What's in your electric home?

All appliances, including a heat pump. I've acquired an electric frypan and an air fryer, which use less power than a hob or oven.

When did you start, and why?

I wanted to make the best use of assets. Transferring some financial assets from the bank to the roof would add to the value of the property and still give me a financial return. This has succeeded well beyond expectations, effectively giving me a weekly return in my hand that is well above standard investment rates - and tax free!

How much have you saved?

Power charges are down to a third of what I'd been paying, and this includes charging my EV. As the EV has few moving parts maintenance costs are negligible, so there's an extra saving. My battery is boosted at night when rates are lowest, and appliance timers (dishwasher and washing machine) are set for the sun.

What do you love most about it?

The freedom to enjoy a full life on a fixed income cannot be underestimated. Financial and social benefits gained mean that increasing electricity and petrol costs are not the worry they would be without solar. I have the power, it's from a clean source, and virtually maintenance free. Excess is exported for the benefit of others and my power account.


