After 28 years of dedicated service to Hyde Park City, Susan Balls is retiring, leaving behind a legacy of commitment, leadership, and institutional knowledge that has helped shape the city as it is today.

Susan began her career with Hyde Park City on **June 1, 1997**, as a **building custodian**, in **August 1998**, she transitioned into the role of **Receptionist**, where her responsibilities quickly expanded. In this position, Susan scheduled use of the building, handled animal control matters, managed business licensing, and played a key role in devel-

oping the city's **initial building permit process**. This work became especially significant in **2000**, when Hyde Park City established its own building department after many years of relying on county services.

In January 2003, Susan was appointed City Treasurer, a role she has carried with professionalism and care ever since. Over the years, her contributions extended well beyond this title. At various points, she has served as Planning and Zoning Secretary, a Development Review Committee member, and has overseen or supported payroll, accounts payable, accounts receivable, human resources and benefits, as well as serving as a building permit technician. Her versatility and willingness to step in wherever needed made her an invaluable asset to the city.

Susan has served under six mayors during her tenure: Mayor Daines, Mayor Kooyman, Mayor Christensen, Mayor Flint, Mayor Wheeler, and Mayor Cox, providing continuity and stability through decades of growth and change.

Her service has also extended far beyond Hyde Park City. Susan has been deeply involved with the Utah Association of Public Treasurers, serving on its board for 17 years, including a term as President from 2014–2015. Most recently, she served as the organization's Executive Director. In addition, Susan has spent the past three years as a Director with the Association of Public Treasurers of the United States and Canada, where she most recently served as Chair of the Membership Committee. She also contributed to the planning committees for the last three National Conferences, held in Salt Lake City, Greenville, South Carolina, and Chicago, Illinois.

Since Susan began her career with Hyde Park City, the community has seen tremendous growth and change. The city's **population has more than doubled**, growing from approximately **2,500 residents in 1997 to nearly 6,000 today**, and the city's **budget and operations have expanded significantly** to meet those needs. Through it all, Susan's steady presence, institutional knowledge, and dedication to public service have been a constant.

Hyde Park City sincerely thanks Susan Balls for her **28 years of exceptional service** and wishes her all the best in a well-earned retirement. Her impact will be felt for years to come. She will be working through the month of January if you would like to come in and wish her well.

A new elementary school building is currently being constructed at 333 E. 300 N. in Hyde Park, UT, as a part of the Cache County School District. The school will be named Old Ephraim Elementary School, named after Cache Valley's last living grizzly bear. Building construction began in the summer of 2025 and is planned to be completed in the fall of 2026.

SNOW REMOVAL POLICY

City snowplows are not deployed unless more than 2 inches of snow has accumulated on the roads or if there is a major safety concern. When they are deployed, they follow prioritized routes. All city streets have been categorized according to priority as follows.

- 1. Arterial roads and major collectors such as Center Street, $600 \, \text{S} \, (3100 \, \text{N})$, and $400 \, \text{E}$
- 2. Subdivision streets, and smaller through streets
- 3. Cul-de-sacs, other dead-end streets, and parking lots

Nov 1, 2025 - April 1, 2026.



No parking on the street between 1:00 a.m. and 5:00 a.m.

- Where no curb and gutter exists, a vehicle must be parked 6 feet off the asphalt.
- Equipment or trailers must be removed.

The parking ordinance applies during the entire 5 month period whether or not there is snow on the ground.

Hyde Park City Parks & Trails Update

Thank you to everyone who participated in our Parks and Trails survey this summer! Your feedback has been incredibly valuable, and we're excited to share our next steps.

The city has applied for a state-funded grant to develop a Parks & Trails Master Plan. This is an important step toward building the parks and trails you said you wanted and that our growing community deserves.

The City is inviting voluntary donations to support our parks and trails efforts. An incredible 83% of survey respondents said they would support better parks through a tax increase! Instead, to keep things affordable for everyone, the City has decided to seek donations. Every contribution will help. Donations of \$1,000 or more will come with a memorial plaque if desired.
