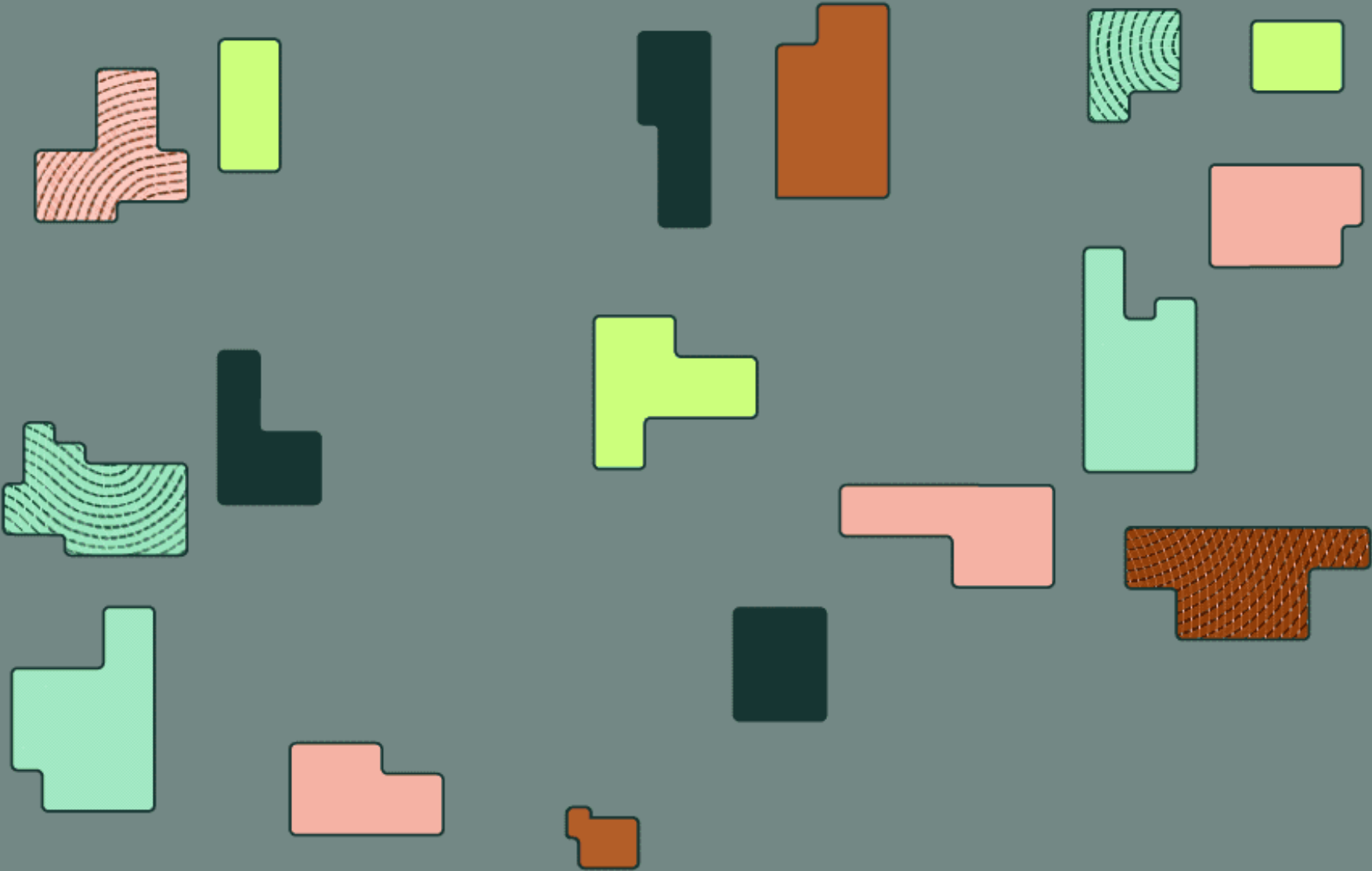

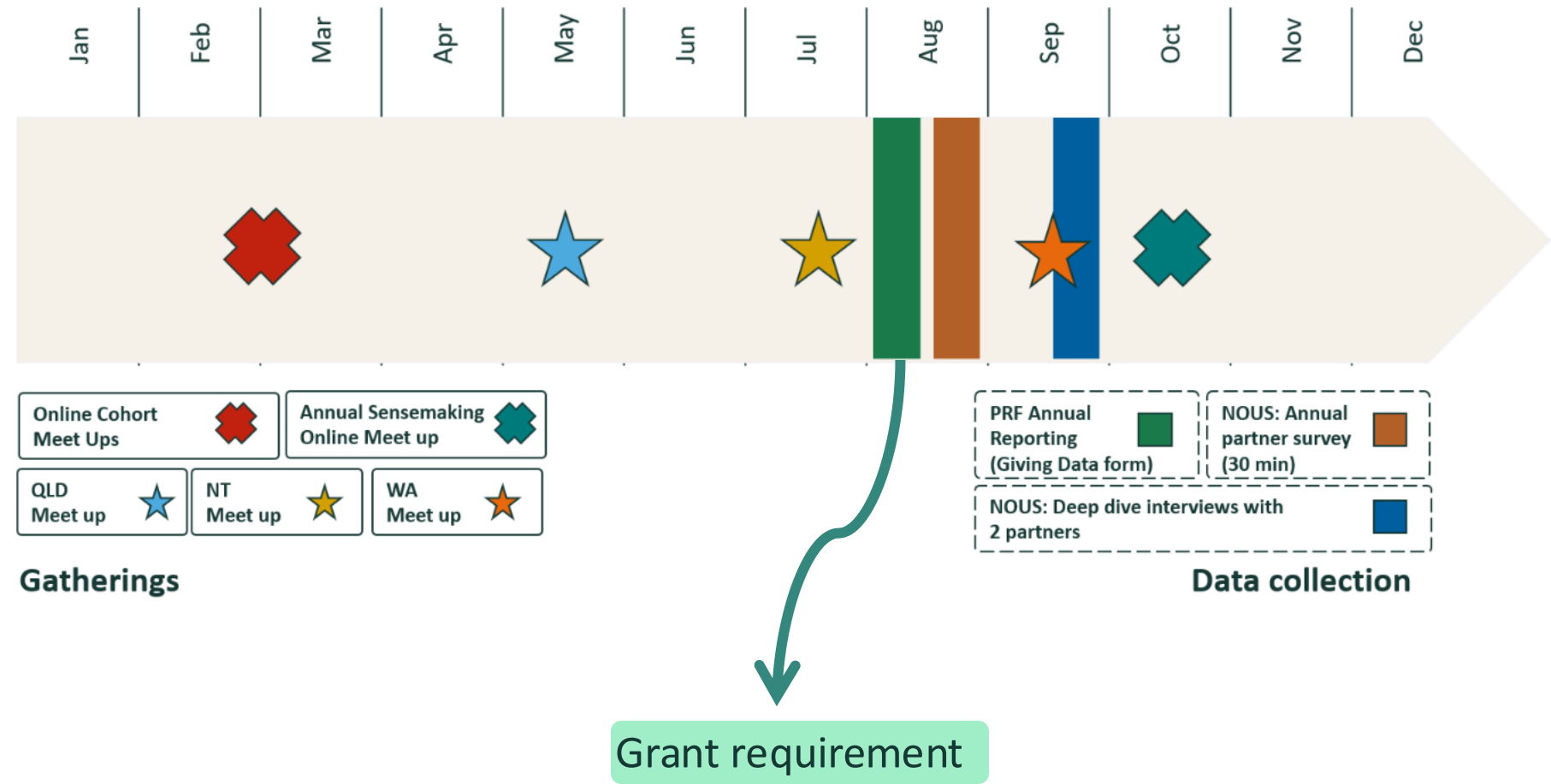

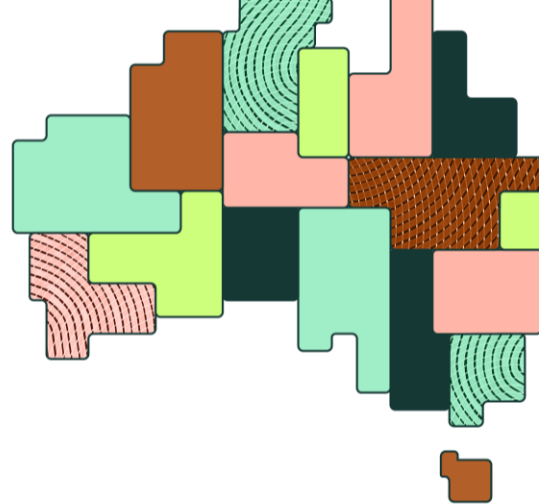


Annual cycle of contact points throughout the three-year grant round



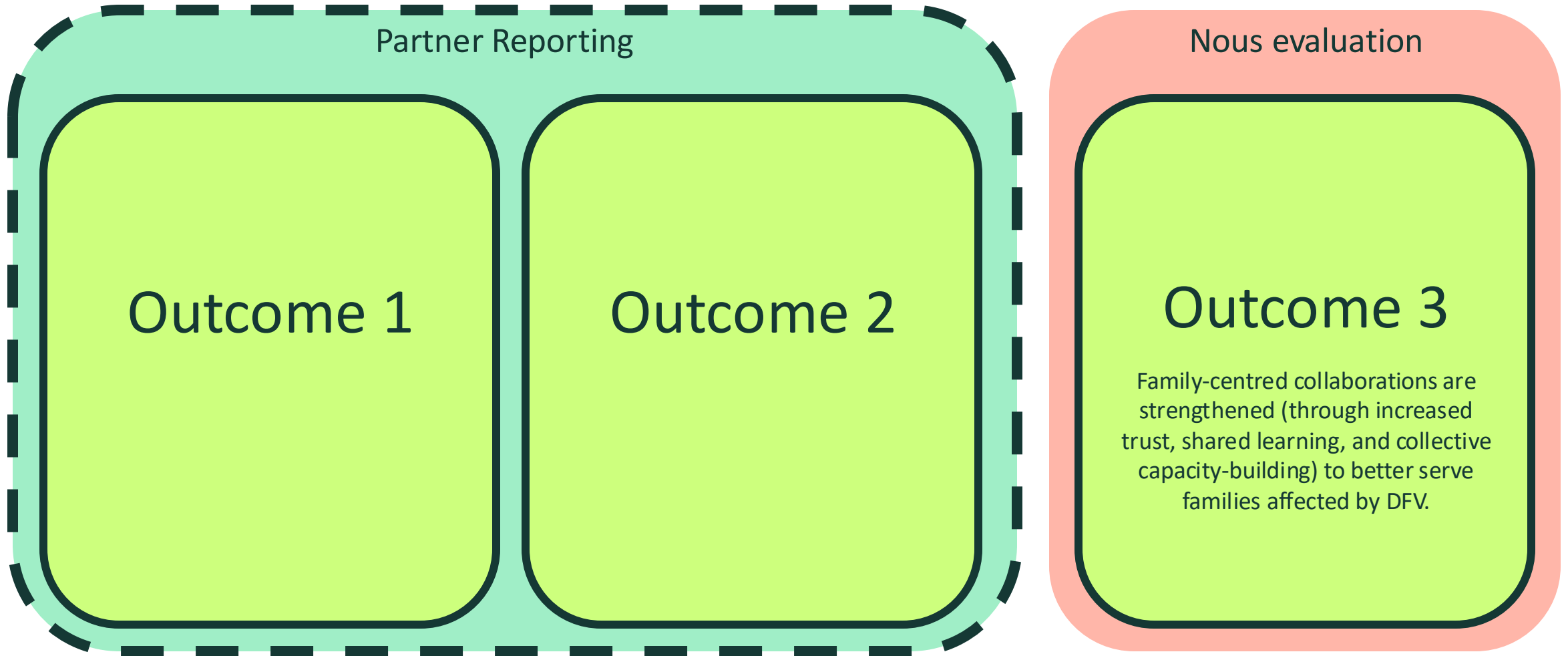
Grantee Portal (GD) Registration

Implementation examples

Example 1: For Year 1 of our grant, we intended to recruit a Linker role to support connection of Pregnant mothers experiencing DFV to other services within our collaboration. Implementation was delayed as it was a priority to hire someone that reflected the cultural diversity of our cohort. This delayed implementation of 6 months has resulted in an underspend in our first year of operation.

Example 2: A planned collaborative review of client intake processes led to the development of a client journey map for practitioners to use with clients to give view to their recovery. This was co-designed with First Nations representatives with lived experience of DFV and will be reviewed alongside outcomes data in one year to gather insights.

Example 3: To improve inter-agency coordination, partners jointly implemented a new digital referral and action-tracking platform. The rollout required rescheduling planned training and revising procedures for data entry. We prioritised this adaptation to result in more transparent client referrals and aligned reporting requirements across the collaboration. This incorporates feedback from our cultural governance advisory to ensure pathways are culturally safe and follow Indigenous Data Sovereignty protocols

Example 4: Staff turnover and unanticipated local disruptions resulted in delays to our initial plan. In response, partners collaboratively reviewed the workplan and prioritised on 3 out of 5 of our initial goals ensuring resources were reallocated to high-need activities. This adaptation supported continued progress and minimised risk to overall grant outcomes.

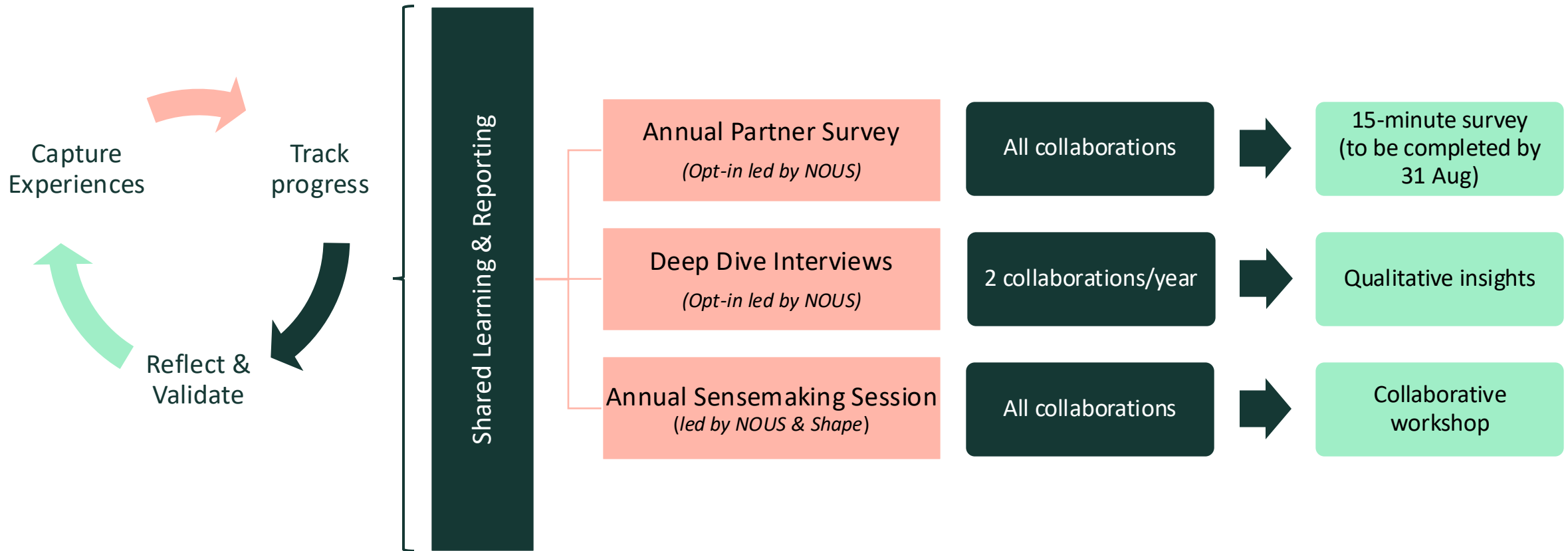

This identified a community advocacy organisation to partner with to provide support to clients during the program. Early signs show this has increased client retention by 36% and qualitative reports of an increased sense of healing and connection.</i>	•Stabilised or increasing

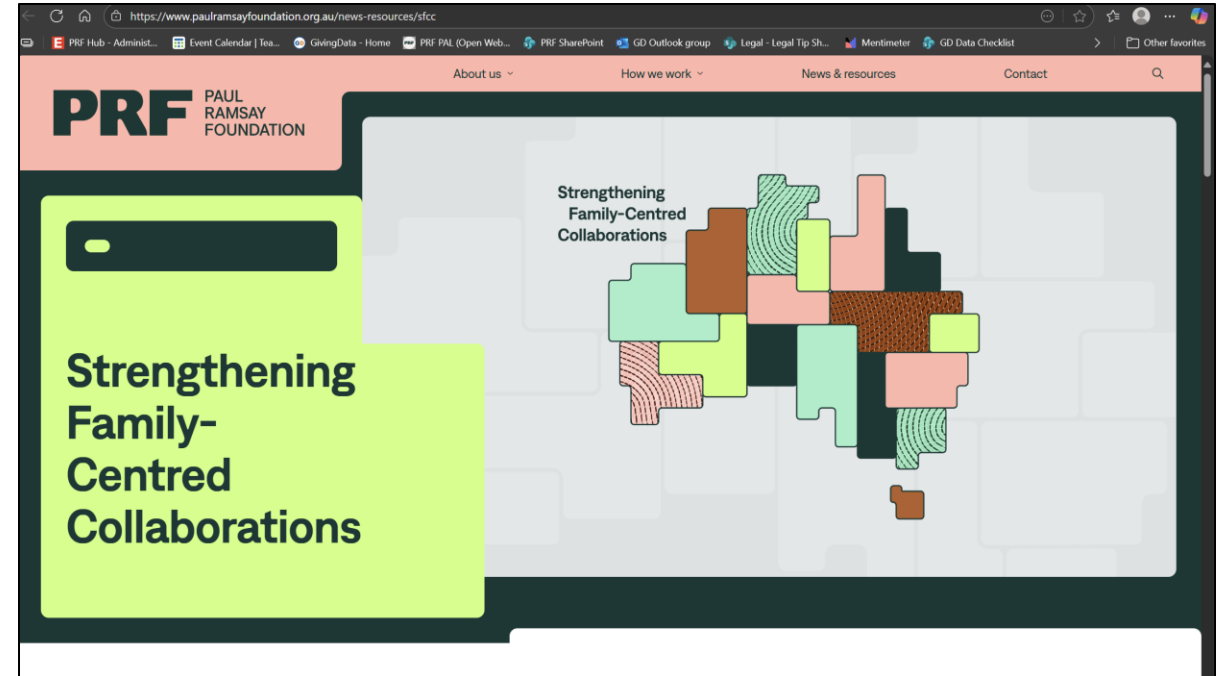
