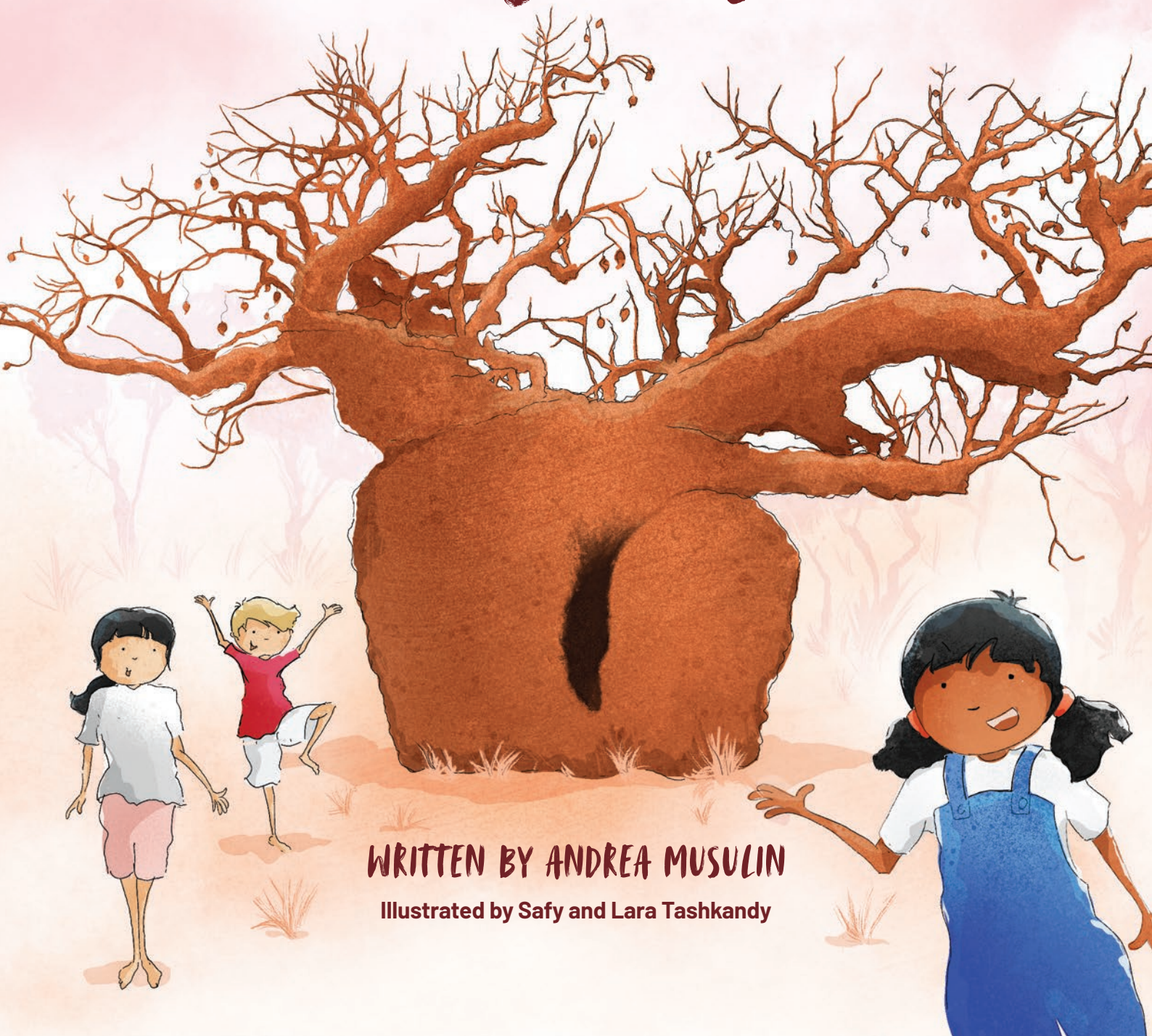

blue-winged kookaburras roam.





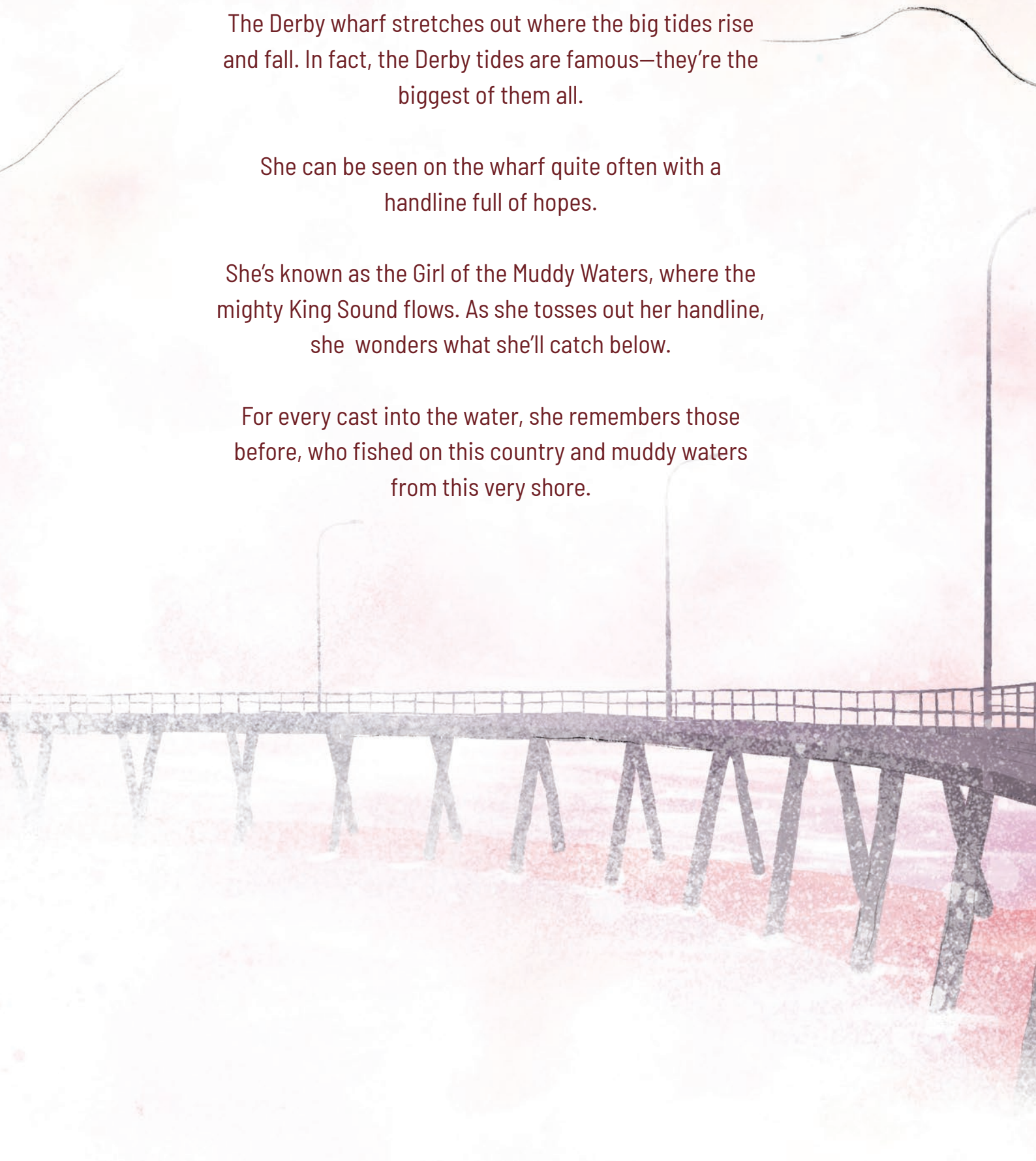
You are here

from this very shore.

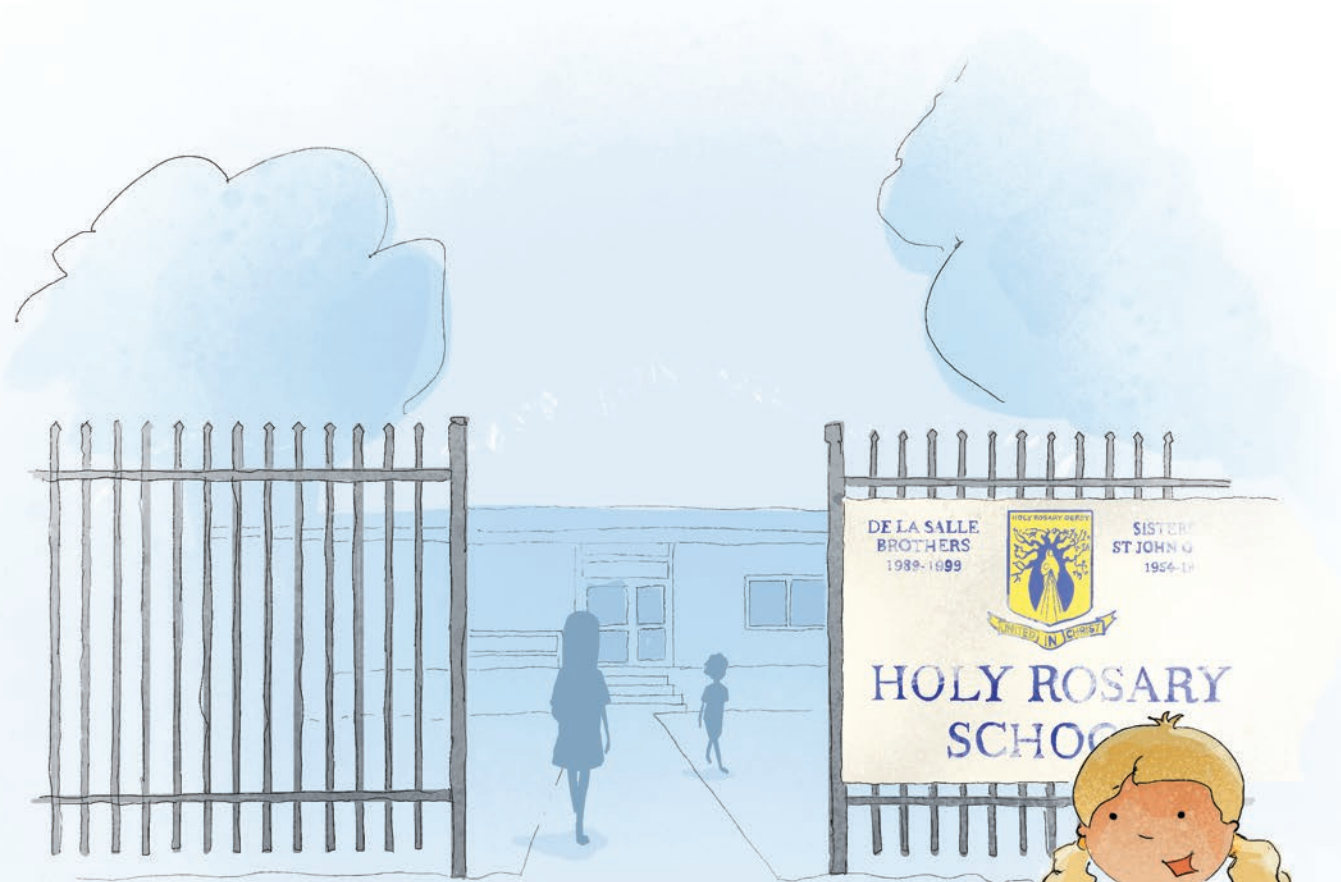






There are two schools in Derby where children go each day.

There's Derby District High School, where children go to learn and play, and there's Holy Rosary Catholic School where the children go to learn, have fun and pray.



But wait, there's one more school, though you won't find children there, because it's called the Kimberley School of the Air.

From stations, communities and homes both near and far away, students join their classes and learn something new each day.





Derby is a place where history comes alive,
in the heart of Kimberley Country where culture
continues to thrive.

Derby became a town in 1883, on Country rich with
stories from the land and from the sea.

The famous Prison Boab Tree still stands proud
today, helping us remember history and the many
lessons along the way.

For many Aboriginal families, this tree tells stories
too, of courage, hope and healing, and the strength
to start anew.

The famous Prison Boab Tree reminds us every
day, to learn from our history and to build a better
way.





Cuttings is where the kids like to throw a line, but
it's Barra that the kids catch most of the time.

This is where the people of Derby gather, yarn and
meet, and always keep a careful lookout for the mud
crabs at their feet!



A favourite spot for local kids, both near and far away,
the Cuttings is a special place for kids to spend a
Derby day.



The old people call the Fitzroy River The Mighty Martuwarra and
it's much more than a stream. It's full of ancient stories, more
than kids could ever dream.

For thousands of years, its waters have helped Country thrive,
giving life to people, plants and animals to survive.



A place of culture, caring and traditions passed along,
its spirit lives within the land, forever proud and strong.

Though the floods brought change and the old bridge
has now passed, a new one stands in its place while
honouring the past.





Wharf

Every place on this map tells a story for you and me.

You might spot the Derby jetty stretching out into
the bay, or visit the famous Boab Prison Tree along

You might see the Derby Pool, the hospital or

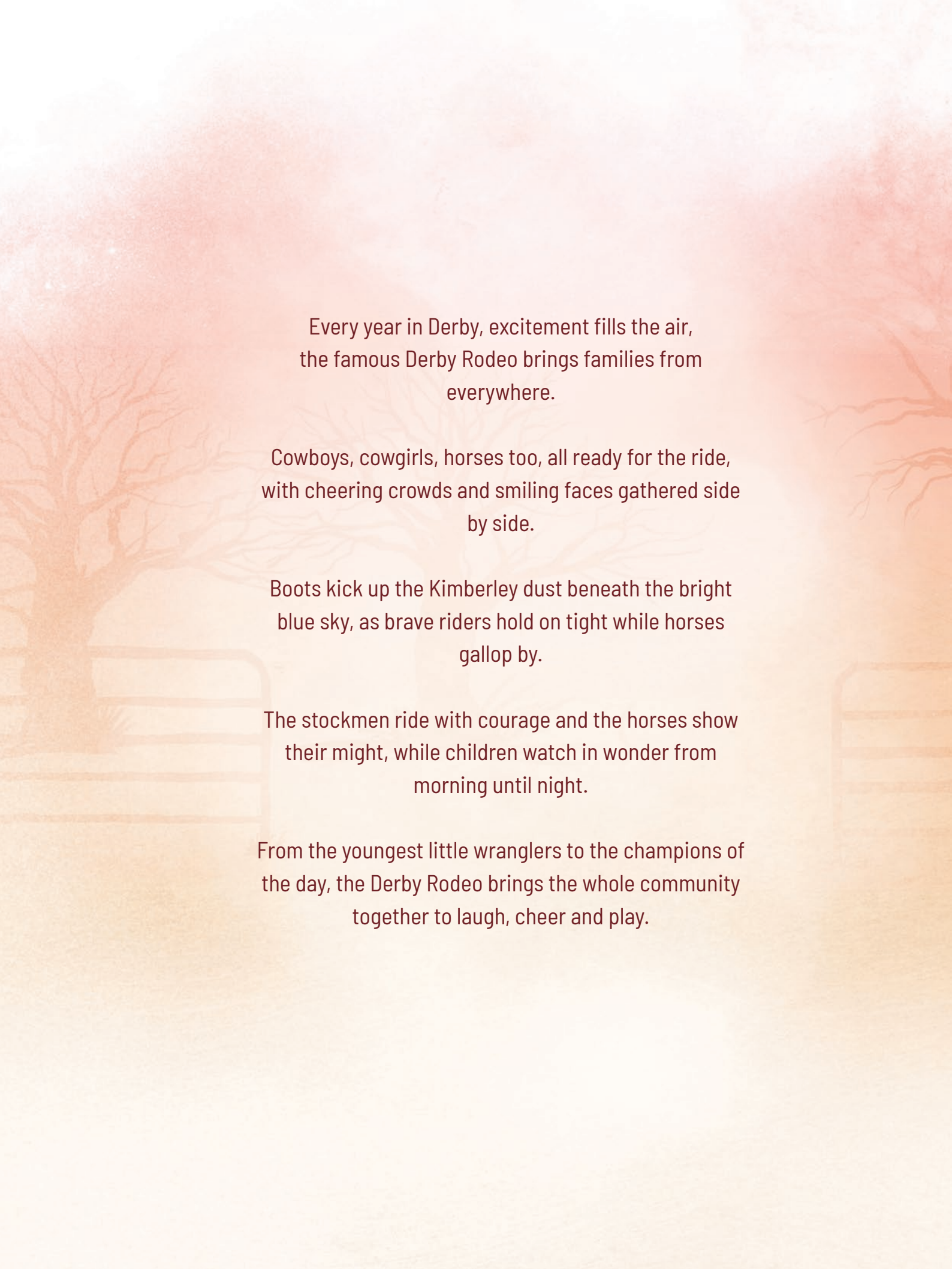

Every year in Derby, excitement fills the air,
the famous Derby Rodeo brings families from
everywhere.

Cowboys, cowgirls, horses too, all ready for the ride,
with cheering crowds and smiling faces gathered side
by side.

Boots kick up the Kimberley dust beneath the bright
blue sky, as brave riders hold on tight while horses
gallop by.

The stockmen ride with courage and the horses show
their might, while children watch in wonder from
morning until night.

From the youngest little wranglers to the champions of
the day, the Derby Rodeo brings the whole community
together to laugh, cheer and play.





But wherever they live,
it's important to know
that all kids in Derby
still need adults to help them grow.



Derby kids are special, they are all one of a kind.
They may look different and have their own individual design.

Some kids are in wheelchairs or have extraordinary minds
but, most importantly,

*all kids in Derby have the right to feel safe
all of the time!*

Some kids feel unsafe depending on who they are with
or what they are doing,
whose house they are at or what pictures they are viewing.

It might be a secret they have been made to keep
or something at night when they are trying to sleep?

Someone might ask to see someone's
private parts under their clothes
but if it's not their job to do this, then that's not how it goes.







When Derby kids feel unsafe, they might feel it in their belly or maybe they sweat or their legs turn to jelly.

These feelings have names. It's not just in their minds.
These reactions are called

Early Warning Signs.



Their heart might beat fast, or their brain might race away.
If this ever happens, HELP they must say and,
if it is possible, try and get away.

If this ever happens, it's important to know
that all kids in Derby can let their feelings show.

Some worries kids hide may be big and some worries may
be small but it's important for kids to talk to a trusted
grown-up about them all!

Ignoring unsafe feelings won't make them go away.
If you don't tell a grown-up, the worry will stay.



Remember

Nothing is so awful you can't talk with someone about it.

Kids need to know that this is true,
so always tell a grown-up if there is something
worrying you.

When feeling unsafe, kids should try not to fear,
there are plenty of adults who are just waiting to hear.





It simply doesn't matter what you've done or what you do.
There are lots of grown-ups in Derby who care about you.

Maybe someone in your mob is there when things get
rough to help you see things through.

Can you think of someone you know that
you could talk to?



If at first you don't feel safe,
keep telling till you do.

Keep telling the grown-ups whom you trust,
they are there to help you.
