Dear Parents, Carers & Friends of All Saints,

Hopefully you are all rested and looking forward to a successful new year in 2026. As a school we enter an Ofsted window and look positively towards another busy and exciting term of 'typicality' at All Saints. That is because our 'typicality' ensures we continue to grow stronger, it ensures we continue to build on our many strengths, and ensures we continue to look forward with ambition and optimism in full support of the children and community that we serve. Your parents and carers were invited to celebrate a welcome mass in September, led by Fr Sean and Deacon Bennett, where we celebrated together, supported by our mission statement of "Love and Justice". You will be invested with Christian Values and principles, so that whatever path you take in life you will feel the security and understanding of what it takes to be a good person, brought up within the "All Saints' Way".

Look through the pages of this first newsletter of 2026, parents, and you will see our celebrations and our achievements in pictures and print. AWARDS EVENING

The Headteacher, Mr McGuinness, opened the evening speaking of our ongoing academic and pastoral improvements at All Saints. He commented this was his tenth year as head, and “What a privilege it has been to serve the community” he comes from.

The hallar-up was filled with several hundred pupils, parents and guests, all gathered for our latest special event.

Our guest speaker for the evening, Michelle Hinnigan, talked of being Captain of the England Women’s Football team and lifting the European Championship U19 Trophy in July 2009. She also talked of playing football with Leyton Baines, Ryan Taylor and our own Mr Volante on St Chad’s field, and going on to Captain Everton FC. The message to the pupils was “Let nothing hold you back!”

Awards were plenty: notably two Year 11 boys, **Matthew Jorga** and **Joshua Wokenforth**, for achieving maximum Grade 9 scores in all three sciences. Also, an outstanding award was presented to **George Travis** for not missing a single academic session in all of his five years as a pupil at All Saints. That’s not a single morning or afternoon’s absence in five full years of secondary school.

The Father Collins Award was presented to **Lacy Noonan** for outstanding achievement in Sixth Form.

Whilst the final award of the evening, the Eric Seal Memorial Award, was granted to **JP McGuinness** for an outstanding academic career. He will go on to study ‘Sports and Exercise Psychology’ at Edge Hill University.



Our annual 'Open Evening' comes quickly in September and is always a resounding success. This year it was no different.

For many of our teachers, it can be rewarding because it is a chance to celebrate with past pupils returning with their children.

Or it is an evening where we meet with fresh, inquiring parents from Kirkby and the wider surrounding community.

It gives us a chance to show the school off, and share our passion and belief in what we do at All Saints.

This time, we opened the school on the 25th September and gave welcome to over 400 families.

They joined us for the evening, visiting different departments and enjoying a taste of the 'All Saints' Way'.

Unfortunately, we are limited in the numbers we can accept. But we encourage everyone to make All Saints their first choice, and hope to see them join with us.

He is currently working on gym plans for his latest assignment on "How an assistant coach would impact on a team."


LLS focuses on multi-sports learning, where students from mixed disciplines come together to support each other.
