What our IADVL Constitution 2024 says:

The Constitution and SOPs of IADVL do not explicitly regulate **faculty participation limits** in academic sessions at conferences.

Conference scientific programs are generally handled by **scientific committees** under the **IADVL Academy** and

local Organizing Committees, with EC oversight. Dr. Rajeev sharma

No constitutional amendment is required for such operational policies; it can be included as a **conference or**

**scientific program guideline.**

Nature of Proposal:

This is a **policy proposal** related to conference faculty allotment.

Impact on IADVL:

**Merits:**

Encourages **broader participation** by creating opportunities for more members, especially young and emerging dermatologists.

Helps **avoid repetitive faculty lineups** and addresses concerns about perceived favoritism or faculty monopolization.

Promotes academic diversity and inclusivity in scientific sessions.

**Concerns:**

Needs careful framing of exceptions (e.g., plenary speakers, award lectures, workshops). Must ensure scientific quality is not compromised by limiting sessions for certain experts. Flexibility may be required for niche topics with limited specialists.

Conclusion & Recommendation:

The proposal has strong merit in promoting fairness, diversity, and encouraging younger members.

It can be implemented as a **conference policy** via the IADVL Academy, with clear guidelines and defined

exceptions (for keynote, plenary, invited award lectures, etc.).

No constitutional amendment is needed.

It should be routed to the **IADVL Academy** for policy drafting, followed by EC approval and incorporation into the

**conference SOPs**.

**Dr. Rajeev Sharma stated that in conferences, a faculty member should not be allowed to participate in more than two academic sessions, and this should be implemented.**

**Dr. Deepika Pandhi LM/ND/3772 suggested that in case of last-minute faculty dropouts, it may become necessary for some faculty members to participate in more than two academic sessions. Therefore, last-minute exceptions should be permitted.**

**Dr. Rajeev Sharma agreed, stating that such relaxation would be allowed only in emergencies; otherwise, the rule should be strictly followed.**

- Silent campaigning is already taking place.
- Virtual meetings for candidates are being scheduled.
- Candidates are already aligned with NMC norms.
- The only modification required in the current proposal is:
- Candidates must submit an undertaking on stamp paper declaring that they

will not employ non-MBBS doctors in their clinical practice.

Suggestion by Dr. VenkatRam Mysore LM/KN/3211 LM/KN/3211

- The undertaking should be executed on a ₹100 stamp paper, duly notarized

by the candidates.

Dr Rajetha Damisetty LM/TS/4726 LM/TS/4726 enquired whether BDS graduates can be employed as receptionists in a skin clinic. Dr. Vinay Singh LM/ND/2993 responded that BDS graduates cannot be employed, as it is difficult to judge whether they are working purely as receptionists or are involved in procedures such as operating laser systems.

Dr. P. Narsimha Rao LM/TS/134 LM/TS/134 suggested that the wording of the proposal should be modified, as it is not possible for anyone to control the entire clinic. Dr. Rajeev Sharma LM/UP&UK/2251 concluded and finalized that the statement would read: 'I will not employ any non-MBBS doctor in my clinical setup.'"

Dr. Deepika Pandhi LM/ND/3772 inquired whether MBBS doctors can be trained in Botox and fillers. Dr. Vinay Singh LM/ND/2993 responded that priority should first be given to stopping non-MBBS practitioners before considering MBBS doctors. Dr. Rajeev Sharma LM/UP&UK/2251 added that, as per NMC guidelines, MBBS graduates are not considered quacks, and while they are permitted to practice in any subject, they cannot designate themselves as specialists.

Dr. Venkatram Mysore LM/KN/3211 clarified that the proposal applies only to the contestants who are going to contest the elections.



Dr. Janak Thakkar LM / G / 455 questioned why the restriction should apply only to contestants, suggesting that it ought to apply to every member. Dr. Rajeev Sharma LM/UP&UK/2251 responded that the requirement is already included in the constitution and should be applicable to all candidates. Dr. V.K. Sharma LM/ND/1652 further suggested that the implementation should begin at the national level, then extend to the state level, subsequently to each committee and committee member, and finally to the general membership




- **How will it help IADVL?** Brief introduction.

### Key Discussions: What does "high-interest paying instrument" mean?

IADVL cannot invest in stocks/ETFs under the Society Registration Act → Only mutual funds & fixed deposits allowed. Will there be income tax on interest earned? Interest rates are expected to decline, affecting payouts. Disbursement only after one year (as total deaths are known at year-end). Instead of creating new fellowships, existing grants should be increased (DVLWT funds can be strengthened).



Dr. Vinay Singh LM/ND/2993 observed that most of the IADVL funds are kept in savings bank accounts with low interest rates. He suggested that these funds could be shifted to higher-yielding investments where the principal remains secure, thereby generating more interest for member benefits.



Collection of CME credit hours has been mandated by majority of the State Medical Councils for renewal of

registration. At present there is no stringent check on the actual presence of the delegate inside hall during

scientific sessions, based upon which the CME credit hours are awarded. The implementation of such a check

will ensure that scientific halls don't remain empty, especially during early hours of the day, immediately after

lunch and on the last day. Empty halls demotivate faculties, who have put their heart and soul into creating a scientific lecture. This will also reduce the overcrowding in pharma stalls.

What our IADVL Constitution 2024 says:

The Constitution and SOPs outline **conference organization, scientific content, and financial rules**, but they **do not specify mechanisms for awarding CME credits**.

CME credits are generally governed by **State Medical Councils**, but IADVL, as the organizer, can implement

attendance-based monitoring to align with state guidelines.

The Constitution permits **conference SOP modifications** by the IADVL Academy and the EC.

Nature of Proposal: This proposal pertains to **policy and conference SOPs**, not the Constitution.

It involves the implementation of **attendance tracking** for awarding CME credits.

Impact on IADVL:

**Merits:**

Promotes **active participation** in scientific sessions.

Ensures **fair awarding of CME credits** based on actual attendance.

Motivates faculty by improving audience presence during sessions, especially in low-attendance slots (early morning, post-lunch, last day).

Reduces unnecessary crowding in non-scientific areas (exhibitions, stalls).

**Concerns:**

Needs careful operational planning, such as:

Entry/exit tracking via QR codes, RFID, or manual methods.

Privacy and logistical considerations.

Coordination with State Medical Councils for credit validity.

There may be some special issue like: special population, differently able people, females with small child

or lactating mother, or elderly. We need to think and concern all before we just reach a number game.

**Conclusion & Recommendation:**

The proposal is justified and timely, promoting scientific integrity and better conference engagement.

No constitutional amendment is needed; it can be adopted as a **conference policy** under the **IADVL Academy**

and EC supervision, with special mention of special population like differently able people, females with small

child or lactating mother, or elderly, etc. We need to think and concern all before we just reach a number game.

Must be referred to the **IADVL Academy** to draft operational guidelines and recommend based on all aspect as

well as solutions for better IADVL.

The proposal can be first discussed at EC/IADVL Academy then CC level for consensus.

**Dr. Rajeev Sharma suggested that if 80% attendance can be implemented in CC meetings, it should also be applied to conferences.**

**Decision: this proposal will be drafted by the IADVL Academy and subsequently presented in the ABGM.**

**Proposal 9 Zone-Wise Rotation Policy for DERMACON Bidding cfc and const**

Dr. Sudip Das LM/WB/3322 proposed that, for the benefit of conferences, certain venues should be pre-selected by IADVL and the hosting of the national Dermacon should rotate zone-wise. This would ensure that every zone gets a fair chance to organise the national conference, and also allow participation from many cities that currently do not get the opportunity, as the process is often linked to elections. He emphasised that such a system would be for the overall betterment of IADVL.

Dr. Himanshu Gupta LM/ND/7241 suggested that a zone-wise distribution of elections is necessary. He explained that when two zones contest against each other, the zone with a larger number of members often wins, regardless of merit. As a result, zones that deserve to host the national Dermacon but have fewer members or less voting power are disadvantaged. He recommended that a zone-wise rotation policy be adopted to ensure fairness in both elections and conference hosting.

Dr. P. Narsimha Rao LM/TS/134 stated that, since this proposal originated from a particular zone, it should be communicated to all zones. Consent should be obtained from each zone to determine whether a rotation policy for hosting the Dermacon can be implemented.

Dr. Saumya Panda LM/WB/2805 stated that the proposal had the support of members from two zones, and therefore it is not limited to a single zone. He emphasised that the rotation policy should be implemented to ensure that every zone has a fair opportunity to host the Dermacon.

Dr. Putta Srinivas LM/TS/59 further added that certain zones, such as the South Zone, have many cities capable of hosting the Dermacon. He raised the concern of how it would be decided which city gets to conduct the conference, given the multiple options available.

Decision: Dr. Rajeev Sharma LM/UP&UK/2251 suggested that every zone has sufficient venues, and each city is capable of hosting the Dermacon, not just those in the South Zone. It was finally decided that the proposal would be Referred to the ABGM with referral to the CFC and Constitution Committee, and the decision would be communicated in the CC group.

## **Proposal 10: Resignation Due to Conflict of Interest const**

Plan: Election candidates holding administrative posts may resign only if they win the election. Ensures continuity in state branch and academic activities of IADVL. The Bidding Committee for DERMACON should further discuss the clause clarification.

Dr. Sudip Das LM/WB/3322 explained the rationale behind requiring a contestant to resign from their current post in IADVL before contesting an election.

For example, if a person is a SIG coordinator and he wants to contest for election, how can he influence more persons? So this should be brought in consideration.

Dr. Rajeev Sharma LM/UP& UK/2251 agreed that for a post in a conference scheduled two years later, it may not be necessary for a person to resign from their current position. He raised the question of how someone could potentially influence others in this scenario and opened the floor for discussion.

Dr. Deepika Pandhi LM/ND/3772 stated that many complaints arise from fellow contestants, noting that if a person already holds a position in a committee, or serves as a coordinator or convener, they may try to influence the committee or other members to vote in their favor. She suggested that it would be better for the election officers to provide guidance on this matter.

Dr. VenkatRam Mysore LM/KN/3211 noted that while complaints often come from fellow contestants, it is very difficult to determine what actions are acceptable and where to draw the line. He agreed that there should be some clear guidelines—a boundary that contestants should not cross.

Dr. P. Narsimha Rao LM/TS/134 suggested that since nominations usually open in April and elections are held in October, contestants should avoid any conflict of interest during this six-month period. This would be in the best interest of the association and would also ensure the smooth conduct of the elections.

Dr. V.K. Sharma LM/ND/1652 suggested that the possibility of conflict of interest in such cases is minimal. A contestant may be able to influence only a limited circle of friends or contacts, but it is not possible to influence all members. Hence, this issue deserves relatively low consideration.

Dr. Ramesh Bhat LM/KN/2051 suggested that if a SIG coordinator contests an election, they may travel to different places, influence people, and carry out campaigning, which should be restricted. In response, Dr. Rajeev Sharma LM/UP& UK/2251 stated that if a person takes up a role such as coordinator, editor, or convener, they should, in return, agree not to contest elections for the next two years.

Decision: The final decision, as stated by Dr. Rajeev Sharma LM/UP& UK/2251 , was that this proposal should be referred to the ABGM, but only after the Constitution Committee provides clear guidelines on it.

As in recent years there have been 1) some instances reported of quackery promotion by members, 2) many states have either different bye-laws or do not have registered societies, and also 3) some alleged financial misappropriations which has led to lots of time & energy wastage of the National EC which is committed for a clean IADVL, as we are slapped with notices from income tax department and for the first time in the history of IADVL, have to go for a forensic audit. For a smooth coordination between the functioning of National IADVL & the state IADVL branches, this step is necessary. To encourage having standing committees, it can be discussed that if a state does not fulfil the above-mentioned requisite, then the state will not be eligible to host SIG activities, Mid-dermacon & Dermacon, and other important IADVL activities. If constitutional – will it replace the existing clause? Or modify? Give detail of the clause – page no. and clause no.

### **Constitution committee Comments**

What our IADVL Constitution 2024 says:

#### **Committees in IADVL Constitution:**

The Constitution already provides for various Standing Committees at the National Level (Section D, Rule 3, Page 33–34).

These committees can include advisory and expert members, as per need. It mandates that all committees must include members from IADVL and explicitly mentions *no non-member* shall be allowed. It specifies a two-year term for crucial committees like the Constitution Committee, Finance Committee, and Academy.



### **State Branches' Autonomy:**

State branches are allowed to frame their own rules to maintain their autonomy, provided they do not conflict with the

National Constitution (Section C, Page 23–24).

States can set up their own committees but align with the national rules.

No explicit mandate currently exists in the Constitution for every state branch to compulsorily have Ethics and

### **Disciplinary Committees.**

### **Administrative & Constitutional Nature:**

This proposal qualifies as both administrative and constitutional. It proposes a new constitutional mandate requiring

uniform committee formation at the state level.

### **Impact on IADVL:**

This proposal strengthens ethical governance, ensures uniformity, and enhances accountability across all state branches.

It reduces risks of administrative lapses and legal/financial scrutiny by proactively managing complaints and ethics issues. Aligning such mandatory committees with central IADVL policies will lead to smoother coordination.

### **Recommendation:**

Yes, this proposal requires constitutional amendment as it seeks to *add* a new clause mandating state-level committee.

Referral to the **Constitution Committee** is necessary for clause drafting, placement, and legal vetting

### **Note:**

The clause does not replace any existing clause but introduces a *new mandatory provision*. Careful phrasing is needed to maintain state autonomy yet ensure uniform compliance.

### **Review:**

The proposal seeks to make it *mandatory* for every IADVL state branch to have an **Ethics Committee** and a **Disciplinary**

**Committee** with a minimum of five members (odd number preferred). If a state has an Anti-Quackery Committee, either merge or rename Ethics & Anti quackery Committee if possible. Currently, no such mandatory clause exists in the Constitution, though state branches can form committees on their own.

This proposal qualifies as both **administrative** and **constitutional**, as it aims to enforce uniform ethical structures across all states. It aligns with IADVL's mission of *clean, transparent, and accountable governance*.

### **Conclusion & Recommendation:**

The proposal is justified, timely, and necessary for strengthening IADVL's governance framework across all state branches. review, and inclusion. State IADVL bodies. It requires a **constitutional amendment** and must be referred to the **Constitution Committee** for proper drafting, this step will ensure consistency, safeguard ethical practices, and streamline coordination between the National and the proposal can be first discussed at EC/CC level for consensus.

**Dr. Vinay Singh LM/ND/2993 suggested that an Ethics Committee should be constituted at the state level, particularly for Dermacon, Mid-Dermacon, and state conferences. The purpose of this committee would be to prevent any misappropriation in organising conferences or educational programs. He further recommended that the committee should consist of an odd number of members, preferably five or seven, with at least one member representing the National EC.**



**Dr. Rajeev Sharma LM/UP&UK/2251 advised that the Constitution Committee has concluded that no such provision currently exists in the Constitution. Therefore, a constitutional amendment is required, and the matter must be referred back to the Constitution Committee for proper drafting. He further noted that the committee could be named either the Ethical Committee or the Disciplinary Committee, or it could be merged with the AQLC (Anti-quackery Legal and Ethics Committee).**

**Decision: Once redrafted by the Constitution Committee, the proposal will be placed before the AGM for approval**

### **IADVL Executive Committee 2025 Meeting**

The meeting commenced with an introduction and a formal welcome to all EC Members by Dr. Bhumesh Kumar Katakam, Honorary Secretary General, IADVL

#### **Key Points:**

- The roadmap for the next six months was discussed and outlined.
- A review of activities conducted previously was taken up.
- Important deliberations and strategic decisions were made to ensure smooth functioning and continuity of planned initiatives.

### **Recommendations/Decisions:**

1. As per Dr. Rajeev Sharma(LM/UP/2251)'s input:
  - Chartered Accountant advised to stop pharma sponsorships
  - Utilize funds already allotted to Academy
  - Option to hire an event manager for execution
  - Academy account to be shifted back to main IADVL account for smoother functioning.
2. Defaulters/Dropouts:
  - Candidates failing to complete → blacklisted for 2 years
  - A 6-month grace period may be given in genuine difficulty cases
  - Centers with high dropout rates → may be considered for removal
3. Research Grant Defaulters:
  - Defaulters not to be included in future academic events

### **Constitution Committee Report – 2025**

Presented by: Dr. V.K. Sharma(LM/ND/1652)& Dr. Vikas Shankar (LM/B/5749)

#### **1. Maintenance of Records**

- Records of IADVL Constitution are available from 2008 onwards.
- The original constitution to be preserved separately.
- Amendments must be documented below the original text, clearly mentioning:
  - Year of change
  - Nature of change

#### **2. Constitution Reforms & Update Committee**

- Proposal to form a Constitution Reform and Update Committee for regular updates.
- No proposal to be accepted without a “Change Report”, which should include:
  - Full written proposal
  - Summary of discussion held
  - Decision taken

#### **3. Proposals in AGBM/CCM**

- Proposers must be physically present at AGBM.
- If absent → a letter of authority can be given to the seconder.
- For non-EC members:
  - Preferably a maximum of two proposals per person.
  - Ideally, all proposals to be presented first in Central Council Meeting (CCM).

- CCM meetings:
- Initially hybrid format
- Suggested to move to fully virtual over time

#### 4. Archival System for Minutes

- An archival system to preserve all minutes of meetings.
- Video recordings of meetings to be maintained for 3 years.
- Any request for changes in the minutes must be submitted within this 3-year window.

#### Meeting with CA-Key Discussion Points

##### 1. Conference Accounts & GST Compliance

- As per the GST Act, conference accounts should ideally be closed within one month; a practical maximum of two months may be allowed.
- Non-compliance with SOPs may attract a small penalty.
- Invoices should be raised at least one week before the conference; companies unwilling to comply should not be engaged.
- Organizing Committees (OCs) must use Tally for reporting to the Treasurer. Relevant MOU clauses with OCs will be updated accordingly.

##### 1. Separate PAN for Conferences:

Conferences should be conducted under a separate PAN, distinct from that of IADVL. At the same time, it is equally important to retain IADVL's administrative control and audit through IADVL Chartered Accountant, as was maintained during the use of IADVL PAN by DERMACON and MID DERMACON. This will help maintain financial transparency, compliance, and accountability.

##### 2. Minimize Income Attracting TDS:

IADVL should avoid income sources where Tax Deducted at Source (TDS) is applicable at the time of payment. Such income, if more than 20% of total receipts of IADVL then it is treated as a Business Income and it will impact the charitable status of IADVL.

##### 3. Application of Income:

As per Income Tax Act, 85% of Gross income should be applied to charitable purposes in India. It is very crucial for retaining charitable status.

##### 4. Establishment of a Corpus Fund:

Create a dedicated Corpus Fund and deposit conference savings into this fund. Contributions to the Corpus Fund are treated as capital receipts and not considered



income, which will not increase the profit of the Income and Expenditure Account.

## **5. Expansion of Charitable Activities:**

Increase focus and expenditure on charitable activities in the following key areas and increase the amount of expenses in following two areas Education Medical Relief This will strengthen IADVL's charitable profile and support its eligibility for various exemptions under income tax laws.

## **6. Investment Strategy – Mutual Funds:**

Increase investments in Mutual Funds, as income is only recognized upon sale or redemption. This approach helps in controlling the recognition of income, thus optimizing tax implications and may not affect the charitable status of IADVL.

## **7. Reduce Investment in Fixed Deposits (FDRs):**

Minimize new investments in FDRs, as the interest accrued is treated as income, which increases the savings ratio and may affect the charitable status of Adlecting. Concluded with thanks to Mr. Sanjay Labh for his valuable advice.

## CENTRAL COUNCIL MEETING

It was welcomed by Honorary Secretary General Dr Bhumesh Kumar Katakam

- The Secretary's report was presented by Dr. Bhumesh Kumar Katakam (LM/TS/3891), highlighting the wide range of activities conducted across India. A major achievement included the creation of a world record, with **752** Free Skin Health Camps across India on **13th July 2025**. A total of **1432** dermatologists participated, reaching out to **45,903** patients, offering free consultations, medications, and spreading awareness on skin health, catering primarily to the needy population. This remarkable initiative also received recognition in the Parliament of India.

The report was well appreciated by the Central Council members. It also outlined the series of meetings conducted by the Executive Committee (EC) with various committees, detailing the specific dates and the support extended by the EC for their functioning. Regular meetings with state presidents and secretaries were also held to sensitize them about the different IADVL activities.



Furthermore, the EC actively participated in DERMACON 2025, Jaipur, as well as several other national programs under the IADVL banner. Close collaboration with the IADVL Academy was also emphasized, particularly in the planning and execution of academic activities.

### **Presidential Address**

Dr. Rajeev Sharma(LM/UP&UK/2251)delivered the Presidential Address. He emphasized that, for the first time in the history of IADVL, a forensic audit was being conducted, acknowledging the challenges faced over the past six months.

He officially ratified the Central Finance Council (CFC) members, declaring that the CC is empowered to do so and that the CFC members would function with effect from today.

He also highlighted the world record of medical camps conducted in collaboration with the Community Dermatology Committee and urged all members to work with honesty and integrity in the service of IADVL.

Further, he informed members about the engagement of Mr, Amitabh Acharya as Legal Retainer, whose primary role will be to review the various MOUs signed by the EC and act as an advisor. He clarified that the Anti-Quackery Team will engage a separate legal firm with pan-India presence.

The minutes of the Opening AGBM held at Jaipur, which had already been passed there, were placed before the CCME for confirmation. The minutes were proposed by Dr. Rashmi Sarkar and seconded by Dr. Vikas Shankar, and were duly passed.

### **Elections 2025**

The Returning Officer, Dr. Bhmesh Kumar Katakam (LM/TS/3891), read out the election applications received for the year 2025.

The President, Dr. Rajeev Sharma(LM/UP&UK/2251), emphasized that for venues bidding to host DERMACON, the application forms must be duly completed, with the proposed venue clearly mentioned, so that eligibility can be assessed. He clarified that while the Election Officer examines whether criteria are fulfilled, the EC should be informed of the proposed venues.

### **During the discussion:**

- Dr Venkataram Mysore( LM/KN/3211) stressed that elections are an independent institution, the EC cannot influence the process, and authority cannot be concentrated in one individual; the Election Officer should remain supreme and the institution strengthened.
- Dr. Dinesh Kumar Devaraj highlighted the importance of complete and accurate venue details in the application form.
- Dr. Vikas Shankar noted that elections have two arms: (i) autonomy of the Election Body and (ii) assessment of eligibility of candidates and bidding cities.
- Dr. V.K. Sharma(LM/ND/1652) suggested that the venue can be initially decided.
- It was proposed to develop an SOP for the bidding process, ensuring that forms are duly filled with complete details. Inspection of proposed venues could be conducted through a local committee before declaring eligibility.

With the 15-day withdrawal window, Dr. Manjunath Shenoy(LM/KN/2878) suggested that applications be sent to the EC, with either a virtual inspection or a local inspection committee reviewing eligibility before elections are held.

- Dr. Ramesh Bhat(LM/KN/2051)**enquired** about the Income Tax notice. Dr. Rajeev Sharma(LM/UP& UK/2251)clarified that it pertained to the year 2021–22, mainly related to the Mumbai DERMACON.
- Dr. Shashi Kumar B M (LM/KN/5241) suggested exploring avenues beyond SB accounts for increased income generation. Dr. Rajeev Sharma(LM/UP& UK/2251) responded that, based on auditors’ advice, funds are being allocated to the Academy after receipt of the IT notice.
- It was further clarified by Dr. Rajeev Sharma(LM/UP& UK/2251)that funds allotted for orations should be maintained separately, with the interest utilized to support oration expenses.
- Dr Venkataram Mysore( LM/KN/3211) raised concern regarding the transfer of funds to Jaipur just before March 31st without CC and CFC being informed. Dr. Rajeev Sharma(LM/UP& UK/2251) explained that the transfer was made at the request of the Jaipur organizing committee to settle vendor payments before the financial year-end and the funds were returned within 24 hours. He added that in the absence of a CFC, the Arbitration Committee could have been involved.
- Dr. Suresh Talwar (LM/UPUK/2257)suggested placing funds in bulk deposits of 90 days to yield 8–9% interest. Dr. Rajeev Sharma(LM/UP& UK/2251) agreed to review this.



- Dr. Rajib Gogoi(LM/NE/2933) advised reducing the number of smaller FDs and further suggested that the Treasurer’s Report should be more self- explanatory, with multiple payments consolidated under broader, understandable heads (e.g., grouping all travel expenses together, and clubbing smaller petty payments).

The Treasurer’s Report was passed, proposed by Dr. Manoj Kumar Ram and seconded by Dr. V.K. Sharma(LM/ND/1652)

RAJU & PRASAD PRELIMINARY FORENSIC AUDIT REPORT INTRODUCTION TO THE ASSIGNMENT & PROCEDURE FOLLOWED FOR AUDIT

### **A.ABOUT THE CONFERENCE**

•DERMACON 2024 is the 52nd National Conference of the Indian Association of Dermatologists, Venereologists and Leprologists (IADVL). It will be held from 22nd to 25th February 2024 in Hyderabad.

The conference will focus on cutting-edge scientific content, encompassing the latest advancements in

Dermatology, Venereology, Leprosy, Aesthetics, and Dermatosurgery.

•The theme of the conference is "Skinception to Skinnovation", reflecting a blend of foundational knowledge and innovative practices. Sessions are thoughtfully designed to cater to both academicians and practitioners, aiming to deliver knowledge that is both academically enriching and practically

### **B.ABOUT THE FIRM**

•M/s Raju and Prasad Chartered Accountants (hereinafter referred to as “We” or “Us” or “The firm”)have been appointed by the IADVL through appointment Letter received on 17.04.2025 to conduct discussion ON Forensic Audit Report OF DERMACON HYD 2024.

The scope of our audit is as below –

#### **A.Examination of Financial Records**

- Review of invoices, receipts, and payment vouchers related to the event.
- Verification of bank statements, fund transfers, and cash transactions.
- Analysis of contracts with vendors, caterers, venues, and other service providers.

**B. Verification of Vendor Transactions**

- Authenticity of vendor selection process (tendering, quotations, and approvals).
  - Identification of related-party transactions or conflicts of interest.
  - Ensuring that payments are supported by valid documentation and approvals.
  - Detection of over-invoicing, duplicate payments, or fictitious vendors.
  - Review of travel and accommodation expenses for authenticity.
  - Investigation into possible collusion between event organizers and vendors.
  - To look into email communications between the Organizing secretary and Vendors
  - To look into Email/WhatsApp communications between Organizing committee members.
  - Check the actual presence of delegates in the conference, Lunches and dinners.
  - Check the number of delegates who participated on behalf of the pharmaceutical industry.
  - Check the actual dispatch of conference brochures sent to members through the post office.
  - Check the actual number of hotel room bookings, Justification of expenses and confirmation of the fact about their eligibility (whether they have made the payment or not)
  - Justification of expenses- either as per agreement, based on volume/size of seminar, credit worthiness of suppliers, the actual movement of material, genuinity of expenses, and arm length price of service purchased for the events.
- a. Catering Expenses
  - b. Event Management Expenses paid to Instant Travel Solution fabrication expenses done by M/s. Paras Art Studio
  - d. Printing work paid to M/s. XLNT Prints
  - e. Diesel Charges paid to M/s. Abdul Shykur-Generator entertainment Expenses
  - g. Security Service Charges and Manpower charges paid to M/s. Madhu Valet Services and Instant Travel Solution.

## **Audit Findings:**

### **1. In appropriate vendor selection process.**

OC-T and OC-S have stated that, they did not create the awareness or publicized about the requirement. The four vendors approached the Organizing Committee on their own initiative. Further, the proposals were submitted without any financial quotations. This indicates that the OC did not follow the basic procedure of creating awareness about the work requirement, which is essential to ensure wider participation and obtain competitive responses from the market. The presentations or proposals submitted by the four vendors have not been provided to us for verification. The absence of such critical information indicates a clear lack of transparency in the vendor selection process. It also raises serious concerns regarding the intent to withhold information, thereby potentially avoiding audit and accountability. Furthermore, it was informed that there is no email correspondence with the vendors. Given the nature of the services involved and the profile of the vendors, the complete absence of any formal communication— especially via email—is highly unusual and only serves to reinforce the suspicion of non-transparency and potential misuse of official position.

### **2. No basic commercial prudence in fixing the consideration:**

in the present case, financial quotations were not obtained from the vendors, which constitutes a serious procedural lapse. The absence of a financial quote not only undermines the price discovery process but also opens the door to potential misappropriation or misuse of funds.

### **3. agreement was backdated**

The sequence of events suggests that the agreement was executed as an afterthought, likely with the intention to retrospectively regularize the arrangement and shield those involved from scrutiny. Such manipulation of documentation raises serious concerns regarding procedural integrity and points towards a deliberate attempt to conceal irregularities.

### **4. Potential Overstatement in Cost Estimation**

Upon detailed examination of the prices charged by M/s. Paras Art Studio and in view of their appropriate vendor selection process and fixation of price, it appears that the price charged is unusual, inflated and not aligned with prevailing market rates. For instance, a lump sum amount of ₹55.00 lakhs were claimed towards Pickup Zone, Walkway, Common Area Passage Carpeting, Entry

Gate, and other general décor elements. Based on visual evidence (photographs) of the actual walkway setup, the expenditure of ₹55 lakhs appears grossly excessive and not commensurate with the scale and nature of the work executed, indicating a strong possibility of cost overstatement.

### **5. Unauthorized Additional Billing**

As mentioned in Points 2 and 3, an additional work order amounting to ₹59 Lakhs (₹50 lakhs + GST) was issued on 19.02.2024, just days before the commencement of the conference. However, the vendor subsequently raised an invoice dated 29.02.2024 for an amount of ₹76.99 Lakhs (₹ 65.25 Lakhs + GST) exceeding the additional work order value by ₹17.99 lakhs.6catering

### **Audit Findings:**

#### **1. In appropriate vendor selection process.**

OC-T and OC-S have stated that, they did not create the awareness or publicized about the requirement. The SIX vendors approached the Organizing Committee on their own initiative. This indicates that the OC did not follow the basic procedure of creating awareness about the work requirement, which is essential to ensure wider participation and obtain competitive responses from the market. The presentations or proposals submitted by the SIX vendors have not been provided to us for verification. The absence of such critical information indicates a clear lack of transparency in the vendor selection process. It also raises serious concerns regarding the intent to withhold information, thereby potentially avoiding audit and accountability. Furthermore, it was informed that there is no email correspondence with the vendors. Given the nature of the services involved and the profile of the vendors, the complete absence of any formal communication— especially via email—is highly unusual and only serves to reinforce the suspicion of non-transparency and potential misuse of official position.

#### **2. In appropriate procedure in fixing the price.**

OC has not shared the menu or even the basic requirements such as the nature of cuisine to be served, the categories of dishes, the number of items under each category, the type of service setup required, or the specifications regarding crockery and other service elements. In the absence of these fundamental inputs from OC, the caterers, while presenting themselves to the OC, proposed their own menus along with quoted prices based on their independent understanding and offerings. There is no basis for an "apple-to-apple" comparison among the vendor proposals. Such an approach not only undermines transparency and fairness but also creates scope for arbitrary selection and financial impropriety. The determined price may be high. Agreements and Communication – Physical, Unverifiable Agreements with both caterers were handled physically, with no email correspondence or digital trail of discussions, changes, or confirmations. Except for one initial allotment email to Gazal Caterers. Discrepancy in Approved Rate vs. Amount Charged by Caterers per the work order issued to Aathidhyam Caterer on 08.02.2024, the rate specified per pax is ₹ 900 with a minimum guarantee of 2,000 pax. However, the caterer has subsequently charged ₹ 1,300 per pax for 2,670 pax, amounting to a rate escalation of ₹ 400 per pax. There is



NO approval obtained from the organizing committee towards the increase in rate of ₹ 400 per pax which amounting to ₹ 10.68lakhs. Inadequate Verification of Plate Count but Payment was made: OC-S and OC-T have stated that the number of plates consumed was confirmed by a volunteer and the event manager, and that payments to the caterer were made on that basis. However, this claim raises serious concerns for the following reasons: Duplicate Entries in Delegate Scan Data:

4. **Selection of event manager** – Procedure is inappropriate. It was merely stated that ICS Global was approved unanimously by the OC. However, upon discussions with various other OC members, it has been understood that although some presentations were made, the rationale behind selecting ICS Global was neither discussed in detail nor formally communicated to all members. This indicates that the process followed was not constructive, transparent, or in line with standard procurement practices. The absence of documented evaluation and open discussion suggests the presence of vested interests in the selection of this vendor.

5. **Accommodation charges paid through ICS Global:**

the OC has not undertaken any verification of the hotel invoices submitted by the event manager to authenticate the amounts charged. Additionally, there has been no validation or cross-verification of the actual number of room-days occupied by the guests. Taken together, these lapses indicate a complete lack of transparency in the process related to hotel room bookings and the associated payments totaling ₹6.02 crores (₹5.09 crores excluding GST).

6. **Entertainment expense of ₹ 1.30 crores to ICS Global**

he refusal to share basic supporting documentation such as entertainer invoices and payment records, under the pretext of internal company policy, reflects a serious lack of transparency. Given the significant amount involved—₹1.10 crores (₹1.30 crores including GST)—the absence of verifiable third-party evidence undermines the credibility of the expenditure thereby raising suspiciousness for potential financial misrepresentation or undue gain.

7. **Housekeeping and Manpower services** of ₹ 0.32 crores and 0.27 crores paid to ICS Global: Upon review of the information shared by the Event Manager, it is noted that a total of 1,125 man-days and 943 man-days were deployed for housekeeping and general manpower, respectively. In total, 2068 man-days were deployed. These deployments were in addition to the security and housekeeping services already provided by HITEX and HICC. It is also noted that no other vendors were considered or evaluated for the supply of manpower services. Further, the agreement executed with M/s. ICS Global does not contain any reference to the provision of manpower services

8. **Valet services:**

An amount of ₹ 22 Lakhs was paid towards valet services provided by Madhu valet services. As per their invoice 1,207 man-days were deployed. This works out to 300 people per day. These figures appear excessive, particularly in light of the parallel services offered by HITEX. No justification or breakdown for this level of deployment has been provided.

9 **printing expenses**

Audit Findings:

1. **Absence of Competitive Bidding:** It was noted that the Organising Committee did not obtain any quotations or competitive bids from multiple printing vendors prior to awarding the contract. This represents a deviation from prudent procurement practices.

2. **Unjustified Cost Escalation:** Upon obtaining an independent quotation from another printing vendor for similar specifications and volumes, it was noted that the actual amounts paid were significantly higher than prevailing market rates.

This raise concerns over the reasonableness of the pricing, potential overcharging, or non-transparent decision-making.

3. An amount of ₹ 3,13,435 was paid to Mr. Koteswara Rao in his personal capacity. Upon enquiry, it was informed that the payment pertained to postage expenses for dispatching various brochures related to the conference.

### **10 Accommodation charges**

Audit Findings:

Unsubstantiated Expenditure of ₹32.53 Lakhs: Guest details were not provided for approximately 157 rooms. An amount of ₹32.53 lakhs was spent towards these rooms. Since, the details of guest occupied these rooms not provided there is a high chance of potential misuse. Unsubstantiated Expenditure of ₹29.65 Lakhs (Name of the Guest is available): From the above it can be said that OC-S and OC-T have not provided the purpose or category of the Guests with room nights 119 Allotment of room though not an OC member:

### **11. Registration Audit Findings:**

Duplicates in Registrations

It is understood that there are duplicates in the registration data which means same delegates got two registration IDs.

### **12. Audio Visual Expenses:**

Audit Findings:

Lack of Supporting Documentation for Vendor Evaluation: Although it was informed that presentations were made by four vendors on 20.12.2023, the corresponding presentations have not been provided for audit review. Further, no financial quotations were submitted by the vendors at that stage, thereby undermining the transparency and competitiveness of the vendor selection process. Excess amount charged than mentioned in the work order: It is observed that a work order dated 06.02.2024 was issued for an amount of ₹ 0.90 crores plus GST. However, the final amount charged by the vendor was ₹ 1.03 crores (₹ 1.22 crores including GST), resulting in an excess of ₹ 13 lakhs (₹ 15.34 lakhs including GST) over the approved value.

### **13. Event Tribe Management:**

Audit Findings:

Lack of Committee Oversight: No evidence of Organizing Committee discussion or approval regarding entertainment activities or vendor selection, indicating procedural lapses in governance. Unilateral Decision-Making: The Organizing Secretary acted independently in selecting the vendor and finalizing terms, bypassing due procedure.

Absence of Price Benchmarking or Competitive Bidding: No documentation to support vendor selection through competitive bidding or any price discovery mechanism.

### **14. Use of personal email ID for official purposes:**

It is understood that the Organizing Committee had created a dedicated email ID, [dermacon2024@gmail.com](mailto:dermacon2024@gmail.com) and [dermacon2024hyderabad@gmail.com](mailto:dermacon2024hyderabad@gmail.com), for official correspondence with delegates, vendors, the Scientific Committee, pharmaceutical companies, and other stakeholders. However, it has been observed that correspondence was made through the email ID of the Organizing Secretary, [angoorirao53@gmail.com](mailto:angoorirao53@gmail.com) and the same mailed id was mentioned in the brochures.



Organizing Secretary confirmed that the monthly bank statements of DERMACON 2024 were shared with National IADVL, Chairman Finance Committee, Organizing Chairman, IADVL Telangana State, etc.,

through his personal email ID [angoorirao53@gmail.com](mailto:angoorirao53@gmail.com). There were certain cases wherein correspondence with vendor was through his personal mail ID. As there was official correspondence through [angoorirao53@gmail.com](mailto:angoorirao53@gmail.com), we have requested him to provide access for which he has replied as below:

“Vendors and pharma companies were not communicated through the said mail ID. Credentials of E mail ID are private and cannot be shared “The use of a personal email account for official matters raises significant concerns regarding lack of transparency, and non-traceability of official correspondence, which hampers audit verification and accountability.

### **15. Minutes of the meetings of Organizing Committee:**

OC-S and OC-T have provided a physical register purportedly containing the minutes of the Organizing Committee(OC) meetings. As per their representation, the minutes were handwritten by the Organizing Secretary directly into the register. Upon verification, it was observed that the matters discussed and decisions taken were indeed handwritten—however, notably, these entries were made below the signatures of the attending OC members. When questioned, OC- S and OC-T stated that this has been their regular practice. This approach deviates significantly from standard and widely accepted procedures, wherein the minutes of the meeting—i.e., the matters discussed and resolutions passed—are clearly documented first, and the signatures of the members are obtained underneath, thereby indicating their review and acceptance of the contents. In the present case, the fact that discussions and decisions are recorded underneath the signatures give rise to a strong suspicion that it is a deliberate act with a mala fide intention. However, we have considered the same as minutes of the meetings.

### **The Forensic Auditor presented the report, following which several questions and observations were raised:**

- Approval process for financial transactions: It was suggested that clear thresholds be established:
- Up to ₹1 lakh – approval by the Organizing Secretary.
- ₹1–5 lakhs – approval by both Organizing Secretary and Organizing Chairperson.
- Above ₹5 lakhs – to be sent to EC and entire Organizing Committee (including subcommittees) for approval.
- Event management concerns:
- Dr. Suresh Talwar (LM/UPUK/2257) noted that payments were made through the appointed event management agency, which refused to provide full details to the forensic auditor citing confidentiality.

Dr Venkataram Mysore ( LM/KN/3211) asked a specific question to Forensic Auditor that “ When we want to take action whether civil or criminal can you fix culpability for those who are responsible?

**Forensic auditor replied that it is difficult to confine the responsibility on single individual, however by and large it is the core committee members who played major role particularly it is the Organizing Secretary and Treasurer who played much bigger role after seeing discussions and verifications.**

**Dr Venkatraman Mysore asked what action can be taken now ?**

**FORENSIC auditor replied ,we have to give complaint to Economic Offences wing, as a private agency we may not get cooperation from vendors since we don't have law enforcement powers , the EOW being a law enforcement agency they have the powers and basing on this forensic audit report they may do enquiry or investigation and provide proper conclusion**

replied that pinpointing responsibility was very difficult and not within his mandate; any action would need referral to the Economic Offences Wing

- Clarifications from the auditor:
- The forensic auditor stated that this was not the final report and more information was needed.

In response to Dr. Shyam Verma(9913500888)'s query on non-cooperation by vendors, he clarified that as they are not a law-enforcing agency, they could not compel vendors to provide details. It was suggested that the vendors and event management agencies involved could be blacklisted by IADVL.

- Organizational accountability:
- Dr. Arvind Singh pointed out lapses at multiple levels, including CA and legal retainer
- Dr. Rajib Gogoi(LM/NE/2933) asked if MOUs signed by the Organizing Committee were shared with the EC. The CFC Chair clarified that they had not received these MOUs. Dr. Vinay Singh(LM/ND/2993) stressed that the responsibility lay with the Organizing Committee, and monthly financial tallies and corrected MOUs should be submitted to the EC.

**Dr.A.G.Rao has asked that after conference was over so many questions being asked what EC was doing earlier ?.**

**President Dr.Rajeev Sharma interrupted him by saying that who were there in the GBM to present the accounts of Dermacon 2024 for adoption and approval?**

**And have you given authorization letter to the Treasurer to present the accounts ?**

**Both you were supposed to present during GBM which is mandatory as per constitution, to present the accounts and both of you were absent in the GB and your accounts are not yet cleared by GBM so far.**

- **At this stage Dr.A.G.rao expressed "sorry"**
- Dr V.K. Sharma suggested that a written clarification be sought from the Organizing Committee within a defined deadline (e.g., 7 days).
- Dr. Arvind Singh felt that further written replies were futile since the forensic audit had already been conducted.
- Next steps:
- When Raju and associates were asked by members about action, they replied saying that is not in their domain and it can be referred to government agencies like economic offence wing if the association decides to do so.
- It was resolved to await the final forensic report before proceeding with further action.
- Dr. Angoori Rao noted that conferences are not fully aligned with NMC guidelines, making compliance difficult under current structures.
- Dr. Rajetha damisetty (LM/TS/4726)emphasized accountability and the need to punish the guilty. **Dr Rajetha Damisetty said that if any one of the 18,000 members of IADVL can raise objection to these 3cr or 2 cr or 15 cr belongs and then ever body will be brought to book, so whatever Respected Dr..A.G.Rao said should be noted and condemned by this august body**
- Dr. Soumya panda(LM/WB/2805) suggested either disciplinary action or punishment.
- Dr. Shyam Verma(9913500888) questioned why NMC guidelines were not followed. **Dr.Shyam Verma said that what ever Dr.A.G.Rao said is objectionable, and if things were going against NMC rules what he was doing ? why this realization now retrospectively after many crores have gone missing ?**
- Dr. Rajib Gogoi(LM/NE/2933) insisted that culprits must not be spared and that written replies should still be sought.
- Dr. Putta Srinivas(LM/TS/59) highlighted serious lapses: no competitive quotations, excessive billing (e.g., printers), a brochure costing over ₹75

lakhs, unilateral decisions by the Organizing Secretary without committee involvement, and the marginalization of the Organizing Chairperson.



- **Discussion Regarding Dr. Netha's Request to Present His Case**

- **Dr. Netha sought permission of the House to present his side and prove his innocence. President Dr. Rajeev Sharma informed that Dr. Netha was required to be present during the AGBM to present the Treasurer's Report, failing which appropriate action could still be taken. After the AGBM, the Disciplinary Committee had decided that until the final forensic report is submitted, the accused — namely, the Organizing Secretary and the Organizing Treasurer — would not be involved in IADVL activities. Hence, any explanation could be submitted in writing Netha told that he had informed the then president that because of his ill health he could not attend the AGBM which was denied by President Dr. Rajeev Sharma and also on enquiring Dr. Bhumes HSG clarified that he did not receive any communication from Dr. Netha. The Dr. Netha questioned why the Organising secretary had to go to foreign countries and abroad. Dr. Manjunath Shenoy replied that the written mail communication was received only 1 day before by Dr. Angoori**

- At this point, Dr. Netha stated that he is innocent and capable of proving his innocence. He expressed that he is deeply distressed by the situation and at times feels extremely anguished and like committing suicide. After much deliberation, President Dr. Rajeev Sharma permitted Dr. Netha to present his explanation before the House.

- Upon taking the dais, Dr. Netha mentioned that Dermacon Hyderabad was one of the most successful Dermacons, with record-high savings in the history of IADVL. He emphasized that organizing such a conference is a major responsibility and that substantial savings were achieved under challenging circumstances. He reiterated his willingness to prove his innocence and added that, if not given the opportunity, he would be compelled to take legal recourse. He also suggested that all accounts could be seized and his transactions scrutinized for transparency.

- Dr. Netha further stated that he had accepted the responsibility of Treasurer, Dermacon Hyderabad, only because no one else was willing to take up the post. He highlighted his previous record of serving in several responsible positions in the Telangana state branch with integrity. He questioned why no action was taken against those who did not perform their duties, whereas action was being taken against those who had worked sincerely for the conference. He expressed that systemic corrections were needed before placing blame on individuals.

- Dr. Netha stated that Some procedural lapses would have been happened, I am accepting, that is my personal opinion, might be due to non- participation, non-cooperation of the organizing chairperson of the Dermacon 2024, non-cooperation of the scientific chairperson and chair, circumstances led to the selection of new scientific chairperson by the OC, non-cooperation, lack of the participation of state president and general secretary, lack of proper monitoring, advice and support by central supervisory committee. Lack of legal responsibility and active participation of organizing committee, lack of leadership and organizing capacities of organizing secretary due to his adamant character, his usual to never take, accept the advice given by the treasurer, not sharing of any documents to the treasurer during the total tenure of the conference, the bank cheques books were always with him only, even now also. After he signed the cheque, he forced me to put signature without showing any recourse. OS, organizing secretary used to say that he was the answerable for the conference and also he said he was the key person and forced me to sign. Only 3 members have complained that too from organising committee after the conference. So that shows the intention

- He also alleged that the Organizing Secretary, Dr. Angoori Rao, used to sign cheques first and then compel him to sign them, and that he often acted under pressure.
- Responding to these statements, Dr. Angoori Rao clarified that it was, in fact, the Treasurer's duty to settle accounts, and since Dr. Netha was not doing so, he had to intervene to ensure smooth functioning. He further remarked that he was not a child to sign cheques under compulsion and that he had only fulfilled his responsibilities in accordance with his role.

#### Constitution Committee Report

The Constitution Committee Report was presented by Dr. Vikas Shankar. He informed that several activities have been planned under the Constitution Committee, including the "Know Your Constitution" quiz and other initiatives that had already been discussed during the morning session.

When Dr. V.K. Sharma was asked about the possible actions that could be taken against the accused individuals, he clarified that, as per the Constitution, the maximum action permissible is removal from the Association and initiation of disciplinary proceedings.

President Dr. Rajeev Sharma raised the point regarding the powers vested in the President to call an Extraordinary General Body Meeting (EGBM). He questioned why the President has not been given discretion to call for an EGBM in case of an exigency, as currently there are multiple procedural checkpoints — such as obtaining approval from the Constitution Committee — which may delay urgent decisions.

Dr. Rajeev Sharma also pointed out that, according to the Constitution, signatories to the Association's bank account should include the President, Vice President, Secretary, and Joint Secretary, totaling five authorized signatories, and questioned why this provision was not being followed.

Further, it was discussed that earlier, the Executive Committee (EC) tenure changed from Dermacon to Dermacon, but now the new EC takes charge from the day of installation, which occurs prior to Dermacon. However, it was emphasized that the outgoing Secretary and Treasurer are responsible for completing the previous accounts before handing over to their successors.

Dr. Arvind Singh opined that an Extraordinary GBM cannot be convened at the whims and fancies of any individual, and hence several procedural checks are necessary. Dr Venkataram Mysore added that since the Constitution mentions that the Secretary can call for an EGBM, it implies that the President can also do so, as the Secretary functions as the executive arm of the EC. Dr. Arvind Singh further reiterated that all such decisions are governed by the Societies Registration Act, which supersedes these internal provisions, and that the handing over of signatory powers during emergencies is not appropriate even under such circumstances.

Dr. Vinay Singh LM/ND/2993 responded that BDS graduates cannot be employed, as it is difficult to judge whether they are working purely as receptionists or are involved in procedures such as operating laser systems.

Dr. P. Narsimha Rao LM/TS/134 LM/TS/134 suggested that the wording of the proposal should be modified, as it is not possible for anyone to control the entire clinic. Dr. Rajeev Sharma LM/UP&UK/2251 concluded and finalized that the statement would read: 'I will not employ any non-MBBS doctor in my clinical setup.'

Dr. Deepika Pandhi LM/ND/3772 inquired whether MBBS doctors can be trained in Botox and fillers. Dr. Vinay Singh LM/ND/2993 responded that priority should first be given to stopping non-MBBS practitioners before considering MBBS doctors. Dr. Rajeev Sharma LM/UP&UK/2251 added that, as per NMC guidelines, MBBS graduates are not considered quacks, and while they are permitted to practice in any subject, they cannot designate themselves as specialists.

Dr. Venkatram Mysore LM/KN/3211 clarified that the proposal applies only to the contestants who are going to contest the elections.

Dr. Janak Thakkar LM / G / 455 questioned why the restriction should apply only to contestants, suggesting that it ought to apply to every member. Dr. Rajeev Sharma LM/UP&UK/2251 responded that the requirement is already included in the constitution and should be applicable to all candidates. Dr. V.K. Sharma LM/ND/1652 further suggested that the implementation should begin at the national level, then extend to the state level, subsequently to each committee and committee member, and finally to the general membership

### Key Discussions: What does "high-interest paying instrument" mean?

IADVL cannot invest in stocks/ETFs under the Society Registration Act → Only mutual funds & fixed deposits allowed. Will there be income tax on interest earned? Interest rates are expected to decline, affecting payouts. Disbursement only after one year (as total deaths are known at



year-end). Instead of creating new fellowships, existing grants should be increased (DVLWT funds can be strengthened).

Dr. Vinay Singh LM/ND/2993 observed that most of the IADVL funds are kept in savings bank accounts with low interest rates. He suggested that these funds could be shifted to higher-yielding investments where the principal remains secure, thereby generating more interest for member benefits.

“Dr. Rajeev Sharma LM/UP&UK/2251 suggested that the society’s memorandum cannot be changed, and it clearly states that we cannot invest in properties or the stock market. He further noted that our auditor has advised reducing profits by avoiding sponsorship from Pharma, as we are already facing issues with income tax. Any further investment or amendments to the memorandum could also lead to additional society registration charges. Therefore, we must be cautious and refrain from investing in the stock market or mutual funds.”

Key Concerns:

Eligibility criteria for President-Elect are unclear—what contributions at what level should be considered? The term "capacities other than President and Secretary" is vague. The proposal refers to "Vice-President Elect," but this position does not exist. A major constitutional change will be required if the proposal is passed.

Dr. Rajesh Kumar (LM/M/2891) explained that in larger cities it is more difficult for a common member to become Vice President or President, whereas in smaller cities members generally have a fairer chance to attain these positions. He suggested that the clause be amended so that every common member has the opportunity to contest for the posts of National President or Vice President.

Dr. Rajeev Sharma LM/UP&UK/2251 agreed that every member should ideally be allowed to contest elections; however, he cautioned that this could result in hundreds of candidates for a single post. He further pointed out that the Association’s Memorandum stipulates certain qualifications for positions such as President and Secretary, and these provisions cannot be altered frequently.

Dr. Sudip Das LM/WB/3322LM/WB/3322 LM/WB/3322 suggested that the eligibility criteria for the post of Vice President be relaxed, proposing that the required experience be reduced from 5 years to 3 years.

Dr. VenkatRam Mysore LM/KN/3211 explained that the national structure already has a progression in place: two years as CC Member, followed by Joint Secretary, then Vice President, and finally President. He suggested that this pathway be adhered to, and if members from larger cities face challenges in becoming President or Vice President at the state level, they can still follow these established criteria at the national level.

Dr. Rajesh Verma LM/C/2651 agreed that the eligibility criteria should not be diluted, noting that there are already several norms in place for entry into the national level, and therefore the existing standards should be maintained.

Decision: Proposal not Referred to ABGM

Dr. V.K. Sharma LM/ND/1652, Chairman of the Constitution Committee, cautioned against making frequent changes to the Constitution. He noted that constant amendments create confusion, as a new Secretary takes charge and is often unaware of the full extent of past changes—typically only about 75% of the provisions are well known, while the rest remain unclear. He emphasised that frequent modifications should be avoided.

Dr. Rajeev Sharma LM/UP&UK/2251 agreed that frequent changes are difficult, as each amendment has to be registered with the Registrar of Societies. He further requested the CC members to frame and pass a rule that any proposal countering a decision made within the last five years should not be brought forward, as it would be subject to rejection.

Dr. Rajeev Sharma LM/UP&UK/2251 suggested that there is considerable conflict of interest between the Constitution Committee and the SOP Committee. He proposed that the two committees be merged, with the SOP Committee coming under the purview of the Constitution Committee, to streamline the functioning of the committees.

Dr. Kingshuk Chatterjee LM/WB/5280 clarified that the proposal had been misinterpreted. The intention was never to create an administrative burden on IADVL; rather, the proposal aimed to facilitate smoother communication between the states of the East Zone.

Dr. Rajeev Sharma LM/UP&UK/2251 clarified that the Constitution already specifies the East, North, West, and South zones, and therefore a separate council for the East Zone cannot be created. He added that the secretary of states within east zone must decide on their own and pass it to central committee.



Decision: Proposal not Referred to ABGM

Dr. Sudip Das LM/WB/3322 proposed that, for the benefit of conferences, certain venues should be pre-selected by IADVL and the hosting of the national Dermacon should rotate zone-wise. This would ensure that every zone gets a fair chance to organise the national conference, and also allow participation from many cities that currently do not get the opportunity, as the process is often linked to elections. He emphasised that such a system would be for the overall betterment of IADVL.

Dr. Himanshu Gupta LM/ND/7241 suggested that a zone-wise distribution of elections is necessary. He explained that when two zones contest against each other, the zone with a larger number of members often wins, regardless of merit. As a result, zones that deserve to host the national Dermacon but have fewer members or less voting power are disadvantaged. He recommended that a zone-wise rotation policy be adopted to ensure fairness in both elections and conference hosting.

Dr. P. Narsimha Rao LM/TS/134 stated that, since this proposal originated from a particular zone, it should be communicated to all zones. Consent should be obtained from each zone to determine whether a rotation policy for hosting the Dermacon can be implemented.

Dr. Saumya Panda LM/WB/2805 stated that the proposal had the support of members from two zones, and therefore it is not limited to a single zone. He emphasised that the rotation policy should be implemented to ensure that every zone has a fair opportunity to host the Dermacon.

Dr. Putta Srinivas LM/TS/59 further added that certain zones, such as the South Zone, have many cities capable of hosting the Dermacon. He raised the concern of how it would be decided which city gets to conduct the conference, given the multiple options available.

Decision: Dr. Rajeev Sharma LM/UP&UK/2251 suggested that every zone has sufficient venues, and each city is capable of hosting the Dermacon, not just those in the South Zone. It was finally decided that the proposal would be Referred to the ABGM with referral to the CFC and Constitution Committee, and the decision would be communicated in the CC group.

Plan: Election candidates holding administrative posts may resign only if they win the election. Ensures continuity in state branch and academic activities of IADVL. The Bidding Committee for DERMACON should further discuss the clause clarification.

Dr. Sudip Das LM/WB/3322 explained the rationale behind requiring a contestant to resign from their current post in IADVL before contesting an election.

For example, if a person is a SIG coordinator and he wants to contest for election, how can he influence more persons? So this should be brought in consideration.

Dr. Rajeev Sharma LM/UP&UK/2251 agreed that for a post in a conference scheduled two years later, it may not be necessary for a person to resign from their current position. He raised the question of how someone could potentially influence others in this scenario and opened the floor for discussion.

Dr. Deepika Pandhi LM/ND/3772 stated that many complaints arise from fellow contestants, noting that if a person already holds a position in a committee, or serves as a coordinator or convener, they may try to influence the committee or other members to vote in their favor. She suggested that it would be better for the election officers to provide guidance on this matter.

Dr. VenkatRam Mysore LM/KN/3211 noted that while complaints often come from fellow contestants, it is very difficult to determine what actions are acceptable and where to draw the line. He agreed that there should be some clear guidelines—a boundary that contestants should not cross.

Dr. P. Narsimha Rao LM/TS/134 suggested that since nominations usually open in April and elections are held in October, contestants should avoid any conflict of interest during this six-month period. This would be in the best interest of the association and would also ensure the smooth conduct of the elections.



Dr. V.K. Sharma LM/ND/1652 suggested that the possibility of conflict of interest in such cases is minimal. A contestant may be able to influence only a limited circle of friends or contacts, but it is not possible to influence all members. Hence, this issue deserves relatively low consideration.

Dr. Ramesh Bhat LM/KN/2051 suggested that if a SIG coordinator contests an election, they may travel to different places, influence people, and carry out campaigning, which should be restricted. In response, Dr Rajeev Sharma LM/UP& UK/2251 stated that if a person takes up a role such as coordinator, editor, or convener, they should, in return, agree not to contest elections for the next two years.

Decision: The final decision, as stated by Dr. Rajeev Sharma LM/UP& UK/2251, was that this proposal should be referred to the ABGM, but only after the Constitution Committee provides clear guidelines on it.

Dr. Karla Faleiro LM/GO/10687, President of the Goa State branch, objected to the proposal, noting that in smaller branches with only around 50 members, an age limit cap would result in very few eligible candidates, leading to the same individuals serving as President multiple times. In response, Dr. Rajeev Sharma clarified that the constitution already specifies that once a person has served as President, they cannot contest for the position again in the subsequent term.

Dr. P. Narasimha Rao stated that since every state has its own constitution, this proposal should be restricted to the national level only.

Dr. Vikas Shankar stated that the age limit should not be applied to the post of National President-elect.

Dr. Rashmi Sarkar stated that an age limit should be applied to the post of National President-elect. Dr. Venkat Ram Mysore LM/KN/3211 stated that the proposed age is appropriate for contesting the post of National President-elect, as it reflects maturity. By that stage, most family responsibilities are settled, allowing sufficient time and focus to serve the association. Therefore, he supported the proposal for applying an age limit to the National President-elect post.

  1. The registration fee to attend Dermacon, Mid dermacons should be made affordable for all. As everything is sponsored, the registration fee should be @ 7000 for Dermacons & @5000 for Mid dermacons. The fee should be 5000 for Dermacon & 3000 for mid dermacons for the newly passed out for 4 years, this will enable more youngsters to join Dermacon. A separate fee may be charged and the QR code on the name tag can be modified for those who want to enjoy alcohol.
  2. Each member of the organising team must furnish copy of the Audited Income Tax Returns of self & clinical establishments filed in previous 02 years and 01 year after the conference is over ( eg. 1) It is evident that most of the young members are not interested in the affairs of IADVL, many have not converted their PLM status to LM. Also, many members have changed addresses/ state/ e mail & phone numbers, many are not traceable. It is proposed to introduce Yearly renewal of the membership to be introduced during the annual cuticons of state and Annual Dermacons where a dedicated booth should be erected where members can fill a form with attachment of the required documents and demographic details if any change is there or can update the data if no change is there at a nominal cost. This will inculcate a sense of belonging to the members and soon the database of membership will get corrected.

Dr. Rajeev Sharma LM/UP&UK/2251 mentioned that much of the members 'data does not match their current location, as many addresses are not updated in the directory. This has resulted in several journals being returned to the IADVL headquarters. He emphasised that it should be the responsibility of the state presidents and secretaries to update their members 'data and provide it to the national body.

Decision: This proposal was not referred to the ABGM; instead, the data will be updated by state president and secretary and then presented at the ABGM.

**Dr. V.K. Sharma LM/ND/1652 suggested that proposals from any individual—whether from the EC, CC, or a common member—should be restricted to a maximum of two. No single member should be allowed to submit more than two proposals.**

IADVL should engage a LAW firm which has pan India presence and can address and fight legal cases on behalf of IADVL members at the local level as IADVL v/s the opposite party. This will streamline the work against quackery in dermatology and also be of help in the legal cases if need arises. However, a proper MOU must be drafted citing all the services the Law firm is going to render to IADVL, and its scope. The amount to be furnished to the

Law firm can be generated by parking a handsome amount of money from IADVL account into a high interest yielding instrument where the interest is earned back into IADVL account every month/quarter as per the

decision of MOU for payment to the Law firm. This will give more confidence and clarity to the members as they can contact the local legal representative of the said Law firm, who will prepare necessary drafts and appraise the

legal cell of IADVL and take proper actions. So far some amount from Rs 50,000000/- ear marked for anti-quackery activities has been utilised by Tamil Nadu branch.

Dr. Rajeev Sharma LM/UP&UK/2251 stated that the IADVL EC had not been able to secure a law firm for the association; however, Dr Rajetha Damisetty LM/TS/4726 has managed to identify one. He emphasised that it is clear IADVL will need to allocate a significant budget to engage the law firm in the fight against quackery. Further details will be provided by Dr. Rajetha Damisetty.

Dr Rajetha Damisetty LM/TS/4726 informed the members that the identified law firm is Ms. Tania Agarwal and Associates, a Delhi-based legal firm which consists of seven lawyers. Ms. Tanya Agarwal herself is a practicing lawyer in both the Supreme Court and the High Court.

Furthermore, Ms. Tanya Agarwal assured that she would support IADVL in every possible way. She also committed to identifying suitable lawyers for representation in the Sessions Court and mentioned that she would provide a draft MOU, with the financial terms to be finalised and filled in by IADVL. She expressed her willingness to extend this support because she recognises that IADVL is working for the cause of public awareness. Therefore, her law firm should be seriously considered by IADVL.

Dr. Rajib Gogoi LM/NE/2933 and Dr. Putta Srinivas LM/TS/59 both suggested that this proposal should be moved forward. They emphasised that IADVL should acquire a law firm, regardless of the cost, as it is essential for protecting the interests of the younger generation and all IADVL members in the fight against quackery.

Decision: The final decision, as stated by Dr. Rajeev Sharma, was that the proposal should be approved by the CFC, regardless of the amount involved. It should not be referred back to the ABGM, as one year has already been lost. Since the proposal has already been passed through the CCM, the CFC can finalise the approval, and further suggestions can be considered later.

#### **Background:**

As per the **IADVL Constitution 2024 (Page 34)**, the Hon. Secretary-Elect and Hon. Treasurer-Elect are elected by the life members of the association and serve as **observers** for one year prior to taking office. During this period, they may attend EC, Academy, and CCM meetings, assist the incumbent Hon. Secretary or Hon. Treasurer, and are entitled to travel and accommodation support. However, they currently:

- **Do not possess voting rights**
- **Are not seated on the dais** during ECM/CCM
- **Cannot perform independent functions**

#### **Proposal:**

In view of their **democratically elected status by the IADVL membership**, and to foster a culture of inclusion, respect, and preparation for leadership, it is proposed that:

##### **1. Voting Rights:**

- o The **Hon. Secretary-Elect and Hon. Treasurer-Elect** be granted **voting rights** during their observer period in **Executive Council Meetings (ECM)** and **Central Council Meetings (CCM)**.
- o Their voting rights shall be limited to issues **not involving financial or constitutional amendments**, preserving the sanctity of observer status while ensuring engagement in deliberations.

##### **2. Seating on the Dais:**

- o Both Hon. Secretary-Elect and Hon. Treasurer-Elect be provided **seating on the dais** during ECM and CCM, similar to other EC members.
- o This shall symbolically and practically **acknowledge their elected status**, preparation for future leadership, and allow better visibility and interaction with the council.

#### **Rationale:**

##### **1. Democratic Mandate:**

- o Both positions are **elected by IADVL life members** through the same electoral process as other EC members. Denying dais seating or voting undermines this democratic endorsement.

##### **2. Leadership Training:**

- o Active participation in discussions and decisions ensures a **more effective transition** into their future roles,



aligning with the spirit of apprenticeship.

3. **Respect and Inclusion:** Providing voting rights and dais representation is a gesture of **institutional respect**, enhancing morale, motivation, and ownership among future leaders.

4. **Consistency in Functioning:**

Other national and medical associations extend similar privileges to their elect positions. Aligning

IADVL's practice with such standards will enhance the professionalism of its governance.

**Suggested Resolution:**

"Resolved that the Hon. Secretary-Elect and Hon. Treasurer-Elect, being elected representatives of the IADVL membership, be granted voting rights and be seated on the dais during Executive Council and Central Council Meetings, with immediate effect. These voting rights shall exclude financial and constitutional matters during their observer year."

**1. Legal Committee Opinion :**

1. The posts President (Elect ) , Hon.Sec.General (Elect ) and Hon.Treasurer ( Elect ) are posts not mentioned as office bearers in the Memorandum of IADVL ( HQ ) ,neither are these posts part of the Governing body of the Association, in the Memorandum.

2. These nomenclatures have been provided by the AGBM in its own wisdom for the Association.

3. Although these posts are not a part of the Memorandum of the Constitution, but yet each of these are elected members of the Central Council .

4. Therefore, the mentioned posts shall retain all powers and duties conferred by the Memorandum of the Constitution, as Central Council members.

5. The Said posts cannot exceed the limits provided in duties and responsibilities other than those granted to Central Council members.

6. The Said posts are neither members of the Governing Council ( Executive Council ) as laid down in the Memorandum nor do they enjoy any other privilege accorded to Central Council Members except the nomenclature.

7. It would be both wise and prudent to desist from according any special status to any member of the Central Council except nomenclature.

8. The proposal to include these said posts for a special reference is primarily, illegal ,arbitrary, mollified and a colorful exercise of power.

9. Any change on the original Memorandum of the Association has to be first have a prior permission from the registering authority under the Societies Registration Act and then proceeded .

10. The said changes will be a cause of greater litigation being not in concurrence of the societies registration act as it will foster disharmony , undue interference of extra Constitutional considerations (

without due responsibilities and answerability to the the members at large ) and undue influence on policy matters as it will provide an undue support / rejection to matters of consideration, by the Association ,without any Constitutional liability .

11. The Memorandum of the Association does not mention any duties for the said posts and therefore they shall be a liability on the autonomy of the EC merely because of an illegal insertion into the decision-making process of the Elected office bearers for the Association Year, as by law established.

12. The alley quoted regarding other Medical Associations does not hold good too since the largest Association of Medical Men ,the IMA ( HQ) although includes Elect posts but does not allow the Elect office bearers to perform any duty of the Association or present themselves on the Dias .

13. What cannot be done directly, cannot be done indirectly": is a legal maxim  
This is the core principle of the doctrine, derived from the Latin maxim "quandò aliquidprohibetur ex directo, prohibetur et per obliquum".

This is an attempt indirectly for undue illegal interference merely by increasing the numbers of a future EC into being subdued / unconstitutionally interfered upon by pre elected CC members, in the the day to day running of the Association by changes brought about in nomenclatures.

#### **Constitution Committee Opinion :**

What our IADVL Constitution 2024 says:

As per IADVL Constitution 2025 (Section D, Page 34):

The Hon. Secretary-Elect and Hon. Treasurer-Elect are observers during their term prior to assuming office.

They may attend EC, Academy, and Central Council Meetings (CCM).

They have no voting rights and cannot independently perform official functions.

They are entitled to travel and accommodation for attending meetings but cannot influence decisions. Their presence is for training and observation only, not for active decision-making or voting.

#### **Proposal Nature:**

The proposal seeks a policy change, not a constitutional amendment, because the current clause defines their role but does not explicitly bar dais seating.

However, voting rights in EC and CCM would indirectly alter the Constitution's intent regarding the observer status of these positions.

#### **Impact on IADVL & Concerns:**

Granting voting rights may dilute the observer principle meant for learning, not influencing decisions prematurely. Could raise concerns about conflict of interest before they formally assume



office. Might require careful differentiation to avoid confusion in financial or constitutional matters.

### **Conclusion & Recommendation:**

Dais Seating: Not Acceptable as per current Constitution.

Voting Rights: Not acceptable as per current constitution . Needs thorough deliberation. The Constitution treats these posts as observers only; voting rights—even partial—may need a constitutional review or clarification by the Constitution Committee before approval.

The proposal can be first discussed at EC/CC level for consensus, followed by a legal/constitutional vetting if voting rights are to be granted. Potentially conflict with observer role defined in the Constitution.

### **SOP committee Opinion**

All committee members are in agreement and support the proposal. We believe it will help ensure a smoother transition, build confidence in future office bearers, and prepare them better for their roles.

We recommend that the proposal be placed before the Central Council for consideration.

**Apart from the Constitution Committee Report, Dr. VenkatRam Mysore LM/KN/3211 suggested that individuals holding these posts are currently in their learning phase. Therefore, they should not actively claim the seats at this time, as they are essentially in a training role. After a year, they will be better prepared and are likely to secure the positions.**

**Decision: Not referred to ABGM.**

As in recent years there have been 1) some instances reported of quackery promotion by members, 2) many states have either different bye-laws or do not have registered societies, and also 3) some alleged financial misappropriations which has led to lots of time & energy wastage of the National EC which is committed for a clean IADVL, as we are slapped with notices from income tax department and for the first time in the history of IADVL, have to go for a forensic audit. For a smooth coordination between the functioning of National IADVL & the state IADVL branches, this step is necessary. To encourage having standing committees, it can be discussed that if a state does not fulfil the above-mentioned requisite, then the state will not be eligible to host SIG activities, Mid-dermacon&Dermacon, and other important IADVL activities. ### **Constitution committee Comments**

What our IADVL Constitution 2024 says:

#### **Committees in IADVL Constitution:**

The Constitution already provides for various Standing Committees at the National Level (Section D, Rule 3, Page 33–34).

These committees can include advisory and expert members, as per need. It mandates that all committees must include members from IADVL and explicitly mentions *no non-member* shall be allowed. It specifies a two-year term for crucial committees like the Constitution Committee, Finance Committee, and Academy.

#### **State Branches' Autonomy:**

State branches are allowed to frame their own rules to maintain their autonomy, provided they do not conflict with the

National Constitution (Section C, Page 23–24).

States can set up their own committees but align with the national rules.

**No explicit mandate currently exists in the Constitution for every state branch to compulsorily have Ethics and**

**Disciplinary Committees.**

#### **Administrative & Constitutional Nature:**

This proposal qualifies as both administrative and constitutional. It proposes a new constitutional mandate requiring uniform committee formation at the state level.

#### **Impact on IADVL:**

This proposal strengthens ethical governance, ensures uniformity, and enhances accountability across all state branches.

It reduces risks of administrative lapses and legal/financial scrutiny by proactively managing complaints and ethics issues. Aligning such mandatory committees with central IADVL policies will lead to smoother coordination.

#### **Recommendation:**

Yes, this proposal requires constitutional amendment as it seeks to *add* a new clause mandating state-level committee.

Referral to the **Constitution Committee** is necessary for clause drafting, placement, and legal vetting



**Note:**

The clause does not replace any existing clause but introduces a *new mandatory provision*. Careful phrasing is needed to maintain state autonomy yet ensure uniform compliance.

**Review:**

The proposal seeks to make it *mandatory* for every IADVL state branch to have an **Ethics Committee** and a **Disciplinary Committee** with a minimum of five members (odd number preferred). If a state has an Anti-Quackery Committee, either merge or rename Ethics & Anti quackery Committee if possible. Currently, no such mandatory clause exists in the Constitution, though state branches can form committees on their own.

This proposal qualifies as both **administrative** and **constitutional**, as it aims to enforce uniform ethical structures across all states. It aligns with IADVL's mission of *clean, transparent, and accountable governance*.

**Conclusion & Recommendation:**

The proposal is justified, timely, and necessary for strengthening IADVL's governance framework across all state branches. review, and inclusion. State IADVL bodies. It requires a **constitutional amendment** and must be referred to the **Constitution Committee** for proper drafting, this step will ensure consistency, safeguard ethical practices, and streamline coordination between the National and the proposal can be first discussed at EC/CC level for consensus.

**Dr. Vinay Singh LM/ND/2993 suggested that an Ethics Committee should be constituted at the state level, particularly for Dermacon, Mid-Dermacon, and state conferences. The purpose of this committee would be to prevent any misappropriation in organising conferences or educational programs. He further recommended that the committee should consist of an odd number of members, preferably five or seven, with at least one member representing the National EC.**

**Dr. Rajeev Sharma LM/UP&UK/2251 advised that the Constitution Committee has concluded that no such provision currently exists in the Constitution. Therefore, a constitutional amendment is required, and the matter must be referred back to the Constitution Committee for proper drafting. He further noted that the committee could be named either the Ethical Committee or the Disciplinary Committee, or it could be merged with the AQLC (Anti-quackery Legal and Ethics Committee).**

Decision: Once redrafted by the Constitution Committee, the proposal will be placed before the AGM for approval

As in all national conferences of IADVL banner, the PAN used is of National IADVL and as in recent past Dermacons, there have been alleged financial misappropriations which has lead to lots of time & energy wastage of the National EC, as we are slapped with notices from income tax department and for the first time in the history of IADVL, have to go for a forensic audit, if we engage a event manager to do everything, on our terms and conditions ( which can be discussed and finalised ), except the scientific program, IADVL will be saving money, will be spared of any harassment from IT department and there will be no internal fighting. This model is being used by various societies across the globe and they are running it successfully. For logistics at the local venue city level, the seed money can appropriately be increased and the share model after the conference is over, can be modified on pro rata basis. Now we are no more a charitable association but are Association of People, the tax exemption under section 12 D is no more applicable in the ITR filed from now onwards. There will be no discrepancy in counting of the food plates, lodging rooms allotted, printing, writing materials

expenses, audio-visual expenses, trade area income & expenses, dinners arrangements including the cultural event expenses, construction of the temporary structures which is discouraged in the constitution but almost all OCs get it done ( fallout of the recent Hyderabad Dermacon and previous Dermacons) and there will be no issue of difficulty in

**Relevant Sections:**

**Section H: Conferences** (Pg 47–49)

Detailed clauses exist for conference finances, organisation, and responsibilities.

**SOP Section 8 (Pg 149):**

Provides clear financial guidelines for DERMACON, including MOU with Organizing Committees.

**Key Points in Current Constitution:**

Current model allows **OC** to handle most aspects of the conference, with the National EC overseeing the finances and retaining supervisory authority.

The **financial responsibility** currently rests with both National EC and local OC, with strict reporting,

auditing, and accountability rules.

Constitution discourages *temporary structures* and has strict guidelines for financial propriety.

However, there is **no clause mandating a compulsory external event management firm** for full

conference management.

**Proposal Nature:**

This proposal is both **administrative and constitutional**. It seeks to fundamentally shift the operational model by giving full conference management (except scientific

program & basic local logistics) to a hired CMC under National EC control. Impact

on IADVL:

**Merits:**

Greater **financial transparency and control** at the National level.

Minimises tax risks, legal scrutiny, and future disputes.

Reduces administrative burden on doctors and enables focus on scientific content.

Aligns with practices followed by many global medical associations.

**Concerns:**

Requires **amendments in the Constitution (Section H: Conferences)** and SOP (Dermacon Finances).

Could reduce local ownership and flexibility.

MOU terms with CMC must be carefully drafted to avoid future complications.

It can be too burdensome for National EC apart from regular organisational responsibilities getting neglected.

**Conclusion & Recommendation:**

The proposal holds **strong merit** for better financial governance and risk mitigation.

However, it **requires constitutional amendments** (Section H: Conferences) and **SOP revisions**.

It must be referred to the **Constitution Committee** and **Finance Committee** for legal, financial, and constitutional

vetting, with clear frameworks for accountability and operational roles.

EC may first discuss the feasibility and then send it for constitutional processing.

It needs constitutional changes and careful multi-committee review before adoption.

The proposal can be first discussed at EC/CC level for consensus.

**Dr. Rajeev Sharma stated that the auditor had suggested having a separate PAN card for each conference, such as Dermacon and Middermacon. However, he felt that this would not resolve the issue, as maintaining separate PAN cards would make it even more difficult to monitor and control the Dermacon accounts.**

**Dr. Shashi Kumar B. M., Council Member, advised that while having a separate PAN card could save 18% GST initially, the same amount would be lost when the conference transfers the funds back to IADVL. Hence, maintaining a separate PAN card would ultimately result in a financial loss.**

**Committee Functioning (Section D, Page 33-34):**

The Constitution allows formation of **Standing Committees** and empowers the **President** to appoint

members in consultation with the Immediate Past President and President-Elect.



The President has authority to **add or remove members** of committees and sub-committees as needed during the term.

The EC and CC oversee committee functioning, but **routine replacements** don't necessarily require GBM approval.

**Administrative Nature:**

This is purely **administrative**, not constitutional, as it involves internal committee processes already within the President's prerogative.

**Proposal Review:**

The proposal aims to enhance **efficiency and accountability** by allowing committee chairpersons and conveners to suggest the removal of non-contributing members.

This is already *implicitly permissible* under current constitutional provisions, which allow the President to restructure committees as required, ensuring flexibility.

However, formalising this as a routine practice with clear guidelines will further improve clarity and fairness.

**Impact on IADVL:**

**Benefits:**

Improves committee productivity and morale. Encourages active contribution from all members. Streamlines committee work without bureaucratic delays.

**Recommendation:**

No constitutional amendment is needed, but it is advisable for the EC to:

Frame a simple **SOP or guideline** stating that chairpersons/ conveners may recommend replacement of

**Enhancing Inclusivity and Opportunity within IADVL** The Indian Association of Dermatologists, Venereologists and Leprologists (IADVL) is a national body representing registered dermatologists from across India's diverse states. Just as the Union of India reflects a multicultural, multi-ethnic, and multilingual populace, the IADVL's membership mirrors this rich tapestry.

Currently, the existing voting mechanism for allocating DERMACON, our annual national conference, creates an uneven playing field. States with significantly larger membership numbers inherently hold a disproportionate advantage, making it nearly impossible for smaller state branches to successfully bid for hosting the conference.

This situation particularly disadvantages regions like the North East and other zones across the Indian Union.

This imbalance not only limits opportunities for smaller branches but also concentrates conference-related financial benefits – crucial for community outreach, scholarships, and anti-quackery initiatives at the grassroots level – in a

few select cities/states. Furthermore, repeatedly hosting DERMACON in the same centers gives the impression that only certain parts of India are dominant within the organisation.

To address these disparities, we propose a rotational system for DERMACON allocation based on five distinct zones across India: East, West, North, South, and Central. Under this system, bidding for the conference would be restricted to branches within the designated zone each year. This approach would significantly reduce the current unfair discrepancy and ensure broader participation and resource distribution.

#### **Equitable DERMACON Allocation Through Zonal Rotation**

The Indian Association of Dermatologists, Venereologists and Leprologists (IADVL) serves as a national platform for dermatologists from all states of India, reflecting the country's diverse demographic.

However, the current DERMACON bidding process disproportionately favours states with larger memberships, hindering smaller state branches, particularly those in disadvantaged regions like the North East, from hosting the conference. This also concentrates vital funds for local initiatives (community outreach, scholarships, anti-quackery efforts) in a few recurring locations, fostering a perception of regional imbalance within IADVL. To foster a more just and equitable environment, we propose dividing India into five zones: East, West, North,



South, and Central. DERMACON hosting opportunities would then rotate annually among these zones, with bidding open only to branches within the allocated zone. This will ensure fairer distribution of opportunities and resources across our national membership.

### **Reimagining DERMACON Allocation for Inclusive Growth**

The IADVL, as a national body, brings together dermatologists from every corner of India, representing the nation's incredible diversity. Our aim is to ensure that all members have equitable opportunities and that resources are distributed fairly across the country. The current method for allocating DERMACON, our premier national conference, inadvertently creates an uneven playing field. States with significantly higher membership numbers possess an inherent advantage, making it challenging for branches with smaller memberships to successfully bid for hosting. This particularly impacts regions like the North East and other less numerically strong zones within the Indian Union.

Beyond the issue of hosting opportunities, the repeated selection of certain cities for DERMACON limits the flow of essential funds – vital for grassroots initiatives such as community outreach, scholarships, and anti-quackery campaigns – to other parts of the country. This concentration of events and resources also inadvertently conveys an impression that leadership and opportunities are confined to specific regions.

Therefore, we advocate for a revised approach to DERMACON allocation. We propose dividing India into five distinct zones: East, West, North and South. The conference venue would then rotate annually among these zones, with bidding restricted to branches within the designated zone. Furthermore, within each zone, different venues should be given a chance, and consensus-based allotment should be prioritised over voting wherever feasible. This systemic change will promote inclusivity, ensure a wider geographical spread of conferences, and facilitate more equitable distribution of crucial resources across our membership.

Please note that we are open to rearranging these zones based on membership strength and other relevant factors.

What our IADVL Constitution 2024 says:

**Section H: Conferences, Clause (g)6, Page 42** currently governs DERMACON venue selection, which is primarily based on bidding and voting by members.

There is no constitutional provision mandating zonal rotation for conference venues.

Presently, all branches, regardless of size, can bid and compete through voting. The Constitution does allow the General Body to modify or restructure conference procedures if ratified through appropriate constitutional processes.

Nature of Proposal:

This is a **constitutional amendment proposal** as it aims to *modify Section H (Conferences)* to introduce a *zonal rotational system* for DERMACON allocation. Impact on IADVL:

**Merits:**

Promotes **geographical inclusivity** and equitable representation of smaller branches. Ensures **fairer resource distribution** and allows all regions to benefit from conference-generated funds and exposure.

Aligns with the principles of **national representation** and democratic fairness.

**Concerns:**

Restricts free competition in bidding, potentially reducing flexibility in conference planning.

Requires careful zoning and clear guidelines to prevent confusion or disputes. Operational challenges may arise in less-developed city for large-scale conference logistics.

Conclusion & Recommendation:

The proposal introduces a **positive reform** for inclusivity, addressing a long-standing concern of unequal representation.

Since it directly affects the **conference bidding and allocation process** detailed in the Constitution, it **requires a constitutional amendment and there is finance concern also.**

Framing of rotational cycles, bidding timelines, and contingencies. EC may review it first for feasibility before formal constitutional processing.

### 1. **Uniform Tenure Alignment:**

It is proposed that all State IADVL Councils follow a uniform tenure aligned with the National Council - preferably from CUTICON to CUTICON or April to April.

This alignment will facilitate smoother coordination, standardised activity cycles, and better alignment in reporting, budgeting, and planning.

### 2. **Orientation Meeting Post Elections:**

Immediately following the elections, each State IADVL branch should conduct a mandatory orientation meeting—similar to a CC Meet—during the first week of the new term.

**Participants:** State Presidents and Secretaries.

**Purpose:** To outline the roadmap for the year's activities, set clear expectations, establish timelines for key events such as CUTICONS and MIDCUTICONS, and communicate financial protocols.

This practice should be uniformly implemented across all state branches to ensure consistency and effective governance.

### 3. **Accounts and Signatory Transfer Protocol:**

#### **Operational Challenge:**

One of the key challenges faced at the operational level is the delay in transferring financial authority and updating signatories following the election of new office-bearers.

#### **Proposal:**

A strict protocol should be enforced to ensure the smooth transition of financial responsibilities. This should include a clearly defined timeline—**within 15 days** of the new term's commencement—for the transfer of:

- Bank account signatories
  - Access to digital banking platforms
  - Custody of financial records and documents
  - Handover of budgets, audit reports, and pending liabilities
- Implementing this uniform protocol across all state branches will help maintain financial continuity, transparency, and accountability.

### 4. **Conference Organisation and Budget Management:**

### Proposal: Extension of Office-Bearers 'Tenure to Two Years

To enhance project continuity, ensure stronger implementation, and promote greater accountability, it is proposed that the tenure of key office-bearers—**President, Secretary, and Treasurer**—be extended to **two years**.

#### Benefits of a Longer Tenure:

- Supports better planning and execution
- Ensures continuity for key initiatives
- Improves team coordination
- Enhances long-term governance consistency

This change aims to strengthen leadership effectiveness and maximise the impact of IADVL activities at the state level **Constitution Committee comment**

What our IADVL Constitution 2024 says:

The Constitution grants **state branches autonomy** to manage their internal governance, provided it doesn't conflict with the National Constitution (Section C, Page 23-24).

No uniform rule currently exists mandating synchronised tenures, orientation meetings, or standardised conference protocols across all state branches.

Nature of Proposal:

This is primarily an **administrative and policy proposal**.

Impact on IADVL, **Concerns & Recommendation:**

Extending office-bearers 'tenure to two years or more may enhance continuity and leadership stability.

Some smaller or less active branches may find implementation challenging without capacity-building support.

State policy is governed by State EC/ CC/ AGBM and state constitution. If any change need to be done then we need to follow state constitution and must be driven by State AGBM mandate.

We can only suggest here to amendment/s.

No constitutional amendment is immediately necessary.

This proposal is not needed at IADVL Constitution Committee as it's a state constitution matter of autonomy.

The proposal can be first discussed at EC/CC level for consensus.

Dr. Rohit Bansal stated that there is still confusion regarding the tenure, as some states follow the Cuticon-to-Cuticon rule, while others follow the April-to-March system. Hence, there is no direct coordination between the state and national levels.

Dr. Rajeev Sharma suggested that the state constitutions should be aligned with the national constitution. Only then can this issue be resolved. The national constitution follows the April-to-



March tenure; however, the formal takeover takes place during Dermacon, while the tenure remains April to March.

Dr. Rohit Bansal inquired whether the state tenures could be increased up to 2 years. Dr. Rajeev Sharma responded that the state tenure can be extended up to 5 years, provided it is approved in the State GB, after which it can be implemented.

Dr. Rajeev Sharma also mentioned that after his tenure, he is willing to provide orientation to the State Presidents and Secretaries regarding IADVL-related information.

## **DERMACON 2026 BANGALORE PRESENTATION DR. RAGHUNATH REDDY AND DR. S. SACHIDANAND**

### **Registration:-**

**Dr. Raghunath Reddy started with the registration part. He mentioned that, as per the advice of President Dr. Rajeev Sharma, a uniform reduced rate of 25% has been applied to the registration. In addition, the 10% increase that was supposed to be added has also not been implemented. Thus, a total reduction of 35% in the registration fee has been given, and this applies not only to the first slab but also to all subsequent slabs.**

**He further added that, unfortunately, only 300 registrations have been received so far, and among them, 10% are free registrations for senior citizens above 70 years of age. He remarked that this situation is again not favorable for IADVL.**

### **Meetings, Vendor selection and contracts**

All the major decisions are taken after the due deliberation with the Organising core committee.

Multiple meetings were held with important mo Like scientific committee, of the organising committee,

All minutes are written in a register - hand written till now, in future we are planning to have a video recoded meeting

Vendor contract has been made for only Venue and Event management



We have selected the best available venue as per our bid proposal, Inspection was held by the IADVL Venue inspection committee and approval has been taken. Rates have been negotiated keeping the core committee informed and after obtaining their approval

Many event management companies had contacted us, but we have selected a small company from Bengaluru after due deliberation with the Core committee, we did not want to engage the well-known big companies who were involved in the DERMACONS and MIDDERMACONS in the recent past based on our assessment

We have selected an event management company with clear description of scope of work and the OC is going to take more responsibility and involvement to execute the work.”

### **Rules & guidelines as per constitution, SOPS & MOU**

- Sending monthly account statement, Bills & Invoices, MOUs, TDS & GST paid details to - Central IADVL local accountant - Request EC to let us know if the MOUs made till now are in proper order.
- Not giving registrations to companies under the heading of stalls or sponsorship.
- Many companies are not happy - Might impact the total registration & their participation.
- Following very strict & uniform policy for the allotment of stalls - Many companies though are aware of that, with their experience 2019, Still they come and bargain repeatedly for hours & days based on their past experiences.
- They repeatedly quote what they got in the past and demand too much based on their previous experience.
- Not able to estimate the possible number of registrations & participation from the companies - Hence not possible to project a budget in the present scenario.

### **SCIENTIFIC PROGRAM**

- All inclusive, practically oriented program including recent advances
- Theme: "Empowering Skin Science: Implicit Ingenuity & Inclusivity"
- For the first time a common e-mail was sent to all LMs, inviting applications for the faculty position with relevant credentials

- We received around 400 applications, but most of them were not supported by the academic requirements
- We have selected around 150 Faculty from these applications
- We are in the process of finalizing the scientific program. Preliminary program was shared with the academy and approved
- The communication to the faculty will start from 25.08.2025
- We will be almost ready with full scientific program before the CSC meeting scheduled for 11th & 12th October 2025
- Once the Orations and awards are announced, we will send one more printed brochure to all the members to encourage registration.

- **Dermacon 2027 Ahmedabad Request for Venue change**

- Dr. Jagdish Sakhia explained that the venue earlier decided for DERMACON 2027 was Mahatma Mandir. However, there are some concerns. Previously, the venue was managed by a private forum (The Leela), but now it has been fully taken over by the government. This means that in case of any government program, the MoU can be cancelled and our event can be called off at any time. Secondly, the site within the venue that was earlier designated for the entertainment program has now been converted into a plantation area, making it difficult to continue with the planned activities. He further mentioned that there are chances of the Vibrant Gujarat Summit being conducted around the same time as DERMACON 2027, which is another major reason for considering a change of venue. Therefore, it was finally decided that an emergency GBM will be convened to take a final decision on whether the venue for DERMACON 2027 should be changed.

- **The financial report of Dermacon Jaipur 2025 :- Presented jointly by Dr. U.S. Agarwal, Dr. Dinesh Mathur, and Dr. Vijay Paliwal.**

- They provided a detailed account of:
  - The overall income and expenditure of the conference.
  - Sponsorships received and delegate registrations.
  - Major heads of expenditure including venue, hospitality, scientific sessions, and logistics.
  - Balance position and surplus generated, if any.
  - In earlier meetings, the expected income was projected to be around ₹28–31 crores, while the expected expenditure was estimated at ₹23–24 crores, with anticipated savings of ₹2–3 crores.
  - However, the actual income was significantly higher:
    - ₹31.9 crores from pharma industry support
    - ₹4.51 crores from delegate registrations
    - Bringing the total income to approx. ₹36.20 crores.
  - The actual expenditure under different heads amounted to around ₹27–28 crores.
  - This resulted in a net savings of ₹8.7 crores, far exceeding the initial expectations.



- The organisers also clarified that, in line with NMC regulations, no pharma sponsorship was taken towards the registration of doctors.
- Regarding participation:
- Against the expectation of 6,000 delegates, around 4,000 delegates registered.
- Additionally, 1,700 accompanying persons were registered.

### **IADVL Anti quackery Legal and Ethics Committee Report**

Dr Rajetha Damisetty, Chairperson of the Anti quackery Legal and Ethics Committee, presented her report. She began by thanking President Dr. Rajeev Sharma for merging the Anti quackery, Legal, and Ethics Committees into a single body. She noted that this integration has helped in addressing issues more effectively and has enabled the committee to take independent decisions comfortably.

She then presented the approximate financial budget required for the committee's activities. Under various heads—such as yearly fees for the legal retainer, responses to notices filed in the Supreme Court or lower courts, and representation of lawyers in the Supreme Court, High Courts, and District Courts—the total budget estimated was about

₹1.5 to ₹2 crores.

She informed that approximately nine show-cause notices have been issued to dermatologists who were found to be falsely promoting products on social media, which is not permissible. In addition, about three legal notices have been received by the Chairperson of the committee in response to the actions taken.

She further highlighted that the committee has made a representation to the Telangana Medical Council, which in turn has forwarded the matter to the National Medical Commission (NMC), stating that oral maxillofacial surgeons, who are also dentists, are not fit to perform hair transplant surgeries. She described this as a historic step taken by the Telangana Medical Council under the initiative of the committee.

She also emphasised that “cosmetologist” is not a recognised medical degree, as only a 10th pass qualification is sufficient to obtain such certification. Therefore, she strongly advised that dermatologists should refrain from using the term cosmetologist in their degrees, professional titles, or practice.

A discussion was held regarding a formal complaint against Dr. V. Ramesh, President, IADVL Telangana State Branch. Dr.Rajeev sharma noted that, as the matter pertains to the state branch, appropriate action should be taken at the state level. The outcome and actions taken are to be communicated to the National Executive Committee (EC) for information.

A discussion was then held regarding Dr. T.A. Rana and Dr. Chrianjiv Chabhra, who were identified as false dermatologists without the NMC-required qualifications to practice dermatology. From the IADVL Delhi branch as well as the Central IADVL, about 3–4 notices were issued to them, but no response was received. The IADVL Delhi branch also submitted a letter recommending their suspension, yet there was no reply.

Finally, Dr. Arvind Singh, an IADVL member and lawyer, suggested that both Dr. T.A. Rana and Dr. Chrianjiv Chabhra should be suspended from IADVL membership. He clarified that if suspended, they would not have legal grounds to challenge the decision in court, since IADVL functions as a registered society under the Societies Registration Act.

### **Indian Dermatology Online Journal (IDOJ) Report by Dr. Dipankar De**

The report of the Indian Dermatology Online Journal (IDOJ) was presented by Dr. Deepankar De. He began by expressing gratitude to the EC, particularly the President and Secretary, for giving IDOJ a fair opportunity to function independently without interference.

#### **Dr. Dipankar presented the statistics:-**

- As of 31st July 2025, a total of 1067 publications were submitted, out of which 93 were accepted, reflecting an acceptance rate of 9%.
- He noted that the journal's performance has shown a steady increase every year since 2022, with further improvement in 2024.

On the financial front, the journal received an advertisement income of ₹11,15,000 from pharmaceutical companies such as Med Manor, Alkem, Glenmark, and Sun Pharma. The major expenditures included printing and posting of issues, the IDOJ editorial board meeting, and Pablon expenses, amounting to a total of ₹34,81,043.

#### **Core discussion points:-**

- How to increase the reviewer database and utilize the precious time and expertise of reviewers without burdening them with too many review requests
- How to improve journal efficiency, including further reducing time taken for article processing and production
- Making the manuscript management portal more friendly for the authors, reviewers, and editor
- Adding features on the article processing and production platforms for seamless progress in these phases



- Augmented social media engagement for better visibility of the journal
- Ways to use artificial intelligence to the advantage of research and publishing and tackling the menace of mindless AI use

## The most significant changes of this year

- **ORCID (Open Researcher and Contributor ID).** This information will appear alongside their name in their publications
- **Expedited appearance on PUBMED**
  - From acceptance to appearance of articles in search engines Like PUBMED were taking several months at the cost of visibility/search ability of the articles on PUBMED.
  - In the publication phase, the accepted articles are first published as ‘ ahead of print’ before it is ‘published in an issue’ with a lag period of some months between these.
  - The articles were appearing in PUBMED after approximately 5 weeks of getting ‘published in an issue’.
  - This shortcoming has been addressed and the articles published ahead of print are appearing on PUBMED within one week, not several weeks/months.
  - This is in line with reputed journals globally.

## Indian Journal of Postgraduate Dermatology (IJPGD) Presented by Dr. Yogesh Marfatia

The report was presented by Dr. Yogesh Marfatia, who informed that the journal has now entered its third year, with the sixth issue scheduled for publication. He shared that the journal is progressing well and receiving a large number of publications and articles.

The only concern raised was regarding sponsorship. Previously, the journal was sponsored by Galderma, but due to certain NMC-related issues and other difficulties, the company has withdrawn its support. Therefore, Dr. Marfatia requested the IADVL EC to manage the journal’s annual budget requirement of approximately ₹8–10 lakhs.

In response, Dr. Rajeev Sharma assured that there is no need to worry about sponsorship, as the journal belongs to IADVL, and the association will take full responsibility for its financial support.



## Conference Reform Committee (CRC) Report by Dr. Shyam Verma and Dr. Abir Saraswat

The Conference Reform Committee (CRC) report was presented by Dr. Shyam Verma and Dr. Abir Saraswat. Dr. Shyam Verma began the presentation by explaining the need for this committee. It was constituted by the IADVL-EC after the debacle of the Hyderabad CC meeting in February 2024, where there were unfortunate allegations of fund misappropriation by a small group of respected state dermatologists. For the first time in IADVL's 73-year history, a forensic audit was requested at the demand of members.

The CRC gathered suggestions from members across different states and cities, including both experienced conference organisers and regular members. The proposed reforms were framed considering the existing practices of Dermacon, which have been well managed. The committee's role was to suggest reforms, not to mandate their implementation—the final decision rests with the EC.

Following this, Dr. Abir Saraswat continued the presentation of the report.

## Registration fee and related issues:-

**a.** Registration should be 100% electronic and online, including spot registration. The registration form should be hosted on the IADVL website, NOT the conference website. Only those persons should be allowed whose LM/PLM number is verified at the time of registration by automated checking against the official database of members. After the member is verified and fills the form, the payment gateway should link to the conference bank account. This will completely eliminate non-member registration. Bulk registration by pharma should be discouraged (see point no. e *vide infra*), event that should only be done individually through electronic registration on IADVL website as above.

**b.** Strict access control in all the academic halls and exhibition area with barcode scan entry only. Exhibition area entry may be allowed for accompanying members. Ideally this should also be restricted to members only, but may be kept open for accompanying persons till OC and delegates get used to the restrictions in academic halls. Gradually accompanying person entry should be stopped. Pharma member registrations to be decided and entry restricted only to those registered, with a valid ID. The new Pharma MOU proposal will need to be brought.

**c.** One dinner can be complimentary and included in the full registration cost. All other dinners should be optional and paid separately at the time of registration. There should be a pre-fixed maximum number of Pax decided by the OC based on dinner hall size. Dinner bookings should close as soon as this number is reached. Options for alcohol may be kept separate (different rate for dinner only or dinner + alcoholic drinks; can easily be encoded in the QR/bar code of delegate badge).

**d.** Single-day registration should be allowed. Fee for any one day should be 40% to 50% of the fee for the whole conference (CME+2.5days). Complimentary dinner only if it is there on that day, and places are available.

**e.** Any member who pays for registration through a credit card/debit card/bank account/ accompanying person's name may be given an incentive as 20% discount on the total payment (not for day registration). This can be programmed into the online registration form software itself and needs no manual intervention.

**f.** General formula for calculation of registration amount: Cost of lunches and gala dinner (plus per-head cost of venue, including AV charges (minus) 30% (to be covered by pharma support for conference)).

Our suggestion is for 2028 (can be adjusted based on Cost Inflation Index for that year, these are 2025 prices):

- Day ticket fee for CME or any of the three conference days: Rs.4000+ GST.
- Combo fee for CME+all 3 days: 16000 less 30% = 11200+GST.
- Those paying from own accounts: 11200 less 20% = 8960+GST (equals approx. 10500. Most members wanted registration fee to be around Rs. 10000).
- Workshops can be priced similarly to CME.
- Postgraduate students: 10% additional discount on total amount.
- Suggested price for dinners: 2000+GST (excl. alcohol).



- Accompanying persons: Same as PG students.

**g. Only 3 price bands:**

- First 4 months from previous dermacon (Early bird): rates as above.
- Next 6 months: 10% escalation.
- Final 2 months and spot: 20% escalation.

**h.** Local organizing committees should register through an electronic method in the usual way. Ten free registrations (Core OC plus state EC) may be given to core OC members on their discretion (with one accompanying person each).

Dr. Bhumesh Katakam pointed out that the incoming and outgoing EC meeting is an important event where the President-elect is formally given responsibility and discussions are held with both the incoming and outgoing EC members. If the timeline is shifted to December, it would not be possible to conduct this meeting effectively. Similarly, Dr. Kiran Godse, Dr. V.K. Sharma, Dr. Venkatram Mysore, Dr. Rajiv Gogai and Dr. Deepika Pandhi also emphasised that advancing the timeline to December would make it impractical to hold the incoming-outgoing EC meeting, which could result in a shortfall for IADVL.

## Practice, Media, and Laser Industry Management Committee Report

Presented by **Dr. Neeraj Pandey and Dr. Rohit Batra**

Dr. Neeraj Pandey began the report by thanking President Dr. Rajeev Sharma for constituting the committee. He outlined that the committee's basic roadmap is to initiate a program in collaboration with the aesthetic industry, particularly focusing on laser companies and related stakeholders.

He highlighted that many members have raised concerns regarding their purchases of machines, as they are often not receiving adequate annual maintenance services or finding replacement parts unavailable. To address these recurring issues, the committee is planning to organise a comprehensive dialogue between dermatologists and the laser industry management.

In addition, the committee is also working on initiating specialised CME programs, including one on **Cyber Security and** another dedicated to GST awareness—aimed at educating members on effectively handling GST-related matters.

### **Website Update Committee Report–Presented by Dr.Rasya Dixit**

This year, the highlight was the launch of the new COMMUNA app, developed with enhanced features to serve IADVL members. The app provides comprehensive information about members and allows them to update their own profiles, including communication address, mobile number, and other details.

Dr. Bhumesh Kattakam, Honorary Secretary General of IADVL, and Dr. Rajeev Sharma, President of IADVL, jointly urged all members to download the COMMUNA app on their mobile devices. They emphasised that the app will serve as a one-stop platform for accessing information and keeping member records updated.

### **Media Management Committee Report–Presented by: Dr. Syed Mubashir**

Dr. Syed Mubashir presented the Media Management Committee report on behalf of the Convener, Dr. Deepali Bhardwaj.

- Media Representation:
- Dr. Deepali Bhardwaj represented IADVL in a debate on NDTV News regarding the death case of Shefali Jariwala. The discussion focused on the use of glutathione, unethical aesthetic procedures performed by quacks, and treatments being carried out at beauty parlors. This was a significant representation of IADVL on a national platform and was widely viewed and appreciated.
- Collaborative Initiative:
- During Hair Con, a joint statement was released by the IADVL Vice President, President of ACSI, and President of the Plastic Surgery Association on strategies to combat quackery.
- Social Media Presence:
- The official Instagram handle of IADVL is being managed by Dr.Khushboo.
- The primary focus of the media cell is to create awareness about IADVL, educate the public about quackery, and increase engagement of dermatologists and the association on social media platforms.
- Collaborative Activities:
- The Media Cell plans to work closely with Yuva Cell and Quackery Cell to organise awareness campaigns and activities, including observance of health- related days at national and state levels.
- Budget Requirement:
- Dr. Syed mentioned the need for a dedicated budget to support these activities, which will be submitted to the Secretary General for consideration.

President Dr. Rajeev Sharma advised that the budget proposal be prepared in a structured manner and submitted for approval by the IADVL EC.

Member Wellness and Derma Talent Committee Report Presented by Convenor, Col Amit Bahuguna

Col. Amit Bahuguna proposed a series of wellness and talent events to be organised during DERMACON and at state Cuticons. The suggested activities include:

- Sports: Tennis ball, cricket tournaments, chess tournaments, and sports day activities.
- Cultural events: Fashion shows, dance performances, cultural nights.
- Online events: Singing and poetry competitions, online chess tournaments.

As an example, in Rajasthan, the Dr. Corporate Cricket League was conducted by the Rajasthan Cricket Academy and Jaipuria Academy Grounds in Jaipur to spread awareness about skin health. An online chess tournament was also organised successfully.

Additional proposals included celebrating a Derma Wellness Day at state levels.

The main point of discussion was the coordination with state branches for uniform implementation of these activities.

Dr. Bhmesh Katakam suggested that a flyer be prepared and circulated to all state presidents and secretaries to facilitate planning and execution.

#### **IADVL-GSK National Quiz Program Report Presented by Dr. Debdeep Mitra**

Dr. Debdeep Mitra presented the report on the IADVL-GSK National Quiz Program.

- Conducted on 15th August with participation from 94 teams.
- 5 teams were shortlisted for the finals, which will be held at Mid Dermacon, Surat on 20th September.



- Dr. Malcolm Pinto is the UG Quiz Coordinator.
- Postgraduate(PG)Quiz:
- Quiz Masters for 19 Cuticon shave been finalized.
- The Tamil Nadu Cuticon has already been successfully conducted, while the remaining 18 Cuticons are in progress.
- The finals will be conducted on stage at Dermacon, Bangalore.

### **IADVL Award Review Committee Report**

The report was presented by Dr. Iffat Hassan, who outlined the roadmap of the committee along with the NIVL recommendations.

A key recommendation concerned the long-standing award previously known as the Professor Ratan Singh Award, which had earlier been renamed to the IADVL Award for Exemplary Contribution to IADVL. The committee proposed to further rename it as the IADVLA Award for Exemplary Contribution to the Association.

For the Best State Branch Award, the committee suggested introducing a scoring system. Proposed criteria included:

- State having its own journal – 10 marks
- State publishing a newsletter– 5 marks
- Conduct of basic and advanced mock exams –5 marks
- Organisation of quizzes for postgraduates and others – (additional marks as decided)

This structured scoring system was recommended to bring transparency and uniformity in evaluating the Best State Branch Award.

### **IADVL National Resident Committee Report**

The report was presented by Dr. Bhumesh Katakam, who stated that the main objective of this committee is to connect the younger generation with IADVL. The committee has undertaken several initiatives, such as:

- Organizing an online reel-making competition on the occasion of World Vitiligo Day.
- Conducting awareness activities on World Skin Health Day, focusing on skin health and co-equity.
- Designing and editing the IADVL Resident Magazine.

## IADVL Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) Committee Update Presented

(AsperAGBM2025, Dermacon, Jaipur)

Several revisions in the SOP draft were made in alignment with the opening and closing minutes of the AGBM 2025.

### Key Proposals:

1. Elections & Meetings
  - Candidates bidding for various posts in IADVL elections will not be invited to the Mid-term CC meeting.
  - Virtual platform approved for election campaigning.
2. Dermacon Format
  - Dermacon will now be a bi-annual event, conducted alongside the ISPD Regional Convention to strengthen academic collaboration, improve resource allocation, and enhance conference quality.
  - Mid-Dermacon will be a two-day event (Saturday & Sunday). This change will not apply to Surat but will be implemented from subsequent editions.
  - Chairs for Treasurer-elect and Secretary-elect will be included in the inaugural function of Dermacon.
3. Financial Provisions
  - Annual international conference budget for the President and Honorary Secretary-General increased from ₹1.5 lakh to ₹5 lakh.
4. Governance & Representation
  - The Honorary Secretary-General (HSG) to be included as a member in all IADVL selection committees and as a jury member in award selections, along with the President, President-elect, and Immediate Past President.
  - The SOP Committee will now come under the IADVL Constitution Committee (as decided in Mid-term CC).
5. Voting & Communication
  - Electronic voting period reduced to 15 days (earlier 1 month).



- Implementation strategies include:
- Notifications to members.
- Email newsletters.
- Updates on official IADVL website.
- Application process updates.
- Revised scholarship application forms.
- Establishing an online submission portal through Academy Central for scholarship monitoring and review.

## 6. Academic & Member Support Initiatives

- Stipend increase for IADVL Observer-ship recipients.
- New Awards: Introduction of an IADVL thesis-based poster award at Dermacon and Mid-Dermacon.
- New role: Creation of the post of IADV Le-Librarian.
- Joint convenors to be formally included in the IADVL Academy SOPs with defined roles and responsibilities.

### **IADVL Mentorship Committee Update Presented by Dr.Saloni Katoch and Dr.Kinnor**

Dr. Saloni Katoch highlighted the progress of the mentorship program. The committee was constituted and an initial meeting was held with the EC. A mentorship post was created, and 16 mentors were carried forward from 2024 to 2025.

The mentee application process was opened, and 81 applications were received. After evaluation and scoring, mentees were matched with mentors based on ranks. Following acceptance from both sides, 48 mentees were successfully paired with 16 mentors. Coordinators were assigned to each mentor-mentee group.

The MEDIKNIT platform was informed regarding the initiation of the Guru Derma Program, and an orientation for mentees was scheduled in the first two weeks of September. Looking ahead, the committee is planning to initiate an international mentorship program, which is currently under discussion.

## Presidential Initiatives

**Two initiatives are currently under progress: Genetic Testing and Setting up a Travel Desk.**

- **Genetic Testing:**

This project is still under review and consideration. Once the details are finalized, the proposal will be forwarded to the Academy and to the CFC for their approval. The budget for this initiative has already been approved in the AGBM. An extension of time till the next AGBM is proposed, by which we expect the project to be finalized.

- **Travel Desk:**

The idea is to establish a dedicated travel desk at the IADVL office for booking tickets—not only for members but also for their families—at convenient refund and cancellation rates. Discussions are ongoing with two potential agents. However, due to the ongoing financial audit and involvement of multiple agents, the process has been temporarily paused.

Once the final forensic audit report is available, the proposal will be revisited. If approved, the travel desk will operate at a nominal service charge, offering significant advantages such as:

- Corporate-level booking with better cancellation policies compared to direct airline bookings.
- Preferential benefits such as better seat selection and meal options.

Both initiatives are expected to reach a conclusive stage by the next AGBM.





- I. IADVL DSB held the first ever “The Science of Anti-ageing Conclave” at Hotel Eros Nehru Place New Delhi on 20st July 2025. With 220 delegates. the meeting aimed to bridge basic anatomy, evidence-based anti-ageing interventions, and practical aspects of aesthetic dermatology. The conclave featured a balanced mix of foundational science, video demos, debates, and panel discussions, bringing together national experts and young dermatologists.
- II. IADVL DSB held Dermatopathology Workshop with SIG Dermatopathology at AIIMS New Delhi on 26th – 27th July 2025 with 160 delegates
- III. IADVL DSB held a meeting on Allergy- Urticaria-at Hotel The Metropolitan, New Delhi on 29th of August 2025 with 35 delegates
- IV. IADVL DSB monthly meeting was held at LHMC ( MEU hall Swarn Jayanti Auditorium) on 30th August 2025 with 75 delegates. with discussion of excellent cases. In addition, the 2nd editions of Relay Quiz and a new ‘Ask the expert Session’ were held, with the latter having open discussion on a chosen topic-the first speaker being Maj Gen Manas Chatterjee on -Challenging cases in Dermatosurgery.

Additionally, educational activities with patients and their attendants were carried out about basic skin hygiene, common skincare myths and pitfalls, and the dangers of self-treating skin conditions and need of consulting only a dermatologist for skin, hair and nail disease. Role plays and videos were played followed by patient interaction at 5 medical colleges.
- 2) Videos on skin giving clues to internal disease, hair loss and need to consult dermatologist were released on all IADVL DSB social handles for public awareness
- 3) Poster on STI prevention was released on social media handles during STI awareness week (14-21 April 2025)
- 4) IADVL-DSB World Vitiligo Day (25th June) Video Contest was held with a theme of-Innovation for Every Skin, Powered by AI
- 5) IADVL DSB, organized 30 camps at different parts of Delhi to serve the needy and underprivileged community on 13.7.2025 as part of the International book of records activity. More than 60 Dermatologists from IADVL Delhi State Branch participated in these free Skin Health Checkup and Awareness camps at various Medical Colleges, Delhi Schools, Old age homes, Schools for visually impaired and orphanages. More than 1400 patients were provided free skin consultation and medicines. This activity was covered by Hindustan times and news channels- Times Now Navbharat and Network 10
- 6) Patient Education Material "Our Skin, Our Journey. Patient education material on 1. What is Eczema; 2. Eczema and Associations; 3. Eczema and Stress were prepared for World eczema Day on 14th September and shared on all DSB handles



- 7) Patient Education Material- Unmet Needs – The Path Forward for Urticaria were prepared and shared for World Urticaria Day on 1st October
- 8) IADVL-DSB World Psoriasis Day Video Contest was held with the submission of 3-minute videos (song, poem, role-play, story, etc.) in line with the -Theme of World Psoriasis Day 2025- Psoriatic Disease and Comorbidities: Understanding the Domino Effect! On 29th October. The winning videos were shared in all IADVL DSB handles

- 11) Operation Hope joint initiative of IADVL DSB and FUE Asia - OPERATION HOPE — Hair Outreach for Patient Empowerment A global charitable initiative for patients with secondary cicatricial alopecia was held at Hotel Eros on 6th December with 8 dermatologists and 4 patients. OPERATION HOPE, a compassionate mission to provide charitable hair transplantation to individuals suffering from disfiguring secondary cicatricial alopecia. We invited dermatologists, hair surgeons, and centers across India and worldwide to become part of this noble cause.in PRE conference workshop in CUTICON 2025. The event was covered by Bharat News.



## GUJARAT

(16<sup>th</sup> July to 15<sup>th</sup> December 2025)

### Workshop on Basics of AI – 31 August 2025

- One day workshop on “Basics of AI” conducted on 31 August 2025, attended by about 100 delegates from across Gujarat and neighbouring states.
- Objective was to bridge the gap between hearing about AI daily and knowing how to use it meaningfully in professional work.
- Sessions introduced generative AI and demonstrated live how it can assist in: making presentations, drafting research protocols, performing literature searches and preparing teaching material.
- Dedicated discussions addressed responsible AI use in education and social media, highlighting data privacy and medico legal concerns.

### MIDDERMACON 2025 – 19–21 September 2025

- MIDDERMACON 2025, the flagship mid term conference of IADVL, was held from 19–21 September 2025 and attracted roughly 700 delegates from all over India, underlining the Gujarat branch’s growing reputation as an active academic hub.
- The scientific programme combined keynote talks, focused symposia and panel discussions.
- A major highlight was the 12 live hands on workshops covering: botulinum toxin, fillers, lasers, chemical peels, body contouring, vitiligo surgery, dermatosurgery, hair transplantation, skin boosters and thread lifts.
- Each workshop was designed to be practical, with step by step demonstrations and supervised practice time for participants.
- In continuity with the AI initiative, dedicated modules on AI in dermatology showcased how AI based tools can support image analysis, triage and workflow management.
- Many delegates appreciated that MIDDERMACON addressed not only traditional dermatology but also future trends in the specialty.

### Psoriasis CME – 12 October 2025

- A focused, full day CME on psoriasis was organized on 12 October 2025, with the aim of moving beyond drug centric discussions to a patient centric view.
- Focused on patient expectations, realistic goals and sustainable treatments.
- Covered rational biologics use: initiation, monitoring, cost-safety balance.
- Compared biologics vs. systemic therapies; impact on comorbidities, psoriatic arthritis.
- Interactive case discussions for real-life application.

### ASTICON 2025 – 31 October to 2 November 2025

- ASTICON 2025 was held from 31 October to 2 November 2025 as a comprehensive conference on sexually transmitted infections, HIV and related conditions.

- Scientific content ranged from the current epidemic landscape of STIs and HIV to practical issues such as syndromic management of vaginal and urethral discharge, acute HIV infection and non venereal genital dermatoses.
- Special sessions covered “Breaking the silence of herpes,” syphilis updates and challenges in managing STIs during pregnancy.
- Psychosexual aspects of STI care—often neglected in daily practice—were also discussed in depth.

### **Dermatopathology CME – 30 November 2025**

- A dedicated Dermatopathology CME was conducted on 30 November 2025 to strengthen clinicopathological correlation skills.
- Faculty covered granulomatous patterns, non-infectious granulomas, panniculitis, hair follicle tumours, lymphoproliferative disorders via slides/photos.
- Stress on clinical history, requisition forms, contextual report interpretation.
- Ended with engaging PG quiz for knowledge check and fun

### **Public health days and outreach**

- Psoriasis Day, Vitiligo Day, HIV/AIDS Day and Nursing Day were actively celebrated across medical colleges and private institutes throughout Gujarat.
- “Chalo Pathshala” initiative conducted more than 20 camps across Gujarat, offering health check ups and free medicine distribution.
- Rural health camps: 12 camps held across Gujarat with free medicine distribution, skin health awareness, women’s health awareness and skin hygiene awareness activities.
- Senior citizen home camps: 4 camps organized with free medicine distribution and focused care for elderly residents.

### **Jail visit services**

- Every Thursday from 3:00 pm to 5:00 pm, residents from BJMC visit Ahmedabad Central Jail to consult inmates with skin complaints.
- Prescriptions are restricted to medicines available in the Central Jail dispensary to ensure feasibility and adherence.
- Inmates requiring procedures are referred to the Skin Department at Civil Hospital Ahmedabad (CHA, Ahmedabad) for further management.

### **Anti quackery actions**

- Alongside academic activities, the branch maintained strong regulatory engagement against unqualified practice.
- Multiple complaints were received regarding non dermatologists performing dermatology, cosmetology, dermatosurgery, hair transplantation and laser procedures without proper training.
- After careful documentation and verification, formal complaints were filed with the Gujarat Medical Council against eight such practitioners.
- As Secretary of IADVL GSB, the branch representative appeared before the Council to present the association’s views.



- It was emphasized that unqualified practice harms patients and damages the specialty's reputation, and the Council was urged to act firmly and clearly differentiate qualified dermatologists from others providing similar sounding services.

## Representation to Government of Gujarat

- A detailed representation was submitted to the Health Secretary, Government of Gujarat, with a copy to the President, IMA GSB.
- First concern: the IADVL GSB President was not being invited to important state level meetings on dermatology and cosmetology services; the letter requested formal inclusion of the association in such deliberations to ensure expert input in decision making.
- Second concern: strong objection was expressed to registration of non dermatologists as "cosmetologists" or owners of "dermatology clinics" under the Clinical Establishment Act.
- The letter highlighted risks to patient safety and recommended clear, specialty specific qualification criteria and inspection mechanisms.
- IADVL GSB positioned itself as a willing partner to help design and implement such guidelines.

## CUTICON 2025 – 12–14 December 2025

- CUTICON 2025, the 51st Annual Conference of IADVL Gujarat State Branch, was held from 12–14 December 2025 at Club O7, Ahmedabad, with the theme "Innovations – Excellence – Practice Builders."
- The conference aimed to advance clinical dermatology, aesthetics and dermatosurgery through comprehensive academic sessions, live demonstrations and interactive discussions.
- A full day pre conference video demonstration workshop focused on lasers, dermatosurgery and office procedures, covering practical applications of LHR, Q switch, fractional CO<sub>2</sub>, HIFU, vitiligo surgery, scar management, exosomes, polynucleotides, MNRF, threads and advanced skin and hair therapies.
- The main conference featured orations, keynote sessions, panel discussions and sponsored symposia addressing vasculitis, AICTD, infective dermatoses, psychodermatology, STIs, leprosy, genodermatoses and endocrine–dermatology connections.
- Research received strong emphasis through multiple free paper sessions, PG thesis based presentations, Dr. Ranjan Raval Free Papers and Dr. Bharat Shah Award Papers, offering robust platforms for residents and faculty.
- Sessions on holistic anti ageing, clinic branding and practice building provided practical insights to support real world dermatology practice.

## RESIMED SESSIONS:


## QUACKERY MUKT BHARAT - FREEDOM FROM QUACKERY The Karnataka Model of Anti - Quackery

IADVL Karnataka, through its Antiquackery and Legal Cell (AQC-LC) 2025, led a state-wide movement to curb the growing menace of dermatology-related quackery, especially in cosmetic procedures, lasers, and injectables. Under the leadership of President Dr. Manjunath Hulmani and the Executive Committee, district coordinators were empowered to work with government authorities, judiciary, and the public to address unqualified practice. The initiative began with sensitizing policymakers and health officials, followed by district-level action where documented complaints led to raids, closures, and legal notices against illegal clinics across more than 27 districts. Public awareness was strengthened through Kannada media campaigns, highlighting the dangers of unsafe treatments. Despite challenges such as unethical associations by some qualified practitioners, repeated advisories and corrective measures were implemented. This coordinated, evidence-based, and legally empowered approach, now known as the “Karnataka Model of Anti-Quackery,” has become a national blueprint for protecting patient safety and upholding ethical dermatological practice.







**18.11.25:** After a meeting of the EC NEIADVL and Antiquackery committee, member directives for NEIADVL members to strengthen our Antiquackery endeavours and safeguard member interests were published and widely circulated on the official WhatsApp group of the branch. It was decided that a Google form will be circulated among the members to submit complaints regarding unqualified practitioners.

An undertaking was taken from the dentist to stop skin consults and aesthetic procedures. Apollo clinic was instructed to remove all signages/advertisements etc with immediate effect and employ only certified skin specialists in their Dermatology department henceforth.



## Academic Activities

## TEACHER'S DAY WISHES VIDEO RELEASE BY TN IADVL


**DATE: 5th September 2025**

The third quarter of the year by the IADVL Academy was academically enriching and fruitful. IADVL Academy [Special Interest Groups (SIGs) and Task Forces (TFs)] conducted multiple CMEs/Workshops, both digital and physical, across India in association with IADVL State branches for the benefit of its members.

Seven Special Interest Groups (SIGs) will be completing their tenure in 2026. Accordingly, applications were invited for the posts of Coordinator, Convener, and Members for these seven SIGs, as well as for the SIGs on Psoriasis and Pigmentary Disorders. In addition, applications were invited for the post of Joint Conveners of the IADVL Academy. The evaluation of work performed by SIGs and Task Forces (TFs) during 2025 is currently in process.

### **IADVL Observerships and IADVL Training Program**

#### **A. IADVL Observerships 2024-2025**

IADVL Observerships for a duration of 4 weeks (with a stipend of 15,000 INR), for IADVL LMs aged less than 35 years and for a duration of 2 weeks (without a stipend), for IADVL LMs aged 35 years or above, are offered at approved centers. IADVL Observerships 2025 offered observership courses in different specializations under the able guidance of 27 course directors. Various courses offered are LASERS, Aesthetic dermatology, Dermatosurgery, Phototherapy, Trichology, Hair transplant Surgery, Urticaria, HIV medicine, Leprosy, Pediatric dermatology, Dermatopathology and Dermoscopy.

In DERMACON 2025, all the observership directors were felicitated, and observership results were announced in February 2025. A total of 244 candidates applied this year (230 below 35 years and 14 above 35 years), out of which 92 were selected (81 below 35 and 11 above 35 years). An email with the details of candidates to the course directors and of the course details, consent forms were sent to all the candidates.

Till mid-December 2025, 65 candidates have finished their observership, and 11 have withdrawn due to various reasons.

Announcement for observership 2026 was made on 5th Nov 2025, and the entire submission process is now online. Applications have been submitted, 234 total, and we plan to evaluate and submit the results by January 2026.

#### **Changes for observership 2026**

1. Professor Leni George, CMC Vellore, will take over as Course Director in place of Dr Susanne Pulimood.

2. Dr Dipak Kulkarni has revised the course title to “Dermatosurgery, Lasers, and Practice Management.”
3. Dr Sharmila Patil has discontinued as Course Director due to personal reasons.
4. Two additional seats have been approved at Dr Venkataram Mysore’s centre.
5. Six additional seats have been approved at Dr Madhavi Pude’s centre.

### **IADVL Training courses 2025**

IADVL Training courses 2025 are of 4 months with a stipend of 30,000 INR per month, as compared to a 3-month training period and a 10,000 INR per month stipend in 2024. Training course 2025 are offered at the following centers- Dr Bhumesh Kumar Katakam (Pediatric Dermatology, Gandhi Medical College/ Hospital, Secunderabad), Dr Sachin Verma (Procedural Dermatology, SkinVita Clinic, Kolkata), Dr Venkataram Mysore (Dermatopathology, The Venkat center for skin, ENT & plastic surgery (Venkat Charmalaya), Bengaluru), Dr Dasika Subba Rao (procedural dermatology, Vijaya Skin Hospital and Laser Center) and Dr Sumit Sharma (Hair restoration, Dermawave Skin, Laser and Hair Transplant Center). Forty-five candidates applied for 2025 training, out of which 13 candidates were selected and allocated to the centers. Communication regarding the same was forwarded to the training course directors and candidates. Out of 13 candidates to date, 11 have given their consent. Till November, only 3 candidates have completed their training

**Changes in Training 2025:** The training courses are for 4 months at a stretch or divided into 2 halves if the program director agrees, with a stipend of Rs 30,000/- per month.

Announcement for training 2026 was made on 5th Nov 2025, and the entire submission process is now online at Academy Central. Sixty-three applications have been submitted, and evaluation is underway. The results are planned to be announced by January 2026.

**Title: An update on leprosy and skin NTD**

The Department of Dermatology JSS Medical College in association with IADVL Special Interest Group on Leprosy and NTD (IADVL Academy) along with IADVL EC and Karnataka Branch successfully conducted a one-day CME on “An update on Leprosy and Skin NTDs” at JSS Hospital Mysuru on 27th July 2025. Dr.Ranugha PSS, Coordinator of SIG Leprosy and NTD organized the event under the guidance of Dr.Kanthraj, Professor and Head with the support of all faculty of the department. Dr.H. Basavanagowdappa, Vice Chancellor, JSSAHER was the chief guest of inauguration ceremony, Dr.Madhu CP, Director, JSS Hospital, Dr. D.Narayanappa, Principal JSS Medical College and Dr.Veeranna S, President, Mysore Dermatology Society were the guests of honor.

In support of the WHO goal of reduction in NTDs by 2030, recent updates on various leprosy and skin NTD were the topics. Dr.Sunil Dogra, Chairperson, IADVL Academy and Professor, Dermatology from PGI Chandigarh, Dr.Madhu Rengarajan, Professor from Madras Medical College and Dr.Madhukara J, Professor from St.John’s Medical College shared their experience. Faculty from different Indian states including Dr.Shruthi HN from Karwar, Dr. Manobalan K from Puducherry, Dr.Vijaya B from Mysore, Dr.Sujai Suneetha from Hyderabad, Dr.LekshmiPriya K from Pune, Dr.Sowmya S from Guntur and Dr.Shivani from J&K spoke and shared their knowledge. A panel discussion on challenging cases was conducted by Dr.Ranugha.

Around 100 delegates attended the conference from across India. An award paper session on interesting cases of leprosy and NTDs was conducted in which 20 postgraduates from across Karnataka participated. Dr.Nithya from JSS and Dr.Rashmi Shetty from BR Ambedkar Medical College were given cash prize for 1st and 2nd best presentation respectively. 2 credit hours were approved by Karnataka Medical Council for this event.



### 12th December, King George's Medical University (KGMU), Lucknow

Title: Subcutaneous and Deep Mycoses: An Overlooked Fungal Frontier

The academic programme began with a workshop focusing on practical aspects of mycological diagnosis, including demonstration of direct smear techniques, fungal culture methods, and advanced fungal identification using MALDI-TOF MS, highlighting the importance of clinic-laboratory correlation.

The CME sessions were attended by over 150 delegates and covered a wide range of clinically relevant topics related to subcutaneous and deep fungal infections. Key areas discussed included the clinical spectrum, diagnostic approach, and management of mycetoma; emerging insights in sporotrichosis; chromoblastomycosis; phaeohyphomycosis and entomophthoromycosis; histoplasmosis; mucormycosis; and deep fungal infections in immunocompromised hosts, including cryptococcosis and penicilliosis.

The programme was further enriched by video demonstration, an audience quiz, a case-based postgraduate quiz, and an interactive panel discussion addressing diagnostic dilemmas and therapeutic challenges in day-to-day practice.

Overall, the workshop-cum-CME successfully provided a comprehensive, practice-oriented update and enhanced awareness and expertise in the management of subcutaneous and deep mycoses

## VITILIGO TASK FORCE

The IADVL EC, IADVL Vitiligo Task Force, and IADVL Odisha successfully conducted a two-day Vitiligo Surgery Workshop on 25–26 October 2025 at the Kalinga Institute of Medical Sciences (KIMS), Bhubaneswar. The workshop received special institutional permission from KIMS to perform live surgical demonstrations, making it a landmark hands-on academic event in vitiligo surgery.

Day 1 featured structured lectures and panel discussions covering essential surgical principles, including surgical setup, technique selection, micropunch/minipunch grafting, ultrathin split-thickness grafting, suction blister grafting, NCES, and office-based procedures. Eminent speakers shared clinical pearls, while interactive panels addressed challenges, stability assessment, and management of difficult-to-treat cases.

Day 2 was dedicated entirely to live surgical demonstrations, conducted inside the KIMS OT complex under strict safety and ethical protocols. Participants observed real-time procedures such as suction blister grafting, ultrathin SSG, minipunch and micropunch grafting, and NCES preparation. Expert surgeons also



showcased practical nuances in microneedling, dermabrasion, and postoperative care. The live format allowed delegates to witness technique execution, instrumentation, troubleshooting, and graft-harvesting steps exactly as performed in routine clinical practice.

The workshop provided rare, high-value experiential learning, bridging theory with true surgical skill transfer. With enthusiastic participation from dermatologists across India, the event reaffirmed IADVL's commitment to advancing surgical excellence in vitiligo.



IADVL Vitiligo Task Force successfully conducted the World Vitiligo Day Online National CME on 22 June 2025. The full-day academic program, awarded 4 CME credit points from Odisha Medical Council in Collaboration with IADVL Odisha, highlighted global perspectives and emerging advances in vitiligo care.

The CME opened with the “Cairo Chronicles”, featuring experts from Egypt who discussed vitiligo and depigmenting disorders in infancy, including diagnostic challenges and the role of the Excimer stamp test. 



## Introduction

The Community Dermatology Committee of the Indian Association of Dermatologists, Venereologists and Leprologists (IADVL) continued its commitment towards improving skin health awareness, early detection of dermatological diseases, and equitable access to dermatologic care during the reporting period from 16th July 2025 to 15th December 2025.

## Objectives of the Committee Activities

To enhance public awareness about common skin diseases, their prevention, and early treatment.

To conduct community-based screening and dermatology camps, especially in rural and semi-urban areas.

To promote stigma reduction related to skin diseases such as leprosy, vitiligo, psoriasis, and sexually transmitted infections.

### 1. Community Dermatology Health Camps

Multiple free dermatology camps were organized across various states in collaboration with state and city IADVL branches. These camps catered to populations with limited access to specialist dermatologic services. Common conditions encountered included dermatophytosis, scabies, eczema, acne, pigmentary disorders, and psoriasis.

80+ camps were done in the reporting period

### 2. Chalo Pathshala

Recognizing the importance of early intervention, the committee conducted school-based dermatology awareness programs targeting children and adolescents. Interactive sessions were held on:

Personal hygiene and skin care

Fungal infections, scabies, pediculosis

Acne and body image concerns in adolescents

Sun protection and prevention of photodermatoses

Educational material in local languages was distributed to students and teachers. Teachers were



sensitized to identify common skin conditions and encourage timely medical consultation.

70+ Chalo Pathshala camps done all over India in association with IADVL state branches

### 3. Mission prison

Multiple free mission prison camps were organized in prisons across various states in collaboration with state and city IADVL branches

10+ Mission Prison camps done

4. Atopic Eczema Day observation on Sep 14 2025
5. World Psoriasis day observation on 29/10/2025
6. World AIDS Day observation on 1/12/ 2025
7. Many other activities were undertaken in association with the different state branches

The Constitution Committee of the Indian Association of Dermatologists, Venereologists and Leprologists commenced its work on 12th February 2025, marking the formal beginning of a structured and comprehensive constitutional review process for the year. At the outset, the Committee established its functional framework to ensure effective coordination, transparency, and continuity. A formal working group was constituted, and a dedicated WhatsApp group of the Constitution Committee was created as a supplementary communication platform to facilitate structured discussions, circulation of documents, and timely exchange of views, alongside formal correspondence.

To ensure informed and uniform deliberations, e-copies of the original IADVL Constitution of 1975 and the revised working Constitution of 2024 were circulated to all members of the Constitution Committee at the very beginning of its functioning. This enabled the Committee to anchor its work firmly in the foundational constitutional framework while addressing contemporary organizational requirements.

The first formal interaction between the Constitution Committee and the National Executive Committee and Central Council for the 2025–2026 term took place on 16th February 2025 through a Zoom meeting held at the level of the Chairperson and Convener. This meeting served to initiate structured dialogue, align expectations, and define the scope and methodology of the constitutional review process during the term.

From 17th February 2025 onwards, the Constitution Committee formally commenced detailed and structured discussions on the Constitution Review. The review process was undertaken on a clause-wise basis, with careful reference to both the 1975 Constitution and the 2024 working Constitution. The deliberations focused on constitutional clarity, internal consistency, procedural correctness, and alignment with evolving organizational practices, while safeguarding the core principles and democratic ethos of the Association.

On 6th July 2025, the Constitution Committee began a comprehensive review of all proposals received from the Honorary General Secretary in connection with the upcoming Central Council mid-term meeting

scheduled for August 2025. Each proposal was examined diligently and in depth, and the review was completed within the stipulated timeline. By the end of July 2025, all members of the Constitution Committee had fully aligned on the scope, intent, and substance of the proposed constitutional amendments and updates, ensuring collective understanding and informed consensus.

During the course of the year, the Constitution Committee examined and rendered considered opinions on a wide range of constitutional, procedural, and governance-related matters. These included clarification and rectification of the UP–UK State Branch nomenclature; formulation of invitation protocols and eligibility criteria for the Central Council Mid-Term meeting; examination of the membership case of Dr. Viswasat Bakaya of the UP–UK State Branch under UP UK nomenclature issue ; and issuance of a clear constitutional opinion on the lawful procedure for convening and conducting an Extraordinary General Body Meeting (EGBM). The Committee also examined the structure and functioning of the Finance Committee and advised on the constitutional mechanism for convening an EGBM on Central Finance Council.

Further, the Committee provided its opinion, upon reference by the Member of Constitution Committee, on the issue of video recording of the Central Council Meeting and EGBM held at Jaipur. It examined the framework for electronic voting and opined on the constitutional safeguards and transparency measures required for e-voting. The Committee also rendered its opinion on the proposed venue change for Gujarat DERMACON 2027, the zone-wise rotation of DERMACON bids to ensure equity and balanced regional representation, and the termination of membership case of Dr. T.A. Rana, strictly in accordance with constitutional provisions and principles of natural justice. In addition, the Committee examined and opined on the DERMAZONE and CUTICON Inauguration and Valedictory Protocols, with the objective of ensuring uniformity, dignity, and constitutional propriety in ceremonial proceedings.

In mid-September 2025, the Constitution Committee undertook a comprehensive re-examination of all aspects and future prospects of the Constitution Review and proposed amendments. This exercise was aimed at ensuring internal coherence, legal robustness, and alignment with both foundational principles and practical governance needs. Subsequently, the second Zoom meeting between the Constitution Committee and the National Executive Committee and Central Council was held on 6th October 2025. This meeting focused on further deliberation, clarification, and refinement of the Constitution Review and update process.

The third Zoom meeting of the Constitution Committee was held on 18th October 2025, primarily to deliberate on the planning of the Golden Jubilee celebrations of the Constitution Committee. Although detailed discussions and preparatory planning were undertaken, the proposed Golden Jubilee celebrations could not be materialised due to unavoidable circumstances.

On 8th November 2025, the Constitution Committee issued a formal clarification regarding the scope of reference and the process of committee review. This clarification outlined the extent of the Committee's mandate, the procedural framework for examination, and the advisory nature of its role, thereby providing institutional clarity and procedural guidance.




Under the aegis of the Executive Committee for the 2025–2026 term, the Constitution Committee planned and executed the circulation of the proposed amended draft of the Constitution to all Central Council members by 20th November 2025. A cut-off date of 5th December 2025 was fixed for receipt



of responses, comments, and suggestions. An Extraordinary Central Council Meeting was subsequently held on 9th December 2025 (as fourth zoom meeting), during which the proposed amended draft was discussed in detail. The fifth meeting of the Constitution Committee was also held on the same date during the ECCM, specifically for structured deliberation on the Constitution Review, updates, and amendment provisions.

The fifth Zoom joint meeting of the Constitution Committee with the Executive Committee and Central Council was held on 8th December 2025 to finalise the flow of events, agenda sequencing, and procedural framework for the forthcoming E-Central Council Meeting. Following the deliberations of the ECCM, a revised draft of the proposed constitutional amendments was circulated to all members on 20th December 2025. The first Extraordinary General Body Meeting on the Constitution amendment and update was then proposed on 23rd December 2025, during which the revised draft was formally placed before the General Body for consideration. A sixth Zoom meeting of the Constitution Committee was proposed for 23rd December 2025 in connection with matters relating to the E-GBM; however, the meeting could not be convened due to unavoidable circumstances.

Throughout the year 2025, the Constitution Committee functioned in a structured, consultative, and constitutionally grounded manner. The Committee consistently adhered to the principles of natural justice, procedural fairness, and institutional continuity, and discharged its advisory mandate with diligence and responsibility. The work undertaken during the year reflects a sustained effort to strengthen constitutional clarity, reinforce governance integrity, and uphold the democratic functioning of the Association.




## IADVL'S ANTI-QUACKERY, LEGAL, AND ETHICS COMMITTEE

### CC Meeting report (24th August, 2025)

1. The budget requirements for 1.5 – 2.1 crore INR that includes a budget for the anti-quackery cases to be filed, the central command centre and awareness activities was submitted.
2. The AQCLEC presentation led to unanimous decisions to
  - a. Cancel Mr T A Rana's IADVL membership owing to lack of proof of his eligibility
  - b. Suspend Dr Chiranjiv Chhabra in view of her role in propagating quackery by training unqualified people in dermatologist-led aesthetic procedures
  - c. Appoint a central committee to look into the role of Dr V Ramesh, president of IADVL Telangana in actively promoting quackery by enabling his daughter to perform independent skin and hair consults and claim expertise in performing chemical peels, lasers and hyaluronic acid fillers in the cheek, chin, nasolabial folds and lips.

### Anti-quackery activities:

1. 458 complaints were submitted along with collated evidence to the NMC
2. Question was raised in Rajya Sabha by Mr Vivek Tankha, honorable member of parliament
  - a. whether unqualified or unregistered persons are conducting aesthetic dermatology and laser treatments across the country.
  - b. whether such unregulated practices have resulted in harm or fatalities to patients;
  - c. whether existing legal provisions are sufficient to govern these procedures,
  - d. whether Government plans to enact a central law or create a dedicated regulatory body for oversight, and
  - e. the measures being taken to ensure patient safety and ethical practice in this sector?
3. Virtual townhall was conducted on 28th August, 2025 on IADVL platform; it was a 2 hour. Program attended by almost 200 members and received critical acclaim.
4. A three-day long summit was held in Jabalpur on 11-13th September, 2025 to bring together anti-quackery warriors from across the country. Dr Amarendra Pandey was the organizing secretary of the conference and Dr Rajetha Damisetty the chief patron. Dr Akshay Samagani, Dr Avinash Pravin, Dr Karthick Raja, Dr Nitin Jain and Dr Varun Tyagi too part in the proceedings. Multiple sessions were conducted on legal aspects of anti-quackery in which senior lawyers of the high court and supreme court and anti-quackery law enforcement officials also took part.



5. A day long dedicated conference called Dakshin Health Summit on anti-quackery, legal and ethical aspects in Hyderabad on 9th Nov, 2025 in Hyderabad organized by committee chairperson Dr Rajetha Damisetty and the convener Dr Amarendra Pandey as the organizing chairperson and convener of the conference. Dr Avinash Pravin, Dr Madhavi Reddy.N and Dr Nazia Nousheen Siddiqua, members of the IADVL AQCLEC were faculty members in the conference which was attended by around 250 members and garnered enormous amount of social and traditional media coverage. Notable was the presence of Dr G.Srinivas, vice-chairman of Telangana medical council and Mr Karam Kommireddy, senior high court lawyer.

  - b. Recording of podcasts in English, Hindi and Telugu
  - c. Anti-quackery camp planning preceding DERMACON on 28th Jan 2026

## Legal aspects

1. Appointment of a supreme court lawyer as the legal retainer through the AQCLEC efforts
2. Monitoring and aiding ongoing anti-quackery cases in Madras and Madhya Pradesh High Courts
3. Appointment of a lawyer to represent IADVL in the Bombay High Court case challenging the infamous DCI public notice dated 6th Dec 2022.
4. Facilitation of representation by IADVL lawyer in the criminal case against IADVL president Dr Rajeev Sharma. The case also had named Dr Rajetha Damisetty, the TGMC and the TGDC as accused.

The Website Update Committee focused on strengthening consistent content generation for the public section of the IADVL website during 2025. A dedicated content creator was engaged, and a wide range of patient-education topics were published, including Botox, fillers, stretch marks, PRP for hair loss, lasers for pigmentation, micro needling, phototherapy, hidradenitis suppurativa, tattoo removal, melanonychia, facial pigmentation, premature greying, myths about vitiligo, laser hair reduction, chemical peels, hyperhidrosis, skin tags, freckles, PCOS and skin, pregnancy-related skin changes, cutaneous vasculitis, herpes zoster vaccine, HPV vaccination, lupus erythematosus (LE), microblading, morphea, nanofat, oral ulcers, polymorphic light eruption (PMLE), and scalp micropigmentation. Additionally, clinical photographs from various medical colleges were collated, tagged, and uploaded following EC approval, enriching the clinical image repository. Updates were carried out across both the IADVL Main Site and the IADVL Public Site to ensure improved accessibility and visibility. The Communa member app also showed steady growth, reaching a total of 1,618 downloads during the year.

Under the leadership and guidance of Dr. Rajeev Sharma, President IADVL and EC Liaison Member, and Dr. Bhumesk Kumar Katakam, Honorary Secretary General, IADVL, the committee has worked steadily to ensure a structured, transparent, and impactful mentorship program.

Application forms for the IADVL Mentorship Program were released earlier in the year and received an encouraging response from young dermatologists across the country. A total of 81 applications were received from prospective mentees, reflecting strong interest and trust in the mentorship initiative. The committee completed a detailed evaluation of all submissions using predefined criteria. Mentor-mentee matching was carried out based on cumulative scores and the mentor preferences indicated by the applicants. A provision was kept in place to reassign mentors in cases where a mentee declined the initially allotted mentor, ensuring fairness and optimal alignment.

A total of 16 mentors consented to participate in the 2025 cycle, with 48 mentees selected for the program. The mentorship sessions were formally inaugurated on the auspicious occasion of Teachers' Day, 5th September 2025, with an orientation programme outlining the objectives, structure, and expectations of the initiative for both mentors and mentees. The mentorship sessions were conducted in a structured, well-moderated manner and were recorded for documentation. The sessions were efficiently moderated by the support executive from [www.communia.app](http://www.communia.app).

For ease of communication and coordination, each mentor-mentee group was assigned a dedicated coordinator. This approach facilitated timely communication, scheduling, and resolution of logistical issues, thereby enhancing the overall mentorship experience.

The IADVL Mentorship Committee 2025 reports the successful completion of the IADVL GuruDerma Program 2025. Each session witnessed active engagement from both mentors and mentees throughout the mentorship cycle. E-certificates have been issued to all participating mentors and mentees. The committee places on record its sincere appreciation and gratitude to the mentors who contributed their time, expertise, and guidance toward the successful conduct of the IADVL GuruDerma Program 2025. The mentors for the current mentorship cycle included Dr. Asha Kulsekaran, Dr. Ajith Kumar, Dr. Bikash Ranjan Kar, Dr. Binodini Behera, Dr. C. V. Madhuri, Dr. Maya Vedamurthy, Dr. Meera James, Dr. Mukta Sachdev,

Dr. Narendra Kamath, Dr. Niti Khunger, Dr. Rashmi Sarkar, Dr. Rohit Batra, Dr. Sudip Ghosh, Dr. Tarun Kumar Mittal, Dr. Vijay Zawar and Brig (Dr.) Y. S. Bisht. Their sustained involvement and commitment played a pivotal role in ensuring the academic rigor, smooth execution, and overall success of the mentorship program.

As a continuation of the mentorship initiative, the committee plans to conduct a Leadership Masterclass, comprising three additional sessions focused on leadership development for the selected 48 mentees, in the forthcoming phase.

In addition to the domestic mentorship program, the committee recognizes the importance of expanding its scope. Discussions regarding the International Mentorship component, initiated during earlier meetings, will be revisited and taken forward in a structured manner.

Overall, the mentorship program has been highly successful, marked by strong participation, effective execution, and meaningful engagement. The committee remains committed to further strengthening the program and building on this success in future cycles.





## IADVL STANDARD OPERATIVE PROCEDURES COMMITTEE

The SOP Committee had an active and productive year, with a primary focus on strengthening governance, standardization, and transparency within IADVL. The Committee's key mandate during the reporting period was the systematic review, revision, and harmonization of Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs), ensuring that all approved decisions of the Association were accurately and promptly incorporated.

A major activity of the Committee this year was the incorporation of resolutions arising from the AGBM 2024 into the existing SOP framework. Several SOP sections were reviewed and updated in alignment with the opening and closing minutes of the AGBM, ensuring consistency with the Association's constitutional intent and member-approved decisions.

Important academic and conference-related SOP amendments included the decision to conduct MIDDERMACON as a two-day event (Saturday and Sunday), with Surat being exempted from this change. The SOPs were also revised to include chairs for the Treasurer-Elect and Secretary-Elect during the DERMACON inaugural function, and to introduce a Thesis-Based E-Poster Award at both DERMACON and MIDDERMACON, thereby encouraging academic rigor and resident participation.

Significant governance and administrative updates were implemented during the year. These included a reduction in the electronic voting period from one month to 15 days, the introduction of the post of IADVL E-Librarian, and the formal inclusion of Joint Conveners within the IADVL Academy SOPs, with clearly defined roles and responsibilities.

On the financial and training front, the SOPs were amended to reflect an increase in the stipend for IADVL Observership recipients, along with related updates across multiple SOP sections to maintain internal consistency.

The Committee also initiated preliminary SOP revisions linked to the opening proposals of AGBM 2025, ensuring continuity and preparedness for upcoming governance cycles.

The committee also witnessed the resignation of two key members, the Chairperson, Dr. Dinesh Devaraj and Convener Dr. Divya KS. As a result, Dr. Rochelle C Monteiro took over as the Convener in June 2025.

Despite challenges such as the volume of SOPs, the need for precision, and the importance of consensus-building, the Committee remained committed to timely and accurate SOP revisions. Going forward, the SOP Committee aims to implement periodic SOP audits, enhanced digital access, and faster integration of AGBM decisions, thereby supporting efficient and transparent functioning of the Association.

The SOP Committee expresses its sincere gratitude to the IADVL EC Office Bearers, Central Council members, for their guidance, cooperation, and continued trust.



### RECOMMENDATIONS IN BRIEF

- Hon Secy General will also be a member of the Selection committee..

The committee shall scrutinize the applications and follow the below process, Define specifically the Aim of the award and the category – Academic or for administrative, Assess the awards as per the criteria listed next.

1. SCORING System for lifetime Achievement Awards
2. Scoring system for other Awards
2. Scoring System for initiating Orations in a Legend Name

### IADVL WELFARE SCHEMES

- \* **BENEVOLENT FUND**
- \* **PERSONAL ACCIDENT RELIEF FUND**

IADVL also has an on-going PROFESSIONAL INDEMNITY INSURANCE POLICY for financial protection against any medicolegal claims. Each of the above is to help and benefit IADVL member during any personal crisis or tragedy. Both these funds are through internal accrual while Professional Indemnity is in association with National Insurance Company limited.

### JADVL BENEVOLENT FUND

IADVL Benevolent Fund is to extend solace and support to IADVL members who have undergone the misfortune of being afflicted by serious disability/prolonged illness. The disability or ailment should be due to diseases or mishaps that are not self-inflicted. The intent of the fund is to provide emotional and financial assistance and a helping hand at a critical time. The objectives of this scheme will be to provide financial support to the deserving members in the case of invalidation or in the event of their suffering any injury or physical disability or unforeseen misfortunes like prolonged sickness leading to premature retirement. The support will be extended in the form of one-time payment to a maximum of Rupees 2 lakhs per member as per set guidelines.

### Following is the list and definition of critical illness/disability eligible for grant of Benevolent Fund:

1. Stroke resulting in paralysis: Defined as a cerebrovascular accident or incident producing neurological sequelae of a permanent nature, having lasted not less than six months.
2. Chronic renal Failure: End stage kidney failure presenting as chronic irreversible failure of both kidneys to function, as a result of which regular renal dialysis is initiated or renal transplantation carried out.
3. Major Organ Transplant: The actual undergoing of a transplant as a recipient of one of the following human organs: (a) Kidney, (b) Lung(s), (c) Liver, (d) Heart, (e) Bone marrow
4. Blindness: The total, permanent and irrecoverable loss of the sight of both eyes.
5. Major Burns: Third degree burns covering more than fifty percent (50%) of the Life Assured's body surface area
6. Amputation of limb: Amputation of one or more limbs warranted due to conditions other than accidents.
7. Any other medical conditions deemed to result in a permanent or partial disability / COVID 19 infection requiring intensive unit care.

### JADVL PERSONAL ACCIDENT RELIEF FUND

The personal accident relief scheme is no longer there

### MODE OF DISBURSEMENT OF BENEVOLENT FUND & PERSONAL ACCIDENT RELIEF FUND

Aggrieved member can send the duly filled application form, with bills, hospital summary etc through their branch /City unit to State President/Secretary who shall forward to IADVL President/Hon. General



Secretary. Upon receipt of the application an Expert Committee duly authorised by the IADVL Executive Committee headed by the President of IADVL shall evaluate and approve the same based on the merit of the case. The approved fund can be electronically transferred only in the name of the affected member whose PAN card is verified.

### **Aims and objectives of the scheme:**

3. Advance Fraternity Contribution (AFC) Rs.2000 (Rs Two thousand only) a minimum amount kept with DVL trust towards members future fraternity contributions.

Annual legal fee is based as per type of Dermatology practice: a) The Consultant with only office practice will have to pay Rs. 1000/- per year; (B) The consultant with practice of cosmetic, laser & other Dermato surgical procedures will have to pay Rs. 3000/- per year; to cover these procedural events or litigations. The indemnity coverage will be Rs. 7,00,000 (Rupees seven lakhs) per case and Rs. 15,00,000 (Rupees Fifteen lakhs only) aggregate per year.
