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## From the Desk of the Supervisor

**L**ast year, we established an ordinance review committee made up of Planning Commission members, Board members and residents to review Cannon Township's Zoning Ordinance. In 2008, the Zoning Ordinance was amended to include many restrictions that have proven to be both unpopular and unworkable. In many cases, the changes are indecipherable. This has led to confusion for both residents and zoning staff. That confusion has led, in turn, to complaints from current and past Zoning Administrators, as well as many residents.

**T**he committee is carefully addressing every word of the ordinance and, with the help of committee members, particularly those residents who deal with the ordinance, will recommend an overhaul of the ordinance sometime this Fall. We are employing a common sense approach that will match the

common sense possessed by most Cannon residents. In addition to listening, we are also reviewing the Zoning Ordinances of other communities and will borrow the approaches those communities have taken on various issues, and adapting them to fit Cannon's issues. Unfortunately, this factor has proven tedious, because like our current ordinance, most townships rely on verbosity to regulate zoning.

**A**t the conclusion of the Committee's work, it will forward a recommended amended Zoning Ordinance to the Planning Commission for consideration and recommendation to the full Board. With any luck, the residents of Cannon Township will have a streamlined, easy to understand Zoning Ordinance later this year.

We're waiting for word of a grant award (or not) for the extension from Townsend Park into Cannonsburg. We hope to know by the end of

June and plan to begin the construction process as soon as we know. It would be nice to complete that project before the snow flies!

### Bostwick Lake Park

The park is mowed and the trash emptied on a regular basis. We recently had the ground near the shoreline leveled and arranged to have the banks maintained on a regular basis. It is our hope that this will be a great spot for families to be able to enjoy Bostwick Lake. Please let me know if you encounter any problems. And remember – dogs are not allowed at the park!

### Township Center Park Property

You may remember that we received the promise of a grant award for improvements to this area. Unfortunately, since the funds are federal, we have to wait for additional

approvals before we can sign the contract and begin work. I have asked the state to look into granting us a waiver so we can get started before we actually sign the contract.

The grant will cover the creation of a parking lot, grassy play area, picnic pavilion, and accessible trail. I'm also waiting to hear the results of a grant to pay for a play area for preschoolers and should know about that in November.

Though still lacking a sign, there is a mountain bike trail that veers off to the right as you walk south from the trail head on the Township property. This mile-long trail can be used for walking or biking. I skied on it a couple of times last winter. Please try it out if you get a chance!

## Cemetery Update

The Cemetery Committee would like to thank Elaine Shupe, Pat Detmer, Ivan Judson, Bea Nestle, and Mary Lou Krampe for attending our April Visioning Meeting. These residents were an instrumental part of assisting us in prioritizing improvements to our cemeteries. Lawn maintenance in the Cannonsburg and Bostwick Lake Cemeteries were at the top of the residents' list. Cemetery Sexton and Landscaper, John Venman will be testing an organic liquid matter, Suma Groulx, which will provide liquid nutrition and maintain moisture for a healthier lawn. The product will be tested in a small area that has not been able to grow grass. If improvement is noticed the committee will investigate applying Suma Groulx over the entire lawn.

Another area of opportunity which arose from the meeting was a secondary water source at the Cannonsburg Cemetery. The water pump has been fixed, but is still not as easy to pump as it could be. The Committee has decided to place a 55 gallon water tank in an expanded enclosure on the property. This water will be for watering plants only; it will not be drinkable. A base needs to be built and the enclosure expanded before the tank can be placed. This project is expected to be completed by the end of June.

The Committee voted unanimously to increase the mole budget in both the Cannonsburg and Bostwick Lake Cemeteries. We recognize the moles are a challenge and we have an on-going program to address the issue.

**I**t seems nice to not have had a May election and not to have to worry about sending ballots out for an August primary. That gives the Clerk's Office a little breather. I've been using this time to catch up on filing and record-keeping.

**T**he recent sale of oil and gas leases in the Cannonsburg State Game area triggered a reaction in Cannon Township. Many local citizens are concerned that this type of drilling would affect their quality of life. Our Township Board listened and is taking action!

**C**annon Township has taken the leading edge in this area, passing a resolution for a six month moratorium on "**fracking**" (hydraulic fracturing) until we are able to update our ordinances to protect the health, safety, and welfare of our citizens as well as protect our water quality. Although townships cannot regulate oil and gas drilling itself, we are able to adopt ordinances that regulate related ancillary activities.

These include access roads and routes, storage tanks, ponds, pits, high capacity water wells, and certain pipelines. We can also regulate hours of operation, noise levels, and odors.

**D**uring this six-month period, Cannon officials are attending informational sessions conducted by FLOW – For Love of Water. These meetings are open to anyone who is interested. Please see our website for meeting information.

**S**peaking of our website – [www.cannontwp.org](http://www.cannontwp.org) – we have recently had some major upgrades. These changes do not affect the site itself, but have greatly changed the way information is added to the site. During this turnover, some links may have been broken or there might be data missing. # Summer Watershed News

## Watershed Education Incorporated Into ERMS Curriculum

*This May I had the privilege of working with 6th and 7th graders at East Rockford Middle School. A grant was awarded to ERMS by Groundswell (<http://www.gvsu.edu/coe/groundswell-great-lakes-stewardship-initiative-188.htm>) to incorporate watershed education into their curriculum. Nichol DeMol from Trout Unlimited and I presented lessons on what a watershed is, how we can protect the health of our watershed, and a few studies to determine if we are doing a good job protecting our lakes and streams.*

One study is looking at the macroinvertebrate (bug) population in a stream. The range of bugs and their numbers can tell us a lot about effects human impact is having on the stream. Another study involves taking samples of phosphorus and chlorophyll and measuring dissolved oxygen and temperature in a lake to determine if human impacts are speeding up the aging process of the lake. We took students down to Bostwick Lake and also got them into Bear Creek and Rum Creek to show them how these studies are done.

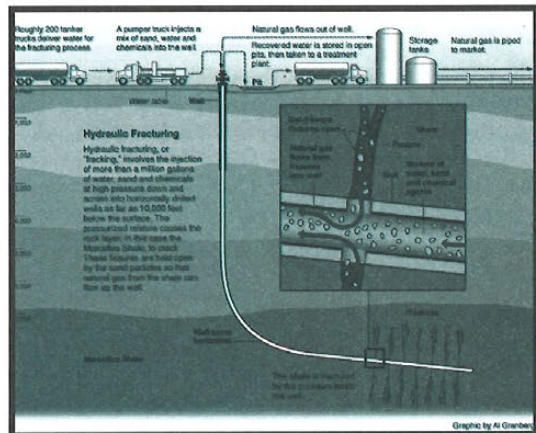

### Safety tips for grilling and campfires from the U.S. Fire Administration:

Every year Americans look forward to summer vacations, camping, family reunions, picnics, and the Fourth of July. Summertime, however, also brings fires and injuries due to outdoor cooking and recreational fires. Annually, there are almost 3,800 Americans injured by gas or charcoal grill fires. (Source: CPSC)

Summertime should be a time of fun and making happy memories. Knowing a few fire

safety tips and following safety instructions will help everyone have a safe summer.

### Residential Grill Fire Facts

- An estimated 5,700 grill fires occur on residential properties each year in the United States.
- Almost half (49 percent) of grill fires on residential properties occur from 5 to 8 p.m.
- Over half (57 percent) of grill fires on residential properties occur in the 4 months of May, June, July, and August.
- Thirty-two percent of grill fires on residential properties start on patios, terraces, screened-in porches, or courtyards.
- Place your grill a safe distance from play areas and keep children away from the grill area by declaring a three-foot "safe zone."

### Grill Safety

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills must only be used outdoors. If used indoors, or in any enclosed spaces such as tents, they pose both a fire hazard and the risk of exposing occupants to toxic gases and

potential asphyxiation.

- Position the grill well away from siding, deck railing, and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Place the grill a safe distance from lawn games, play areas, and foot traffic.
- Keep children and pets from the grill area: declare a three-foot "safe zone" around the grill.
- Put out several long-handled grilling tools to give the chef plenty of clearance from heat and flames when cooking.
- Periodically remove grease or fat buildup in trays below the grill so it cannot be ignited by a hot grill.

### Charcoal Grills

- Purchase the proper starter fluid and store out of reach of children and away from heat sources.
- Never add charcoal starter fluid when coals or kindling have already been ignited, and never use any flammable or combustible liquid other than charcoal starter fluid to get the fire going.

### Propane Grills

- Check the propane cylinder hose for leaks before using it



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for the first time each year. A light soap and water solution applied to the hose will reveal escaping propane quickly by releasing bubbles.

- If you determined your grill has a gas leak by smell or the soapy bubble test and there is no flame:
- Turn off the propane tank and grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not attempt to move the grill.
- All propane cylinders manufactured after April 2002 must have overfill protection devices (OPD). OPDs shut off the flow of propane before capacity is reached, limiting the potential for release of propane gas if the cylinder heats up. OPDs are easily identified by their triangular-shaped hand wheel.
- Use only equipment bearing the mark of an independent testing laboratory. Follow the manufacturers' instructions on how to set up the grill and maintain it.
- Never store propane cylinders in buildings or garages. If you store a gas grill inside during the winter, disconnect the cylinder and leave it outside.

### Fire Pits

In recent years, there has

been a new concern for the Fire Service - fire pits. Fire pits are known to be a great source of warmth and ambience. But, with the popularity of fire pits increasing, fire safety has become even more important. There are many things you should consider while setting up and using a fire pit.

- Keep away from flammable material and fluids such as gasoline, diesel fuel, kerosene, and charcoal lighter fluid or vehicles while in use.
- Do not use flammable fluids such as gasoline, alcohol, diesel fuel, kerosene, and charcoal lighter fluid to light or relight fires.
- Exercise the same precautions you would with an open fire. Do not allow children to use the fire pit. Keep children and pets away.
- Do not wear flammable or loose fitting clothing such as nylon.
- Do not burn trash, leaves, paper, cardboard, or plywood. Avoid using soft wood such as pine or cedar that likely pop and throw sparks. Use of seasoned hardwood is suggested.
- Before starting the fire, make sure that the lid will still close to extinguish the fire in case of emergency. Do not overload.
- Before you light the fire, check the wind direction.
- Keep a fire extinguisher or garden hose nearby.

### First Aid for Burns

For minor burns, take the

following action:

- Cool the burn. Hold the burned area under cool (not cold) running water for 10 or 15 minutes or until the pain subsides. If this is impractical, immerse the burn in cool water or cool it with cold compresses. Cooling the burn reduces swelling by conducting heat away from the skin. Don't put ice on the burn.
- Cover the burn with a sterile gauze bandage. Don't use fluffy cotton, or other material that may get lint in the wound. Wrap the gauze loosely to avoid putting pressure on burned skin. Bandaging keeps air off the burn, reduces pain and protects blistered skin.
- Take an over-the-counter pain reliever. These include aspirin, ibuprofen, naproxen or acetaminophen. Use caution when giving aspirin to children or teenagers. Though aspirin is approved for use in children older than 2, children and teenagers recovering from chickenpox or flu-like symptoms should never take aspirin.
- Talk to a doctor if you have concerns. (Source: Mayo Clinic)

### Campfires in Cannon Township

We receive many calls requesting burn permits for campfires. In Cannon Township, you do not need a burn permit for campfires as long as you are in compliance with the township ordinance. Ordinance NO. 2006-3 (An

Ordinance to amend the Cannon Township Open Burning Ordinance No. 95-22, as amended) states as follows:

### SECTION 3. OPEN BURNING

(e) Open fires used solely for cooking for immediate human consumption, or for recreation or ceremonial purposes, shall not be prohibited if the following conditions are satisfied:

- (i) any fire in excess of three feet across shall require an Open Burning Permit;
- (ii) such open fire shall not be composed in whole or substantial part of leaves or grass clippings; and
- (iii) such open fire shall use non-processed wood and shall not burn garbage or any material described in Section 4(f) of this Ordinance.

Additionally, the campfire should never be left unattended, or should be thoroughly extinguished before leaving. And, a protective steel rim or rock formation should be used to help control the size and fire exposure to its surroundings. The exact ordinance can be found at the following:

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# Cannon Township



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*By the end of last year, the Cannon Township Fire Department responded to 500 calls. Our average emergency response time for 2012 was 5 minutes 23 Seconds (this statistic includes calls outside of Cannon Township and non-emergency calls)*

## Here is a breakdown of our calls:

**Fires - 43** (Grass fires, Structure fires, Chimney fires, etc.)

**Rescue & Emergency Medical Service calls - 335**  
(Accidents, Ice rescues, EMS calls, etc.)

**Good Intent Call - 35**  
(Disregarded after dispatched, Authorized burning, etc.)

**Service Calls - 36**  
(Unauthorized burning, smoke investigation, lock outs, etc documents/1236703320\_725616.pdf All other fires within the township MUST be issued a burn permit by calling 874-9725.

**Hazardous Conditions (no fire) - 25** (Carbon Monoxide calls, Gas leak, Power line down, etc.)

**False Alarm - 26** (Malfunctioning alarm system, CO detector, etc.) Our average response

time is calculated based on when Kent County dispatches the department to when the department arrives on scene. Sometimes our delayed arrival is the direct result of not being able to find a street address.

Please take time to make sure that your address is clearly marked at your mailbox and/or the house numbers are visible from the street. If necessary, clear away any brush or tree limbs that may obscure your house numbers or prevent us from accessing your driveway.

As a service to the public, the Cannon Township Fire Department is still offering reflective street signs for \$10.00 per sign. Call 874-9725 or stop in our fire station on Belding Rd., next to the township hall, during normal business hours.

## Watch Out

As you are outside doing lawn work, take a minute and inspect your driveway for branch obstructions. This simple problem continues to plague our department when responding to calls and is addressed in the current township ordinance which states in general:

Driveways longer than 75 feet, to have a minimum of 20 feet wide and 14 feet high, cleared of all obstructions. The Cannon Township website has this ordinance in full detail under Chapter 19 Section 19.05 at

## Severe Weather Tips worth repeating:

During the next few months, the risk for severe weather will be at its annual highest. Severe weather means the atmospheric conditions are right for thunderstorms that can produce high winds, intense rainfall, large hail, lightning and even tornadoes. Take a minute and make sure you are familiar with the signs and warnings of springtime inclement weather. If nothing else, take this opportunity to discuss this section with the other members of the family so that they know where to go and what to do when the weather turns nasty.

The first step is knowing when severe weather is probable. Consult your local news stations, or NOAA to find easy downloadable applications (apps) for your handheld devices, laptops and computers.

Know the differences between a watch and a warning when the National Weather Service issues an alert.



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### The watches and warnings are defined as:

#### **Severe Thunderstorm Watch:**

Conditions are conducive to the development of severe thunderstorms in and close to the watch area.

**Severe Thunderstorm Warning:** A severe thunderstorm has actually been observed by spotters or indicated on radar and is occurring or imminent in the warning area.

**Tornado Watch:** Conditions are conducive to the development of tornadoes in and close to the watch area.

**Tornado Warning:** A tornado has actually been sighted by spotters or indicated on radar and is occurring or imminent in the warning area.

Planning will help make sure your family has a severe weather action strategy when bad weather strikes. This is especially important during the summer months when many children are home alone when the possibility of severe weather is the highest.

Make sure all members are familiar with the safest spot in your home, apartment or condominium. In most cases, the safest spot will be in the lowest floor of the home, in the smallest room without windows. It is also recommended that you have an emergency kit that contains a flashlight, a battery powered radio and extra batteries.

### Smart Summer Planning

As you start planning for those cookouts and fireworks, here are some tips to stay safe:

For fireworks, the Consumer Product Safety Commission offers these recommendations:

- Do not allow young children to play with fireworks under any circumstances. Sparklers, considered by many the ideal "safe" firework for the young, burn at very high temperatures and can easily ignite clothing. Children cannot understand the danger involved and cannot act appropriately in case of emergency.
- Older children should only be permitted to use fireworks under close adult supervision. Do not allow any running or horseplay.
- Light fireworks outdoors in a clear area away from houses, dry leaves or grass and flammable materials.
- Keep a bucket of water nearby for emergencies and for pouring on fireworks that don't go off.
- Do not try to relight or handle malfunctioning fireworks. Douse and soak them with water and throw them away.
- Be sure other people are out of range before lighting fireworks.
- Never ignite fireworks in a container, especially a glass or metal container.
- Keep unused fireworks away from firing areas.
- Store fireworks in a dry, cool place. Check instructions for special storage directions.
- Observe local laws.
- Never have any portion of your body

directly over a firework while lighting.

- Don't experiment with homemade fireworks.

### For cookouts:

- Keep grills away from anything that can burn, such as your house, car or dry vegetation.
- Keep all matches and lighters away from children.
- Make sure everyone knows how to Stop, Drop and Roll.
- Do not leave your grill unattended while it's cooking and keep children and pets away.
- For charcoal grills, only use starter fluid designed for grills. Never use gasoline and never add fluid to an already lit fire.
- Before using a gas grill, check the connection between the propane tank and the fuel line. Make sure the venturi tubes (where the air and gas mix) are not blocked.
