

I'm human



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"God's children are all one and the same, and we should not be divided. We were created by God to be His family, just like siblings. We should not compare ourselves with others or compete against each other, for we are all equal in God's eyes. Instead, let us work together as one family, following God's guidance. We are not our own creators; rather, God has a plan and purpose for each of us. He is the one who has given us life, and it is up to us to follow His ways. Let us put aside our differences and come together as one people, united under God's guidance. Rather, we must trust in God's mercy and goodness, and leave the outcome to His sovereign will. In the past, I have experienced God's laws and rules. At first, I didn't understand why God's ways were so mysterious (7:8). However, as I grew in my faith, I began to grasp God's purposes and plans for me (7:9-10). But even with this understanding, I still struggled with the difficulties and challenges of life. Now, I realize that these struggles are a part of God's plan for me, and that He is always working everything out for my good (7:11-12). The Bible says that we should not ask questions about why bad things happen to us, but rather trust in God's sovereignty and goodness (7:13).
