Twenty years ago, Erin Brockovich's name became synonymous with tenacity and determination as Julia Roberts portrayed her on the big screen. The real-life heroine, now 60, still feels overwhelmed by the fame that followed. In a new book, "Superman's Not Coming," she reflects on how her life changed after the film's release. In the movie, Brockovich takes on Pacific Gas and Electric Company over groundwater contamination in Hinkley, California. Today, at 60 with four grandkids, she continues to fight for clean water, acknowledging that her struggle is stronger than ever. "I haven't stopped" doing what I've been doing, she emphasizes. Brockovich's journey began after a serious traffic accident led her to lawyer Ed Masry's firm. She eventually became president of her own research and consulting firm, host of her podcast, and founder of the Erin Brockovich Foundation. Her foundation educates and empowers communities in their fight for clean water. Twenty years since the film's release, Brockovich notes that the problem is worse than she initially realized. "I couldn't really see then that it would be everywhere," she says, referring to chromium-6 contamination affecting nearly 200 million Americans across all 50 states. According to a 2016 report by Environmental Working Group, Erin Brockovich emphasizes that the issue of contamination is still widespread globally, not just in the US. She receives daily emails from concerned communities worldwide seeking solutions. In her latest book, she highlights everyday products with toxic chemicals, such as shampoos and baby lotions, cell phones, and Tupperware, among which asbestos, lead, mercury, radon, and formaldehyde are under-regulated. Brockovich shares stories of people and communities that have made a difference in various locations, including Hannibal, Missouri, Tonganoxie, Kansas, and Poughkeepsie, New York. She notes that despite progress, there are still many Hinkley, California-like situations out there. Interestingly, Brockovich's own story was the basis for the biopic Erin Brockovich, starring Julia Roberts as a single mother who fought against Pacific Gas & Electric's water-polluting practices in Hinkley, California. Here are some interesting facts about the film: * The biopic was inspired by Carla Santos Shamberg's chiropractor, who told her about Erin Brockovich. * The real Erin Brockovich wanted Goldie Hawn to play her in the movie. * Julia Roberts earned a record-breaking \$20 million for her role in the film. * Albert Finney initially declined the film but changed his mind after his girlfriend convinced him. Served fake Erin in the movie, but actual Brockovich appeared as "Julia" in one scene. Director Steven Soderbergh kept her and Roberts apart to avoid Roberts imitating her.
