


Effects of Divorce on Society

Divorce adversely affects society by

- 1. Diminishing the child's future competence.
- 2. Weakening the family structure.
- 3. Contributing to early sexual experimentation leading to increased costs for society.
- Adversely affecting religious practice—divorce diminishes the frequency of religious worship.
- 5. Diminishing a child's learning capacity and educational attainment.
- 6. Reducing the household income.
- Increasing crime rates and substance use, with associated societal and governmental costs (<u>Waite and Gallagher 2000</u>).
- 8. Increasing risk for school suspensions, "Persons in Need of Supervision" status, binge drinking, and marijuana use (<u>Demuth and Brown 2004</u>; <u>Eckenrode, Mrcynyszyn, and Evans 2008</u>; <u>Osborne, Manning, and Stock 2007</u>).
- 9. Increasing emotional and mental health risks, including suicide.

Relationship Quality and Marital Status Among U.S. Adults With Children



The first item codes a relationship as strong and loving if rated a 7 or higher on a zero-to-10 scale, where 10 is the strongest and most loving relationship they can imagine and zero the least. The second item asks: "In the past 30 days, how many days have you felt like you could not speak to your spouse/partner because you were angry with them or they were angry with you?"

Sample size is 5,881 U.S. adults who are in an exclusive relationship and live with at least one child aged 3 to 19, from the Gallup Familial and Adolescent Health Survey, June-July 2023.

In 2005, the most comprehensive study on the economics of marriage was published. Written by Jay Zagorsky, the report, *Marriage and Divorce's Impact on Wealth*, closely followed the net worth of individuals throughout their 20s, 30s and early 40s, and found that the wealth of married respondents increased by around 14 percent for each year they were wed. "Compared to being single, married people almost doubled their wealth, increasing it over 93 percent," said Zagorsky.
