

In one instance, I noticed a subtle change in an elderly gentleman's speech and persisted until his family took him to the hospital for further evaluation, preventing potential harm. While working with family members can be trying at times, my training has taught me to listen attentively and approach each situation respectfully. Helping others is second nature to me, and I've always found fulfillment in this line of work. As a patient support worker, I'm dedicated to making a positive impact on people's lives while preserving their dignity.
