Message from the Mayor

As we are all aware, our state—and specifically, here in Cache County— we continue to face serious drought conditions. In response, I will be asking the city council to implement water restrictions by resolution in our city council meeting on June 10th. We must be wise with the resources we have and make the best decisions for our community, not only for today, but for the long term. These changes, if approved, ask every resident and business to take responsibility and accountability for conserving our water resources.

Additionally, as of 21 May, Governor Cox issued an Executive Order (2026-02) Declaring a State of Emergency in the State of Utah Due to Drought Conditions. Hyde Park City will be implementing restrictions, and I'm certain that through the summer, we will be implementing additional restrictions. I will be asking the city council to adopt restrictions through a formal resolution. It would be unwise to wait when we all recognize we're dealing with a serious issue. These restrictions will include :

- Watering twice per week (not consecutive days), mirroring what many canal companies are doing. Great resource for watering tips [Weekly Lawn Watering Guide – Conserve Water Utah](#)
- No watering between the hours of 9 am and 8 pm
- The city may be imposing fines for violations

Most of the water used in our city goes toward outdoor residential watering. During the winter months, we usually can run all residents and businesses from our spring. We are asking residents to reduce outdoor water usage by more than 20%. I have personally witnessed sprinklers running in April, watering immediately after rainfall, and spraying water onto roads and sidewalks. These practices waste water and do not reflect good stewardship of our limited resources.

I have instructed the city to do its part by:

- Stopping irrigation of the Center Street park strip, except for where there are trees (City Building, Lions Park)
- Reducing watering in parks, yet maintaining watering of trees
- Following all canal company restrictions where secondary water is used
- Further reducing watering during the hotter summer months whenever possible by allowing grass to grow slightly longer, helping shade and protect the soil
- Consider a landscape moratorium for newly built homes

We encourage residents to prioritize watering gardens, trees, and shrubs. Established lawns can survive drought conditions by going dormant and will typically recover the following season. As the canal company wisely stated: “If your yard is green, you’re watering too much.”

The State of Utah’s water conservation program offers rebates and incentives for water-saving improvements through Utah Water Savers, including:

- Up to \$150 for replacing older toilets (pre-1994) with high-efficiency WaterSense-labeled models
- Up to \$3 per square foot for replacing turf with water-wise landscaping
- Up to \$100 for installing a WaterSense-labeled smart irrigation controller
- Up to \$250 for commercial toilet and urinal upgrades

This is a challenging time, and we must all do our part to conserve and preserve our water resources. Together, we can protect this precious resource and ensure there is enough water to meet the needs of all residents throughout the drought. The state has encouraged residents to “Slow the Flow” Rebates for Water-Saving Upgrades | Utah Programs I would simply encourage all of us to change our water behavior and use water more thoughtfully, as if it’s the precious resource that it is.

North Park Police Department:

School is out for the summer, and people are enjoying the outdoors in our wonderful community. North Park Police officers are seeing an increase in traffic and speed. Our officers are proactively looking for dangerous violations such as high speeds, driving under the influence, distracted driving, and motorists not properly restrained or buckled. Help us have a safe summer by slowing down, buckling up, and driving safely.

I also wanted to invite the public to check out the department website. We have added several new features including monthly statistics, a victim's resource page, a public trainings page, information about the new e-motorcycle law, our 2025 year-end report, and on-line fingerprint scheduling.

We have also added a new feature under the Services tab called "Camera Registry." The idea behind this feature is to simplify and expedite the process our officers go through as they try and find doorbell footage of crimes that have occurred. When a crime occurs, the officers and detectives can search the Camera Registry and then reach out to the owners of the cameras to request footage. This is completely voluntary and the department would not have access to any footage. It simply helps officers find locations where security footage might exist.

Influencing Decisions by Local Government

Hyde Park City is not courting or considering a data center, yet, to avoid the frustrations felt by many Box Elder County residents, this is a reminder of how citizens can become informed and influence decisions by local government.

Making Law vs. Implementing the Law

It is important to understand that local government exercises its power in two distinct ways: adopting rules/codes and implementing them.

Legislative Role: In their legislative roles, the City Council and Planning Commission adopt or amend city codes, ordinances, and zoning. The public is encouraged to express their views regarding what codes, ordinances, and zoning decisions are adopted or amended. Once these are adopted, these codes, ordinances, and zoning decisions bind citizens and government.

Implementation Role: When citizens apply to engage in activities regulated by the city, the City Council or Planning Commission evaluates those applications based on the codes, ordinances, and zoning regulations in place. These may be requests for subdivision approvals, commercial developments, sign permits, landscaping plans, etc. If the application meets the conditions specified in the codes, ordinances, and zoning regulations, the government agency must approve the application. If the application does not satisfy the requirements, the agency must deny the application. All these applications and the decisions made are public information.

Public Meeting v. Public Hearing

Utah law requires that almost all meetings of government agencies shall be open to the public. (There are some exceptions for discussion of personnel issues and sensitive information.) Any member of the public may attend any **public meeting**. However, observing public meetings does not mean that public input is allowed. When public input is sought, the agency will schedule a **public hearing**. At public hearings, anyone may express their views (although there is a time limit on how long one can speak). These hearings will be noticed at least ten days in advance. You can find out what public hearings are scheduled by going to: <https://www.utah.gov/pmn/>
