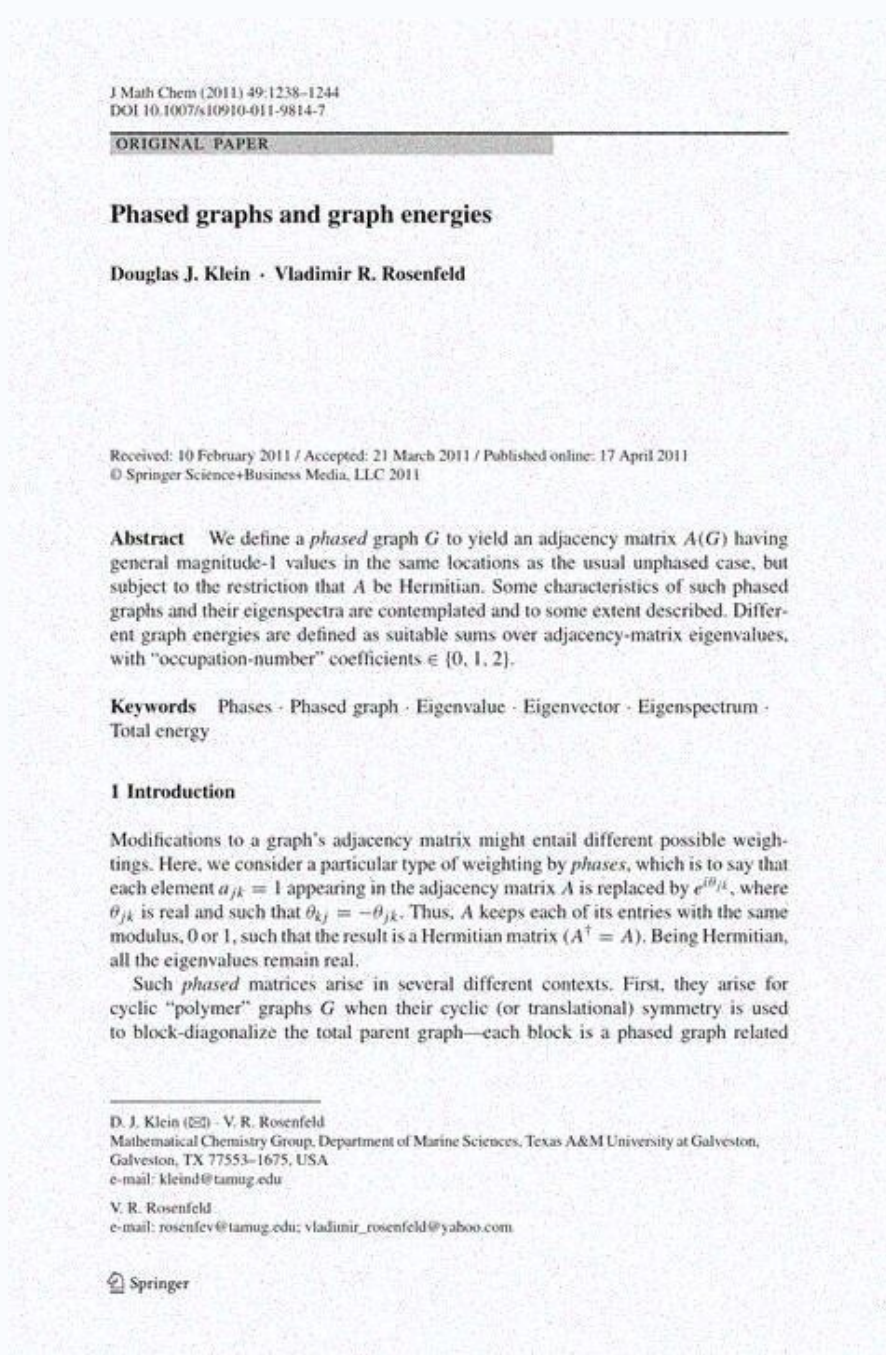

The custodial parent or guardian must then certify this in writing to the department. Additionally, the applicant must complete at least thirty hours of supervised driving practice, with at least ten of those hours being at night. If the applicant passes a certain examination and meets these requirements, they may be issued a class G driver license. A class G driver license allows the licensee to drive a motor vehicle that requires a class G license on public highways. However, for the first six months after obtaining the license, there are certain restrictions. For instance, the licensee cannot drive between 12:00 a.m. and 5:00 a.m. unless they are accompanied by a parent or legal guardian with a higher-level license, or if they are driving to or from a sanctioned school activity, their place of employment, or a family emergency. Another restriction is that for the first six months, the licensee cannot drive a motor vehicle containing more than one passenger under the age of eighteen, unless those passengers are siblings. Additionally, the licensee cannot use a wireless communication device while driving for any reason except in an emergency or when using an audible turn-by-turn navigation system. It's worth noting that if a peace officer has reasonable cause to believe there is another alleged violation of a motor vehicle law, they may stop or issue a citation to a person operating a motor vehicle on a highway. If the licensee is found responsible for violating any of these restrictions, they will receive a fine and potentially face other penalties. Finally, it's important to note that the department may not issue a class G driver license if the applicant has been found guilty of certain violations or has had their license suspended or revoked in the past. The department will impose fines up to \$75 for the first offense and extend any applicable restrictions by 30 days. If all restrictions are complete, the new period starts when the report of responsibility is received. For a second violation, the fine increases to \$100, and the restriction period extends to 60 days. Both periods can run consecutively if an extension was already in place. For a third or subsequent offense, the maximum fine remains at \$100, but the department will suspend the driving privilege for 30 days upon receiving the report of responsibility. If there's another suspension due to a moving traffic violation, they'll run concurrently. A citation can be dismissed if the licensee provides evidence that they were traveling to or from a sanctioned school activity, place of employment, religious event, or family emergency. For subsection E violations, the citation can be dismissed with proof that the passengers were siblings of the licensee. The restrictions do not apply after the license holder turns 18. Any penalties must still be satisfied even if the person is 18 or older. Finally, a class G license holder can apply for a class D license on or after their 18th birthday, unless they have a suspended class G license due to section 28-3321. To get a class M license or motorcycle endorsement, minors under 18 but at least 16 years old must wait until the suspension period is over. The department won't issue these licenses unless two conditions are met: Firstly, the applicant has held an instruction permit for at least six months, except those who already have a valid motorcycle driver's license from another state or jurisdiction. Secondly, either the person completes a motorcycle education program approved by the department or their custodial parent/guardian certifies in writing that they've done at least 30 hours of supervised motorcycle practice.
