

PRESIDENT'S REPORT: CLINT MCGHIE

It is my pleasure to present the Scarboro Surf Life Saving Club Annual Report for the 2024/25 season and highlight some of Scarboro SLSC's achievements over the past year.

The Club has once again upheld its core commitment to protecting the swimming public at Scarborough Beach. I am very proud of the outstanding service we provide on one of WA's busiest and at times, most dangerous beaches, running two separate flagged areas for much of the season. In 2024/25, our members recorded nearly 10,000 patrol hours and performed 191 rescues which was roughly 25% of the total rescues in WA. Thank you to all of our patrolling members who have contributed this season, particularly our Patrol Captains and Vice Captains for leading our patrols and maintaining the high standards.

Our Education and Training team once again excelled, ensuring we have the necessary skills on patrol. This season, 44 members obtained their Bronze Medallion, and 37 members earned their Surf Rescue Certificate, along with many higher awards, adding to the core and specialised skill sets required to run our patrols. Thank you to all of our trainers and assessors for their tireless efforts this season, going above and beyond to accommodate our members.

This Season it has also been pleasing hear of a number of rescues performed by our Club members outside of normal patrol hours! This is a reminder of the skills of our members and the value of a Surf Life Saving club at Scarborough beach.

Thank you to the Beach Operations Committee who have overseen the Lifesaving and Education areas, making sure Members are well trained and have the best possible resources at their disposal to perform their roles.

Congratulations to Chris Kuster who was a very deserved winner of the SLSWA Trainer of Year at the 2024/25 Awards of Excellence in June 2025, a testament to his ongoing commitment.

The Board has continued its focus on the growth and investment in our Nipper and Youth programs, recognising the importance they hold as our future lifesavers, competitors and leaders.

In 2024/25, Scarboro again had in excess of 630 members under the age of 18. Providing pathways to the broad range of activities available in Surf Life Saving remains critical to retaining our Youth through to Senior membership. Pleasingly, we have seen 80%+ retention in our 13 to 15 year old members and 70%+ retention in our 15 to 18 year old members from 2023/24 to 2024/24. This is a testament to the efforts of our Youth Engagement Team, Age Group Managers and Surf Sports Coaches, who have created a Youth program to engage our young members and support their transition from Nippers into the Senior Club. I am encouraged by this and excited for the future as we see some bigger cohorts of Nippers begin to transition to Youth.

The Woodside Nippers program at Scarboro has enjoyed another strong season. The surf skills displayed by our youngest members is a testament to the dedication of our coaches who run a fantastic program, as evidenced by our strong 4th position at the Nippers states.

Our Starfish Nippers, under the guidance of Ali Nielsen, again delivered a rewarding and inclusive program for children and young people living with disability to experience Surf Life Saving at Scarborough Beach. I was very proud when Ali presented on Scarboro's Starfish Nippers program at the SLSWA President's meeting in September 2024 and she captured the room as she explained the meaning and benefits of the program.

Thank you to all of the officers and age group managers who contribute to the Nippers and Youth program. Thank you also to the parents for bringing your Nippers and Youth to the Club, enabling them to participate and for getting involved with the Club yourselves.

I would like to congratulate Jack Brohman who has been recognised for his contribution with his selection on the SLSWA Youth Committee, a new advisory committee exploring youth member retention and innovative youth development programs.

The Surf Sports Committee continues to work hard to develop our Surf Sports program. We were lucky to secure the services of Heath Wright as our Head Coach early in the season, and have seen an increase in participation across our Youth members. The Club sent its biggest Touring Team to the Aussies for a number of years which was great to see.

A big thank you to the Surf Sports Committee and to all our coaches and officials for their efforts in driving the development and growth of our Surf Sports program.



Congratulations to all of our members who competed for the Club over the season across the multitude of events, and special call out to Jose Desfosses for his Aussies gold medal in the 70-74 Years Male 1km Beach Run.

This season we were very pleased to welcome Stelio Eleftheriou as our new Director Member Services. Stelio had only been in the Club for few years and he has brought a welcome fresh approach to the Board. The Member Services team does a lot of work behind the scenes and is particularly focused on ensuring that our members and their guests can enjoy the Club in a safe and respectful manner.

One area of the Member Services portfolio that is not 'behind the scenes' is the 'Social Scene'. This season saw the return of an enthusiastic and hard working Social Committee led by Michele Gates, who put on a range of events throughout the season that were well attended and enjoyed by all. This culminated in the 'Havana Nights' themed Annual Dinner that was hosted at the Club for the first time in our new Club Rooms. It was a fantastic night and opportunity to recognise those members who contributed and achieved in outstanding ways over the course of the season.

I would like to make special mention of Cheryl Harry, our Education Officer, who was presented the Life Members Trophy for the Most Enthusiastic Member at the Annual Dinner. This award is for individuals who exemplify unwavering enthusiasm and exceptional contribution throughout the season. Cheryl's commitment has been nothing short of extraordinary this season. As a Patrol Captain, Trainer, and Assessor, she volunteered an incredible 146 hours of service whilst also leading our Education Program that saw a huge number of new and requalified awards. Thank you Cheryl.

Our ability to maintain our privileged position on Scarborough Beach and to be able to provide the services to both the public and our members is reliant on our Partners and Sponsors. First and foremost, our appreciation goes to City of Stirling, our major partner, with whom we have a very close relationship. As a result of this substantial support and disciplined investment, we remain in a strong financial position. However, the Club is not immune to the substantial increases in costs seen over the last





couple of years and the Board is not satisfied to just maintain the status quo, year-in year-out. Capitalising on the 'Sustainable' pillar in our Strategic Plan, the Board has commenced work on the development of a business plan to ensure that we remain financially viable well into the future by strengthening our core income streams, including the function centre, sponsorships, investments, grants, and lifesaving services. This process is aimed at ensuring the Club's long-term sustainability and our ability to continue delivering high-quality services to members and the public.

As I write this, we are very close to launching the first major upgrade of our website in many years. This has been a big undertaking due to the volume of content and I am hopeful that the fresh new look will provide external viewers a snapshot of what our Club offers as well as providing a current information source for members for a number of years to come. I would like to thank Sammi Marshall from The Little Workshop, who is also one of our members, for her significant contribution and patience on this project.

Thank you to our admin team for their invaluable support behind the scenes. We really appreciate the above and beyond efforts this season from Functions Officer Sharon Walshaw, Admin Officer Trina Cullen (who departed in February), Facilities Support Officer Deb Buscall and Kate Irwin (who joined us as Admin Officer in March). Your work keeps the Club running smoothly and supports all of the Directors, Officers and Members. Thank you.

To all our Officers, volunteers and members: thank you. Your willingness to step forward is what keeps our Club strong and is much appreciated. If you are considering volunteering in 2025/26, I encourage you to connect with one of our Directors.

Finally, I would like to thank our Directors, Matthew Watson, Melissa Dalziell, Marnie Glasson, Belinda Kuster, Stelio Eleftheriou, Tanya Channell and Graham Jones. Without your significant contribution and support for one another, it would not be possible to run such a large Club.

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DIRECTOR OF FINANCE REPORT: MATTHEW WATSON

The 2024/2025 season continued the trends of recent seasons, steady growth, stability, and investment.

Key Financial Highlights:

- Membership revenue increased from \$154k to \$159k.
- Cash and cash equivalents increased by \$13k to \$562k (including term deposits).
- Revenue of \$215k from ancillary operations (functions, merchandise, canteen, and bar).
- Sponsorship, grants, donations and fundraising efforts of \$102k.
- Lifesaving and patrol efforts contributed approximately \$96k from water safety and patrol services.
- \$66k invested in new equipment for education, lifesaving operations and competitors.

This season, Michele took on the dual role of Membership Officer and Social Officer, making a substantial impact across both areas.

DIRECTOR OF BEACH OPERATIONS REPORT: BELINDA KUSTER

I'd like to thank our patrolling members for their service this season. It has been a long warm summer, with some big days and multiple incidents.

I'd especially like to thank those members who have used their lifesaving skills outside of patrol hours to keep our beach safe and save lives. Many of our members have been recognised with coastal bravery award nominations this year, including Austin Wyeth for running up to the club, getting a board, paddling out and rescuing 1 of 2 struggling swimmers; Zoe Doyle, for recognising a neurodiverse adult who was struggling while she was out paddling her board on a mess around session, and handed over her board to him and coached him back to shore. Also, the team of Brad Aggiss, Robert Howard, Rory Watson, Michele Gates and Xande Cuneo who, before patrol, saw a commotion at Brighton and raced down to help, arriving as surfers were bringing an unconscious, paralysed man out of the surf. The team took over, stabilising the man's neck, providing first aid assistance and reassurance to the man and his family who were on the beach, waiting on ambulances, and worked with CoS Beach Inspector and Scarboro member Andreas Kolm to keep the man safe and breathing after fracturing two vertebrae - one in his neck and one in his upper back. Due to this team's diligence and care, the man is able to walk again.

We had a busy season, with **9611** hours of volunteer service given. We also had 56 NRC holders provide **2912** hours of volunteer service looking after the nippers on Sunday mornings which freed up our patrol to look after the public.

I'd also like to thank our major sponsor Rendezvous, who this year provided a \$500 voucher to Straits Café to thank our Patrol Captains for their season of service. Our captains enjoyed dinner together in June and are already planning for next season.

We will be receiving a new ATV from SLSWA to start the new season in 2025-26. We also received two new IRB's this season to add to our competition and patrolling service. These new boats were named after two members who have provided outstanding service to the club, not necessarily in the IRB sphere, but often over the wider club space, going above and beyond the normal expectations of a club member and providing prolonged and valued service to the club. In Angus McMillan's case, it was for dedication to lifesaving as the Beach Operations Director for four years, Lifesaving Officer for one year, Vice-Captain and Patrol Captain, as well as competing for the club in IRB competitions at State and National level, winning Gold and Bronze medals at State level, and was named SLSWA Lifesaver of the Year in 2020.

Terence (TC) Colby is synonymous with patrolling at Scarboro and is a fixture in the truck and his "office"; the first aid room. TC was the Education Officer from 2008-2014, won Club Trainer of the year in 2012, and Assessor of the Year in 2013 and 2017, and Club Officer of the Year in 2016. He volunteered many hours for Scarboro when we hosted Aussies in 2014 and 2018 and then took on the role of Lifesaving Officer in 2014, providing a constant presence on the beach, topping up uniform supplies (especially patrol caps when members "forgot" them when arriving for patrol), and has kept the beach vehicles fuelled over many summers. TC has decided that this will be his last year in the official role of Patrol Officer, and is stepping down, however I'm sure we will still be able to see him around the first aid room and keeping us all on our toes with an inappropriate joke or two as the club would not be the same without him. I would like to thank him on behalf of the Beach Operations Committee and the club in general for his years of volunteering for us and wish him a happy 'retirement' from the Beach Operations Committee.

Finally, while we missed out on winning the SLSWA Patrol Club of the Year award for best patrolling club on the coast, I'm confident that our excellent trainers provide outstanding education, as evidenced by both Cheryl Harry and Chris Kuster being finalists in the SLSWA Awards of Excellence, with Chris taking home the SLSWA Trainer of the Year award this year. PATROL OFFICERS REPORT: TERRY COLBY & NATTI MCBAIN

This season marked another successful year of volunteer lifesaving service at Scarborough Beach.

Across the 2024/2025 patrol season, our members recorded a commendable **9,611 patrol hours**, reflecting a consistent contribution to public safety. A total of **191 rescues** were performed, with the **IRB** (50), **RWC** (57), **Rescue Board** (39), **Rescue Tube** (37) and **Other/No-Gear Rescuer** (8). These figures reflect a strong operational capability across our patrol teams in diverse surf conditions.

Preventative actions (6405) remained a key focus, with patrols undertaking thousands of interventions to ensure beachgoer safety prior to escalation.

We continued to see an impressive level of engagement from Patrol Captains and Vice Captains who ensured rostered teams ran efficiently. Education and requalifications were again essential to maintaining operational readiness, and we thank Cheryl Harry and her training team for another excellent year of award delivery and member development.

A particular highlight this season was the ongoing success of our Champion Patrol initiative, which once again recognised the commitment and excellence of teams across all patrol groups.

We also need to sincerely thank Terry Colby (TC) for his years of service as Patrol Officer. TC's leadership and tireless dedication to the operations of beach patrols has been instrumental in building the culture and consistency of our service delivery. We wish him all the best and extend our deepest gratitude for his lasting contributions.

Finally, thank you to all patrolling members — from our new Bronzies to our long-standing veterans — for your continued commitment to keeping Scarborough Beach safe. Your efforts are noticed and appreciated by the community and the Club alike.

Courses & Highlights

We started the season once again with the Rapid SRC to Bronze Medallion course, with 15 youthies giving up a week of school holidays to get their Bronze done early. It's fair to say I was very impressed as they brought the energy and smashed it out, making it a great week for trainers and candidates alike—thanks to Peter Hilgendorf for teaming up with me to deliver this.

The very next week we held the first Rapid SRC course for



the Under 14s. Unfortunately, mother nature was not on our side as we found it difficult to get into the water. But the crew powered through, finishing strong despite being bounced between the club and Hillarys for water skills. Thanks to Rory Watson for leading the charge on this one.

Rory and Chris Kuster also ran a second Rapid SRC course in the December school holidays for those who missed the first round—9 more youthies ticked off.

These school holiday courses aren't without their challenges they rely heavily on our trainers adjusting their weekly schedules, sometimes even taking time off work or putting in hours after hours to make it all happen. But the effort is worth it.

The energy, commitment, and outcomes speak for themselves and we've already locked in the October 2025 program!

Across the season, the rest of our Bronze and SRC courses ran using a collaborative model. Trainers pitched in across the board, with courses sometimes running concurrently with Powercraft courses. This team-first approach gave new and probationary trainers the chance to learn and diversify, building confidence and capability across the board, while also providing high-quality courses.

Another example of adaptability and commitment to education saw us running separate wet sessions for our final Bronze course to accommodate a group of prospective surf boat rowers. This flexible delivery meant they could juggle external commitments and still get their Bronze Medallion allowing us to field boat crews at State Titles.

Big thanks to Michele Gates, Rory Watson, and Paul Rosser for helping me make this work—your support in this extraordinary situation is appreciated beyond words.

Other Highlights

• 31 parents earned their Nipper Rescue Certificates this season—adding another layer of safety to our Nippers program. Thanks to Graham Jones, Craig McLure and

Rory Watson for co-ordinating.

- First Aid (HLTAID011) was once again offered free thanks to SLSWA grants. These courses were once again delivered by Belinda Kuster. Her expertise and commitment to First Aid is second to none.
- Bel also extended her impact into the wider community, running external sessions at a local school and Basketball WA—an awesome show of community spirit.

Stepping Things Up

In an example of continuous improvement, we expanded our ART course from a short 2-hour weeknight session to a more robust 4-hour weekend version. We also expanded the team for this course to support Bel Kuster who's held down the fort for years.

- Chris Kuster renewed his ART Facilitator award
- Cheryl Harry (yours truly!) added ART to the training toolkit

We also saw the exciting addition of Silver Medallion Aquatic Rescue (SMAR) to our course list, complementing the Silver Medallion Patrol Captain (SMPC) course introduced last year.

Led by Chris Kuster with support from Rory Watson and Andrew Dennehey, this course welcomed candidates from Scarboro, Floreat, City of Perth, and Yanchep—a true example of cross-club collaboration.

Powering Up Powercraft

This year saw increased collaboration and growth within the Powercraft space. The team went from strength to strength this season, growing both in numbers and capability:

- Will Morgan gained his IRB Driver trainer
- Rory Watson completed IRB Crew trainer
- Damian O'Donnell picked up IRB Crew and RWC trainer quals

There are also a number of probationary trainers well on their way to completion.

In addition to training IRB Crew courses, Chris Kuster and



Damian O'Donnell expanded their involvement by joining Reece Vogels and David Thomson in training IRB Drivers and RWC operators.

FIRST AID OFFICER REPORT SHANE POWER

A reasonably busy season for 24/25 with First Aid cases treated 206 with 14 incidents (serious) that required transport to hospital. A quick snap shot of incidents requiring first Aid Near Drownings Medical x 4 Fractures/Dislocations x 9 Spinal Injuries x 8 Beach Injuries x 15 Craft Rider x 8 Oxy Viva Oxygen used x 12 Methoxyflurane x 2major First Aid x 6 Minor First Aid x 127. We also provided First Aid for a number of events during the season.

During the year we added three more First Aid kits, two Oxygen Therapy kits and replaced 2 AEDs which were deemed outdated and not cost worthy to repair. We have ample equipment for operational requirements for our services. Members who hold the relevant qualifications are using the advanced diagnostic equipment that we have at our disposal. Methoxyflurane inhalers were made available with the new SLSWA policy in place. They were required on two occasions with good pain relief results during treatment. Our dedicated laundry provider to process our used linen worked very well with the liner hamper in the room being used for this purpose. Again, over the winter season all first aid equipment will be serviced and checked to be ready for the upcoming season. Please continue to use the white board for any issue's that I need to be informed about or contact me though the office if appropriate.

The AED cabinet outside the First Room will be replaced due to rust issues we cannot avoid this as the cabinet has to be open and not covered in any way to allow fast access if required. EpiPen's during the winter season are stored in the safe if required all patrol and office bearers are aware how to access them if required. A reminder if the first Aid room is not operational during the winter months and a AED is required in a emergency there are two locations a cabinet outside by the First Aid door and another one outside by the Main Office door upstairs. These have a 24-hr phone number that is maintained though St John Ambulance who are to be contacted on 000 for the procedure to access the AED.

Alternatively, if you have access to the equipment shed all the ATVs and one of the land cruisers have first aid and oxygen equipment in them. In the ATVs they are in dedicated equipment storage boxes in the rear tray of each.

I would again like to thank all members for their input and assistance though the season if any members have any questions or require assistance with any first aid issues, please don't hesitate to contact me.

JET SKI (RWC) OFFICER'S REPORT DAMIAN O'DONNELL

ARE A CONTRACT

Scarboro Surf Club have had a busy season for jet skis.

- We recorded just over two hundred operational hours
- We had ten new drivers qualify as operators in October 2024
- 57 rescues were completed, representing 30% of the total rescues for the club

We are fortunate to currently have three operational jet skis. These belong to SLSWA and we use and care for them, with a 50/50 split for maintenance responsibility costs.

Two of the skis are quite old (measured by operational hours) but with reasonable care being taken to maintain them over the years, they continue to serve us well.

Jet ski #09 is the oldest ski in the fleet; a 2016 model FX HO, with 379 hours. This is the small yellow and black ski. Some aesthetic hull work was completed on the ski this year and the sacrificial hull was replaced.

Jet ski #44 is a 2019 VXR, with 469 hours. This is the blue and white ski and is a little bigger than #09. After a significant service in August 2024, this ski continues to serve us well.

Jet ski #64 is a new ski, provided by SLSWA in September 2024. This is a supercharged FX SVHO, providing us more power, weighing more and it has considerably more technology. We have managed to put 71 hours on this ski over the season, and it is operating well. All three skis are rescue ready and come equipped with their own sled and offshore emergency response packs. These skis serve an essential role in the metro emergency response group and are particularly effective in whitewater search and rescue.

The unique thing about the skis is that they can operate in shallow water and are incredibly agile when compared to other watercraft, so they are generally purposed with any inshore rescue and recovery work. If we are tasked with a search and rescue, an area is generally assigned, and we'll primarily work with water police and police divers. The divers use marlin boards, which are towed behind the ski when scanning the sea floor to search large areas quickly. This year, we had 2 skis called out for a search and rescue after a drowning at Mettam's Pool.

In addition to the skis being an essential part of the SLSWA Emergency Response Team, the skis' most common purpose at Scarboro is to provide water safety during patrols, carnivals and club events.

Outside of our own club, we are involved with water safety for other club carnivals, we support four abalone sessions each year (servicing the area between Trigg and Hillary's), and we support the management of the Rottnest Channel Swim finishing shute alongside a large group from Scarboro of IRB and board rescue volunteers. Many of these events raise valuable funds for the club.





We currently have about 50 qualified jet ski operators, with some very active and others less engaged. This group consists of the volunteer surf lifesaving contingent alongside several City of Stirling lifeguards and beach inspectors.

We have 1 new trainer this year, topping up the existing team of 1 trainer and 3 trainer/assessors.

Training to develop a jet ski operator is intense, with such a heavy (450kg) and powerful piece of equipment operating in unpredictable conditions, in close proximity to the general public. To learn, a member must have their recreational skipper's ticket and bronze medallion, plus ideally the experience of several seasons on the beach. Further, we have identified that those with their IRB driver certificates and several years of driving behind them generally have an edge that serves them well, to operate a vessel in the unique and varied surf conditions that present at our very high profile and busy Scarborough Beach.

This past year, training was completed over several months prior to the patrol season commencing in late 2024. We do this intentionally to expose the students to the challenge of poor weather and heavy winter swells, that they are then comfortable and confident to operate in all conditions. As Dave Thomson says, "Anyone can ride a jet ski but not everyone can actually drive a jet ski".

The skis are difficult to operate and it's not just a matter of standing there with a throttle. Manoeuvring in often very restricted space with waves crashing over and around you, all while not falling off or running swimmers over and being on the lookout for those that may need assistance, is no easy task.

That said, anyone who is interested and can genuinely commit to the significant responsibility that comes with operating a jet ski for Surf Life Saving purposes, is encouraged to reach out to me directly.

DIRECTOR OF SURF SPORTS REPORT: TANYA CHANNELL



The 2024/25 season has seen the Club continue to focus on building a successful program for athlete and coach development and participation in Surf Sports. It has been very positive to see the increase in the numbers of athletes training and competing for the Club this season.

At the start of the season we were very pleased as a Board to appoint Heath Wright as our Surf Sports Coach. He had been developing our Nippers over the last few years and it was amazing to be able to get him to expand our offerings to focus on development and participation across all our youth athletes.

I would like to acknowledge the contribution that Andrew Walker made at the Club over the previous 2 seasons that has seen improved skills and competitiveness for those that were training with him.

At our planning meeting before the start of the surf sports season we determined that we would target specific carnivals rather than compete in all of them.

Each of our area captains have provided reports for their areas so I won't repeat the details of their reports here but I would like to call out some of the highlights for the year.

We started the season with the Endurance Championships in October 2024 we had an awesome turnout for this as the first surf sports event of the season, with competitors from U12 to Masters. It was great to see so many competitors and we had some great results as well, including 3 gold, 2 silver and 2 bronze. This showed the depth of our club with medals for U12's to Masters. Also a special call out to Melanie Thomas who competed in all events on the day, 1.5km beach run, 3.5km board paddle, 7km single ski and 2km swim, 1 was exhausted just watching her, an inspiration for all our athletes to follow.

For the last weekend in October we had 22 competitors compete at Surf League Rd 1 and it was great to see such positive attitudes and team work all round on the day. We also had some great results. Thanks to Christie Jones who managed to wrangle our beachies, Owen McCallum was 3rd in Beach Flags and Ewan, Owen and Sam finished in the top 6 in the Beach Sprint. Well done boys. Also we had a number of finals in Board, Iron and Surf Races. Due to other commitments Surf League Rd 2 was a smaller team but Lila, Jess, Zoe, Amelie and Livia had some great results and they made a number of finals.

On the last weekend in November Scarboro hosted the excellent Victorian R&R Coach Christine Cardwell once again, she put all our R&R competitors, coaches and judges through their paces on Friday, Saturday and Sunday and it was great that she once again made time to support R&R in WA, thanks to Doug McGhie for arranging the weekend and SLSWA for their support of this event.

The first weekend in December was the first lifesaving event of the year Lily Tolev and Melanie Thomas both represented the club in Champion Lifesaver and qualified for Aussies as a result. The following weekend was the First Aid State Championships and we had teams in both the Open and the U19 events, Lily Tolev and Rory Watson received bronze in U19.

The final State Championship Event for Lifesaving, was held in January and was very successful for Scarboro, culminating in GOLD to our OPEN CHAMPION PATROL TEAM of Rory Watson, Hamish Watson, Lily Tolev, Melanie Thomas, Chris Kuster and Adam Cousins. Our U17 team also made 5th on the day earning some valuable points for the club, well done to Jack Brohman, Sam Cousins, Ky Koerber and Amelie Lynch. Thanks to Nicole, Rory and Belinda for driving this event, it is great to have Scarboro represented again in these events and Nicole has a great recap in her Annual Report. I love that we have been able to rejuvenate Scarboro's standing in this event and thank Nicole and her team who have been amazing in driving this.

Our next targeted carnival was at Leighton, we had a bus load (literally) of our youth competitors compete, everyone did really well, there were lots of teams and we had many competing in their first carnival for Scarboro and they all enjoyed the experience.

We also had a good team for Board rescue with entries in U17 and youth board races. The team made 3 semi finals and 1 final with Austin Wyeth and Owen Wright coming 6th in their final. Well done boys, it was a long and hot morning for all the participants. Following the conclusion of the Board Rescue were the Surf Belt Races and Rescue-tube-rescue which went late into the day.

That same weekend the Masters events were held and Scarboro had over 25 competitors who won 8 gold, 9 silver and 12 bronze medals between them. We had lots of new members giving the events a go and lots of learnings for next year. Janet Stephenson has provided a recap in her annual report.

Then on Sunday our Beach Flags competitors starred, with Gold in U14 Male to Nathanael D'Alessandro and Gold in U15 Female to Coco Fonseca. It was great to see so many competitors in last weekend of the State Championships giving their best. I am also proud to say that working as an official over the weekend I loved the attitude of all our competitors, the way they interacted with the officials, their fellow competitors and also worked together to support their teammates. We had some great results and made many finals over the weekend. Well done to Zoe Doyle who was 5th in U14 Board race, Lila Turner 6th in the U15 surf race and Max Kryachok for 4th, 5th and 5th in U14 Board, Surf race and Ironman. We look forward to improving these results next year as we get bigger and stronger than ever.

It was also great to see 4 boat crews on the water on at the Surf Boats State Championship, thanks to Doyle and Wayne and to Cheryl and the education crew for making this happen. It was the first carnival for most of them and a few sore bodies at the end of the day, well done to the Scarboro Plumbers with 4th in the U19 Male surf boat and the Scarboro Sharks with 6th in the U23 Male surf boat. It was nice to have some boats back competing and after the experience they will be even better for next year, so I hope we can keep them together.

Our largest Aussies team in many years trekked across to North Kirra at the end of March and early April. Our youth competitors had a shortened program due to the weather which was disappointing, but they are all the better for the experience and have already started booking for next year.

It was great to have representation in Champion lifesaver, Champion patrol, Masters, R&R and March Past, the first touring march past team since 1967.

I would like to thank City of Perth for letting us share their transport for our various boards, Jose's ski, first aid/champion patrol equipment and 2 reels, we really appreciate their assistance in getting our team to Queensland, even if it was a little bit delayed on the way back.

Also thanks to our amazing sponsors Lifestyle Wardrobes, and Bullock and Lubi'sTiling who assisted with fitting out our competitors, they looked amazing! Well done as well to the youth team and thanks to Belinda Devenish for all their fundraising efforts.



We understand the importance of competition to the club can't be discounted and needs to be encouraged at all levels. Most of the teams returned from last year, including Max McGhie and Patrick Jones in the U11 2 Person. I look forward to improving on this year's results next season, and encouraging more members to consider competing in one of the traditional events in surf lifesaving.

As a culmination to the Pool Lifesaving season, the SLSWA Pool Rescue State Championships were held over 2 long days in July 2024. There were 15 clubs taking part and over 240 athletes competing. Scarboro SLSC was well represented by a larger team than previous years, with 33 athletes, earning 333 points in total and we finished 3rd overall. This is an improvement of 2 places from last year! In the process we amassed 21 gold, 17 silver and 15 bronze medals.

Our newer recruits this season stood up and applied their learning and training and our team members that entered and came on the weekend to make up teams really put it in and were rewarded by excellent team results with lots of medal winning places. Champion Patrol encapsulates all elements of SLS. Teams compete over a day in a theory paper, a rescue relay, a surf

We finished 9th at the Australian titles after a 12-hour day on the beach in extremely challenging conditions.

We started the intra-club events on 6 October, and over the season we had consistent numbers in the weekly events. Overall the numbers grew during the season and it was nice to have the youth age group managers supporting these events.

The attendances for the year were: 942 swimmers, average 38, highest 62 234 board paddlers, average 11, highest 33 206 long-run,average 10, highest 22 205 sprinters, average 11, highest 22

All results are published further in the annual report.

Our first trophy event of the year was the **Kikiros Marathon** on 3 November, we had 14 competitors complete the course aged from 15 to 75 which just shows this is an event for everyone **Stephane Dellac** finished with the fastest time, with **Bob Welch** first on handicap. Handicap racing was very tight with the top 5 all within 2 minutes of each other.

On 10th and 24th of November we held the two heats of the **RJ Elliott Trophy**. The first week of the 400 metre swim was completed in perfect conditions with 28 swimmers. Congratulations to David Lazarus and Hayley Wells for taking out the first heat. The second heat of the RJ Elliott we had 43 swimmers with 14 swimmers eligible for the Trophy with **Jeff Young** first on handicap and **Harlan Mullins** with fastest time.

The trophy events just kept coming with the **McGovern Marathon** on 8 December incorporating a swim, wade and long run. We had a great field of 21 competitors for the Trophy event, **Stephane Dellac** recorded fastest time again and **Scott Wyeth** first on handicap.

The weekend of 11 January was the Anniversary breakfast, and we held the 3rd **Bob Phelps Youth Trophy swim** alongside the Jack Moloney Trophy. We had a great turnout for the Bob Phelps with a good representation of nippers as well. Unfortunately, the younger ones did not qualify for the trophy, but we look forward to them competing again next year. Congratulations to **Nick Kryachok** for first on handicap and fastest time. Also well done to **Sophie King** for first Nipper. We also had the annual **Jack Moloney** swim for the Over 30's and we had a great turnout for that as well. The Member Development Portfolio represents our Starfish, Woodside Nipper, and Youth membership. A priority of Scarboro through this portfolio is to strive to make available opportunities that encourage participation in varied aspects of Surf Life Saving that support club goals and develop individuals into outstanding and valued contributors to our community.

Membership in the nipper and youth cohorts continues to be strong and represents a large portion of Scarboro's membership. This season we delivered the Woodside Nipper Program with our enthusiastic "Nipper Crew" to approximately 500 enthusiastic nippers, registrations were high in the under 6, 7 and 8 age categories that we were required to close enrolments. Ali Nielsen, Mark Levitt and Todd Knox with their respective teams oversaw the delivery of Starfish and Youth programs. We have been successful in integrating young members as they continue to grow into our club in areas of sport, lifesaving, education and development.

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The Starfish Nippers program had a special year with many opportunities to shine both on and off the beach! The Starfish Nippers' program at the Scarboro Surf Club had the opportunity to be on the forefront of the inclusivity movement for surf lifesaving, and for this I am extremely proud of the support of the Scarboro Surf Club. We started off at the president's forum, with the opportunity to present to all the presidents of the Surf Clubs across the WA coastline. This was a wonderful opportunity to showcase our community engagement program to the wider Surf Life Saving community, the benefits that the an inclusive program brings to all aspects of a surf club. Highlighting the importance of meaningful inclusion; being at the heart of the Starfish Nipper program and makes for a core component to the successful running of the program. At the president's forum we discussed that meaningful inclusion is whereby people living with or without a disability can participate and benefit from the ability to be included and where people have a sense of belonging, and that is exactly what the Starfish Nippers program achieves. It was a valuable opportunity to discuss the importance of meaningful inclusion with other surf clubs and begin to have discussions whereby we are able to make changes to movement of inclusion within Surf Life Saving Western Australia.

The achievements of the Starfish Nipper program at Scarboro have a significant impact on the participants and families that are involved, but also the Scarboro SLSC Community and other organisations in Western Australia who we partner with to advocate for the importance of inclusion. Starfish Nippers supports participants but also provides volunteers from within the Scarboro community with the opportunity to assist the participants. Starfish Nippers provides an avenue for volunteers to join and participate in Surf Life Saving with a constructive and meaningful purpose.

The community which felt more like family was formed this season down at Starfish Nippers, whereby each participant of the program developed a trusting and respectful relationship with the volunteers. This bond enabled each of the participants of the program with the opportunity to develop both their confidence and awareness both in the water and out. Another key component of the Starfish Nippers program at Scarboro is the incredible volunteers. Without our team of dedicated, hardworking and passionate volunteers, the Starfish Nippers program simply just would not be possible. It is a two-way partnership between volunteer and participant, that work in harmony together to ensure that our Starfish Nippers have





the opportunity to thrive. I am truly so thankful for each and every volunteer who gave up their time on a Sunday morning, ensuring that our Starfish Nipper participants were able to be the very best that they can be in the program!

The program accesses different specialised equipment which ensures the individual needs of the participants are met. The essence of Starfish Nippers is having the opportunity to tailor each of the modified surf lifesaving activities for the individual needs of the participants of the program, this ensures that all participants in the program can THRIVE! The program caters for children living with many different types of disabilities such as down syndrome, cerebral palsy, cystic fibrosis, speech and language delays, children living on the autism spectrum disorder, children living with learning difficulties, developmental delays, intellectual disabilities, visual, auditory and sensory processing disorders, physical disabilities, hearing and visual impairments, epilepsy, as well as children living with an Acquired Brain Injury. Participants within the program have a varying level of ability and capacity to engage with the program, so careful and thorough consideration is needed to ensure that each of the different activities undertaken on the beach, provide for all the children to engage in.

Once again, we had the Saba Rose Button Foundation on board as our major supporter of the program. A wonderful partnership we have fostered over the years, whereby we work harmoniously together, to ensure that we have access to any additional resources we may need, to ensure that we could support children with a higher level of need, care and support.









YOUTH REPORT: TODD KNOX & MARK LEVITT

It's wonderful to be part of a club that values and encourages intergenerational participation. It's equally rewarding to be in a club that recognises the Youth Cohort as the future generation of members, officers, officials, and Directors—essential to ensuring the club's ongoing success and operation.

The club implements a range of initiatives designed to retain youth members while providing a structured and safe pathway for personal, professional, and physical development. These initiatives build on the foundation of Nippers, linking youth (ages U14-U17) with various senior elements and disciplines of the club. Youth are encouraged to explore all available opportunities to discover their interests and potential future involvement in the club. At the core of every opportunity is a strong commitment to volunteering, with all youth encouraged to complete age-appropriate awards and contribute to patrol duties.

The club's current initiatives aim to engage a broader spectrum of youth beyond traditional surf sports competitors by establishing development pathways across key areas of Surf, including Lifesaving, Training (Education), and Leadership. Additionally, the nationally developed Youth Engagement Program (YEP) has been successfully implemented, further expanding opportunities for youth to stay involved in the club through Community Service, Community Engagement, Inclusivity, and Personal Growth pathways.

These initiatives encourage youth members to document their contributions, allowing them to be recognised for their loyalty and service through a tiered reward system. The recognition hierarchy awards a peak cap for bronze level, a Scarboro Club Towel for silver, and a Club Hoodie for gold.

A distinguishing feature of the YEP Gold category is the requirement for youth members to complete a community project that provides tangible benefits to their club branch or the broader state. This season, two exceptional youth members have fulfilled this criterion through their outstanding project contributions—one by spearheading a skin cancer awareness initiative and the other by serving as a member of the inaugural Surf Life Saving Western Australia Youth Committee.

This season, we hosted several 'Have-a-go' days, inviting different club disciplines to engage with youth members and provide hands-on opportunities for participation. One of the most successful and well-attended events took place at Hillarys Boat Harbour, where Surf Boats and Surf Skis combined to offer a safe, structured, and supervised experience. It was





particularly encouraging to see youth members embracing these disciplines and becoming actively involved. Similarly, strong engagement has been observed with the IRB and IRB racing crews. Of course, Jet Ski rides continue to be a popular attraction among youth participants.

As a pre-Christmas session and mid-season incentive, youth members who had fulfilled their patrol hours from the previous season and were up to date in December were sponsored to attend Hillarys Aqua Park. One of the standout activities was a 'Survivor'-style challenge, where teams of youth tested their lifesaving, patrolling, and teamwork skills while competing against their peers. The season-opening Mini-Olympics was also a major success, providing a dynamic and engaging start to the season for youth members. Additionally, this year's calendar featured a dedicated Lifesaving Challenge for the first time, further enriching the opportunities available to participants.

The traditional Sunday morning 'Development Sessions' were initially designed to complement the club's Sunday program. However, coordinating youth groups eager to participate in club activities alongside preplanned development sessions proved challenging. While this presented logistical difficulties, it was ultimately a positive outcome, as youth engagement in club swims, board races, sprints, and beach runs increased significantly throughout the season. As a result, opportunities for teamwork and skills development within the youth program became harder to facilitate. The team is actively exploring solutions for next season to ensure both objectives can be successfully achieved.

Most rewarding this season has been the significant increase in youth participation in surf sports and physical training opportunities offered by the club. Club coach Heath has been instrumental in fostering engagement, encouraging a broader range of youth members to get involved. While not all participants aspire to compete, the program provides invaluable opportunities to develop a healthy lifestyle and recognize the mental health benefits of training in a supportive group environment. This aspect of the youth program, though often overlooked, remains a vital service delivered by the club.

Youth members who compete have achieved some success at both State and National levels. However, the most valuable aspect of competition lies in the shared experiences—traveling together, representing the club, and forming lifelong bonds with fellow club competitors. Events such as the club-sponsored Team Bus to the Leighton Beach Carnival and participation in the Country Carnival and Nationals have fostered strong team connections. These experiences not only create memorable moments but also contribute to team development, personal growth, and a vibrant club culture.

One of the most significant indicators of the Youth program's success at the club is the number of patrol hours completed by its youth members. This season, 119 youth members contributed a total of 4,431 patrol hours—an average of approximately 38 hours per member throughout the 2024/2025 season. If the statistics are correct, this remarkable effort accounts for nearly half of the total patrol hours undertaken by the club.

Among the various measures of success, this statistic stands out the most. While youth members may not always participate in club events or Sunday development sessions—particularly in the older age groups—they continue to fulfill their responsibilities as patrolling club members and, anecdotally, genuinely enjoy doing so. In this regard, the club has successfully fostered a culture where young members engage with their local community, giving back in appreciation for the training, opportunities, and camaraderie they have experienced within the club.

As with all aspects of the club, its success relies on the dedication of volunteers. However, not all volunteers are the same, and the Age Group Managers have done an exceptional job in planning and overseeing each age group this season. It has been a privilege to be part of the broader team delivering the youth program, and I extend my sincere appreciation to Chris Kuster (U14 AGM), Mike Watson (U15 AGM), Stuart Tracey (U16 AGM), and, of course, my invaluable youth program development colleague, Todd Knox (U17 AGM).

A special thank you also goes to Chenoa Wright for her vital behind-the-scenes contributions as the Youth Communications Officer, as well as to the many others who have generously assisted whenever I've reached out for support in delivering this program.

Thank you, Scarboro Youth Leadership Team—it has been an enjoyable and rewarding season, and your dedication is truly appreciated. Working alongside you all has been a privilege, and I sincerely thank you for your efforts and patience throughout the season.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2025

The 2024/2025 season continued the trends of recent seasons, steady growth, stability, and investment. This direction led to a net deficit of \$18k (\$24k surplus excluding depreciation), highlighting our commitment to our members and the club's future.

Key Financial Highlights:

- Membership revenue increased from \$154k to \$159k.
- Cash and cash equivalents increased by \$13k to \$562k (including term deposits).
- Revenue of \$215k from ancillary operations (functions, merchandise, canteen, and bar).
- Sponsorship, grants, donations and fundraising efforts of \$102k.
- Lifesaving and patrol efforts contributed approximately \$96k from water safety and patrol services.
- \$66k invested in new equipment for education, lifesaving operations and competitors.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2025

1. Summary of material accounting policies

In the opinion of the Board, the Club is not a reporting entity because there are no users reliant on general purpose financial statements, accordingly these are special purpose financial statements prepared in accordance with the requirements of section 26 of the Associations Incorporation Act 2015 (WA), and the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012.

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements specified by the Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') and the disclosure requirements of AASB 101 'Presentation of Financial Statements', AASB 107 'Statement of Cash Flows', AASB 108 'Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors', AASB 1048 'Interpretation of Standards' and AASB 1054 'Australian Additional Disclosures', as appropriate for not-for-profit oriented entities

Revenue recognition

The incorporated association recognises revenue as follows:

Sales revenue

Sale of goods, events, fundraising, and raffles are recognised when received or receivable.

Donations and memberships

Donations and Memberships are recognised at the time they are received.

Grants

Grants are recognised at their fair value where there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received, and all attached conditions will be complied with. Funds received in advance of the provision of services are recognised as liabilities by the Club and are not recognised as revenue until such time as services have been provided.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and Cash Equivalents represent cash held in bank accounts with Australian domiciled banks, which are highly liquid and convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to insignificant risk of changes in value.

Trade and other receivables

Trade and other receivables represent amounts owed to the Club and not received at year end. Where it is determined that a receivable is impaired a provision is made for the value of the debt which in the Club's view may not be recoverable.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2025

Inventory

Inventories are recognised at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Inventories are valued on a first-in, first- out basis.

Plant and equipment and leasehold improvements

The accounting treatment of Plant and equipment and leasehold improvements is determined by its value and nature.

Any acquisition with a value of less than \$5,000 will be expensed. Any acquisition more than \$5,000 that becomes a fixture or fitting will also be expensed. Any other acquisition more than \$5,000 is recognised at historical cost, and unless specified are not adjusted for changes in fair value.

After acquisition, the Club recognises accumulated depreciation/amortisation against the cost of the asset and recognises a corresponding depreciation/amortisation expense in the Statement of Income and Expenditure over the estimated useful life.

The initial useful lives estimate of plant and equipment held at balance date range from 4 to 5 years. Leasehold improvements are amortised over their estimated useful life determined at acquisition date, being the lesser of the term of the relevant lease or value in use (10 years).

Function Room Hire

The following judgements and estimates are used in relation to the allocation of expenditure against the function room hire income as per Note 8:

Trade and Other Payables

Trade and Other Payables represent amounts owed by the Club to suppliers, including employees, for goods and services received and which have not been paid for at year end.

Employee benefits

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits, annual leave and long service leave expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Going Concern

The financial report has been prepared on a going concern basis, which contemplates the continuity of normal business, economic activities and the realisation of assets and discharge of liabilities in the normal course of business. In arriving at this position, in the opinion of those charged with governance, the club will, based on varying cash flow forecasts have access to sufficient funds to meet administrative and other committed expenditure for a period of not less than 12 months from the date of this report.

Critical accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue, and expenses.

Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

Provision for impairment of inventories

The provision for impairment of inventories assessment requires a degree of estimation and judgement. The level of the provision is assessed by considering the recent sales experience, the ageing of inventories and other factors that affect inventory obsolescence.

Impairment of Fixed Assets

Fixed Assets are reviewed annually to determine if the asset is impaired, that is, the carrying value of the asset will not be recovered by the Club either through continued use or sale. Where the carrying value of an asset is determined to be impaired, the Club expenses the excess value to the Statement of Income and Expenditure immediately.

Estimation of useful lives of assets

The incorporated association determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation and amortisation charges for its property, plant and equipment and finite life intangible assets. The useful lives could change significantly because of technical innovations or some other event. The depreciation and amortisation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written off or written down.
