PRESIDENT'S REPORT: CLINT MCGHIE



It is my pleasure to present the Scarboro Surf Life Saving Club Annual Report for the 2023/24 season and highlight some of Scarboro SLSCs achievements over the past season.

From the outset,

the Board has focused on the continued growth and investment in our Nipper and Youth programs, recognising their importance as our future lifesavers, champion competitors and leaders. In 2023/24, Scarboro had in excess of 600 Members under the age of 18. Providing pathways to the broad range of activities available in Surf Life Saving is critical to retaining our Youth through to Senior membership.

Led by our Member Development Director, Graham Jones, and a passionate team of Officers, Age Group Managers, Coaches and volunteers, the Club has provided a strong offering for our Nipper and Youth Members.

With numbers regularly being capped in our younger Nipper age groups, we have seen improved competition results for our Nippers this season, culminating in an improved 4th place at the State Titles in March. We continue to engage with our Nipper families and parents and welcome them to participate in other aspects of the broader Club and community.

Our Starfish Nippers, under the guidance of Ali Nielsen, have again provided a program for children and young people living with a disability to participate in Surf Life Saving at Scarborough Beach. The opportunities for these Members, their families and the volunteers that help run the program are great to see and

demonstrate the importance of fostering an inclusive and accessible environment at Scarboro.

At the recent SLSWA Awards of Excellence, Scarboro was a finalist in the 2023/24 Woodside Nippers Club of the Year and our Starfish Nippers were again a finalist in the SLSWA Community Education Program of the Year. We also recognise Heath Wright who was a finalist in the Woodside Nippers Program Volunteer of the Year, whilst congratulations go to Graham Jones who won the Woodside Nippers Program Coordinator of the Year Award, and Christie Jones who won the Woodside Nippers Age Manager of the Year Award.

This season our Youth Engagement Team, led by Mark Levitt and Todd Knox, have done a tremendous job in revitalising the the Youth program, which is aimed at supporting the transition of our young Members from Nippers into the Senior Club. The program has provided a connection to all aspects of the Club, with a lot of fun had along the way. It has been great to present some of our 'Youthies' with the awards and merchandise they have earned during the season and to witness their growth in their chosen activities and camaraderie as a group.

The Club has continued to deliver on its core commitment of protecting the swimming public at Scarborough Beach. This season our Members recorded 8,425 hours on patrol, and performed 139 rescues, 193 first aid treatments and 3,869 preventative actions. These statistics are a reminder of the importance of our role on the beach.

In recognition of the performance of our patrols, Scarboro was once again a finalist in the 2023/24 SLSWA Patrol Club of the Year, whilst Rory Watson was again a finalist in the Young Surf Lifesaver of the Year. Congratulations to Jack Brohman who was named the SLSWA U14/U15 Lifesaver of the Year, an outstanding individual achievement. At a Club level, it was great to see the reintroduction of



an All Champion Patrol Team presented at the Annual Dinner recognising outstanding patrolling Members from within each of our Patrol Teams.

Thank you to Beach Operations Director Belinda Kuster, our Patrol Officers Terry Colby and Nathaniel McBain, and each of our Officers that support the patrol operations, for your tireless efforts in ensuring that our patrols run efficiently and effectively. Thank you also to our Patrol Captains, Vice Captains and all of the patrolling Members who contribute to our service on the Beach.

Of course our Patrols are trained and sustained by our team of dedicated educators and assessors, who this season have trained a total of 168 awards including 26 Bronze, 29 Surf Rescue, 9 IRB Driver, 22 IRB Crew and 5 Silver Medallion Patrol Captain. Congratulations and thank you to Cheryl Harry, in her first year as Education Officer, and her team of trainers and assessors for their dedication during the season in running a total of 20 courses and 25 requals for various awards.

We recognise Chris Kuster who was a finalist in the 2023/24 SLSWA Trainer of the Year and Belinda Kuster who was a finalist in the Assessor of the Year.

In Surf Sports, the Club continues to build momentum competing in all disciplines across the season. The Club has seen great success across a number of sports including IRB, R&R and Pool Rescue. Encouragingly, the squad of Youth Members training with our Coach, Andrew 'Wal' Walker, has grown again this year and it has been great to see the development and team spirit of this group, culminating in the Touring Team to the Aussies on the Sunshine Coast in April. We look forward to seeing what you can achieve next season.

Thank you to Tanya Channell and Nicole Tolev for your unending enthusiasm in driving the Surf Sports area of the

Club. Thank you also to each of our Surf Sports Officers and all of the coaches who contribute so much towards the development and success of our competitors. Sustained success will take time, but the Club is committed to continue to invest in this area and to support its Members in their individual and team pursuits.

Congratulations to our national medallists this season including the IRB's Scarboro Pink team comprising Hollie Sheils-Rudd, Jessica Cake and Joel Horton, Coco Fonseca in Under 14 Female Beach Flags and Jose Desfosses in the 70-74 Years Male 1km Beach Run. We also recognise Doug McGhie who was a finalist in the 2023/24 SLSWA Coach of the Year.

Our Member Services team has held a number of successful events for Members during the season including our Season Opener, Annual Breakfast and the recent Annual Dinner at Rendezvous Scarborough. During the year, the Club has tried a few new ideas to to engage with Members including footy finals pie nights and several Friday nights on the Nipper lawn which proved to be popular, particularly with our youngest Members. Thank you to our Social Officer Grace Rompotes who has again put in a tremendous amount of effort this season in organising these events for Members.

I would like to thank our Director Member Services, Reece Vogels who will enjoy a well earned rest as he retires after serving five years on the Board. This Directorship was a new role that Reece stepped into, charged with navigating the important but complex area of member protection and establishing the necessary systems and records.

Financially we continue to maintain a healthy position under the guidance of our Finance Director, Matthew Watson. This is thanks in no small part to our amazing sponsors who have continued in 2023/24, including City of Stirling, Rendezvous Hotel, IGA Doubleview

Fresh, Sharyn Long Chartered Accountants, Davey Real Estate, International School of Western Australia and Scarborough Rotary Club. We also welcomed our newest sponsors Lifestyle Wardrobes WA and Betty's Burgers in 2023/24. I would like to make special mention to City of Stirling who are our major partner and are extremely supportive of the Club. The ongoing support of Surf Life Saving WA is also acknowledged and greatly appreciated.

Our sponsors enable the Club to provide our core life saving services to the public at Scarborough Beach, as well as providing facilities, services and opportunities for our 1400 Members. I would also like to thank our Functions, Administration and Facilities team, Sharon Walshaw, Trina Cullen and Deb Buscall for your commitment and efforts in supporting the Board, Officers and Members of the Club.

Thank you to all of our Officers who have taken on responsibility in the 2023/24 Season and to our Members who have helped when the call has gone our for assistance. Without volunteers for the many and varied roles we have

to fill, we cannot provide the services to the public and to our Members. Your efforts are greatly appreciated. We always need new faces to step forward, so please speak with one of our Directors if you would like to help the Club in 2024/25.

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DIRECTOR OF FINANCE REPORT: MATTHEW WATSON



The 2023/2024 season saw steady growth, stability, and investment. This direction led to a net deficit of \$57k, highlighting our commitment to our members and the club's future.

Key Financial Highlights:

- Membership revenue increased from \$151k to \$154k
- Cash and cash equivalents (including term deposits) increased by \$13k to \$548k.
- Revenue of \$210k from ancillary operations (functions, merchandise, canteen, and bar).
- Sponsorship, grants, and donations totalled \$105k from community partnerships.
- Lifesaving and patrol efforts contributed approximately \$90k from water safety and patrol services.
- \$60k invested in new equipment for education, lifesaving operations and competitors.

DIRECTOR OF MEMBER SERVICES REPORT: REECE VOGELS



Preamble

The Member Services role is now in its fifth of activity, having initially been introduced in the 2019/2020 season. The role remains as challenging as it was in its inaugural year, in what has proven

to be a continually evolving space. Of note this year was the added requirement for members to complete Volunteer Declaration Forms, as mandated by SLSWA.

Through the hard work of the Officers within the Member Services portfolio, and through the diligence of the Constitution and Policy Review Committee ('CPRC'), the Club has been able to stay ahead of this evolving Surf Lifesaving member protection landscape.

The responsibilities within the MSD portfolio can be conceptualised as having two related, but admittedly distinct, limbs:

- 1. Member Protection; and
- 2. Member Services.

The 'Member Protection' limb is comprised of the rebranded Member Protection Information Officer ('MPIO') (formerly the Member Protection Officer), and the newly created position of Complaints Manager. The 'Member Services' limb incorporates our two Peer Support Officers ('PSO'), Social Officer, Membership Officer, and Disciplinary Committee.

Member Protection

Member Protection Information

Robert Welch was appointed to the position of Member Protection Information Officer.

The role of MPIO is to focus on conducting member protection and member screening duties. This includes having a thorough working knowledge of both our Club's internal policies, the SLSWA Member Screening Policy, the SLSA Child Safe Policy 6.04, the SLSA Member Protection Policy 6.05, and the SLSA Complaints Resolution Policy 6.06. The role also requires active oversight over the membership to ensure Working with Children, and National Police Clearance, compliance – a statutory obligation.

During the season the MPIO was provided the added challenge of not simply maintaining the Club's WWC register (and NPC register), but also overseeing the introduction of a third requirement, that of the Volunteer Declaration Form. The Volunteer Declaration Forms was an additional challenge for the MPIO, as it was not limited to adults, and arguably had a further reach than the WWC. Its implementation was to address a loophole within the Working with Children (Screening) Act 2004 (WA) which means that previously individuals could gain a parent or child volunteer exemption, in full knowledge that they had an interim negative notice or negative notice.

Bob's work as is often thankless which requires extreme diligence and behind the scenes effort. The Club is fortunate, and I am grateful, to have someone of Bob's talents in this role. Thanks also go to the club office, Sharon and Trina, as this Volunteer Declaration Form has resulted in an increased volume of paperwork that needs to be processed.

Complaints Management

Trevor Carleton was appointed to the position of Complaints Manager.

The role of the Complaints Manager is to receive referrals of complaints and grievances from the MPIO, or via the SLSA complaints portal, and determinate the nature of the complaint and how it should be appropriately managed. The role requires in-depth

knowledge of SLSA Complaints Resolution Policy 6.06 2. WWC Check application numbers (where and of the SLS Reporting Systems. applicable), WWC Card numbers and expiry dates

During the season, the Complaints Manager received no complaints or grievances. The fact that no complaints were received is an indication of a largely harmonious working and social environment in the Club, which is a credit to all members. Like the MPIO, the role of Complaints Manager is often thankless work which requires a high level of professionalism and behind the scenes effort. The Club is fortunate, and I am grateful, to have someone of TC's expertise.

Working With Children Compliance

Under the Working with Children (Criminal Records Checking) Act 2004 (WA) ('Act') the Club is required to undertake the following record keeping:

 A list of employees and volunteers identifying those engaged in child-related work;


- WWC Check application numbers (where applicable), WWC Card numbers and expiry dates for all the Club's employees and volunteers in childrelated work;
- Keeping copies of WWC Cards of all of the Club's employees and volunteers in child-related work;
- Keeping all notifications received from the WWC Screening Unit;
- 5. Keeping copies of any WWC Card validations from the WWC Check website; and
- 6. Keeping any Interim Notice(s) or Negative Notice(s) given and the subsequent actions taken by the Club in response to those Notices.

The MSD, MPIO and Club Office have continued to work with the membership to ensure the club remains WWC, NPC and Volunteer Declaration Form complaint.

The below table should assist members in understanding whether they require a WWC or Volunteer Declaration Form to participate in Club activities.

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We continue to encourage members to obtain a hard copy WWC form (and a template which depicts how to fill out parts 5 – 7 of the WWC form) from the Club Office or first aid room. The MPIO and the Club Office are your first points of contact with respect to any WWC queries. The MPIO will be following up individuals as they seek to re-join for the 2024-2025 season.

Peer Support

Our two Peer Support Officers, Micky G and Gillian de Gruchy-Alco have continued in the role of PSO for this season.

They are responsible for providing members with emotional and empathetic support and are both highly competent in this area. Their 'listening ear' is freely available to all members who may have been involved in any traumatic incident or experience, whether at the Club or external, whether directly or vicariously.

Micky G and Gill's support is offered to all members on a wholly confidential basis, and for this reason I do not intend to provide any details or statistics. I thank them both for their continued support of our members.

Membership

The photo boards depicting the interrelationship between the Directors, the Officers and any Captains, have been updated, but perhaps not as diligently as they could be. This is in large part due to the challenge of getting all officers' mutual availability to have their photograph taken, and that officers are appointed and some resign throughout the duration of the season.

Michelle Gates kindly put up her hand to act as this season's Membership Officer and was immediately proactive. Unfortunately I was not able to give her the required time for her to make the most out of the role, a failing of mine. It is something I hope can be addressed in the coming years. There are many membership projects that could definitely use Michelle's touch over the coming seasons.

Social

Grace Rompotes was appointed to the position of Social Officer.

The social committee stuck to the club's usual social calendar this past season, adding in an additional little event here and there.

This year was Scarboro's 96th Birthday. The Annual Breakfast welcomed the naming of the Jody Ballard IRB. The Annual Dinner also went off without a hitch, other than a last minute relocation from the Grand Ballroom to the Preston Room. Thanks go to Rendezvous and to our many suppliers for being able to make this last minute change and pull it off successfully. A large thanks again go to our MCs for the evening, Sarah and Jane.

A thank you goes to our tireless office staff, Trina and Sharon, for their assistance this season. The social events would not be possible without their continued support, knowledge of the Club and its membership, and excellent decorating skills.

Summary

As with past seasons, I owe everything to the capable and generous Officers that I am fortunate to work with. Thank you to Trevor Carleton JP, Bob Welch, Micky G, Gill de Gruchy-Alco, Michelle Gates and Grace Rompotes.

To the Officers who have thanklessly stuck at it for these last few years and continued to give up their valuable time to the Club – thank you. I wish you all the best with the successor to the role of MSD.

DIRECTOR OF BEACH OPERATIONS REPORT: BELINDA KUSTER



This season was my first as Beach Operations Director, moving after nine years in the Education Officer portfolio to fill the large (literally) shoes of Gus McMillan who has migrated north with work. Luckily,

the majority of the Beach Operations Committee remained the same, which made life easier for me as I transitioned to my new role overseeing lifesaving, education, and water safety.

The beach was busy during the season, not just looking after the public over a long hot summer, and our nippers on Sunday mornings, but also with club swims and Starfish nippers to take care of. There were multiple community events we were involved in, from Obstacle Course Racing to Open Water Swims, the state Open SLSWA titles and visits from international lifesaving groups from France, Switzerland and Denmark during the World Conference on Drowning Prevention.

Patrol teams this year were reduced to 14 teams after the departure of a couple of captains, and in response to feedback last year that some patrols were very light on for member numbers. The Beach Operations Committee worked to shuffle our patrolling teams so that we had effective teams that were fully qualified with enough trained operators for First Aid, Advanced Resuscitation skills, as well as IRB drivers and crew, while trying not to split up long standing and well-established teams. Reducing the teams to 14 meant that everyone was rostered for 1-2 more patrols per season, or 5-9 hours more over the season. I'm very appreciative of most patrolling members taking that in their stride and rocking up for every patrol. That effort was rewarded at

our end of season wind up when 98 patrolling members received a \$20 voucher from sponsors Betty's Burgers as a thank you for their dedication.

We started the season with a bang, with large swells and a full beach making our first patrols of the season well and truly blow out the cobwebs responding to 84 rescues, 2 first aids and 1 854 preventative actions over the weekend, advising members of the public on flash rips and reminding them to swim between the flags.

Our stats for the year are impressive:

It was great to see that over a third (48) of our rescues were conducted using a rescue board this year, showing that we can use our physical skills, and not just rely on jet ski or IRB to complete our rescues for us. With 193 first aids, the majority were for stingers, soft tissue injuries and a couple of spinals and broken bones. Thankfully, while we had one tragic drowning on a Sunday morning, it wasn't while we were on patrol.

Our Patrol Captains have been asked to nominate their top patrolling member from their patrol for the season based on attitude, willingness to help out, mentoring other members, upskilling and generally being a pleasure to have on patrol; and these people will be recognised at the Annual Dinner, making up the Scarboro SLSC All Champion Patrol for season 2023-24.

Towards the end of the season we had 10 members participate in the Silver Medallion Patrol Captain and Silver Medallion Aquatic Rescue courses gaining valuable new skills in team management, responding to emergencies, managing difficult situations and scenarios, effective rescue search patterns and physical skills of rescuing patients off the sea floor. Over the winter, the education team will be developing a progression and upskilling plan for those members, including our youth members, who are keen to grow their patrolling skills and make the step up to being a vice captain or patrol captain.







The education team grew again this year, with two new trainers coming on board to deliver training across Bronze Medallion, SRC and IRB skills. Cheryl Harry added a new sidekick in Rory Watson as the assistant education officer and delivered a rapid SRC to Bronze course as well as offering a rapid SRC course over the school holidays. Planning is already underway for training courses for next season, with a repeat of the rapid SRC to Bronze and SRC courses scheduled for September school holidays. Requals went well, with the Lancelin weekend again a huge success. Next season's Lancelin requal weekend will include the Youth on camp at the same time so Michele Gates and crew should be able to get through a lot of our patrolling members in one weekend.

Our water safety efforts continue to bring in valuable revenue for the club. Over the season we provided water safety or first aid services for community partners in Open Water Swimming, Swim Thru Perth, Obstacle Course Racing, Public Schools Association and Rottnest Channel Swim that raised over \$24 000. Additionally, through our auspice agreement with SLSWA, I was able to deliver First Aid training to other clubs who don't have qualified trainers to do so, raising a further \$4800 in revenue. On top of our commercial

water safety and first aid services, we also provided services for our nipper events, carnivals, polar bears with the same few people putting their hands up every time. It would be nice to grow this group to be able to share duties – a project for next season! Our RWC and IRB drivers always help out, but again, it seems to be the same few people who are always out on jet skis for abalone patrol and club water safety – we are lucky to have such motivated people in the club.

We managed to find a second-hand Land Cruiser to replace our ageing stock this season, as well as trying to sell off an ATV to make room in the gear shed, and used our Beach Safe Equipment Fund wisely to buy defibrillators, a replacement radio, patrol rescue boards and rescue tubes and first aid training equipment. Scarborough Rotary also supported us by providing funds for training equipment.

Finally, I'd like to thank the Beach Operations Committee for their hard work over this season: Cheryl Harry and Rory Watson in education, Natti McBain and TC in patrol, David Tomo Thomson in RWC, Hollie Sheils-Rudd in IRB (and leaving this portfolio to move east – so thank you for your service Hollie), Callum Hawkins in radios, David Lim in drones, Shane Power in first aid and Nick Stewart in gear and equipment.

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PATROL OFFICERS REPORT: TERRY COLBY & NATTI MCBAIN

Season 2023-24 was a busy one, with an extended patrol season due to Easter falling early in 2024. In agreement with the City of Stirling and fellow club Trigg, we agreed to patrol from the 7th of October through until the 1st of April. We also cut our patrolling teams from 16 to 14 due to the loss of a couple of patrol captains over the winter, and to make sure we had enough qualified people to provide a full service on each patrol. This meant that most patrol teams performed an additional 1-2 patrols or 5-9 hours this season than they did the previous season, and for this we are very grateful to those patrolling members who turned up as rostered all season.

Our very first weekend of patrol was extremely busy due to large surf and warm weather, with a lot of the public being caught out by the big conditions. We conducted 84 rescues over that weekend alone.

Our lifesaving statistics for the year were:

Scarboro SLSC performed almost a quarter of the rescues for SLSWA in its entirety this season, so a big congratulations to our patrolling members for remaining vigilant, and for sharing the rescues around – this year over a third of rescues were using a rescue board, not just relying on jetski or IRB to do the hard work.

We replaced our old Landcruiser with a less rusted model and had new radios available too. Lots of new and enthusiastic members joined our patrol teams too, adding to the enjoyment of patrols over the season. Betty's Burgers came on board as a proud sponsor and provided key rings to give patrol members a free drink with their burger purchases during the season, and then at the end of the season, we were also able to thank our top patrol hours members with a \$20 Betty's Burger voucher to enjoy in the off season.

Our top patrol hours member was Callum Hawkins with an impressive 142 hours of patrol over the season, but equally as impressive was that 86 of our patrol members met or exceeded their rostered hours.

Our most enthusiastic patrol member was awarded to newcomer Andrew Dennehy for his willingness to proxy or substitute for others, attaining both his IRB Driver and WA Trainer award this season, assisting with SRC and Bronze Medallion training, completing water safety for commercial, senior and junior carnivals and nipper events and jumping in as substitute IRB Driver on various patrols over the season.

Our patrol captains were asked to nominate their most consistent patrol team member this season based on attitude, willingness to help out, mentoring other members, upskilling and generally being a pleasure to have on patrol.

The 2023/24 season was one of change and new beginnings for Education at Scarboro. Stepping into the role of Education Officer for the first time was challenging yet rewarding.

I want to extend my heartfelt gratitude to Bel Kuster, who, after serving as Education Officer for an impressive 9 years, moved into the role of Beach Operations Director. Bel's support and guidance this season were invaluable during a very steep learning curve for me. I also want to thank Rory Watson, who, in his first season as a fully qualified trainer, took on the role of Assistant Education Officer with unwavering enthusiasm and support. Rory, you made a daunting experience that much easier!

This season, we welcomed two new SRC/BM trainers, Janelle Theron and Andrew Dennehy, to the team. Both Janelle and Andrew attained their Bronze Medallions just last season, highlighting their enthusiasm and dedication to Surf Life Saving. And if that wasn't enough, Andrew also became an IRB crew trainer this season.

We also welcomed Melanie Thomas, who brought invaluable experience from the East coast to our team. Mel has seamlessly integrated into the team, eager to both share her expertise and to expand her knowledge and training skills.



Our season began with the Lancelin Bronze Medallion/ SRC requal weekend in September, with 45 members trecking up the coast to ensure their proficiency for the year ahead. Taking advantage of the long weekend, many stayed on with family and friends to enjoy the Buskers Festival and all that Lancelin has to offer. A huge thank you to Michele Gates for two very comprehensive and well-run sessions. The weekend's triumph has already sparked early Lancelin accommodation bookings in anticipation of another requal long weekend.

The remainder of BM/SRC proficiencies were run regularly from October to November with many (72 to be exact) waiting for the "last chance" requal at the end of November. But as always there were stragglers who hadn't yet made it to a scheduled session, so we ran another "last chance" session in December, as well as our assessors from across the club being tapped on the shoulder to do one-offs so that clubbies could patrol or compete.

In total we held 12 BM, 4 ART, 4 IRB Driver, 2 RWC, and 3 IRB Crew requals. Thank you to our team of assessors Chris Kuster, Belinda Kuster, Michele Gates, Andrew Matraszek, David Thomson, Reece Vogels, Belinda Somers, and Peter Hilgendorf for making yourselves available to keep our members proficient.

The training season began with a rapid SRC to Bronze Medallion course during the October school holidays where six enthusiastic SRC's attained their Bronze Medallion in great conditions. Special thanks to Chris Kuster, Belinda Kuster, Rory Watson, and Peter Hilgendorf for adjusting their schedules and joining me to make sure this was a success.

Building on the success of the BM course we ran midweek rapid SRC courses in December and January for fourteen U14's, which also proved to be a success. Again, thank you to Chris Kuster, Peter Hilgendorf, Rory Watson, and Belinda Kuster for making their time available to join me in making this happen. This type



of course requires work and life schedule changes by trainers, and I appreciate their commitment to the education of our youth.

Planning is underway to offer the same for both BM and SRC early in the 2024/2025 season which is a great opportunity for our youth to gain their awards before the season begins.

The remaining Bronze/SRC courses were run jointly with all trainers pitching in. This collaborative approach not only provided flexibility for our candidates and trainers, but also offered valuable mentoring opportunities for our newer trainers, under the guidance of our more experienced team members.

Once again First Aid (HLTAID011) was offered free to members, subsidised by SLSWA grants and was facilitated by Belinda Kuster. Bel also conducted courses to external clubs during winter, providing income for the club. Bel, for this we say thank you!

This season saw the implementation of the new Silver Medallion Patrol Captain course, replacing the Silver Medallion Beach Management. Chris Kuster consulted on the review of the syllabus, with Chris and Bel successfully delivering the first course in WA to members from Scarboro and Trigg.





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As always, our trusty powercraft trainers and assessors made sure our IRB drivers and IRB crew operators are the best on the beach with numerous courses conducted throughout the year.

Also, thank you to Craig McLure for his efforts in qualifying 40 parents for their Nipper Rescue Certificate. This course is paramount in assisting age group managers keep our nippers safe every Sunday.

Finally, I want to express my gratitude to each member of our education team for their dedication, hard work, and unwavering commitment to our club's success. Each and every one of you has contributed to the ongoing education and growth of our members.

FIRST AID OFFICER REPORT: SHANE POWER



Another season done and dusted with very few major incidents, due to a very hot summer with many days being easterly winds and low surf conditions.

Stats for this year were around 193 First Aids through the Patrol Season with 7 serious

and 1 critical incident (Medical Emergency) that were dealt with.

We had an increased number of jellyfish stinger first aid treatments during the early summer months and a small percentage of incidents off the beach in public areas.

Our two external AED cabinets were accessed on 3 occasions to deal with incidents in the public area.

We added another 3 new first aid bags and oxy packs with four new automatic external defibrillators. We retired 2 old first aid bags and oxy packs to training and education.

Our Oxygen Equipment was serviced before the start of the patrols with only a few items such as Defib Pads and two new AED batteries required. We also condemned and wrote off two older AEDs that failed testing by our service provider and were not cost effective to repair. It is a requirement that all these items are serviced annually which is performed during the winter months.

Just a reminder that we have a dedicated linen hamper where all linen that is used is taken for professional washing by a dry cleaner at wholesale cost to the club. This is an infection and OHS responsibility. When we finish a first aid incident and linen is wet and sandy, we cannot simply dry it and use again. New linen is stored above the beds to replace. If at all possible, ask ambulance providers, if a transport is used, that we receive back like for like linen resources. This has worked well in the past and helps to maintain our linen levels.

We purchased 3 new epi-pens due to our current stock being expired, and 2 methoxyflurane inhalers as well.

Remember please use the white board mounted on the wall to communicate any issues that need to be addressed.

I would like to thank all members for their input and assistance throughout the season and all patrols that help to maintain the first aid in readiness. Again, a special mention to TC (Terry Colby) who has attended to the menial tasks, taking dirty linen away, sweeping, mopping the first aid room floor when required, and just being around.

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RWC OFFICER REPORT: DAVE "TOMO" THOMSON



As most members would be aware Scarboro SLSC has two Jet skis stationed at the Scarboro Club as part of an agreement with SLSWA.

We have a Yamaha VXR blue and white #44 and the other also a Yamaha VXR black and yellow #9. Both equipped with

rescue sleds and on standby, rescue ready for any callout or to help support any other external agency if required.

Scarboro's Jet skis are used as a whitewater resource because of our ability to search within a close proximity of the shore and in breaking surf. We are normally tasked with an area to conduct a search or work in conjunction with the Police Divers in a certain area. This involves at times towing Police Divers underwater on what is known as a marlin board, it enables them to cover and scan the sea floor on a greater scale and in a shorter timeframe.

As well as being part of the SLSWA's Emergency Response Team the jet skis provide support to our Clubs normal patrols and club swims when required. We also provide water safety for several outside Club events which can raise funds for the Club. This season we once again helped boost the Abalone Patrols between Trigg and Hillarys. We also utilized both jet skis once again as part of our water safety commitment with the Rottnest Chanel Swim, although having the swim cancelled halfway, they are a great resource.

Scarboro SLSC has 40 qualified Rescue Watercraft operators currently on its membership list. This is made up of several City of Stirling Lifeguards and Beach Inspectors. Amongst that list we also have 1 Trainer and 3 Trainer and Assessors within our ranks.

This season we have not run an RWC course, yet. We are now looking for expressions of interest and of course the weather to change. There is no point in training in flat surf conditions as you need to be able to handle the extreme as well as the calm. I have always said anyone can ride a jet ski but not everyone can drive a jet ski. Not all people are cut out to operate a jet ski. It isn't quite as easy as just standing there and squeezing the throttle, you have 450kg of craft to maneuver in sometimes not a lot of space with waves breaking on your head and trying not to fall off, crash or run any swimmers over. It takes a bit of skill.

So, in saying that if you think you have what it takes, we will be once again looking at running an RWC operator course for Scarboro members over winter. So, check our website site for updates and follow the links to our application process.

Thanks to all the Operators this season who put up their hand to fill shifts and help with any of the calls of assistance, it was much appreciated. Thanks for all your support.

As we move towards our 100th year working with our Strategic Plan that runs into 2028 we are working as a club to build a successful program for athlete and coach development and participation.

Doug McGhie along with Jill Briggs did a great job coaching our teams across all ages from U11 through to Open and Scarboro had teams in every event. We achieved 6 gold, 2 silver and 1 bronze.

Scarboro's team had what was undoubtedly their successful State Championships ever when they won six of the seven events contested across the Nipper, Youth and Open Championships February at Trigg. While having only 16

Open members available that was sufficient to take three gold medals and a silver from the three Open events on offer.

The day began with a win in the Open Female event, with Lily, Kathy, Erin, Janet and Belinda taking the gold with 5.14 points, a convincing win, with Sorrento in second place on 12.36 points. Trigg were third 13.0, Sorrento fourth (15.28) and our newer team of Kim, Michele, Karen, Narelle and Gill just behind with 17.34, relatively close to the pace and a great improvement on their first go at it last year. Both teams had enjoyable seasons, training regularly and improving throughout.

The Open Mixed 5 Person event saw a very close tussle, with Scarboro White (Lily, Brett, Wayne, Clint and Belinda) (7.0) narrowly beating Scarboro Yellow (Kathy, Graham, Erin, Janet, David) (7.26) and Sorrento (7.84). The Open 6 Person was equally close, with Scarboro





White's boys (Brian, Brett, Wayne, Clint, David, Graham) (5.0) narrowly pipping Sorrento Green (5.44), Trigg (6.18), Scarboro Yellow's girls (Lily, Kathy, Erin, Janet, Belinda, Michele) (6.66) and Sorrento Gold (8.06). This was an excellent display of the toughest of R&R events, with 3 swimmers in each team, two of these timed. In a very high standard event, Scarboro won the swimming battle thanks to Graham and Brett, and with equally good drill across four of the teams that guaranteed the gold.

The final for the Under 15 5 Person yielded our Youth gold medal for the day and the first in R&R. Sadie, Zac, Jack, Chiara and Brooke drilled 7.0 points to win comfortably from Trigg (9.0), Sorrento Green (12.0) and Sorrento White on 19.0. Sadie had to leave for patrol before the presentations were made, but the rest of the team was all smiles, no doubt Sadie also when she heard.


The Under 15 2 Person heats followed the reel-based events and both Scarboro pairs (Zac, Jack; Brooke, Chiara) made the final. Trigg won the event with 3.0 points, followed very closely by Brooke and Chiara on 3.5. Zac and Jack tied for third on 4.0 points but lost the bronze on a count-back, no doubt still pretty happy with their gold in the 5 person event.

We had two pairs in the Under 13 2 Person and once again won gold. Maklayla and Harry have been together for several years and even with Harry's leg injury impacting most of the season they looked great

Thank you to the whole team of parents – apart from getting your kids to training, sorting food, wet soggy towels, and deck coats...and spending your weekend






in the grandstand at HBF you helped sort teams, took great photos, kept the humour and positivity going for hours in the stand AND time kept for long stints.

Membership in the nipper and youth cohorts continues to be strong and represents a large portion of Scarboro's membership. This season we delivered the Woodside Nipper Program with our enthusiastic "Nipper Crew" to 502 enthusiastic nippers, registrations were so high in the under 6, 7 and 8 age categories that we were required to close enrolments. Ali Neilsen, Mark Levitt and Todd Knox with their respective teams oversaw the delivery of Starfish and Youth programs. We have been successful in integrating young members as they continue to grow into our club in areas of sport, lifesaving, education and development.

This season our Nipper program continued to offer great value to all families involved with a diverse range of opportunities and benefits beyond just the traditional Sunday morning activity. It was pleasing to see enthusiasm in participation at the Geraldton Country Carnival, club swims, club functions and other club sanctioned events. Our nippers always looked great in their Woodside apparel and team T-Shirts and continue to have access to well-maintained gear and equipment.

This season our Starfish Nipper program continued their collaboration with the Saba Rose Button Foundation. This association provided the opportunity for Scarboro to support children with higher needs to safely access and experience Scarborough Beach. We continued to develop our volunteers and we saw the purchase of a specialised wheelchair through the support of the City of Stirling which provides access to a cohort of participants with more diverse needs.

Participation in Surf Sports is an important element of our nipper through to youth membership and Scarboro has successfully competed across a broad range of disciplines. In the Youth space Scarboro had competitors in the pool, R&R, Ski, Beach, First Aid, Lifesaving, Swim, IRB and Board. We also saw a group of youth members form a touring team and travel to Queensland for the Australian Championships. This season our nippers continued their strong participation in surf sports with broad representation across all disciplines finishing an improved fourth overall in the club standings.

SLSWA offers opportunities through the "Youth Program" which includes development camps, leaders' program, pathways and awards. We had the flags up every week for Sunday activities and maintained the program when competition events were also running. This season 10 of our volunteers maintained formalised Age Group Manager accreditation and all of our AGMs and coaches completed working with children checks facilitated by the club Member Protection Information Officer.

In November Our Woodside Nippers hosted City of Perth Nippers at Scarborough. The Scarboro Urchins dominated winning the Jacko Day Foamie for the third year in a row, this year by 171 points. We look forward to visiting City next season for another great event.

This season competition numbers were very strong at carnivals across all disciplines. STARFISH NIPPERS REPORT: ALI NIELSEN



What a splash starfish nippers was this season! It was another wonderful season of Starfish Nippers at Scarboro Surf Life Saving Club. Firstly, I would like to thank the unwavering support of the Surf Club and in particular Graham Jones for his guidance and support in bringing this program alive, once

again this season! It is such an honour to have the opportunity to run this amazing program, and I am so grateful for everyone's support!

Through the support of the City of Stirling this season saw the donation of a new paediatric beach wheelchair to the Scarboro Surf Club. This has been a wonderful addition to the Starfish Nippers Program. This wheelchair has enabled the Starfish Nippers Program to further support and accommodate the needs of children with higher additional needs needing further adaptations for accessing the program and the beach!

Scarboro's "Starfish Nippers" is an inclusive and adaptive surf lifesaving program. Starfish Nippers

provides children and young people living with a disability or who are medically complex with the opportunity to participate in Surf Life Saving and enjoy experiences that come along with being included within our Surf Club community. Meaningful inclusion is at the heart of Starfish Nippers and is the core component of the successful running of the program at the Scarboro SLSC. Starfish Nippers provides participants with many different experiences, including the opportunity to participate in both beach and water activities, which are tailored to the individual needs of the participants.

The program accesses different specialised equipment which ensures the individual needs of the participants are met. The essence of Starfish Nippers is having the opportunity to tailor each of the modified surf lifesaving activities for the individual needs of the participants of the program, this ensures that all participants in the program can THRIVE! The program caters for children living with many different types of disabilities such as down syndrome, cerebral palsy, cystic fibrosis, speech and language delays, children living on the Autism Spectrum Disorder, children living with learning difficulties, developmental delays, intellectual disabilities, visual, auditory and sensory processing disorders, physical disabilities, hearing and visual impairments, epilepsy, as well as children living with an Acquired Brain Injury. Participants within the







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program have a varying level of ability and capacity to engage with the program, so careful and thorough consideration is needed to ensure that each of the different activities undertaken on the beach, provide for all the children to engage in.

The Starfish Nippers program this season has delivered an opportunity for participants to join a community that supports and advocates for inclusion and accessibility in Surf Life Saving and advocates in the local community. Starfish Nippers has provided families who are raising a child with special needs with the opportunity to come together to share experiences and network with other families who are experiencing similar personal situations. This achievement has been an unexpected silver lining for the program, the amazing and supportive connections and relationships that the parents and families are able to support one another, to feel safe and share experiences. The community that has been created within the Starfish Nippers Program at Scarboro is one like no other. The beach becomes alive when Starfish Nippers is on, the smiles on the participants' and volunteers faces throughout the program are seen throughout the entire beach on a Sunday Morning.

The achievements of the Starfish Nipper program at Scarboro have a significant impact on the participants and families that are involved, but also the Scarboro SLSC Community and other organisations in Western

Australia who we partner with to advocate for the importance of inclusion.

Starfish Nippers provides participants with the opportunity to participate in Surf Life Saving, but it also provides volunteers from within the Scarboro community with the opportunity to assist the participants. Starfish Nippers also provides a new avenue for volunteers to join and participate in Surf Life Saving with a constructive and meaningful purpose.

With access to experienced experts in the disability sector, our members have also been able to develop and draw on transferable skills which assist our club and the personal development of our volunteers. We regularly evaluate the program and seek feedback from volunteers, participants and families to ensure that we are providing the best experience possible and meeting the complex needs of the participants in the program. This helps the program to evolve to deliver the best outcomes for participants, families and volunteers. Not only do our volunteers have a wonderful opportunity to bring this program to life, but our volunteers also have the chance to gain and develop transferable skills and experiences that provide them with the opportunity to take with them into their communities and workplaces.

Surf Life Saving Western Australia (SLSWA) places young people in between the ages of 13-17 years old into the 'youth' category. The club recognises this important cohort of life savers and has embarked on a formalised program to ensure youth are properly supported in the transition from 'nippers' into the adult (senior) disciplines within Surf Life Saving. The objective is to encourage all nippers to stay involved with the club and surf lifesaving in general through a formalised experiential program that aims to link all 'youth' with a senior element or discipline of their interest within the club. The philosophy is that connected youth will stay actively involved with the club for longer. Ideally, we want them to stay for a very long time and go on to become the future custodians of the club and the important role that it plays in supporting the local community.

The club strategy to achieve this aim comes primarily from the SLSWA Youth Program, together with a recognition and reward system drawn primarily from the broader Surf Life Saving Australia – Youth Engagement Program (YEP). At the heart of both initiatives is the

concept that youth need to be given the opportunity to experience all the components of Surf Life Saving available to them within the club, in a safe, fun and collegial environment.

It was important to the Youth Engagement Team (YET or 'Yetti's) that the youth felt a sense of identity and affiliation with both the program and the club from their first introduction to the YEP. To that end, the club funded the development of a logo for the youth program, as well as the production of a range of merchandise to promote the scheme to the youth of the club. A big thank you to Morgan Knox for her excellent design at rather short notice. The attached design is contemporary and befitting for a program of this calibre.

Through our sponsors, the club undertook a commitment to ensure every member of the YEP was given a T-shirt with the new youth logo on the back, as well as the club and sponsor recognition on the sleeves. This was a big hit with the youth who are often spotted wearing the shirts outside of the surf club environment.



The club also funded a range of merchandise for the Youth Engagement: Bronze Award 'bronze' level of recognition for 'Youthies' that took the time to gather and capture their experiential journey throughout the season and accumulate the required number of points for the first step in the YEP. A big well done to those 'Youthies' that have made such an important contribution to the club over the season. The corduroy peak cap with the youth logo is a much sought after reward that cannot be purchased, only earnt. Please encourage those Youth that you see around the club with that hat on, they have demonstrated a commitment to the club appropriate for their age and experience.

The success of the youth programs requires a whole of club approach. Without the active involvement of all the various elements, disciplines and sports of the club, the program would not be able to achieve its, and therefore the club objectives. I would like to thank the guidance of Graham Jones and unwavering and full support of all the board members, as well as the various volunteers that took the time to demonstrate or facilitated an experience for all the youth throughout the season. Thank you to the wonderful Education Team once again and specifically Rory who was 'allocated' to the youth program each Sunday to ensure that the team conveyed correct and contemporary information to the youth.

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FINANCE DIRECTORS REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2024

The 2023/2024 season saw steady growth, stability, and investment. This direction led to a net deficit of \$57k, highlighting our commitment to our members and the club's future.

Key Financial Highlights:

- Membership revenue increased from \$151k to \$154k.
- Cash and cash equivalents (including term deposits) increased by \$13k to \$548k.
- Revenue of \$210k from ancillary operations (functions, merchandise, canteen, and bar).
- Sponsorship, grants, and donations totalled \$105k from community partnerships.
- Lifesaving and patrol efforts contributed approximately \$90k from water safety and patrol services.
- \$60k invested in new equipment for education, lifesaving operations and competitors.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2024

1. Summary of significant accounting policies

In the opinion of the Board, the Club is not a reporting entity because there are no users reliant on general purpose financial statements, therefore these financial statements are special purpose financial statements for the purposes of Section 60-30 of the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Regulations 2013.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of section 26 of the Associations Incorporation Act 2015 (WA), Section 60-15 of the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Act 2012 (Cth) ("ACNC Act").

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements specified by the Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') and the disclosure requirements of AASB 101 'Presentation of Financial Statements', AASB 107 'Statement of Cash Flows', AASB 108 'Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors', AASB 1048 'Interpretation of Standards' and AASB 1054 'Australian Additional Disclosures', as appropriate for not-for-profit oriented entities

Revenue recognition

The incorporated association recognises revenue as follows:

Sales revenue

Sale of goods, events, fundraising, and raffles are recognised when received or receivable.

Donations and memberships

Donations and Memberships are recognised at the time they are received.

Grants

Grants are recognised at their fair value where there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received, and all attached conditions will be complied with. Funds received in advance of the provision of services are recognised as liabilities by the Club and are not recognised as revenue until such time as services have been provided.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and Cash Equivalents represent cash held in bank accounts with Australian domiciled banks, which are highly liquid and convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to insignificant risk of changes in value.

Trade and other receivables

Trade and other receivables represent amounts owed to the Club and not received at year end. Where it is determined that a receivable is impaired a provision is made for the value of the debt which in the Club's view may not be recoverable.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2024

Inventory

Inventories are recognised at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Inventories are valued on a first-in, first- out basis.

Plant and equipment and leasehold improvements

The accounting treatment of Plant and equipment and leasehold improvements is determined by its value and nature.

Any acquisition with a value of less than \$5,000 will be expensed. Any acquisition more than \$5,000 that becomes a fixture or fitting will also be expensed. Any other acquisition more than \$5,000 is recognised at historical cost, and unless specified are not adjusted for changes in fair value.

After acquisition, the Club recognises accumulated depreciation/amortisation against the cost of the asset and recognises a corresponding depreciation/amortisation expense in the Statement of Income and Expenditure over the estimated useful life.

The initial useful lives estimate of plant and equipment held at balance date range from 4 to 5 years. Leasehold improvements are amortised over their estimated useful life determined at acquisition date, being the lesser of the term of the relevant lease or value in use (10 years).

Function Room Hire

The following judgements and estimates are used in relation to the allocation of expenditure against the function room hire income as per Note 8:

Trade and Other Payables

Trade and Other Payables represent amounts owed by the Club to suppliers, including employees, for goods and services received and which have not been paid for at year end.

Employee benefits

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits, annual leave and long service leave expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Going Concern

The financial report has been prepared on a going concern basis, which contemplates the continuity of normal business, economic activities and the realisation of assets and discharge of liabilities in the normal course of business. In arriving at this position, in the opinion of those charged with governance, the club will, based on varying cash flow forecasts have access to sufficient funds to meet administrative and other committed expenditure for a period of not less than 12 months from the date of this report.

Critical accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue, and expenses.

Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

Provision for impairment of inventories

The provision for impairment of inventories assessment requires a degree of estimation and judgement. The level of the provision is assessed by considering the recent sales experience, the ageing of inventories and other factors that affect inventory obsolescence.

Impairment of Fixed Assets

Fixed Assets are reviewed annually to determine if the asset is impaired, that is, the carrying value of the asset will not be recovered by the Club either through continued use or sale. Where the carrying value of an asset is determined to be impaired, the Club expenses the excess value to the Statement of Income and Expenditure immediately.

Estimation of useful lives of assets

The incorporated association determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation and amortisation charges for its property, plant and equipment and finite life intangible assets. The useful lives could change significantly because of technical innovations or some other event. The depreciation and amortisation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written off or written down.
