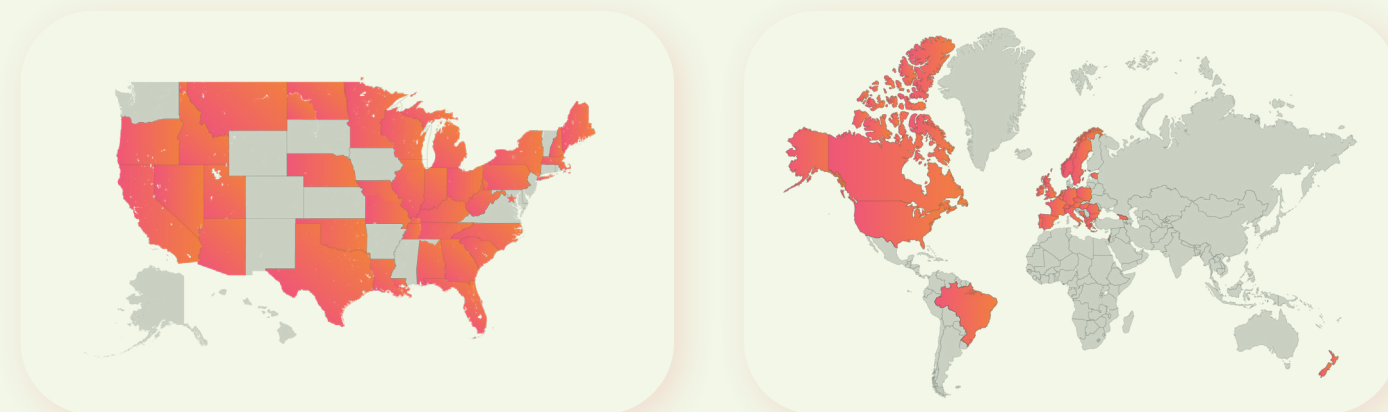
By the Numbers

The cornerstone of Young Voices' offerings, the Contributor Program gives media training and placement services to students and young professionals interested in public policy. Our team of PR professionals edits and places op-eds, schedules broadcast interviews, and connects our best writers to mentorship and employment opportunities.

In Fiscal Year 2025 (June 2024 - May 2025), **Young Voices secured 2,151 media hits** between articles, radio, TV, podcasts, and speaking opportunities. **Together, these appearances reached an estimated 154 million people** according to estimates by CoverageBook and Critical Mention.

When dividing Young Voices' budget by total reach, our cost-per-view (CPV) was 1.5 cents. For context, a good CPV for advertising is anywhere from 3 to 30 cents, making Young Voices a leader in return on investment in the public relations industry.

This year, Young Voices' writers were published in outlets from 25 countries across the world, and 32 states plus DC.

Success Stories

Kate Farmer, *The Wall Street Journal*

Kate joined Young Voices as an undergraduate student in 2023 and was selected as one of our first Social Mobility Fellows. During the Fellowship, Farmer honed her writing skills, publishing originally reported pieces on homelessness. This year, Farmer was awarded The Fund for American Studies’ Joseph Rago Memorial Fellowship, securing a one-year, full-time position at *The Wall Street Journal*. Farmer credits Young Voices for helping her land the job:

“Young Voices taught me how to write — and think — at the highest level in a way my university never did. When pushed in these conditions, I progressed rapidly, and doors in my life started opening. It is a wonderful thing that Young Voices put so much faith and confidence into the 19-year-old writer I was, and I’m very grateful for it.”



Autumn Billings, *Reason*

When Autumn started writing at Young Voices in 2024, she had a passion for criminal justice reform, but lacked experience writing for publications. Autumn joined the Social Mobility Fellowship, receiving hands-on training in reporting for the first time. Within months, she published multiple pieces covering national news and the criminal justice system in her home state of Louisiana. In her words:

“The support and connections Young Voices provided have gotten me so much further with both my writing and commentary than I thought possible in such a short amount of time.”

This January, Autumn was hired as an assistant editor at *Reason*, where she has continued to shed light on abuses in the criminal justice system.



Jonas Du, *The Free Press*

Jonas Du joined Young Voices while studying at Columbia University in the fall of 2023. When his campus became the epicenter of protests in the wake of October 7th, Jonas covered the unrest extensively, and Young Voices’ PR team pitched his commentary to top outlets. Within a year, Jonas had made dozens of appearances on cable channels, including CNN and Fox News. Reflecting on his time with Young Voices, Jonas says it not only helped him build his profile as a commentator but also connected him with an intellectual community that challenges the left’s cultural orthodoxy:

“Young Voices was my first introduction to the heterodox, pro-liberty intellectual space. The progressive left dominates so many of our elite institutions that the center-right space is a small world — through Young Voices, I have met countless people in the knowledge economy in this space which has led me to the career I have today.”

After graduating, Jonas was hired as a fellow at *The Free Press* for its Washington, DC, bureau.



Jeff Luse, *Reason*

Jeff Luse didn’t expect to have a career in journalism before joining Young Voices in 2022. However, Jeff says the Contributor Program “ignited my love for writing and gave me a clearer career path. I don’t think I’d be where I am today had I not joined.” Jeff’s writing as a Contributor earned him top bylines, with op-eds placed in *Newsweek*, *The Hill*, and *National Review*. Jeff says that Young Voices played a role in developing his skills as a writer and commentator for a general audience.

“Working with Young Voices showed me how to structure my arguments and write on technical issues that appeal to broad audiences. Both of these things have helped me to improve turnaround time on my writing. The Contributor Program also grew my professional network, which has allowed my writing to reach more people.”

Jeff is now working in journalism as a deputy managing editor at *Reason*, where he writes for a national audience full-time.

Jonathan Gibson, *The Dispatch*

Jonathan Gibson was one of Young Voices' earliest European contributors when we launched our Fellowship in 2022. Jonathan says our programming helped him build a journalism and commentary portfolio he otherwise wouldn't have had:

"Before Young Voices, I had very little knowledge or experience of what journalism was like. However, from the first session on 'The Art of the Op-ed,' to the helpful guidance and feedback I received when drafting articles and appearing on air, Young Voices quickly helped me to become a better commentator."

Jonathan has since become a regular contributor on the UK's TalkTV, providing commentary on subjects from international relations to tech policy. Jonathan's dozens of on-air appearances helped him secure his next job as a reporter at *The Dispatch* covering AI policy.



Noah Gould, American Institute for Economic Research

Noah Gould started writing for Young Voices in 2023 and quickly developed a talent for in-depth essays that, in his words, peel back *"the layers of cultural and philosophical questions underneath the economic and political phenomenon of the day."* His impressive prose stood out during the Social Mobility Fellowship, where he reported on the regulatory environment in his home state of Michigan. Noah credits Young Voices' hands-on editorial support as crucial to refining his writing:

"The support of the editorial staff to clarify arguments has been tremendous to refine my writing."

Noah became a visiting Fellow at the American Institute for Economic Research in the spring of 2025, after Young Voices placed three of his essays in the Institute's publications.



Victoria Churchill, *Daily Mail*

Victoria Churchill joined Young Voices in 2023 as a grassroots organizer eager to break into media. As a contributor, Victoria quickly developed a knack for broadcast media, making dozens of appearances from local radio interviews to hits on Sky News. Through Young Voices, she was hired to cover the 2024 presidential election for *the New York Post*. When starting that new role, Victoria remarked:

"In just over a year of involvement with the Young Voices program, I have appeared in local, national, and international media outlets over 50 times. Those experiences helped me gain the skillset and confidence to apply for my dream job."

While on the campaign trail with *the Post*, Victoria was one of the first reporters to break the story of the Secret Service deflecting blame for the failed assassination attempt of President Donald Trump in Butler, Pennsylvania. Victoria's impressive reporting helped her land a position covering Capitol Hill with the *Daily Mail*.



Ethan Brown, Metcalf Institute

Ethan Brown is a writer and podcaster covering climate and the environment. Ethan's work focuses on effective, free-market solutions to climate change. Ethan believes a crucial step to advancing these solutions is rejecting the alarmism of the left and engaging with a broader audience. Young Voices helped Ethan reach that audience, getting his commentary published in top outlets like *Newsweek* and *The Hill*. But the impact goes beyond publishing, according to Ethan:

"Young Voices introduced me to other thought leaders advancing climate solutions that do value free markets and individualism."

Ethan is now working at the University of Rhode Island's Metcalf Institute, where he helps New England newsrooms rethink their approach to climate reporting.

New Projects

Law & Liberty Program with the Federalist Society

In 2025, Young Voices launched the *Law & Liberty Program* in partnership with the Federalist Society — a four-month fellowship designed to elevate the next generation of liberty-minded legal thinkers. Tailored for law students and recent graduates within the Federalist Society’s network, the program offers hands-on media training and strategic PR support to help fellows share expert commentary on issues like free speech, cancel culture, campus protests, and constitutional law.

This cohort of just four writers published 11 op-eds on major legal stories — from Supreme Court rulings to the Karen Read trial — collectively reaching 8.6 million readers. The Federalist Society’s legacy in shaping future leaders made this partnership a natural fit, and together we are equipping young legal minds to become principled, public-facing advocates for the rule of law and America’s founding ideals.

Talent Market & America’s Future Awards

Young Voices was honored with two major recognitions at America’s Future’s 30th Anniversary Gala in Washington, DC — a powerful testament to the impact of our Contributor Program and the talent behind it.

Talent Market named Young Voices’ Contributor Program the *2025 Program of the Year*, awarding a \$10,000 prize to fuel our continued growth. With over 100 rising writers contributing hundreds of media hits each month, this award affirms our role as the premier pipeline for liberty-minded talent in media and public policy.

We were also proud to celebrate Program Manager Caleb Franz, who was inducted into AF’s 1995 Society, which honors emerging leaders advancing the cause of freedom. A U.S. Army veteran and author of *The Conductor: The Story of Rev. John Rankin*, Caleb has played a pivotal role in mentoring our contributors and elevating overlooked stories from America’s abolitionist past. Executive Director Casey Given was also inducted into the Society as well, as a former winner of AF’s William F. Buckley Prize.

Together, these honors reflect the strength of our network, the caliber of our people, and the growing recognition of Young Voices as a force for liberty — by the next generation, for the next generation.



Policy Fellowships

Middle East History and Peace Fellowships

This year, Young Voices expanded our policy-focused programming by launching a Middle East History and Peace Fellowship, designed to provide our writers context behind the ongoing conflicts in the Levant. We welcomed our first cohort in October 2024 and a second in June 2025, serving 15 fellows in total. Both groups of writers received exclusive briefings from experts including Adam Kirsch of *The Wall Street Journal*, Robert Nicholson of *Providence*, and Mariam Wahba of the Foundation for Defense of Democracies. The inaugural cohort was remarkably successful, placing a total of 74 media hits, including two articles in *The Hill* and five articles in *RealClearPolitics*.



Social Mobility Fellowship

In 2023, Young Voices launched our Social Mobility Fellowship to encourage our writers to produce original reporting on the social entrepreneurs tackling the most challenging issues of our day — poverty, homelessness, and the criminal justice system — working to preserve the American dream. This year, we supported eight new Social Mobility Fellows, who wrote 16 originally reported articles, which Young Voices placed in top outlets, including the *Chicago Tribune* and *National Review*. The Fellows’ work reached over four million readers and impacted their career trajectories, with two Fellows, Victoria Churchill and Autumn Billings, landing new positions at the *Daily Mail* and *Reason* since participating in the Fellowship.



Introducing the David Boaz Resident Writing Fellowship

Young Voices was honored to receive a legacy gift from the estate of David Boaz, the former Cato Institute Executive Vice President who helped define the modern libertarian movement. Boaz was more than a towering intellectual — he was a personal inspiration and a guiding force in the life and work of Young Voices’ President & Executive Director Casey Given from the earliest days in his career. David believed in the power of ideas and the importance of developing young talent to carry those ideas into the mainstream. He was one of Young Voices’ earliest cheerleaders, joining our Board of Advisors in 2017.

We are beyond proud of the trust this champion of liberty has bestowed on our organization. With the gift, we launched the David Boaz Resident Writing Fellowship, a position that supports a full-time resident writer and commentator in honor of David’s lifelong dedication to advancing liberty.

Introducing the Inaugural David Boaz Fellow, Sam Raus

Hailing from the Philadelphia metro area, Sam joined Young Voices in 2024 and quickly established himself as one of our most prolific contributors, producing dozens of media hits and bylines in *Newsweek*, *The Washington Examiner*, and *The American Spectator*, among others. A graduate of the University of Miami’s School of Communications, Young Voices was honored to offer Sam the role as our inaugural David Boaz Resident Writing Fellow shortly after graduating.

Sam’s incisive prose and steady, balanced commentary are a fitting match for Boaz’s legacy of principled, ideas-first advocacy. Reflecting on Boaz’s example, Sam writes: *“To me, David modeled what it means to lead with ideas and genuine concern rather than performative outrage. In a culture increasingly driven by personality and partisanship, he grounded himself in enduring values: free markets and free people. His work challenges us to think more deeply, speak more precisely, and stay principled even when it’s politically inconvenient.”*

Through the Fellowship, Sam is committed to carrying Boaz’s principled legacy forward through regular op-eds and long-form commentary pieces.



Young Voices Europe



Launched in 2022, Young Voices Europe offers article placement services to classical liberal writers living in the European Union. At a time when European political discourse is stuck between the regulatory overreach and speech restrictions of the progressive left and the nationalist and isolationist tendencies of the hard right, Young Voices Europe is introducing the Old World to fresh perspectives promoting consumer choice and individual liberties.

Liberty Comms Lab

This year, Young Voices is launching our most ambitious European project yet: a hands-on communications accelerator designed for free-market think tanks and advocacy groups looking to raise their profiles in European media. Starting in summer 2025, our PR team will train and consult with 12 think tanks across 9 countries over the course of one year, helping them develop scalable media strategies that will have a lasting impact on the media landscapes in their home countries. If we see success, this model could be imported into our Contributor Program through an advanced professional development track for aspiring nonprofit marketing professionals.

Young Voices Around the Globe

Canadian Expansion

In 2025, Young Voices took a major step toward growing our international reach with the expansion of our Contributor Program into Canada. As part of this new initiative, we invited Canadian writers to apply for our flagship talent development program in the fall of 2024.

Our new cohort is already making waves. In February, contributor Samantha Dagues published a piece on Canada’s burdensome tax system in the *Hamilton Spectator* — which was later shared by Opposition Leader Pierre Poilievre. With additional placements in outlets like the *Toronto Sun* and *Financial Post*, our Canadian contributors are quickly establishing themselves as rising voices in national media. We accepted three Canadian contributors into our Summer/Fall 2025 contributor class and hope to bring on more for years to come, promoting freedom and friendship between North America’s two strongest powers.



Events Around the World

Young Voices is more than a PR agency — it’s a global hub for rising classical liberal thinkers to exchange ideas, build networks, and grow in influence. In 2025, we hosted more than two dozen events across New York, Washington, DC, and London, as well as online — providing vibrant forums for our contributors, partners, and supporters to connect and learn.

Notable among these were our virtual Young Voices Forum, which brought noted authors Corey DeAngelis, Jimmy Soni, and Alexander Salter directly to our network for deep-dive conversations on public policy and publishing.

We also celebrated the release of *The Conductor*, a biography of famed abolitionist Rev. John Rankin by our Young Voices’ Program Manager Caleb Franz. We organized a four-stop book tour in Washington, DC, and New York City, drawing over 200 attendees eager to rediscover the legacy of America’s earliest freedom fighters.



Young Voices Debates

In the fall of 2024, Young Voices launched Young Voices Debates, a bold experiment to revive civil, high-level discourse on polarizing policy questions. Hosted monthly in New York City and streamed live, the Oxford-style series quickly became one of the most engaging programs in our network — drawing an average of 125 attendees per event in person and amassing over 100,000 views across X, YouTube, and CiVL.

Each debate pairs rising and established voices from across the ideological spectrum to tackle questions that matter — from foreign policy to civil liberties — in a format that rewards clarity over conflict. As an extension of our media training mission, Young Voices Debates gives our contributors and friends a space to sharpen their arguments, test ideas in real time, and model the kind of respectful exchange that’s all too rare in today’s media landscape.

The Dissident Project

The Dissident Project is a speakers bureau founded by Young Voices to educate American high schoolers about the value of liberty through the firsthand stories of people who have lived without it. Since launching in 2022, the Dissident Project has delivered 151 talks to more than 25,000 students nationwide, sharing powerful lessons from immigrants who escaped tyranny for freedom.

The Project’s roster of speakers includes brave individuals from Cuba, China, Eritrea, Iran, North Korea, Russia, the USSR, Venezuela, and Zimbabwe — each of whom has experienced the harsh realities of life under tyrannical regimes. These speakers travel to high schools across the country, offering students a rare opportunity to hear personal, lived accounts of censorship, propaganda, political persecution, and economic devastation.

The goal is to inform critical thinking and inspire gratitude for the freedoms often taken for granted that are enjoyed in America. By connecting faces and names to the consequences of lost liberty, the Dissident Project equips the next generation to better understand and defend the principles of a free society.

DISSIDENT SPEECH HIGHLIGHT

Gabriela Blanco in Odessa, TX

Last September, Dissident Gabriela Blanco spoke to 1,300 students at Odessa High School in Texas — our largest in-person audience yet. Gabriela told the students about her experience living under communism in Cuba and how America was a beacon of hope for her and her family. Gabriela’s speech made media coverage, reaching an estimated 2.5 million viewers through an article from Yahoo News and local TV coverage.



New Dissident Class

This school year, our Dissident Project welcomed seven new speakers from China, Cuba, Iran, and the former USSR. Our new class of Dissidents contributed to a record 60 speeches this year, inspiring 8,700 students across the country with their heroic stories.

New Initiatives

Dissident Media Fellowship

In January, the Dissident Project launched its inaugural Media Fellowship to elevate two courageous young voices — Alvin Hailin (China) and Gabriela Blanco (Cuba) — as national thought leaders in the fight for freedom. Modeled after the path of project founder Daniel Di Martino, the fellowship provides intensive mentorship, strategic media training, and storytelling support to help fellows transform personal testimony into cultural influence.

Through op-eds, interviews, speaking engagements, and social media, Alvin and Gabriela are sharing what it means to live under tyrannical rule — and why liberty matters. Since the program began, both fellows have seen major spikes in impressions, and Gaby has produced vertical videos that have reached over 2.5 million views.



Reagan Foundation Collaboration

This year, the Dissident Project partnered with the Ronald Reagan Presidential Foundation & Institute on their “Liberty Over Communism” initiative — a high school lesson plan helping students understand the real-world consequences of authoritarian ideologies.

Three Dissident Speakers — Maily Salabarria (Cuba), Jorge Galicia (Venezuela), and Grace Jo (North Korea) — were featured in powerful classroom video modules that bring their lived experiences to life. These raw, personal stories of censorship, poverty, and repression help students connect abstract political ideas to human cost.

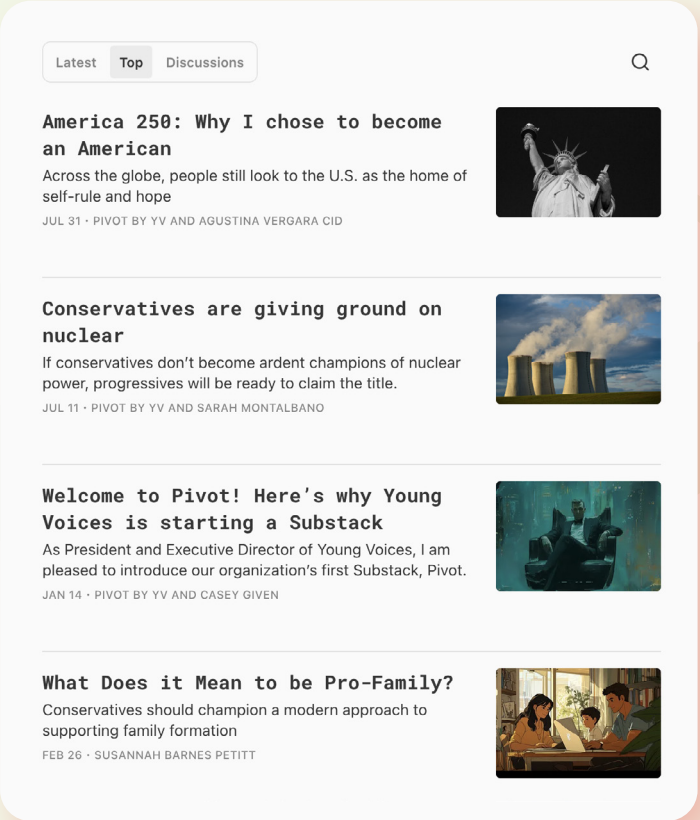
Each module is paired with discussion questions, historical context, and lesson plans to help teachers illustrate how Marxist and collectivist ideas continue to shape global and domestic politics. Together, we’re making freedom real for a new generation of learners.



Introducing *Pivot by Young Voices* on Substack

As traditional media fragments and new platforms rise, Young Voices is adapting to meet the moment. For over a decade, we’ve helped classical liberal writers succeed in legacy outlets — placing op-eds, landing broadcast hits, and reaching millions. But the media world is pivoting, and so are we.

In 2025, we launched *Pivot*, a Substack publication exploring how freedom advocates can stay relevant in a realigned political and cultural environment (find it at pivotbyyv.substack.com). Unlike traditional op-eds, *Pivot* dives into *metapolitics* — the deeper narratives, cultural shifts, and institutional trends shaping the future of the liberty movement. The name reflects our conviction that today’s classical liberals must remain nimble, rethinking how best to communicate timeless ideas to an evolving world.

New Series: America at 250

As we approach the 250th anniversary of America’s founding, we’re launching a new *Pivot* series: *America 250*. This project will feature thoughtful essays on how to preserve and renew the spirit of the American experiment in the years ahead. Through this series, Young Voices contributors will explore the challenges and opportunities facing liberty in 2026 and beyond.

With *Pivot*, we’re not just reacting to change — we’re helping shape the conversation about where classical liberalism goes next.

Finances

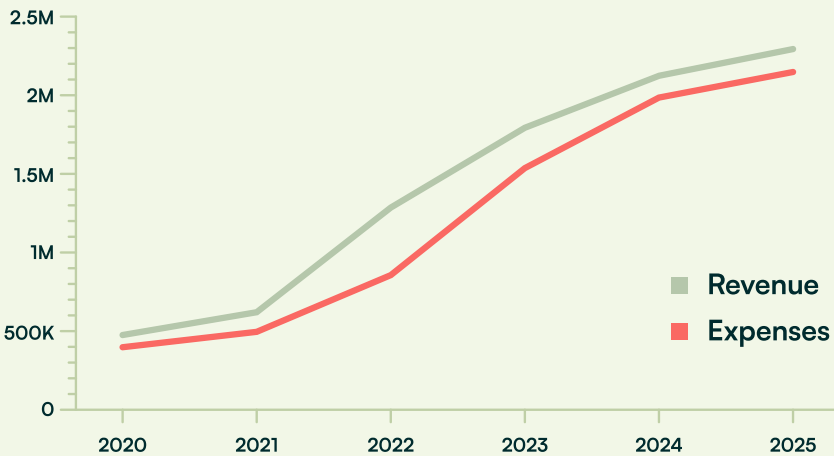
