

HUMANSCAPE

NARS Foundation is pleased to present ***HUMANSCAPE***, a solo exhibition by **Richard Masters**, curated by **Yun Jung Rhee**, featuring a powerful body of work developed over four years on the streets of Manhattan. With this exhibition, NARS inaugurates its Invitationals initiative, a new annual exhibition series that invites artists to present their work in both its Main Gallery and Project Space. A central goal of the series is to identify and support artists who have lacked the recognition NARS believes they deserve.

HUMANSCAPE brings together 11 large-scale black-and-white portraits of individuals Masters encountered throughout New York City, many of whom live on the margins of urban life. Rendered with extraordinary precision using oil-based paint and ink, each 50 x 50 inch portrait confronts viewers with

an enlarged human face that is impossible to ignore. At first glance, the works resemble photographs; upon closer inspection, their meticulously hand-drawn surfaces reveal a sustained commitment to observation, time, and presence.

The monochromatic palette removes the distraction of color, directing attention to line, structure, and form while emphasizing the timeless and universal nature of human resilience. The portraits possess a documentary sensibility, capturing subjects marked by both hardship and survival within the vast and impersonal urban landscape.

Central to the exhibition is an audio component composed of recorded conversations Masters had with his subjects. These recordings expand the exhibition into a multidimensional experience, allowing visitors to encounter not only the faces of the subjects, but also their thoughts, identities, and lived realities. Because the recordings were captured on the street, some voices may be difficult to hear clearly. QR codes accompanying the portraits provide transcriptions of these audio recordings, allowing visitors to better understand the content and context of the voices. Themes of homelessness, mental illness, grief, and social neglect are poignantly embedded throughout the work.

HUMANSCAPE emerged, in part, from the artist's personal loss after the death of his son, whose compassion toward unhoused individuals deeply influenced his empathetic approach. Through close observation and candid conversation, the project documents not only the visible presence of its subjects, but also the invisible social forces that have shaped their lives.

HUMANSCAPE aligns with the NARS Foundation's mission to support socially engaged artistic work. The exhibition invites reflection on visibility, dignity, and responsibility, asking viewers to consider who is seen, who remains unseen, and what it means to truly witness another person. Public programs, including an artist talk, will further extend the exhibition's reach.

About the Artist:

Richard Masters is a visual artist based in New York, whose work explores portraiture, urban experience, and social visibility through painstakingly detailed drawing and painting practices. Working primarily in black and white, Masters combines oil-based paint and ink to create large-scale portraits that blur the boundaries between drawing, painting, and documentary image-making. His work is rooted in sustained observation and direct human encounter, emphasizing empathy, presence, and lived experience. About the Curator:

Yun Jung Rhee is a New Jersey-based curator, director, artist, and arts educator whose practice bridges contemporary art, community engagement, and international cultural exchange. She is the director of Gallery Marie ("Making Art Reach Infinite Eyes") and serves as the exhibition curator for the Jersey City Poetry Festival. Rhee is also the founder and director of Creativemind Art at the Museum of International Art, where she has developed exhibitions and educational initiatives since 2009.
