In 2023, visitors reviewed Crater Lake as the "most beautiful" of any national park in America. Whether you experience the stunning blue hues of the nation's deepest lake in the summer or explore one of the snowiest inhabited places in the world during winter, Crater Lake is sure to stun.

DAY ONE

# Above the lake

Crater Lake's vistas are unparalleled, offering a kaleidoscope of breathtaking scenes. Start your visit with a view from Rim Village, where you can witness the lake's vibrant blue contrast against the snow-capped cliffs. But be sure to continue your journey beyond the busiest viewpoints in the park: each viewpoint around the lake presents a unique portrait of this natural wonder, from the mysterious Phantom Ship to the imposing Wizard Island. Embark on a journey around the lake to discover why Crater Lake is heralded as one of America's most beautiful national parks.



Explore **Rim Drive**, an iconic national park journey, winding around Crater Lake and offering access to its most stunning vistas. This 33-mile loop is a gateway to over 30 scenic pullouts, including Cloudcap Overlook, Oregon's highest paved road. Open only in summer months, explore the less-trafficked East Rim to marvel at rugged vistas. Whether driving, cycling, or taking a trolley tour, Rim Drive presents the park's majestic landscapes and diverse ecosystems. Each stop along the drive reveals new perspectives and photo opportunities, making it a quintessential Crater Lake experience.

Crater Lake National Park's trails offer more than just lake views; they invite adventurers into the heart of its wilderness. From the East Rim's lush meadows to hidden waterfalls, the park's diverse trails cater to all. Choose between peaks with panoramic views or enjoy tranquil walks through ancient forests, whether you're searching for the perfect view of the lake or exploring the natural wonders beyond the rim. Trails are suitable for all ability levels, from peaceful strolls to the summit of Klamath's highest peak,

Mount Scott (8,934'). Crater Lake also features accessible trails for everyone to engage with nature. Hiking here is an exploration of the less trodden, offering a deeper connection with Crater Lake's natural beauty.

**More beyond the lake**  
Crater Lake is a gateway to explore stunning waterfalls, within or nearby the national park. View **Vidae Falls** from your car or take a hike to explore Plaikni Falls.





# Below the rim

Explore Crater Lake from the shore, the **Cleetwood Cove Trail** is your exclusive passage to Crater Lake's shores, offering a unique perspective of the park from the water's edge. This steep trail descends to the only legal access point for swimming in the lake, providing a unique opportunity to touch the pristine waters. The hike is challenging but rewarding, with stunning views and a chance to swim in the nation's deepest lake.



**Safety is crucial:** prepare for the trek and preserve the lake's purity. Bring water and sturdy footwear for the hike, but leave flotation devices behind (only yourself and your swimsuit are allowed in the lake).



**Dive in** into the deep blue waters of Crater Lake! This unique experience allows you to immerse yourself in the clarity and chill of the nation's deepest lake. Anglers can enjoy **fishing** for Rainbow Trout and Kokanee Salmon, with no license required and no size restriction or catch-and-keep limits. These activities offer a serene yet exhilarating way to connect with Crater Lake's natural beauty, reminding us to protect its unique ecosystem for future generations.



Embark on a ranger-led **boat tour** to explore Crater Lake's hidden wonders. These tours offer an intimate look at the lake's volcanic origins and its ecosystem. The journey to the boat dock via the Cleetwood Cove Trail is an adventure, descending through ancient forests to the water's edge. Secure your spot early for this unforgettable experience, which provides insights and views accessible only from the lake itself. Ranger-led tours highlight the lake's history, geology, and the conservation efforts preserving its beauty. A boat tour on Crater Lake is not just a trip; it's an immersive journey into the heart of one of America's most iconic natural wonders.





With one of the largest petroglyph panels in any US National Park and landscapes that tell stories of geological marvels and cultural resilience, Lava Beds is a testament to the beauty and complexity of the natural and cultural world. Whether you're delving into the depths of fascinating caves, hiking across ancient lava flows, or standing in awe of petroglyphs left by the ancestors of the Modoc people, Lava Beds invites you to uncover its secrets. Embrace the opportunity to explore a place where every corner holds a story, every cave a mystery, and every vista a breathtaking view.

Explore more than 800 lava tube caves, the largest petroglyph panel in any US National Park, and the cultural and historical heritage of the Modoc people at Lava Beds National Monument.

## Explore the underground wonders

Lava Beds National Monument is home to a remarkable underground world of over 800 lava tube caves, each offering a unique adventure into the earth's volcanic past. Visitors are invited to explore these natural wonders independently, thanks to a simple cave rating system that ensures an adventure suited to every level of explorer. From the easily navigable green-rated caves to the more challenging blue and the adventurous black-rated caves, there's a subterranean journey waiting for everyone. These caves are not just natural formations; they are gateways to understanding the dynamic forces that shape our planet.

### 800 CAVES TO EXPLORE

#### \* GREEN


Start at **Mushpot Cave**: Illuminated with interpretive signs, this cave is perfect for families and first-time cavers, offering an easy introduction to the underground world of Lava Beds right next to the Visitor Center.

#### \* BLUE

Ready for a bit more challenge? Try **Sunshine Cave** where sunlight streams through collapses in the cave roof, encouraging interior vegetation. This moderate challenge rewards explorers with unique, surreal sights.

#### \* BLACK

Experience required: **Catacombs Cave**, a complex maze suitable for experienced spelunkers, offers a rigorous exploration through its multi-level structure and challenging passages.



Caving in Lava Beds is an adventure that demands respect for nature and preparation. **Safety is paramount**; visitors should come equipped with head coverings, durable clothing, and flashlights, as well as food and water (there are limited services in or nearby the monument).

Don't miss highlights like the bioluminescent wonders of Valentine Cave and the historical depth of Skull Cave. But Remember, these caves are delicate ecosystems; preserve their beauty for future generations by practicing **Leave No Trace** principles.


### LAVA BEDS

## "The land of burnt out fires"

**Above ground**, Lava Beds National Monument offers a landscape equally rich in natural attractions and geological intrigue. The park's surface tells the story of its fiery origins through hikes across rugged lava fields, visits to imposing craters, and the exploration of vast lava flows. This land, shaped by volcanic activity, invites visitors to walk through history, exploring the same trails that the Modoc people and settlers once traversed, a connection to the past and present of this remarkable landscape.

The creation of the Lava Beds landscape is a tale of volcanic fury and the relentless forces of nature. Over the last half-million years, eruptions from the Medicine Lake Volcano have sculpted this high-desert plateau into a wonderland of **geological diversity**. The most recent flows, some just a few thousand years old, have created a rugged terrain of basaltic rock, spatter cones, and the monument's renowned lava tubes. These natural phenomena offer a vivid classroom for understanding the Earth's volcanic processes and the dynamic changes that shape our planet.

Explore the monument's above-ground natural wonders through a variety of **hikes and scenic drives**. Ascend Schonchin Butte, a cinder cone volcano offering panoramic views of the monument and beyond, revealing the vastness of the volcanic landscape that defines the region. Another must-see is Mammoth Crater, one of the park's largest and most impressive craters, whose eruptions contributed significantly to the lava tube formations below. These sites, along with the park's expansive lava flows and fields, provide an unparalleled opportunity to witness the power of volcanic activity and the beauty it can create.



## \* Homeland of the Modoc People

This land, marked by volcanic landscapes and ancient traditions, invites exploration of its significant cultural sites, where the stories of the Modoc people, their ancestors, and where one of the last "Indian Wars" occurred.

The monument's landscape is dotted with pivotal sites from the Modoc War. Take a short hike around **Captain Jack's Stronghold**, the site of a natural fortress used by the Modoc during the 1872-1873 conflict between the Modoc and the United States Cavalry. Nearby, **Gillem's Camp** tells the story of the U.S. Army's encampment, offering a contrasting perspective on the war's events.

Don't miss a chance to view ancient art at **Petroglyph Point**, which displays some of the most extensive examples of rock art in North America, or search for ancient markings in Big Painted Cave. These petroglyphs and pictographs, etched and painted into the volcanic rock, offer a window into the spiritual lives of the ancestors of the Modoc people. Stop by the **Visitor Center** to learn more about the Modoc people and view artifacts and exhibits that help interpret their history.

To fully immerse in the Modoc's history, visitors can engage with the **Modoc War audio tour**, available by scanning the code here. This self-guided journey through the monument's key historical sites provides a comprehensive understanding of the conflict, the Modoc people's resistance, and the impact of the war on both the Modoc and the settlers.



Explore the homeland of the Modoc people, a landscape forged by volcanic fury and cultural resilience. Designated a national monument to protect cultural history and natural beauty, Lava Beds showcases the dramatic aftermath of volcanic activity and interprets the culture and legacy of the Modoc.



**MERRILL, OR:**  
Tucked in the heart of potato country is the quaint quilter's paradise of Merrill. The wide, grand Front Street is home to restaurants, cozy places to stay, unique shopping, and an elegantly curated historical museum that spans the settlement of the city up through today with an entire room devoted to the Modoc wildlife and storied history of Klamath Country.

**TULELAKE, CA:**  
Tulelake is named for the vast lake that long dominated the area until it was drained to create farmland under the Reclamation Act of 1902. Still a thriving agricultural community with a strong ranching and hispanic culture, must visits include the museum at the fairgrounds which houses buildings from the nearby Internment Camp that imprisoned thousands of Japanese Americans during WWII, and of course the Lava Beds National Monument just south of town.



**DORRIS, CA:**  
Built in 1908 when the railroad came through, Dorris is proudly home to the tallest flagpole west of the Rockies. The historic and charming town is an excellent base camp for enjoying the natural beauty along the California and Oregon border with the birder's paradise of Meiss Lake Wildlife Refuge just a few miles to the south. Anyone looking for an unusual place to sleep must stop and stay the night or better yet a few at Butte Valley Bed & Breakfast, which was once a turn-of-the-century country hospital.

**MALIN, OR:**  
In 1909, Czech immigrants sent a scouting party to find the perfect place to settle and recreate the agrarian life they left behind in Eastern Europe. They found it in the idyllic farmlands of what soon became the charming town of Malin. Set amidst lush, rolling hills Malin greets visitors with a vast city park of towering Ash trees that features a newly revitalized swimming pool. The picturesque downtown boasts a refurbished 1930 movie theater, and several "yes-of-course-we-cook-from-scratch eateries."



**BONANZA, OR:**  
Nestled between three distinct valleys and resting on the banks of the Lost River sits the western town of Bonanza. Bonanza is an agricultural community home to working farms, dairies, ranches, and even a ranch-turned-winery. 12 Ranch Wines and Windy Ridge Organic Dairy are both more than worth calling ahead to schedule a tasting and a tour, while Bonanza proper features a general store, a BBQ food cart, a saloon, and a turn of the century jail. Big Springs Park is a local favorite for a picnic and some bird watching.



# Unmissable Moments OF WWII HISTORY



Tule Lake Segregation Center, preserved and interpreted at Tule Lake National Monument, holds a poignant place in American history. It was the largest and most controversial of the War Relocation Centers in the United States during World War II. Here, Japanese Americans were incarcerated after being forced out of their homes in the western United States. This site, now a testament to resilience and remembrance, invites visitors to explore its complex history.

Through guided tours and educational programs, Tule Lake offers a profound look into the injustices and challenges faced by those incarcerated, providing a space for reflection on civil liberties, identity, and resistance.

**“The people used this loyalty questionnaire as a form of protest. The people who gave the ‘wrong’ answer ended up segregated at Tule Lake. That protest is really the Japanese-American civil rights story. It’s a story that hasn’t really been told.”**

The Tule Lake National Monument Visitor Center, located at the heart of the former segregation center, serves as a gateway to understanding the layered narratives of those incarcerated. It offers a starting point for guided tours that reveal the daily lives and struggles within the camp.

The Tule Lake National Monument and its surrounding sites offer a comprehensive exploration of this dark and complex chapter in American history. At the visitor center, ranger-led tours bring to life the stories of Japanese Americans who were forced into a complex test of loyalty and identity.



Nearby the Tule Lake National Monument Visitor Center, the **Tulelake-Butte Valley Fairgrounds Museum** houses artifacts and records, providing a tangible connection to the past. **Camp Tulelake**, once a Civilian Conservation Corps camp repurposed for incarcerating Japanese Americans and later German and Italian POWs, offers guided tours that delve into its multifaceted history. These sites collectively offer a deep dive into the experiences of those who lived through these trying times, encouraging visitors to reflect on the broader implications of wartime decisions.

The story of Tule Lake is not just about the place but the people who endured hardship and injustice. It’s an invitation to remember and honor their resilience and to ensure such history is not forgotten. Visiting these sites offers a chance to connect with the personal stories of those incarcerated, fostering a deeper understanding of our shared history and the importance of preserving these stories for future generations. The National Park Service invites you to visit the **Tule Lake National Monument Visitor Center**, open during summer months, to learn more about difficult history that’s too important to be forgotten. You can learn more, year-round, at the Tulelake-Butte Valley Fairgrounds Museum.

Whether you're drawn to serene paddles, historic trails, or the tranquility of camping under starlit skies, Klamath's state parks offer unforgettable escapes into nature's embrace. Explore the history of the west at the **Collier Logging Museum**, or explore the **OC&E Woods Line State Trail**, Oregon's longest state park, by bike, foot, or horseback, traversing through history and breathtaking scenery. Engage with local Guides & Outfitters or Oregon State Parks tours for an enriched experience that respects these special places.



## HISTORY, RECREATION AND FUN

## at Collier State Park

Collier Memorial State Park features a campground, outdoor museum of historic logging equipment, relocated pioneer village and a new four-corral, primitive horse camp and trailhead. At the **state's finest logging museum**, you'll see rare and antique logging equipment dating to the 1880s, as well as more recent pieces.

From the **equestrian trailhead** located in the horse camp, you can ride north from the park across Fremont-Winema National Forest land to Jackson F. Kimball State Recreation Site and beyond.
