Why are we doing this grant round?

No one service, sector, or system can provide the support families need to navigate/recover from the pernicious effects of DFV. This investment seeks to build the capability of existing collaborative approaches to bolster inter-service and inter-sectoral whole-of-family support in 2 initial focus areas.



PURPOSE

To support vulnerable families experiencing DFV in WA, Qld and NT by bolstering the capability of currently under-resourced inter-service/sector collaborations, improving the provision of whole-of-family support and long-term stability.

WHY?

DFV impacts all members of a family, and repeated patterns of violence have cumulative, intergenerational effects.

For effective recovery, long-term trauma-informed approaches are required to reduce the likelihood of children repeating behaviours witnessed into their own adulthood.

OUTCOMES

1. Children, families, and kin affected by DFV access earlier, culturally safe, and integrated supports (improving their safety, wellbeing, and stability).
2. Services collaborate more effectively to deliver evidence-driven, integrated, and responsive approaches to DFV.
3. Partners generate and share evidence and learnings to enhance, advocate for, and scale effective service models

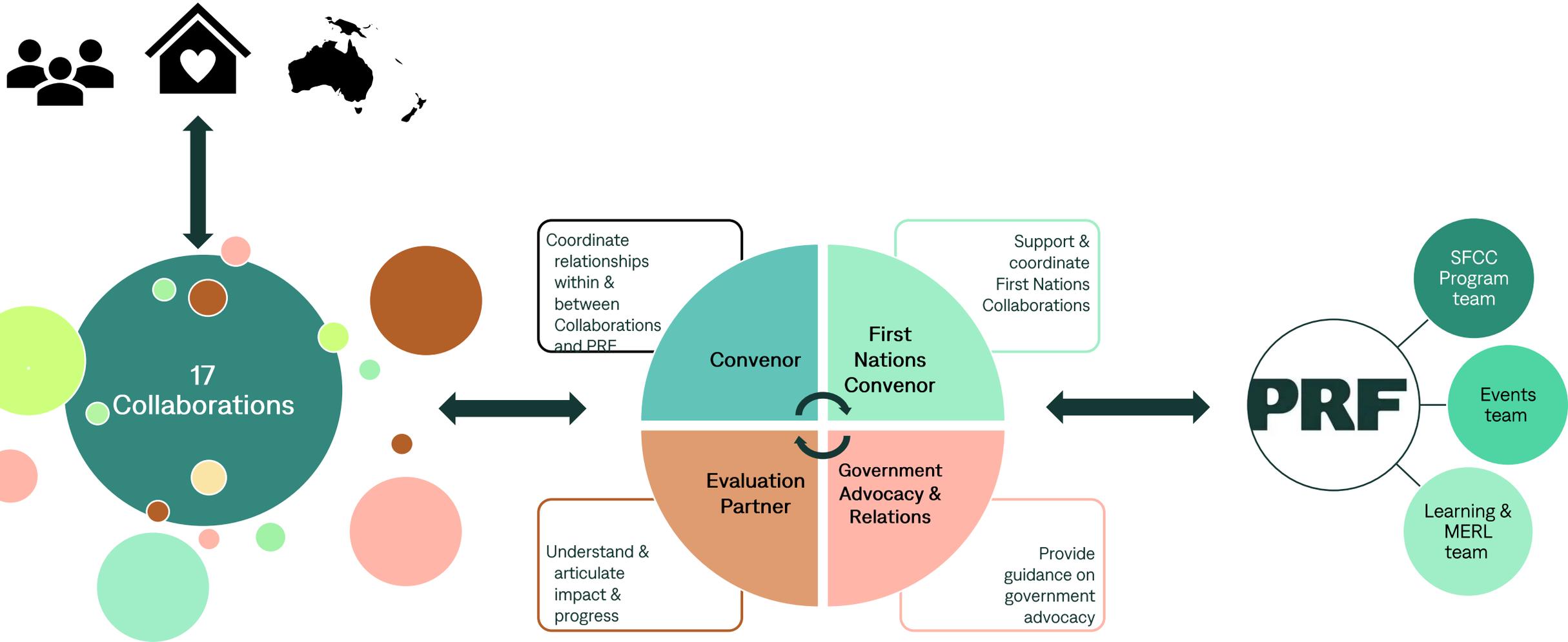
