Policy corner

New DEFRA Secretary of State

Following the September reshuffle, DEFRA has a new Secretary of state: Emma Reynolds, MP for Wycombe, who has the Thames Path right on her doorstep. Emma previously represented Wolverhampton North East (2010 – 2019), before returning to Parliament in 2024, where she was appointed to roles in the Treasury before accepting the SoS role. We've written to Emma, introducing her to the National Trails and NTUK, and we look forward to building a positive and productive working relationship.

<u>Autumn Budget Submission</u>

With the Autumn Budget set for 26th November, NTUK has once again made a submission on behalf of our members, demonstrating the strong business case to invest in National Trails. Drawing on much of the same information gathered from the National Trails for the Second Stage spending review in the Spring, (huge thanks again to the National Tails who were a part of that work), we have again asked Government to increase funding for the National Trails in line with inflation and the increase in the National Trails network. Together, we're showing just how strong the business case for National Trails really is.

Access for all Funding - building the case studies

Despite the challenges of the short-term notice, and having to deliver capital projects in-year, it has been amazing at Partnership meetings to see how National Trails have used the Access for All funding. The projects we have seen so far are going to make a meaningful difference to increasing access for everyone along the National Trails network.

We'd love to hear how you're using your Access for All funding. Sharing your projects with us helps build a collective picture of the impact this funding is having and creates a pool of inspiring ideas for other Trails to draw on in the future.


