
What the Affordable Care Act (ACA) and Medicaid Expansion Did for PLWHA

Before the ACA and Medicaid expansion, low-income adults aged 19–64 without a disability couldn't qualify for Medicaid

For many, the Ryan White Program was the only way to access healthcare


In 2014, Ohio expanded Medicaid to cover individuals with incomes up to 138% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL), regardless of disability status.

This expansion saved lives, especially for those living with HIV/AIDS



Medicaid = Lifeline for PLWHA

Nearly 40% of people living with HIV/AIDS in **Northeast Ohio** rely on Medicaid to afford the healthcare, medications, and support services that keep them alive



House Resolution 1 (H.R.1) is Now Law



On July 4^{th,} 2025 the President signed the resolution into law

Various aspect of this law will take affect affect over the next several years

Impending Effects of H.R.1

H.R. 1 puts PLWHA at risk. Medicaid barriers, work requirements, and funding cuts block access to:

 Life-saving medications like antiretrovirals & PrEP


 Sexual healthcare providers like Planned Parenthood

Comprehensive nursing and critical healthcare services



Work Requirements Are Coming

Beginning January 2026, adults covered under Medicaid expansion who are not working, in school, or meeting other narrow criteria may lose coverage



Nearly 450,000 people in Ohio could be affected

Let's get Educated, Let's get Organized!

Ohio's ADAP = Access to HIV Medications



Ohio's AIDS Drug Assistance Program (ADAP) helps low-income PLWHA afford the medications that keep them undetectable and alive


It covers premiums, co-pays, and prescriptions

What is Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program?

Ryan White funds medical care, medications, and support services for PLWHA who have no other way to pay

There is no indication that Ryan White Parts A/B dollars will be reduced in Ohio or nationally

People at risk of losing Medicaid will still be able to access care and medications through Ryan White funds



The Lived Experience

of PLWHA say their LGBTQ+ identity changes how medical providers treat men all or most of the time

of PLWHA have to educate medical providers about their health needs all or most of the time

of PLWHA delay care due to their LGBTQ+ identity all or most of the time

of PLWHA delay scare due to high out of pocket costs all or most of the time


"I have Medicaid and am HIV positive and am worried about making more money and losing my insurance, but cannot move out of my housing situation unless I make more right now.

I know that there are programs that will help cover medical costs if I lose my insurance but I am afraid of trying to navigate those changes."

Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) Will Shoulder the Burden



BIPOC residents make up 58% of Medicaid enrollees in Cleveland and 57% of HIV cases even though they're only 47% of the population

Cutting Medicaid = Cutting Care for BIPOC Communities

If You Think You Are Risk of Losing Your Medications

- 1 Don't panic!
- Don't ration your medications rationing can promote resistance
- Talk to your prescriber about your concerns and they can help you get the medications you need
