If you don't have time for our simple title capitalization tool, there's another easy way to capitalize titles quickly. The M.I.N.T.S. acronym provides a set of rules for correct title capitalization: M - Months I - The pronoun "I" N - Names (people, places, etc.) T - Titles (books, movies, etc.) S - Start of sentences We've created printable templates for teachers to share with students or have them complete. You can use this anchor chart to teach your students which words need capital letters. Standards: Capitalize holidays, product names, and geographic names. Objective: To remember when to capitalize words in writing. Materials: * Peppermint candies (check for allergies first) * Mr. Sketch scented watercolor markers * Chart paper Method: Place a peppermint candy on each child's desk. Tell them they can eat it after the lesson. Ask students how they spell "MINTS." Print it in green capital letters across the top of the chart paper. As you discuss the capitalization rules, start each rule with a green capital letter, so the word "MINTS" appears as a title and down the left side of the chart paper. Right, let's start fresh. The main point is: names and titles get capitalized. Our school is actually located on Nelson Street - that's a name, so it needs capitalizing too. In writing, we follow some clear rules to make sure everything looks neat and tidy. We capitalize the "I" when it stands alone, and we also capitalize names like Nelson Street. And what about titles? We capitalize those as well! It's all pretty straightforward once you get the hang of it. Let me give you an example: if I write a sentence without capitalizing the first word, that's not right. We need to fix that and make sure everything starts with a capital letter where it should. Got it? Now, let's review our rules for capitalization - we've got some cool reminders to help us remember!
