Visiting Crete is a sensory adventure filled with the scents of rosemary, thyme, sage, lavender, and chamomile. An island brimming with beautiful flowers and stunning landscapes, there are around 2,000 species of plants, of which about 10% are endemic to Crete. The peak explosion of wildflowers occurs from March to May, when wild orchids and tulips are joined by chamomile, poppies, anemones, iris, field gladiolus, and much more, in bloom.

Crete's natural beauty is equalled only by the richness of its history. The island is the birthplace of the ancient Minoans, who ruled some 4,000 years ago. At the crossroads of three continents, Crete has been occupied by consecutive invaders. Evidence of this long history can be seen in Chania, where mighty fortresses preside over labyrinthine lanes and beautifully restored Renaissance mansions rub rafters with mosques and Turkish bathhouses.

In Crete, 'locavore' is not a trend but a way of life. Rural tavernas often produce their own meat, cheese, olive oil, raki and wine, and catch their own seafood. Explore Crete's rich botany, its ancient and modern history, its beautiful landscapes and delicious food and wine, and learn how all of these intertwine.

This journey has been organised for the University of Cambridge alumni and their friends and family. This tour is also open to alumni of Oxford University and their friends and family.

Itinerary 18 – 24 April 2027

B = Breakfast **L** = Lunch **D** = Dinner

6 nights Chania, Crete

Day 1: Chania (Sun, 18 April) **D**

Pm: Arrive and transfer to Porto Veneziano Hotel.

Eve: Listen to a brief background on the tour, followed by a welcome dinner.

Eve: At leisure

Day 2: Chania (Mon, 19 April) **B L** **Landscapes, Food and Wine of Crete**

Am: Following a short history briefing set out to explore Chania's old town on a **walking tour**. See the city's impressive 14th-century harbour and the 16th-century lighthouse. Learn about Crete's many influences, spanning Byzantine, Venetian, Ottoman and more.

Pm: Drive out to the foothills of the White Mountains and visit the **Botanical Park** of Crete, which spreads over 20 hectares. Its microclimate allows a wide range of plants and wildlife to thrive, including fruit trees, herbs, medicinal and ornamental plants. Meet with the owners of the park and learn about the history, landscapes and cuisine of Crete. See a **cooking demonstration**, learning about food

Day 3: Chania (Tues, 20 April) **B L** **Minoans and Crete's Classical History**

Am: Drive to Heraklion and visit the world-renowned **Bronze Age Palace of Knossos**, accompanied by a specialist guide. Visit the **Heraklion Archaeological Museum** which includes important finds from the island, including the Phaistos Disc and Minoan frescoes.

Pm: Enjoy a light lunch at a local taverna before returning to Chania.

Day 4: Chania (Wed, 21 April) **B L** **Wildflowers and the Real Crete**

Am: Discover the natural beauty and charm of rural Crete on a walk around orange groves in **Stylos** to see the springs and river which supply the Samaria table water.

Continue to **Kefalas** for a walk around the olive groves, taking in the serene landscapes and where you can expect to see wild native tulips, lupins, dwarf iris, anemones, and dragon lilies.

Pm: Lunch in Meterizi taverna in Kefalas village. Return to the hotel.

Day 5: Chania (Thur, 22 April) B L

The Battle of Crete

Am: Accompanied by a specialist guide, visit **Souda Bay war cemetery** and take part in a **tour tracing Operation Mercury** (the German Invasion of Crete). Learn about the role of Australian, New Zealand, British and German soldiers at the Battle of Crete. Continue to the Maleme area to visit see historical **Tavronitis Bridge, Hill 107** and the **German War Cemetery**.

Pm: Wine tasting and a light Lunch at **Manousakis winery**. Return to Chania and at leisure.

Day 6: Chania (Fri, 23 April) B D

Bridging the Gap, Greeks and Romans (and Wildflowers).

Am/Pm: At leisure to explore Chania further. Some walkable highlights include the **Chania Archaeological Museum, the Maritime Museum, the Synagogue or the Kipos cafe** which was once a private mansion and has a lovely garden with some impressive old trees. Alternatively spend a relaxing day on the beach or take to the water and enjoy a boat trip. If you wish to venture further afield travel along the coast to the **archaeological site at Aptera** to see the impressive Roman cisterns, ruins of Roman bath houses and a newly excavated theatre. It is also a wonderful site for wildflowers.

Eve: Farewell dinner at Ta Neoria.

Day 7: Chania (Sat, 24 April) B

Am: Depart Chania after breakfast.
