Franklin County Fair Rules:

Please read carefully!!

- 1. The Fair committee or management will not assume any responsibility for injury or damage to persons exhibiting at the fair or to livestock or other projects exhibited. The fair committee or management will cooperate fully to make the exhibit pleasant and profitable.
- 2. The exhibitor must take care of his/her exhibits or plan to have the exhibits taken care of. The Fair Board will not assume responsibility for any loss or any other cause. However, all reasonable precautions will be provided to prevent such losses.
- 3. All animals must be groomed & otherwise prepared for a creditable exhibit. Exhibitors are responsible to certify that his/her animal(s) are disease free from any infectious, contagious or communicable disease and have not been exposed to any in the last 30 days. Cattle and horses must be well broken to the halter.
- 4. Milking cows may be taken from the fairgrounds after the dairy show on Friday afternoon. All other exhibits must remain on the grounds until Sunday.
- 5. Exhibitors not following check out rules will forfeit their premium money.
- 6. Any person under the influence of alcoholic beverages or drugs will not be permitted to exhibit or compete in any event at the Franklin County Fair.
- 7. It will be the exhibitor's responsibility to contact the super intendent of the department, to have his/her exhibit properly classified and entered. He/She should learn when animals are to be judged and have or arrange to have his/ her animal(s) in the show ring at the proper time.
- 8. Premiums will not be paid on any male animal kept for breeding purposes, which is not registered. Papers must be presented to the superintendent of the division upon request.

9. 4-H/FFA:

Livestock exhibitors may not enter Open Class without a separate entry.

- Crop exhibits must have a separate exhibit to enter in Open Class.
- You cannot enter both 4-H and FFA with the same project.
- 10. All entries must be on the Fair grounds in accordance with the Fair Book schedule.
- 11. Only those exhibitors owning livestock are permitted to stay on the fairgrounds overnight.

Youth staying overnight must always have a parent or a leader's supervision.

General Instructions

All youth must be enrolled in a 4-H project in Franklin County during the current year to be eligible to compete for various county awards. Each project or contest has its own guidelines. Consult the 4-H index to find project, contest and demonstration information. Please follow the instructions for entry and checkout. Late projects cannot be accepted due to the judging schedule. However, late projects may be exhibited in Junior Open Class.

4-H members must turn 9 years old within the calendar year.

Cloverbuds age 5-8 can enter projects, but no premium money will be received.

Follow Member Manual and complete the 4-H online record book or record sheet and all project requirements.

Foods

A poster can be exhibited at the Eastern Idaho State Fair without duplicating the food item. Record sheets should be in a resealable plastic bag. Food must be in a separate resealable plastic bag and sealed to avoid earwigs and other bugs. Note: For food items, either a poster (8 1/2" x 11") or a food item may be submitted.

********Horse Rules*******

- 1. No 4-H horse member may show unless they are enrolled in a 4-H horse project or FFA chapter in Franklin County.
- 2. Class divisions for Franklin County will be:

Junior 8-10 years old (8 years old as of December 31, 2024)

Intermediate 11-13 years old as of January 1, 2025

Senior 14-18 years old as of January 1, 2025, or in the 12th grade.

*An 8-year-old turning 9 during the current year is eligible to show.

- 3. 4-H exhibitors and parents will always act as ladies and gentlemen. Politeness is mandatory. Exhibitors will always keep their horse under control. NO exceptions.
- 4. To be eligible for either the 4-H Horse Show or Sho-Deo, members must have a record book entered (See Rule 23).

To be eligible to participate in the Sho-Deo, members must show in at least one (1) class in the county fair horse show or working ranch horse show.



- 5. 4-H members may use more than one horse as long as a supplement form is completed for each additional horse the 4-H member is entering. No horse/pony may be shown by more than one exhibitor in any one class. No exhibitor may show more than one horse/pony in any one class.
- 6. Only stallions born after January 1 of the current year may be shown.
- 7. Ponies 13.2 hands and under must show in the pony classes.

Ponies 13.2—14.2 hands may show in either the horse or pony classes, but not both.

- 8. Multiple rings shall be used as needed. Classes may not be held in order, so exhibitors must be ready and on call for each class.
- 9. Plain, long-sleeved western white shirt with a collar, blue jeans, and western boots with heels (slip on with hard soles) will be the only acceptable attire. A 4-H patch needs to be placed on the left shirt sleeve. Patches will be available to purchase at the Extension office. All 4-H and FFA members participating in any 4-H equestrian activity must wear an ASTM-SEI approved equestrian helmet whenever mounted on an equine, or are in a vehicle (cart, wagon, buggy, etc.) being pulled by an equine. Leaders and parents are also encouraged to wear helmets.
- 10. Spurs are permissible but must be dull with free moving rowels or bumper style. Spurs are allowed in all classes except halter showmanship. No tie-downs, side-pulls, quirts or bats are allowed.
- 11. There will be no chains used over the horse's nose, only under the chin in Halter Showmanship classes.
- 12. Spurs are permissible but must be dull with free moving rowels or bumper style. Spurs are allowed in all classes except halter showmanship. No tie-downs, side-pulls, quirts, or bats are allowed.
- 13. If a horse is a known kicker, it must wear a yellow ribbon on the tail head at all 4-H events.
- 14. Horses must be shown in performance classes with a standard western bit and either Romell or split reins. Snaffle bits/hackamores must be used in the snaffle bit/hackamore training classes. Leather curb straps and curb chains must be flat and at least 1/2 inch in width. No bridals with a nose band may be used. (See Extension Office for further details.)
- 15. Snaffle bit/hackamore classes will be for horses four (4) years old or under, and in the 1st or 2nd/3rd year of training. Youth must be the primary trainer of their own horse/pony. Horses/ponies are not eligible to enter any other riding events, except Working Ranch Horse. Horses are not to have been ridden or shown in a bit, other than a snaffle bit or hackamore. Horses must be ridden with two hands on reins. Bridles with loose ring, D ring, or egg butt snaffle or hackamore are the only ones permitted to be used in the class. A hackamore can only be used with a rawhide braid, leather braid, or rope bosal. Snaffle bits must not have shanks.
- 16. Use of behavior modifying drugs is prohibited. A veterinarian may be on the grounds investigating alleged violations. Suspicion of drug use will be investigated by the Show Committee. A test may be required, and the exhibitor disqualified.
- 17. Play Day entry fees not turned in by the deadline will be charged a \$5.00 late fee.

- 18. County Fair Horse Show entry forms and record books must be turned into the Franklin County Extension office by Monday, August 4th, by 5:00 p.m. No late entries will be accepted.
- 19. 4-H projects will be judged on the Danish system. Ribbons will be given for all classes. Payments will be made for one class in showmanship and one class in performance at the County Fair 4-H Horse Show.
- 20. Exhibitors wishing to exercise their horses may ride in the warm-up arena. No horses shall be ridden in the parking area, by the livestock sheds, or between the grandstands and the indoor arena or on the pavement. Exhibitors not complying with this rule may be dismissed from further competition by the show committee.
- 21. Eastern Idaho State Fair participants: Showmanship classes (Junior, Intermediate and Senior) will be limited to one entry per age division from each qualifying county show. Contestants in all classes will be county blue ribbon winners. Each county will be allowed to send two (2) entries in each performance class, except Western Reining and Western Horsemanship. In addition, one entry will be allowed for each ten (10) contestants participating in that class at the county horse show. (1-10=2, 11-20=3) The Western Reining and Western Horsemanship classes allow one entry per 10 contestants. Exhibitors qualifying for both Western Reining and Western Horsemanship may enter only one.
- 22. Good showmanship shall always prevail. Unnecessary roughness, abuse of horses, or animals that pose a danger to others may result in dismissal of the 4-H exhibitor from further competition. The judge shall advise ring steward to dismiss violators.
- 23. Record Books: 4-H members are required to submit their online record book by Monday, August 5th

Franklin County 4-H & FFA Market Animal Sale

The annual 4-H/FFA Market Animal Sale will be held on Friday, August 15th, in the livestock auction arena at the Franklin County Fairgrounds at 4:30 p.m. Preregistration for buyers will begin at 3:30 p.m. at the sale table.

********Market Animal Rules******

1. To be eligible to sell an animal at the Market Animal Sale, members of 4-H clubs and FFA chapters of Franklin County MUST reside in Franklin County for six months prior to the fair. The market animal must be housed in Franklin County after the beginning weigh-in.

2. Any use of drugs or substances not approved and labeled by the FDA is strictly prohibited. The use of tranquilizers, sedatives or depressants are not allowed. All 4-H/FFA market animals may be subject to testing for substances that violate the standards established by the FDA, FSIS, USDA, and/or EPA. Any violation results in the member's forfeiture of any premium, award, and/or auction proceeds, and will be prohibited from further participation in the Franklin County Fair 4-H/FFA Livestock Events. The use of approved drugs, including antibiotics, must be recorded in the record book. Exhibitors are responsible for ensuring that any drugs administered to market animals meet the withdrawal period prior to sale day. Grand and Reserve champions for market beef, lamb, swine, and goat may be tested for illicit drugs immediately following the market class for the respective species.

CARE OF ALL LIVESTOCK ANIMALS WILL BE CONSISTENT WITH PRODUCTION PRACTICES AND ACCEPTED STANDARDS. EXHIBITORS MUST OBSERVE WITHDRAWAL PERIODS AND BE AWARE OF PENALTIES ASSOCIATED WITH OFF-LABEL USE OF ALL DRUGS.

- 3. Each 4-H/FFA member whose animal does not make weight is encouraged to show their animal in the fitting and showing class and turn in a completed record book. This will complete their project and make members eligible for boost money.
- 4. Each 4-H/FFA member must show his/her animal in both Showmanship and Quality Classes to participate in the Market Animal Sale. The 4-H/FFA member is also expected to be present for the Market Animal Sale. Members who cannot be present for the sale may have an alternate show their animal in the sale but will be fined a 10% penalty of the sale price for their animal. Fine proceeds will go to the Franklin County Market Animal Sale Committee to support Franklin County 4-H/FFA Livestock Program. Dismissal of an animal at the show or sale is at the discretion of the species superintendent. In the event an animal dies, the member should contact the Extension office to determine what is required to finish the project.
- 5. 4-H/FFA members must wear a plain white button-up shirt with a collar and a 4-H patch on the left shoulder or an FFA jacket and nice jeans or slacks at the Shows and Sale. Patches will be available for purchase at Extension Office. NO shorts or tank tops will be allowed.
- 6. Record Books: 4-H members are required to submit completed online record books. Online record books must be completed with the exception of information needed from the sale by Monday, August 4th. No sale money will be awarded unless they are completed and submitted.
- 7. A member may only sell one market animal, whether beef, swine, lamb, meat goat or bucket calf at the Franklin County Fair. Members need to declare what animal they are selling 2 hours after the last quality class of the day. The grand and reserve champions ARE REQUIRED to sell and will be sold first. In the event a member wins grand or reserve champion in multiple species, that member must select which animal to sell. Their other champion animals will be recognized during the sale but will not be allowed to sell.
- 8. Members may show/sell an animal until the calendar year in which they turn nineteen.
- 9. Each 4-H/FFA member is required to have a brand inspection slip or bill of sale for each beef animal (including bucket calves) at the beginning and final weigh-in.
- 10. All beef must be secured with a substantial halter and rope in assigned stalls. No pens will be available for beef. Other market animals will be assigned pens by club and chapter at the fair. Clubs and chapters are encouraged to decorate their area.

- 11. Exhibitors are to provide their own feed and bedding. All animals must be clean and well groomed. Members and their parents are responsible for cleaning in and around the stall area, as well as exhibiting and caring for their animals until they are removed from the fairgrounds on Sunday. Stalls must be kept clean, and livestock must have sufficient food and water provided at all times. Animals will be loaded Sunday morning. Violation of this rule will result in a \$30.00 fine for each occurrence and will be withheld from livestock checks.
- 12. Stall clean up must be completed between Sunday 8:00 am to Monday 6:00 pm. No one will be allowed into the stall area to clean until all animals have been removed from the fairgrounds, or upon species superintendent approval. **NO EXCEPTIONS! Fine for not cleaning your stall will be withheld from livestock checks.**
- 13. Leader's responsibilities:
 - A. Assist with club and fair activities.
 - B. Assure that the record books are completed and submitted by the Friday following the sale.
 - C. Make sure club members have cleaned stalls/pen after animals are removed from fairgrounds.
 - D. Make sure thank you notes to buyers are written and taken to the Extension Office with postage for verification. **The thank you notes will be sent from the Extension Office.**

14. ENTRY WEIGH-IN

Yearly 4-H enrollment fees are to be paid at the Extension Office prior to entry weigh-ins. There will be a \$10.00 fee per animal, charged at each species beginning weigh-in. Leader and member enrollments are due as soon as possible but no later than July 1 of the current year. Unless the Extension Office has your enrollments, you are not considered a 4-H club or member and are not covered by 4-H for liability purposes. 4-H members are required to attend a minimum of 6 hours of club instruction.

Beef should be born after January 1 of the preceding year. No older animal can be entered. Beef projects may be a steer or heifer and must have a minimum of 2.25 lb. average daily gain to be eligible for sale. For safety reasons, it is strongly recommended that all beef be halter broken at the beginning weigh-in.

Only one spare animal per individual can be weighed in. Spare animals may be used by immediate family members only.

15. SUGGESTED WEIGHT AT ENTRY WEIGH-IN:

Beef.....750 lbs. to 900 lbs. Swine....60 lbs. to 80 lbs. Lamb.....80 lbs. to 90 lbs. Market Goat...45 lbs. to 50 lbs.

Beef....157 days Swine...122 days Lamb....66 days Meat Goat....66 days



Each member must indicate which animal is his/hers at weigh-in. All animals must be ear-tagged at entry weigh-in.

16. FINAL WEIGH-IN

Weight eligibility will be established at the final weigh-in on Tuesday of the Fair. Lambs and goats must be dry and un-blanketed at weigh-in. Pigs, beef, market goats and bucket calves must also be clean. One re-weigh may be done immediately before being taken back to the pen.

The Market Animal Committee reserves the right to limit the number of animals in the sale. **White ribbon animals will not sell.**

Weight Limits on the scale:

Beef— min. weight of 1070 lbs. min. Average Daily Gain must be 2.25 lb. or higher max. weight of 1300 lbs. is recommended

Swine—min. weight of 220 lbs. max. weight of 285 lbs. is recommended

Lamb—min. weight of 107 lbs.
max. weight of 140 lbs. is recommended

Market Goat—min. weight of 60 lbs.

- 17. Floor price for each division will be established before the sale according to bids received by the Market Animal Committee. A commission fee of \$25.00 will be deducted from the sale price of each animal to enable the Market Animal Committee to pay for sale expenses. A brand inspection fee will be deducted from beef and bucket calf checks if necessary. Members who cannot be present for the sale may have an alternate show their animal in the auction but will be fined a 10% penalty of the sale price for their animal.
- 18. Livestock checks not cashed after 90 days from issue will be voided.
- 19. All entries are accepted with the understanding that neither the fair board nor the livestock committee shall be held responsible for any damage or loss that may occur to personal property or livestock on exhibit or for sale. Checks will be distributed Friday, October 17th.

Any deviation from the rules will be referred to the livestock superintendent and committee.

********Bucket Calf Rules*******

- 1. Exhibitors must be currently enrolled in 4-H and turn 9 years old within the calendar year. Exhibitors cannot turn 13 in the current calendar year.
- 2. Calves must be born after March 1st, 2025, and before April 12th, 2025.
- 3. The 4-H'er must own the calf by April 12, 2025.
- 4. One spare animal per individual may be weighed in on April 12th. Beginning weight shall not be more than 175 lbs. Only one animal may be sold, whether it be beef, bucket calf, swine, meat goat or lamb.



- 5. A bucket calf is any breed of steer and must be weaned from its mother and off milk by final weigh in.
- 6. No bulls will be accepted at the final weigh-in.
- 7. Exhibitor may show only one bucket calf during the Fair.
- 8. This is considered a beef project; beef breed showmanship will be used.
- 9. Each 4-H member is required to complete their project to sell their animal.
- 10. Exhibitor must wear a plain white button up shirt with a collar and a 4-H patch on the left shoulder and nice jeans or slacks at the show. Patches will be available to purchase at the Extension office. Shorts or tank tops will NOT be allowed.
- 11. Exhibitors may elect to keep or sell the calf. Your decision to sell or retain the calf must be given to the committee at final weigh-in. The Grand and Reserve Champion ARE REQUIRED to be sold in the livestock auction.
- 12. Members must have a bill of sale or brand inspection with them on the day of the final weigh-in.
- 13. The project terminates on Monday when the calf has been picked up by the buyer, you have cleaned your stall, and it has been checked off by a committee member.
- 14. The 1st, 2nd and 3rd place showmen will be designated for Round Robin participation.
- 15. Record Books: 4-H members are required to submit their record book online by Friday, August 22nd. No sale money will be awarded unless it is submitted online.
- 16. All entries are accepted with the understanding that neither the fair board nor the livestock committee shall be held responsible for any damage or loss that may occur to personal property or livestock on exhibit or for sale.
- 17. Exhibitors are to furnish their own feed and bedding. Stalls must be kept clean, and livestock must have sufficient food and water provided at all times. Members are responsible for cleaning out their stalls before Monday, August 18th at 6:00 pm. Violation of this rule will result in a \$30.00 fine for each occurrence and will be withheld from the member's check.
- 18. No one will be allowed into the stall area to clean until all the animals have been removed from the fairgrounds, or upon superintendent's approval. **NO EXCEPTIONS!**
- 19. Livestock checks that are not cashed after 90 days from issue will be voided.




