National Trails Funding call with DEFRA and Natural England

We're working in partnership with DEFRA and Natural England on long term National Trails funding, including opportunities for National Trails funding in wider government programmes and alternative income sources.

We're putting together a call to bring together National Trail reps with DEFRA and NE to look ahead at future funding options to help shape collectively agreed action and next steps.

An invite has gone out to a range of National Trail Officers, National Trail Chairs and Senior Leadership of National Trail host organisations for a call at the end of June. We'll be updating the wider network with outcomes and actions once the call has happened.

Major funding success for Nature Ridge project

A new partnership project connecting wildlife, heritage and access to nature across some of England's most iconic chalk landscapes has secured major funding support.

Congratulations to The Ridgeway National Trail, North Wessex Downs National Landscape and Chilterns National Landscape on the success of their Nature Ridge Landscape Connections Project. The initiative will help strengthen nature recovery, celebrate cultural heritage and improve opportunities for people to connect with these nationally important landscapes and trails.

Funding secured for Scoping the Coast to Coast Nature Trail project

A major new project exploring the creation of a nature-rich corridor along the newly designated Coast to Coast Path National Trail has secured funding to begin developing its vision and next steps.

The project brings together North York Moors National Park, Lake District National Park, Yorkshire Dales National Park, North Pennines National Landscape and National Trails UK to investigate opportunities for more than 60,000 hectares of connected, wildlife-rich landscapes linked to the National Trail.

NTUK is also delighted to be hosting a new Data and Evidence officer, who will work with partners over the coming year to help shape the project's future direction.

NTUK Talks: tackling the challenges facing our Trails

Over the past quarter, NTUK hosted four NTUK Talks sessions, bringing members together to share experiences, ideas and practical solutions to some of the most pressing issues facing National Trail teams.

Discussions ranged from coastal erosion and disappearing beach access on the Pembrokeshire Coast Path and King Charles III England Coast Path, to the complexities of charging for temporary closures over open access land.

Members also explored accessibility challenges on urban stretches of the England Coast Path, including the growing impact of climate change and severe storms, with valuable insights shared on reducing volunteer fatigue.

The final session focused on mental health and suicide prevention across the National Trails network, with guest speaker Ross Macleod from RNLI sharing guidance, [support resources](#) and [free suicide awareness training opportunities](#) for officers and volunteers.
