Uncountable nouns refer to intangible concepts or homogeneous substances and are not used with the article "a" or "an". Gerunds are verb forms ending in -ing that function as nouns and describe activities. The possessive case shows relationships between nouns in a sentence. The possessive form of nouns can be understood by looking at different cases and relationships. Possessive case is formed when a person owns something or has an association with it, which can take the form of ownership, possession, occupancy, or any other kind of relationship. For singular nouns, adding an apostrophe followed by s forms the possessive case, as seen in 'The cat's toy was missing' and 'Casey's sister is a geologist'. The novel's release made quite a splash, indicating that the novel is being used as an object in this context. For plural nouns ending with -s or -es, adding just an apostrophe forms the possessive case, such as 'My nieces' prom outfits were exquisite', whereas for irregular plural nouns, adding '-s is necessary. However, when a singular noun ends with s or z, following the rule of adding '-s often applies. Nouns play different roles in sentences based on their relationships to other words. Nouns can be subjects, objects, subject complements, or object complements. As subjects, nouns are the persons, places, or things performing actions described by verbs. For example, 'Maria played the piece beautifully' has Maria as its subject. Nouns can also be objects of transitive verbs, either direct objects receiving the action or indirect objects receiving the direct object. In sentences like 'Cleo passed Otto the salt', the noun salt is both a direct and indirect object. Furthermore, nouns can serve as subject complements giving more information about the subject in a sentence, as seen in 'A teacher is what Mary is'. They can also act as object complements providing more information about the direct object of transitive verbs. Given article text here as appositives A noun used as an appositive immediately follows another noun to further define or identify it. The second noun is in apposition to the first noun. My brother, Michael, is six years old. Michael is an appositive here, further identifying the noun phrase my brother. Appositives can be restrictive or nonrestrictive. In the above example, the fact that it is set off between commas suggests that Michael is nonrestrictive—that is, it could be left out of the sentence without omitting essential information about who is six years old. In other words, we can surmise that Michael is the writer's only brother; telling us his name is extra information about him. Here is a version of the same sentence where the appositive is used restrictively without being set off by commas: My brother Michael is six years old. In this case, the appositive Michael is providing information that is essential for narrowing down which brother the writer is telling us about. We can infer that they have multiple brothers, and understand that it is the one named Michael who is six years old. Abstract Noun: An Abstract Noun is the name given to a quality, a state or a concept. These are something which we can neither see nor touch but which we can only feel or think of them.
