DID YOU KNOW?

Did You Know that to mark the Regiment's 20th Anniversary next year a Royal Regiment of Scotland statue has been commissioned and will be unveiled in West Princes Street Gardens between the amphitheatre and the Ross Fountain with our Regimental Headquarters at Edinburgh Castle serving as its backdrop.

Designed by renowned sculptor Kenny Hunter, the statue will feature a reclining lion, inspired by our Regiment's cap badge. The lion's posture reflects a moment of reflection and contemplation, while its scale and craftsmanship will symbolise the Regiment's strength, courage, and unity.

The lion will be cast in six separate sections, representing the six historic Scottish infantry regiments that came together to form The Royal Regiment of Scotland. These sections will be welded together, with the seams intentionally left visible to highlight the strength that comes from our unity. The base and plinth will echo this theme, constructed from six separate stones to emphasise the Regiment's proud heritage.

The statue is not a war memorial. It is a timeless tribute to those who have gone before us, those who are serving and those who will serve. Furthermore, the statue will be a link to our local

community and visitors to Edinburgh who will come to know who we are and what we stand for. It will be a place for quiet reflection and pride, where our soldiers, veterans, and families can honour the past, celebrate the present, and look to the future. It will also serve as a focal point for small remembrance events.

The Colonel of the Regiment, Major General Robin Lindsay CBE, said: "This statue will stand as a proud symbol of Scotland's senior line infantry regiment. It reflects our heritage, honours all who have served, and looks ahead to the next generation. It will provide a fitting place for reflection and recognition, not only for the serving and veteran community, but for all who visit our city and its gardens. Edinburgh is our home, and we are deeply grateful to City of Edinburgh and those who supported this project, as we mark 20 years of service at home and overseas."

SCOTTISH GAMES, GREENVILLE

Eight soldiers from 2 SCOTS had the privilege of representing the battalion as the Scottish Honour Guard at the 2025 Greenville Games in South Carolina.

Since 2011, 2 SCOTS has sent a contingent annually to this event, which celebrates Scottish heritage in a region with deep historical ties to Scotland. Many Scottish clans settled in Greenville in the late 18th century after the Jacobite uprising, leaving a lasting cultural legacy.

This year's trip, led by WO2 Chris Andrews, was a packed and memorable experience. Highlights included meeting the Greenville Triumph Soccer Team (with some friendly debate over the term "fitba"), attending a WWE event, visiting a veterans' centre, leading the annual Greenville Games parade, and even trying their hand at line dancing. The soldiers were hosted at various events, including the prestigious St. Andrews Society, and concluded the week by marching as the 2025 Scottish Honour Guard at the games. Despite the challenges of the heat in No. 1 dress, the honour

of participating made it all worthwhile. The trip was made possible by the St. Andrews Society, particularly organiser Jay Spivey and their ever-humble "bus driver," Kevin McBride. The society, now in its 49th year, is dedicated to celebrating Scottish heritage, hosting events such as their own Burns Night and the Tartan Ball.

Reflecting on the experience, WO2 Andrews described it as one of the most rewarding of his 21-year career: "I joined the Army to travel, meet new people, and experience different cultures. The Greenville Games delivered all of that and more. To be treated like superstars by such kind and passionate people was incredible. I encourage everyone in 2 SCOTS to put their name forward for the 2026 games."

FRANCE REBURIAL AND REDEDICATION SERVICES

On 6th July, 12 soldiers from 2 SCOTS travelled to France to participate in a series of reburial and rededication services for five Scottish soldiers killed in the First World War. The first service was a full reburial for CQMS Monro of the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders, whose remains were recently identified through the efforts of the JCCC Commemorations Team.

Led by WO2 Donnell, the bearer party, comprising six Fusiliers and JNCOs, delivered immaculate drill and turnout after weeks of preparation. The service, held at Aubers Ridge British Cemetery, was led by Maj (Revd) Thompson, with music provided by Cpl McEntee (bugler) and LCpl Stewart from 7 SCOTS (piper). Capt Macpherson read at all five services and supported attending families with great care.

Subsequent rededication services were held across France and Belgium for soldiers from the Highland Light Infantry, Seaforth Highlanders,

and Argylls. Relatives, some travelling from as far as New Zealand, were deeply moved by the ceremonies, many learning for the first time about their ancestors' lives and sacrifices.

The trip was a profound experience for all involved, with the privilege of representing The Royal Regiment of Scotland keenly felt. In their downtime, the group visited other cemeteries and Vimy Ridge, strengthening bonds over shared meals and reflection.

4 SCOTS BEGINS NEW CHAPTER IN CYPRUS

The 4th Battalion has now officially completed its move to Dhekelia, Cyprus, marking the start of an exciting new chapter for the unit and their families. The relocation was a significant logistical effort, with service personnel and their loved ones travelling by various means — some driving across Europe via ferries, others flying directly, and equipment transported by land and sea. Now fully established in their new Mediterranean home, the battalion is settling into life in Dhekelia.

Cyprus offers a distinct change of pace, with its warm climate, vibrant culture, and close-knit garrison community. Adjusting to new working environments, 0630 PT sessions, and integrating into local schools and services has been part of the transition. For families, the posting provides

a unique opportunity to experience life abroad together, while the battalion benefits from valuable training opportunities in a strategic location.

This two-year deployment highlights Cyprus's importance as a forward base for British forces, enabling rapid responses to regional crises. From peacekeeping and humanitarian missions to potential operational deployments, the island serves as a vital platform for projecting stability across the Eastern Mediterranean, North Africa, and the Middle East.

With Alexander Barracks now firmly established as home, 4 SCOTS look forward to embracing the challenges and opportunities that the next two years will bring under the Mediterranean sun.



FROM TARTAN TO TANLINES LIFE AT DHEKELIA

For 4 SCOTS, life at Alexander Barracks, Dhekelia, comes with a unique backdrop: the blue waters of the Mediterranean.

The Dhekelia Watersports Centre, located on the beach, has quickly become a favourite for soldiers and families alike. Run by a team of trained soldiers, it offers activities such as paddle boarding, wakeboarding, and kayaking — a refreshing way to stay active and beat the Cypriot heat. These activities not only build fitness and resilience but also create lasting memories for families, especially children learning new skills on the Mediterranean waves.

Braithrean Company were the first to arrive in Cyprus, tasked with maintaining 48 hours' notice to

move as the Lead Company Group for the Regional Standby Battalion. While this has meant significant guard duties, the Jocks have embraced island life during their downtime, from trying lobster for the first time to enjoying the Battalion's private beach and even taking part in a try dive.

As the summer sun shines on, the Watersports Centre and the island's opportunities highlight that Army life overseas is as much about adventure and community as it is about duty.




OP KIPION

In August, a platoon from Alpha Company, 4 SCOTS deployed to Bahrain as part of Op KIPION, the UK's enduring commitment to security in the Gulf region. Taking over the Force Protection role from 1 PWRR, the platoon is now based at the UK Naval Support Facility, working alongside other branches of the UK Armed Forces and their American counterparts at the neighbouring US Naval base.

The deployment has already proven to be a valuable experience, with the platoon engaging in Close Quarters Battle (CQB) training alongside

the US Coast Guard and Navy SEALs. These joint exercises have strengthened interoperability and provided an opportunity to learn from their allies. It's not all work, though—during their downtime, the platoon has been making the most of Bahrain's unique offerings, including an adrenaline-filled session of go-karting on the iconic Bahrain F1 circuit.



EX HIGHLAND EXPRESS

In June 2025, six reservists arrived at Dunstaffnage Marina, to take over HMSTC POCHARD, their home for a week of challenge, adventure, and camaraderie. Led by experienced skipper Lt Col Ed Brooks, the crew set sail into gale-force winds, quickly learning that this was no ordinary training exercise.

The first days, battling strong winds across Loch Linnhe and the Sound of Mull, tested even the experienced sailors and gave novices a true taste of Adventure Training. As the weather improved, the crew ventured into the open Sea of the Hebrides, reaching the Isle of Canna. Choppy seas lingered, but fair winds allowed for good progress, with only the skipper and Pte Gus Strudwick keeping their sea legs throughout.

A calm, sunny day brought the chance to hoist the spinnaker, a new experience for most, and the crew enjoyed the thrill of sail-power in ideal conditions. After a lunch stop at Rum, they continued north to anchor in the breathtaking Loch Scavaig, nestled in Skye's Cuillin Mountains.

The return journey began with a resupply stop in Mallaig before a challenging southbound leg through the Sound of Mull. Despite unfavourable wind and tide, spirits were lifted by the unforgettable sight of a pod of 30 dolphins accompanying the boat around Ardnamurchan Point.

By the end of the week, the crew was physically and mentally exhausted but had built resilience, leadership, and teamwork. For novice Pte Calum Steven, it was a baptism of fire into offshore sailing, but for all, it was an unforgettable adventure.

SCOTTISH ISLANDS PEAKS RACE

The Scottish Islands Peaks Race is a unique adventure combining offshore sailing and hill running through stunning British Isles scenery. Teams sail from Oban to Troon via Mull, Jura, and Arran, running up the islands' highest peaks using only wind, tide, and ingenuity. Spanning 160 nautical miles of sailing and 60 miles of running, the race demands strong hill and navigational skills, attracting elite athletes and recreational teams alike.

This year, 4SCOTS entered two interservice teams: Rival Bear, skippered by Paddy Hand, runners Capt Hand (First Mate), Capt Boyle, Hldr Hill, and Hldr Murray. Pintail IX, skippered by Lt Cage-Whyte (REME), with First Mate Cpl Daly and runners Lt Ritchie, Cpl Whyte and LCpl Gynne. With only these two teams competing, a fierce rivalry was assured.

Ahead of the race on 16 May, the teams spent the week preparing, practising sailing and the tricky

transition from boat to shore, where runners row to designated start points. For many, it was their first time on a boat, with lessons ranging from tacking and gybing to making tea at 45 degrees.

After last-minute boat repairs and a food stock-up, two teams—Hldrs Hill and Murray, and Lt Ritchie and LCpl Gynne—lined up for the Oban race alongside 36 others. The 4-mile hill run from the yacht club to Oban's highest peak and back was gruelling, with Hill and Murray briefly claiming the lead before being overtaken by elite runners. They finished in under 35 minutes, with Ritchie and Gynne close behind.

The next challenge was the chaotic dinghy row to the yachts amidst 36 boats jostling in Oban Bay, dodging trawlers, ferries, and water taxis. With minimal wind (1kt gusting 3), some teams used innovative rowing setups, including a cycling-powered turbine. Lacking such equipment, our teams resorted to towing their yachts with dinghies to reach open water.

Pintail pushed ahead with the main pack, while Rival Bear took a steadier approach in the bottom third. Pintail's runners, Lt Ritchie and Cpl Whyte, completed Ben More in daylight at 6hr 25min. Rival Bear's Capt Hand and Capt Boyle tackled a twilight descent and a dark 6-mile road run, finishing in 6hr 16min, closing the gap on several teams as tides turned against the competition's tail end.

While runners rested, Pintail pushed hard through Duit Point but ran aground attempting a risky Tiger Line, damaging their keel. Sadly, they were forced to withdraw, ending their race.

Rival Bear's runners awoke to the news they were the sole team in the Inter-Services category, with victory in sight. However, sailing Rival Bear felt like racing a Morris Minor in F1—light winds and strong tides left them crawling at 9nm in 6 hours, 30nm behind the leaders. With dwindling food and water stocks and a forecast predicting no improvement, the decision was made to use the engine.

Capt Hand and Hldr Murray took on Rival Bear's Jura leg, greeted at Craighouse by the CO and RSM. After a kit check, they set off at pace, aiming to summit the first Pap before sunset. The terrain was brutal, with loose rocks and boulder fields making both ascents and descents treacherous. They overtook their first team after 5km and reached the first Pap before twilight, navigating the remaining Paps by headtorch.

Despite a tricky descent from the third Pap, the pair maintained their position and pushed hard along a river path to rejoin the race route. A final 5km road run brought them back to Craighouse in under six hours.

After a calm but cold night, favourable tides and the Iron Sail propelled Rival Bear swiftly around the Mull of Kintyre. Spirits were high, with Hldr Hill excelling in the galley, serving bacon and sausage rolls. Arran and Lamlash Bay came into view far sooner than expected. Capt Boyle, Hldr Murray, and a last-minute addition, Capt Hand, tackled the 18-mile leg, including a 6-mile road run and a summit climb. Despite exhaustion, the trio made good time, though Hldr Murray endured hours of "Officer Patter."

Winds picked up to 25+ kts with heavy swell in Lamlash Bay. After several failed attempts to launch their dinghy, the runners finally made a perilous crossing, taking on water. Rival Bear executed a skilful night-time pickup, with Hldr Hill's fingertip catch of the dinghy painter saving the day.

Paddy Hand's famous jambalaya awaited the runners as Rival Bear set off on its final leg. With morale high, the team crossed the Firth of Clyde, arriving in Troon just after 6am on Monday. Hldrs Murray and Hill completed the final row ashore, tapping in to conclude the race.
